CROW'S NEST PASS FREIGHT RATES WITHDRAWN

RAILWAY FREIGHT RATES PUT BACK ON LEVEL WHICH WAS RULE BEFORE JULY 7 LAST

Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways Today Withdrew Crow's Nest Agreement Rates, as Ordered on October 14 by Railway Commission of Canada After Sessions at Which Arguments Were Heard

Ottawa, Oct. 27.—In compliance with the order of the Board of Railway Commissioners, the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways have withdrawn the tariffs filed following the restoration of the Crow's Nest Pass rates on July 7 last. The withdrawal is effective to-day.

PROPHETS IN BRITAIN ARE ATTEMPTING TO FORECAST RESULT OF POLLING OCT. 29

One Man Whose Opinion Press Quotes Says New Commons Will Include 300 Conservatives, 200 Laborites, 100 Liberals and 15 Others; Premier MacDonald Says He Believed Zinovieff Letter Authentic

London, Oct. 27.—An election observer whose previous predictions have been surprisingly accurate, and who is widely quoted by the press, makes the following forecast of the result of the British general election on Wednesday:

Conservatives, 300; Labor, 200; Liberals, 100; other parties, 15.

In general the prophets to-day, without considering the actual number of seats that will be won, assume that the Conservative poll will be largely increased, and the Liberal poll reduced, but not drastically.

In the last election there were majorities of under 500 in ridings returning twenty Liberals, thirty Unionists, fifteen Labor members and two Independents.

Cardiff, Wales, Oct. 27.—Premier MacDonald, speaking at a political meeting here to-day, declared he honestly believed to be genuine the alleged letter from M. Zinovieff to the British Communists, upon which was based in part the protest submitted by the British Foreign Office on Friday to the Russian Soviet representative in London.

Accepting the challenge of a hostile press to make public the date of receipt of the Zinovieff letter to the Government, Mr. MacDonald declared the letter had been received by the Foreign Office on October 19, the date of the dissolution of Parliament. Only nine days had elapsed between the receipt of the document and the answer, he said.

CONTRAST IS SHOWN

Stressing the fact that the matter had been handled in the briefest possible time, the Premier asserted that "in the old days" the Foreign Office would have taken weeks to deal with the situation.

Mr. MacDonald declared unequivocally that the British Government would not brook interference from any foreign power. He said he could not avoid the suspicion that the entire incident was a political plot.

Referring to the possibility that the letter might have been a forgery, the Premier said:

"If the letter is a forgery it shows the amount of scoundrelism with which we are being surrounded. My experience has made it impossible for me not to be suspicious. If the letter is genuine, depend upon it that I am responsible to that Government. It will handle with firmness and discrimination every attempt by an outside power to interfere with our internal affairs."

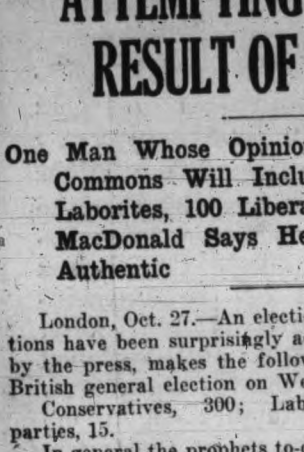

REVOLUTIONARIES IN BENGAL TOWNS TO BE PUT DOWN

Would be Dangerous to Let Them Continue, Says the Government

Order Made by Viceroy Enables Police to Take Necessary Action

Calcutta, Oct. 27 (Canadian Press Cable via Reuters)—Asked his reasons Saturday for asking the Earl of Reading, Viceroy of India, to promulgate the new ordinance for the suppression of extremist demonstrations, the Chief Secretary of the Bengal Government stated the Government had been informed by reliable sources for some time that the revolutionary movement was being organized by the terrorist leaders, and it was very dangerous to allow the revolutionary movement to remain unchecked.

