

Paris, Jan. 7.—An Allied note handed to the German delegation late last evening refused to decrease the number of troop effectives destined for the territories in which plebiscites

for the territories in which plebiscites are to be held.

The note says that non-participation by the United States in the proposed occupation aiready has decreased the effectives by one-fourth, and Germany's expenses will be reduced accordingly, and that therefore, Germany's request for a lessening in the number of troops is unwarranted.

Germany will have to bear the expense of maintaining these troops, and her representatives complained that the cost will be excessive. So heavy an expenditure is not necessary, it was asserted.

More Than 1,000 Persons British and Overseas Editors Lost Their Lives in One

Mexico City, Jan. 6.-Couzetlan was destroyed by Saturday's earthquake, with 2,000 casualties, includng more than 1,000 dead, according to official reports given out here tonight by Presidential military headuarters from advices received from officers in the Vera Cruz centre of disturbance. The entire garrison at Teocelo was killed or injured. The dead numbered thirty and the in-

jured sixty.

Virtually all the roads in the surrounding district were flooded or destroyed, according to the reports.

Six hundred dead are reported at Barranca Grande, near Couzetlan.

The sea at Port Barranca rose twenty-five metres.

At least a dozen towns and villages in the State of Vera Cruz were totally or partially destroyed. Calcabualco, with 200 inhabitants, is reported to have been entirely enguifed.

Apparently the earthquake, which distinctly shook ten of the Central and Southern Mexican States, centring its destructive force in the State of Veru Cruz, has ended, although slight tremors are felt from time to time. 

WOMEN'S PLATFORM IS NOW PROPOSED

National Council Prepares Draft of Plank for Women Voters' Consideration

Drastic reforms in the hitherto ac epted standards of the body politic re aimed at in a suggested women' platform which has been evolved by committee of the National Council of Women, and is being distributed broadcast among the Local Councils of the Dominion for their considera-

This purely tentative platform is the outcome of a decision made at an executive meeting of the National Council, when representatives of the various provinces and of all shades of politics were present. The discussion at that meeting centered upon the responsibilities of women under the recently-acquired franchise and the opinion was generally expressed that, were the women merely to fall in line behind the two accepted political parties their vote would be of little help to the country.

On the other hand, while it was not desirable to form a woman's party, it was obvious that there are tertain principles which should demand the support of the women of all parties.

apportunity to the women of Canada
to express themselves as to what, in
their opinion, were the most urgent
and fundamental of these principles or objects, and then sum them up in what might be called a Canadian Women's Platform.

with sub-committee of the whole at Dttawa, to carry out this plan. Through the convener of the committee, Mrs. Adam Shortt, there has been issued a report of the findings of the committee in their work of trafting a "possible women's platform." The planks in the platform are made up of material secured from the members in reply to a circular letter sent out from ocean to ocean, and which the committee believes expresses not only the consensus of presses not only the consensus of spinion of the vast membership of the leading national organizations of Canadian, but of Canadian women, containing as it does representatives of all other prominent organizations.
