







DEDICATION

Class 44-C, newest pilots in the Army Air Forces, respectfully dedicates its classbook, *Macrocosm*, to our "Old Man," Col. Donald B. Phillips, a Command Pilot with 34 years flying experience and an enviable combat record in World War I.

Since 1910, when he made his first solo flight from the Bennings Race Track near Washington, D. C., Col. Phillips has been connected with aviation. A 2nd Lt. during the first World War, he served as flight commander of the 186th Aero Squadron in France and over Germany from September, 1918 until July, 1919. From 1928 on, after originating the systematic study of Air Corps accidents, he directed various lines of aeronautical development and research for the Army.

He was promoted to the rank of Colonel in March, 1942, when he held the post commandanship at the Victorville, California, Advanced Flying School. Col. Phillips was also commanding officer of Lemoore Army Air Field, from June 1942 until he assumed his command here last October.



TO THE MEMBERS OF CLASS 44-C:

You new pilots, members of one of the largest classes ever to receive wings at Marfa Army Air Field, have experienced training which has been rugged in spots, but you have worked your way to the goal.

You now have a high degree of pilot skill—more important, your conduct has proved that you are proud to wear the uniform of your country and the insignia of the Air Forces.

You have done well—but you could not have succeeded without the devoted effort and sacrifices of the thousands here who have worked inconspicuously at scores of intricate and laborious tasks.



A flying Cadet does not—as some people may imagine—spend all of his time in an airplane. He spends some time in the P. X., some in his cozy sack, and a goodly portion of his day in Ground School.

Claire Chennault, Commander of the famed Flying Tigers, proved the value of daily ground school to pilots. If only a brief talk—scratching diagrams in the dirt with a stick—his pilots received daily "ground school" and their records in combat have proved the value of ground instruction.

Here at Marfa, under the guidance of Capt. R. S. O'Connor, the ground school is the best the army has to offer. Capt. O'Connor, who has been stationed at this field since it first sprung up from the barren desert, received his "baptism by fire" in the First World War. He served as a 2nd Lieutenant in the battles of the Argonne, St. Mihiel and Metz. Being, by profession, a civil engineer and teacher, he is well qualified for his position as Director of Ground School.








The above action takes place daily after the customary all morning rumor "There will be no P. T. today."






Cadets manage to involve themselves and their aircraft in so many unusual situations that four tower operators and a control officer are needed at all times to keep their affairs in order.

The job of making radio checks, giving taxi instructions, replacing unserviceable aircraft, checking all take-offs and landings, watching for wheels up approaches, and issuing weather reports is made a little more nerve-wracking by the constant screech of five or six high-frequency cadet voices coming in over but two receivers.

Marfa Tower which is affiliated with the Army Airways Communications System receives five frequencies simultaneously. Two of these are student transmissions and the other three are for transient aircraft.

Dealing with transient aircraft is only an incidental part of the tower's work. Its main objective is to conduct student traffic to and from the field in the safest manner possible.

May we never have to hear and may the tower operators never have to utter again that time worn phrase—"Bring the base leg in closer to the field."

Due to the strife and the hell of a life—due to those instrument checks.







The Link Trainer Department is set up in close cooperation with the Instrument Flying Department to give the cadets instruction in instrument flying on the ground before the same problems are flown in the air. These problems are first explained by the Link Trainer instructor, and then "flown" in the ground trainer, a device operated by vacuum and electricity which simulates an airplane's flight. The path of flight made by the student is accurately recorded on a chart which may be used at the end of the problem to discover errors and evidences of poor judgment, and to correct them before the same problem is attempted in the air.