NANAIMO ASSIZES BROUGHT TO CLOSE

John Meredith Found Guilty of Criminal Charge

Nanaimo, Oct. 27.—The Nanaimo Assize Court was brought to a close when John Meredith was found guilty of a criminal charge affecting Agnes Gavin on Sept. 18 last, his jury being out forty minutes. His Lordship sentencing Meredith to ten years in the penitentiary with fifteen lashes.

Petty burglaries which have for a considerable time been a thorn in the sides of the local police force and which of late had assumed proportions which were rapidly taking them out of the petty class are thought to have been solved in the local police court, when several stiff sentences

were meted out to local youths, and through the good engineering and hard work by Constables Herdman and Blainey resulted in the recovery of some \$300 worth of loot with the probability of more being recovered in the near future.

Thursday night Constables Blainey and Herdman, through a clue which they had worked on, found under an old barn on the Indian reservation a quantity of goods which had been stolen from Morton's Hardware Store, the value which amounted to \$300. The loot included 500 rounds of ammunition, a quantity of fishing tackle, two rifles, one revolver and other smaller items.

Three arrests followed on Thursday night, and all day yesterday the local police court was busy dealing with the evidence, with the result that two boys, both under seventeen years of age, were sentenced to two years in the Industrial School and their companion, nineteen years of age, was sentenced to one year in Oakalla.

Another local man was also dealt with by Magistrate Potts, the charge against him being theft of a pocket book and a kodak from a logger with whom he had made friends. He was sentenced to twelve months in Oakalla.

FINE POULTRY FARM SUBJECT OF VISIT

"Antrim" is Scene of Demonstration in Chicken Dressing

Shawnigan Lake, Oct. 25.—"Antrim" the modern chicken ranch of Col. H. H. B. Cunningham, Shawnigan Lake, was the scene of a most interesting and instructive demonstration of chicken killing and dressing for market and table by J. H. Terry, the Provincial poultry expert, assisted by Miss Margaret Ingram of Colquitz. Miss Ingram was a land army girl during the war, and made a careful study of poultry farming.

Dr. Warnock, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, was also present and gave a very interesting account of agricultural conditions in the Province. The Shawnigan Women's Institute members were the special guests for the occasion. Accompanying them were a large number of residents of the Lake and near-by districts.

R. H. Pooley, M.P.P., was to have taken the chair, but owing to other pressing business was unable to attend. Mrs. F. F. Elford, president of the institute, presided and introduced the speakers.

Dr. Warnock made a forceful address, impressing his audience with his unbounded faith in the farming possibilities of British Columbia, backing up his optimism with facts and figures. He instanced the poor previous condition of the Okanagan district, where the apple and other fruit producers had organized and through co-operation and growing just what the market called for had placed themselves in an enviable position. The president of the association states the total proceeds from the apple-growing industry to date are \$3,250,000. The amount distributed to the growers was \$1,400,000. The freight bill amounted to approximately \$1,500,000, shipments being made in 4,214 cars. Of these 2,283 went to different points in Canada, the United States taking 180 cars, Great Britain 628, Scandinavia sixty-four, New Zealand seventeen, South Africa sixteen, the remainder going to Holland, Belgium and Mexico. Owing to improved conditions on the prairies and the Wembley exhibition in England the price of apples this year is very good, and not only fruit, but dairy products as well.

Dr. Warnock declared that with the exception of farmers in perhaps Denmark and the Province of Quebec, B.C. farmers were the most prosperous in the world, and when in course of time transportation facilities can be given the Central and Northern British Columbia and the Peace River country agriculture will rank the foremost industry of this Province.

Dr. Warnock spoke in a very enthusiastic manner of the work accomplished by the women's institutes, ranking them as the greatest means

for good of all the rural associations. Referring to the recent W.I. convention in Victoria, Dr. Warnock said it was the finest and most business-like convention I ever attended, despite the fact that they had no government assistance.

