which we are being surrounded. My
experience has made it impossible
for me not to be suspicious. If the
letter is genuine, depend upon it that
so long as there is a Labor Government and I am responsible to that
Government, it will handle with firmsess and discrimination every attempt
by an outside power to interfere with
our internal affairs."

MURDER ARE SIFTED AND FOUND UNTRUE

Sensational Reports About Janet Smith Case Baseless, Manson Declares

Blames Municipal Police For Inexcusable Bungling; Still Seek Murderer

Breaking his long silence on the Janet Smith case, Attorney General Manson issued a care fully-worded statement to-day declaring that recent sensational rumors about the murder of the Point Grey housemaid have been investigated and found ground less; that everything humanly possible is being done by the Pro

possible is being done by the Provincial Police to solve the mystery of the crime, and that inexcusable bungling by the Point Grey authorities in the handling of the case in its early stages has greatly increased the difficulty of tracing the munderer.

Mr. Manson's statement follows:

"Although it may not be usual for the Crown to publicly discuss the evidence in its hands in criminal cases. I feel that so much public meters has been taken in the death of Janet Smith, and so many rumors have been set affoat, that it would at least be advisable, under the special circumstances, that something authentic should be given to the public.

U.S. MAY BAR OUT **COUNTESS KAROLYI**

Wife of Ex-President of Hungary, Radical, Arrives to Give Lectures

New York, Oct. 27.—An effort is being made by S. Stanwood Menken, president of the National Security League, to have the Government deport Countess Catherine Karoly, wife of the former President of Hungary, who arrived yesterday on the steamship George Washington to give a series of lectures. He thinks she is a Bolshevik and a menace to United States institutions.

RAILWAY FREIGHT RATES PUT BACK ON LEVEL WHICH WAS RULE BEFORE JULY 7 LAST

Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways Today Withdrew Crow's Nest Agreement Rates, as Ordered on October 14 by Railway Commission of Canada After Sessions at Which Arguments Were

Ottawa, Oct. 27 .- In compliance with the order of the Board of Railway Commissioners, the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways have withdrawn the tariffs filed following the restoration of the Crow's Nest Pass rates on July 7 last. The withdrawal is effective to-day.

The result is that the rates are now as they were on July 6 last, prior to the revival of the Crow's Nest Pass Agreement.

The tariffs were disallowed by the Railway Commission in a judgment on October 14, following a protracted hearing in Ottawa, and the railways were given fifteen days from the date of the judgment to withdraw them.

CANADA'S GROWING TRADE

TF THE OFFICIAL TRADing figures for the last three years still fail to convince Dr. Tolmie that industrial conditions in Canada have improved to a very considerable extent under the policies of the present Government at Ottawa, we would direct his attention to the comment of The London Times on the growth of trade between this country and the United States—a condition which it considers has been brought about by Canada's recent development.

Our London contemporary points to the fact that during the five years before the war Britain's annual exports to the United States averaged a value of £56,000,000. Germany sold our neighbor goods to the value of £35,100,000; France £26,000,000; Cuba was fourth in the list and Canada came fifth. Now The Times points out that during the fwelve months end-ing June 30 last this country's ex-ports to the United States repre-sented a value of £83,500,000 as compared with the United King-dom's bill of £68,000,000. In other words Canada leads the field in exports to the republic to the

The Bankers Trust Company of New York comments on these circumstances as follows: "Canada's trade position in relation to the United States and Great Britain is shown greatly to have improved during the past three years. In 1921 the Dominion was a debtor to the United States after settling her trade balance with Great Britain, of which country Canada was a creditor, to the amount of \$28,626,000; whereas the triangular settlement for the past year leaves Canadas a net creditor of Great Britain for \$16,116,000. This is brought about by the fact that Canada has greatly increased her exports to Great Britain, while imports from the United States to Canada have been reduced to a much greater extent than exports from Canada to the United States.

It will be noted that Canada "has greatly increased her exports to Great Britain." This is what we have been trying to do; we have spent a good deal of money at Wembley in order that the British consumer might learn something about Canadian industry and what this country has for sale besides wheat. The investment is a good one; yet Mr. Meighen would reduce Anglo-Canadian trade by removing the British preference until Canadian goods are specially favored for entry into the United

It is thus obvious that the League of Nations is not faced with the obstacle which barred progress in 1899 and again in 1907. Her people are obviously in a different frame of mind to-day.






