## TRAFFIC EXPERT ENDORSES BRAKE ON FORD MOTORS

Motor car purchasers, careful to consider safety elements in automobile construction, are giving more and more attention all the time to cars in which the operations necessary for proper control in traffic are reduced to a minimum.

Several reasons instantly appear for this, principal of which is that the more complicated the construction or the more complex the manipulations necessary for control, the greater are the chances for trouble and even dangers in operation.

All of which brings home the fact that nothing contributes a greater element of safety in motoring than the utmost simplicity in those parts of the car upon which the control depends, thereby freeing the driver from as much exertion and distraction as possible.

**Command in Traffic**

"A notable example of how this can be successfully carried out was found in the design and operation of the control of the Ford car, which gives the driver exceptional command in traffic, in mud and sand—in fact, in every place where facility of control is all important," stated a well-known traffic expert after testing a Ford coupe from the San Francisco branch of the other day.

"The all important brake, chief element of safety, was an outstanding feature of Ford control in the experiment. Operating through the foot pedal with but little effort, it exerted a quick grip and permitted immediate stopping of the car."

**Ford Brake Simple**

"The action of the Ford brake is simple," he commented, "for it is transmitted from the pedal directly to a drum on the driving shaft, giving the Ford owner a powerful, positive brake.

"An emergency brake, operated by a hand lever and acting on the drums of the rear wheels, also is provided. Construction of this dual brake system is of such simple and direct design that adjustment is seldom necessary and the safety factor is always of the highest."

## ALL-STEEL BODY STYLE POPULAR

Automobile bodies, while not receiving as much attention as some of the other improvements, have nevertheless, been changed for the better in strength and lasting qualities.

The first autos were equipped with wooden bodies, a heritage from the old carriage days. There are still many who no doubt can remember the first automobile bodies which were made with wooden frames covered with metal panels. While refinements on these first bodies have been made, the industry, in the main, still clings to the auto bodies of that type.

However, Dodge Brothers bodies, in contrast, show an advancement in construction that seems to be destined to mark the eventual passing of the use of metal sheets over wooden frames.

**All-Steel Body**

Back in 1914 when John F. Dodge and Horace E. Dodge decided to bring out an automobile bearing their own name, after having built parts for other manufacturers for a decade, they started the automobile world by announcing an all-steel body on their open cars.

The Dodge brothers were great metal workers and had an important hand in the development of progressive manufacturing by machinery with the elimination of hand labor. It was clear to them from the very beginning that economical, rapid and uniform production could not be secured with any materials other than steel.

It was but natural that their thoughts should turn to an all-metal body, with their minds trained to the manufacture of axles, forgings, engine parts and other metal parts. They were the first to incorporate in their output the all-steel body.

The success of the first all-steel bodies led them to start experimenting an all-steel closed car bodies. Death summoned them both before they had completed their task, but their work was carried on until now the entire line of Dodge Brothers passenger cars, with the exception of one model, is of all-steel construction.

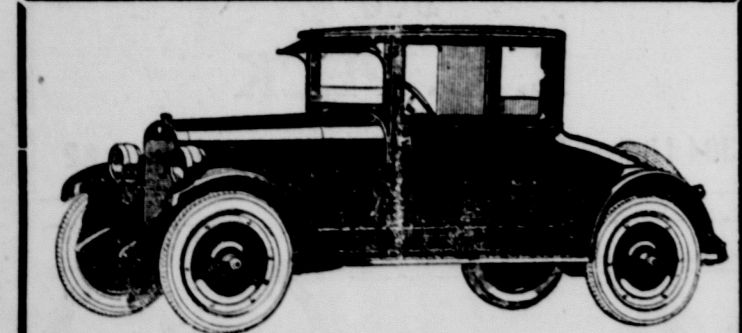