Following Dr. Warnock's address Mr. Terry gave a short address on the proper methods for fattening poultry. The hearers carried away some very useful information. The guests then proceeded to the packing house, where Mr. Terry proceeded to demonstrate the proper methods of killing and plucking. Two methods were shown, the French or sticking, and strangulation. Plucking was done by both the dry and wet method.

Miss Margaret Ingram demonstrated the method in vogue in England for preparing the bird for market. After passing through her skillful hands the chicken looked very tempting. Six chickens were used in the demonstration. These were taken at random from Col. Cunningham's flocks. Mr. Terry said their weight was far above the average. The dressed birds were auctioned off by Mr. James Christian, and the special proceeds went to the Women's Institute funds. Refreshments were served to the guests, who numbered over seventy.

Col. Eastley Wilmot led three hearty cheers for Col. Cunningham. At a luncheon preceding the demonstration Col. Cunningham entertained Dr. Warnock, Mr. J. R. Terry, Mr. W. H. Munroe, president of the B.C. Agricultural Association, Mr. E. W. Neal, vice-president of Cowichan Station and Mr. F. A. Baker of Kokislah. After the demonstration Col. Cunningham personally conducted visitors around his pen, where there are at present about 700 birds. White Leghorns and White Wyandottes. Several pens are undergoing a cream test, and they certainly are beautiful birds. Col. Cunningham explained that he is aiming to produce a type of bird that will be absolutely safe, and is assured of success.

STRANGE SCENE IN CEMETERY OF CORK

Irish National Troops and Republicans Both at Grave of MacSwiney

Annie MacSwiney Destroyed Wreath Army Officer Was About to Place

Cork, Ireland, Oct. 27.—A strange scene occurred at St. Finn Barr cemetery yesterday, the anniversary of the death of Lord Mayor MacSwiney, which was simultaneously commemorated by a national troop and a republican procession headed by Lord Mayor French.

On reaching the grave the republicans found the troops in possession. The Lord Mayor requested them to withdraw, but they refused to do so until they had red a volley over the grave. They retired a short distance, but remained in the cemetery. The Lord Mayor, addressing the people, asked them to leave without demonstration, and as they moved away, a National army officer stepped forward bearing a glass-enclosed wreath. He was confronted by Annie MacSwiney, a sister of the late Lord Mayor. She read the inscription and, snatching the wreath away, hurled it to the ground. The officer made no comment, but withdrew and Annie struck at the wreath with her umbrella, while others kicked it to pieces.

Later Republicans went to the monument in the city and there deposited wreaths intended for the grave.

UNDER NEW CAPTAIN MARU FIGHTS STORM

Battled Way Through Heavy Weather But Here on Schedule Time

On Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock, the Kaga Maru, operated by the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, arrived in this port after a particularly stormy passage from the Orient.

Maru, which still flies her trade across the Pacific, but Capt. Wada's promotion was rapid. In the long period of his service with the N.Y.K. he has commanded many vessels and on all of them has earned the reputation of being thoroughly reliable and a particularly dependable navigator.

Capt. Wada reported that two days from Victoria the weather, which had been anything but pleasant throughout the voyage, was at its worst. The Kaga Maru carried an unusually large passenger list that has been brought here by a Japanese steamship for many months.

The vessel brought silk, approximately valued at \$3,000,000, tea, porcelain, soy and bean paste as principals, and various other general freight. There were 150 tons of merchandise for this port which were discharged here before the vessel proceeded to Seattle, where among other things she will unload 418 cases of fire-crackers.

EXPECTS NEW DIESEL SHIPS TO BE CALLING HERE SOON

When the Kaga Maru of the N.Y.K. fleet arrived in this port on Saturday afternoon, her captain, N. Wada, told of the possibility of two new Diesel engine craft making their appearance on the Pacific at the beginning of next year.

"It is possible," he declared, "that the Nippon Yusen Kaisha will have these vessels running into this port from the Orient before many months have elapsed. However, it is likely that they will be tested for a few months on the coastal trade in Asia before they are given a route across the Pacific."

