The December field trip was taken on the 11th to the campus of the University of California at Berkeley, thence through Strawberry Canyon and the Botanical Gardens. It was a perfect day sunny and warm, after an early morning thunder and lightning storm. Luncheon was eaten at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur H. Myer, who very generously provided good hot coffee and plenty of cake and cookies.

Birds were few and far between. The most interesting observation was that of an American Golden-eye found in the swimming pool in Strawberry Canyon. This, I believe, is a new record for the campus. The list of twenty-eight species is as follows:

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Christmas Bird Census for San Francisco

The Christmas census for 1937 was taken on December 19th, embracing Fort Mason, the Marina, the Presidio, the ocean beach, Golden Gate Park, Sunset Boulevard and Lake Merced, from 8:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. The weather was perfect, sunny and warm, with an average temperature of 60°.

The birds seen on the Sunset Boulevard were one Quail, one Anna Hummingbird, five Robins and twelve Nuttall Sparrows.

In addition to the above territory, one of our members visited Laurel Hill Cemetery. As this cemetery is to be removed before long, which means also its trees and shrubs, which make it now an ideal bird refuge, it is of interest to record the species observed there perhaps for the last time: one Sharp-shinned Hawk, two Anna Hummingbirds, three Red-shafted Flickers, four California Jays, ten Western Robins, one Audubon Warbler, six English Sparrows, one San Francisco Towee, twenty Juncos and two Nuttall Sparrows, a total of ten species and fifty individuals.

Christmas Bird Census at Benicia, California

Benicia, California, December 24, 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Partly cloudy, turning to cold rain, which continued most of the day; light southeast wind; temperature 43° at start, 52° at return. Observers traveling together by automobile with occasional stops to canvass the marsh and hills along highway between Benicia and Cordelia, the two towns being fourteen miles apart. Total 57 species, 7142 individuals.

The pair of Kites has been observed almost daily during the past year on a certain small acreage within the area covered. Shorebirds were almost absent due to the usual shoreline being covered by high flood waters from the central valleys. Visibility was not sufficiently satisfactory to identify many wildfowl in the distance.
