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

Our Peony Show Gardens

For the convenience of those interested in Peonies we have established at our Nursery a Peony Show Garden, consisting of two each of all the varieties of Peonies we grow. This makes it possible to study a great number of varieties without necessitating going thru the fields. The Show Garden has grass walks between the rows of plants.

Single and Japanese Peonies

During the last few years Garden Architects have become intensely interested in Single and Japanese Peonies, resulting in an increasing demand generally. The fact that these two classes have been very scarce make them rather exclusive, but gradually varieties are being released for plantings.

Several varieties of Japanese and Single Peonies make wonderful cutflowers because their colors and shapes are so artistic.

We have a large collection of Single and Japanese varieties, many we are not yet ready to offer, but of the following we can supply reasonably large quantities.

What to Plant with Peonies

Many plants may be planted between and amongst Peonies; in beds and borders they alternate well with Delphinium, Michaelmas Daisies, Artemisia, etc. Bulbs such as Gladioli, that flower when the Peonies are long past, and other bulbs such as Early Tulips, Narcissi, Scillas and Crocus are among the most admirable consorts for Peonies.

Peonies are the best associates for Lilies. Either Lilium Auratum or Lilium Speciosum is good. By using these bulbs as fillers your Peony bed will bloom through July and August. The early flowering Peonies will give the Lilies the shelter they crave and you will have the stately Lilies and Peonies growing in the same space.

Shakespeare, himself, must have noticed the companionability of the Lily, for he speaks of "Thy banks with paeonied and lilied brim," in "The Tempest."