The new motorships, two of which have been completed by shipyards in the Clyde, will be a splendid acquisition to the big Japanese line's fleet. They have a greater speed than the older ships, and carry more passengers, and at the same time their accommodation is far better.

HEAVY FIRE LOSS

MOBILE, Ala., Oct. 27.—The Italian steamer Valturno, with a cargo of lumber, was destroyed by fire while docked at Panama City, according to advices received here. The loss will total \$500,000.

ARE FAST SHIPS

A. H. Hebb, representative of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha here, in conversation with Capt. Wada, learned the new Diesel equipped ships have a speed of fourteen to fifteen knots. The fastest ship on the line is the Iyo Maru. She is capable of a speed of only thirteen knots, but is the fastest of the N.Y.K. fleet.

No dates have been announced as to when the vessels under construction for the N.Y.K. at Clyde yards will be finished. However, there are two which are almost ready for the voyage to Yokohama, and two others which are in the last stages of construction on the building ways.

Capt. Wada would not say much as to the policy of the company regarding the Pacific ports, but asserted that under the new direction of Takekichi Shiran, the lately appointed president of the line, they expected a greater volume of trade in all parts of the world.

MALTA MARU FOUGHT GREAT BATTLE WITH STORM BEFORE MAKING PORT ON SATURDAY

Chartered to Load Lumber Here for Atlantic Ports, Vessel Took Twenty-five Hours on Trip From Alberni to Victoria, Fighting Her Way Through Threatening Seas and Howling Gale

The story of the battle with the storm on Friday night, when the Malta Maru left Alberni for Victoria, and the vessel's subsequent victory over weather such as many aboard had never seen before, is told by the picture of unusual disarrangement on the ship's decks as she lies here to-day taking on cargo.

Meanwhile, waves, great mountains of green water, were crashing over the vessel from stem to stern. Seamen were washed mercilessly across the slippery decks, bumping into hatch covers and ending in the scuppers, with water coursing over their bodies.

There were representatives of lumber companies aboard the vessel. The charterers, the Southern Alberta Lumber Company, had a man aboard. He was several times being out of his bunk in the captain's quarters where he was trying to snatch a few minutes rest, as the ship plunged into deep troughs or rose, suddenly, on a mountainous sea.

Every now and again the lumber in the hold of the ship could be heard falling in a moment when the storm did not drown all other noises. It was heard to be the time the vessel made port, and the ship listed dangerously from time to time.

After several hours of battle the mainmast port shroud was carried away by a gigantic wave and the No. 1 derrick was damaged, some of the gear going overboard.

The ship left Alberni on Friday at 5 a.m. and it was not until 5 a.m. on the following day that she made her way into the Royal Roads, and anchored off the quarantine station. Shortly after sunrise she lay alongside the pier of the Canadian Puget Sound Lumber Company, and lumber was being loaded into her hold.

Her chief officer, S. Yoshitomi, says that she will be once more ready for sea in the course of a few days, and the crew are working hard to have everything restored to their usual order by the time the mills have the Victoria lumber safely stored in her holds.

The chief engineer and the wireless operator were repairing the wireless aerial this morning, and the decks were still littered with spare tackle and tools as the crew went about their work of repairing the vessel's parts.

