AND ATTEMPTED TO END HIS OWN LIFE

Tragedy in Seattle Was Result of Jealeusy-The Murderer Will

Seattle, Nov. 4.-Death was the reward that came to Mrs. Flora M. Shannon for her kindness to one in affliction. Sympathy for him as he lay injured in her home, mistaken for a feeling, of deeper affection, led James Brady to of her life and brands him a murderer. To Brady, during his sickness, Mrs. Shannon ministered to his every want, but in health she spurned his love and other, and this admission fired the spark of mad jealousy in the bosom of the man that took her life.

The killing of Mrs. Shannon occurred in Flat D. 1310 Denny way, some time yesterday afternoon. Her dead body and the unconscious form of Brady, who attempted to end his own life, were discovered in the house shortly after 3 o'clock by A. B. Currie, affianced husband of the woman. Mrs. Shannon, had evidently been dead only a short time for her

Clothing Had Been Set on Fire by the powder from the weapon of her slayer, and it was blazing when Currie

Currie extinguished the fire and telephoned at once to the police.

When Corner Carroll and Sergeant of tectives Tennant arrived it was and that Mrs. Shannon had met he death as the result of two gunshot wounds inflicted with a .38 caliber revolver. One bullet entered her throat, and lodged in the right shoulder. The second bullet struck her just above and in front of the left ear, penetrated the brain and came out behind the right ear. 



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

COMES FROM PEARY

STEAMER ROOSEVELT IS BEING REPAIRED

Return Voyage Was Incessant Struggle With Ice - Explorer Says Progress

Lennox, Mass., Nov. 3 .- Mr. Morris K. Jessup, president of the Peary Arctic Club, to-day received the following telegram from Commander Peary: "Steamer Roosevelt, now at Hope-

"Steamer Roosevelt, now at Hopedain repairing rudder and stern, tak ing ballast and awaiting arrival mail steamer to secure coal. Return voyage incessant struggle with lee to Cape York, September 28th. Then storms and head winds to Labrador coast, October 23rd, Carried away two rudders, sternpost and spanker-boom. Lost one boat. Burned all coal and some interior beams, using wood and hiubber along coast. Expect to communicate again from Chatesu Bay. All progress will be slow. Have no anxiety for our safety and give no credence to exaggerated reports. Commander Peary's Polar steamship, the Roosevelt, left New York on
her long journey in search of the Pole
on July 16th, 1905. The vessel, for

Peary Arctic Club of New York, was
designed particularly for Arctic exlocation. She can be suited by the state of the pole of designed particularly for Arctic ex-ploration. She cost about \$100,000. The Roosevelt had a crew of 20 men and Captain Bartiett. Captain Bartlett.

The Roosevelt left Sydney, C. B., where she was joined by Commander Peary, on July 28th. She was next reported at Dominion Run, Labrador, on July 29th, from which point she received to Graenland. The vessel set on July 29th, from which point she crossed to Greenland. The vessel next was heard from at Etah, Greenland. She passed Cape York on August 7th, and reached Etah on August 18th. The expedition's auxiliary steamer Erik, in the meantime, had visited various settlements in Greenland, and secured natives and dogs for the exploration, and turned them over to the Roosevelt on August 18th.

At Etah the Roosevelt overhauled her machinery, took on board her last supply of coal from the Erik, and thence proceeded north with Esquimaux to the number of 23 on board, and about 200 dogs.

When nothing had been heard of the When nothing had been heard of the Roosevelt by last July, friends of the Arctic explorer who had expected a message of some kind in May or June, began to be worried at the long delay. This anxiety, however, was not shared by the members of the club, who said they did not expect to hear from Peary will locker. until October or November. It was then explained that his only way of

then explained that his only way of getting news down from the north was by whaling ships.

Peary planned to have his headquarters 350 miles north of Cape Sabine.

From that point he hoped to make his actual journey to the Pole, a distance of 500 miles across a desert of ice and snow. This final dash he expected to

make in a month or six weeks from the time he left headquarters.

The previous record for the point nearest the Pole was made by Captain Cagni, of the Duke of Abruzzi's Italian expedition, which reached 86.34 north, or within 237 statute miles of the Pole.

The point preched by ePary 87.6, places him about 203 miles from the Pole.