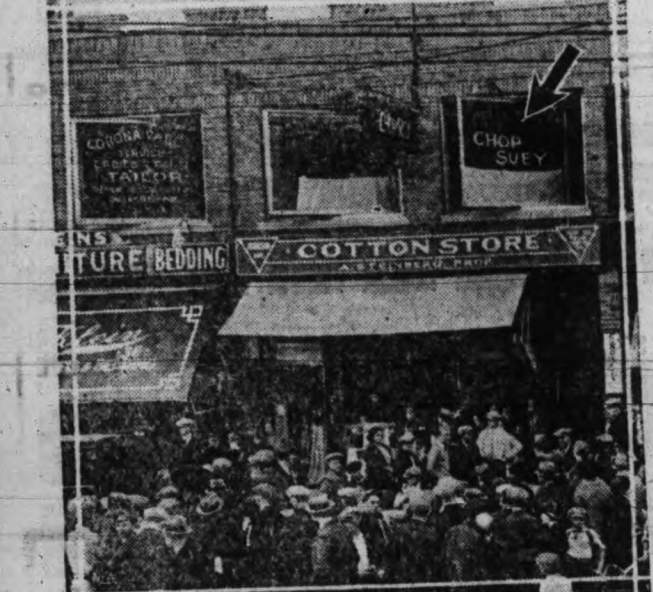

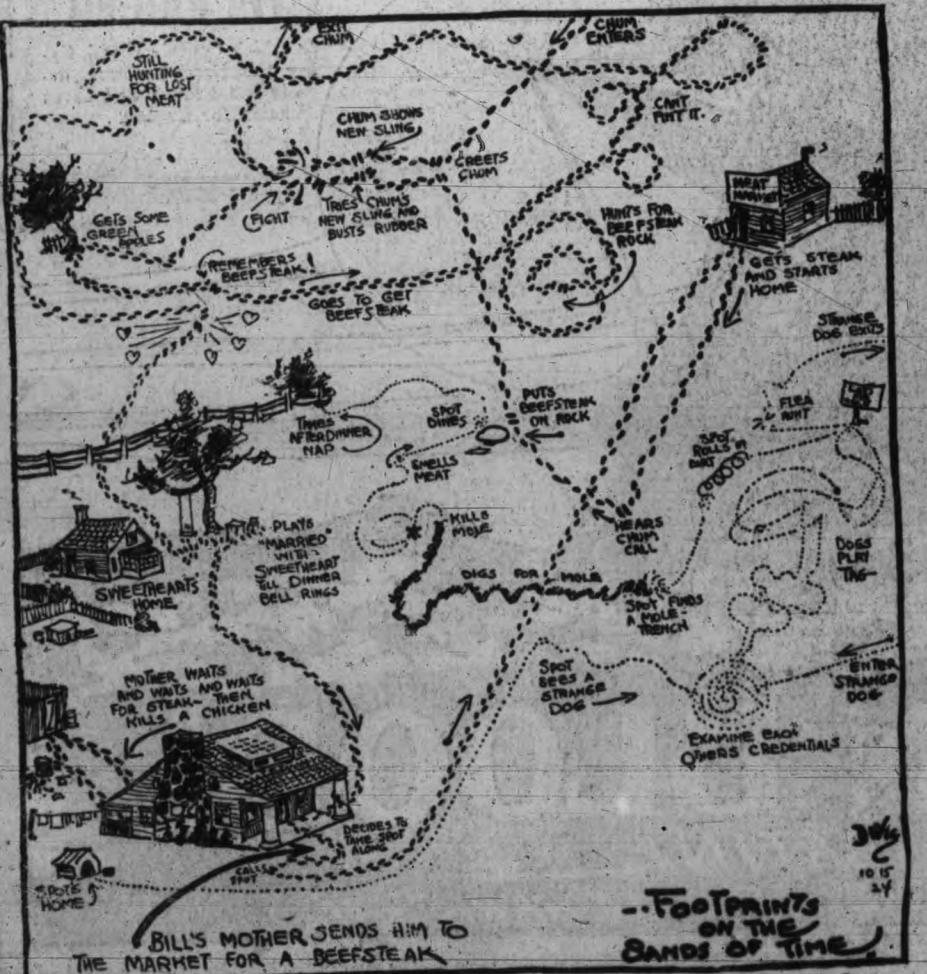

H. Lawson, on behalf of ten plaintiffs whose business it is claimed is being affected by the structure.

The point of view may at times be somewhat deplorable in nature, but the fact very clearly remains that there has been a steady and continued progress in settlement, development and interest in new developments. After all, it is the advance rate at which the West is advancing that counts, rather than hectic developments which formed part of the Western programme some years ago.
