FURTHER RAIDS ON SINN FEINERS TO-DAY

PUTS SALMON FISHERY CONDITIONS SQUARELY UP TO FEDERAL GOVT.

Hon. William Sloan Says Either Accept His Policy of National Control for Industry or Turn It Over to the Province

"The time has come when the Government should step in and take over our salmon-fisheries and administer them for the benefit of the people as a whole and for all time. They should step in and take over the salmon-fisheries just as the British and United States Governments have taken over the fur-seal fisheries of the North Pacific. Instead of licensing existing and new companies and individuals to take and handle our salmon-fisheries the Government should take them over and handle them. By so doing the fish would be given full protection. There would be a radical reduction in equipment and a consequent reduction on overhead expenses that would materially reduce the retail price of both fresh and canned salmon. And at the same time the Government, being serious in its desire to help returned men, can do so by taking control of the salmon-fisheries and install returned men to operate them. The Privy Council decided that the right to administer the fisheries of this Province rested with the Dominion, and that the right to fish was a public right subject to regulation by the Dominion. Provided the Dominion Government is not prepared to accept the policy here advocated, I maintain that the Dominion should surrender that right to British Columbia."

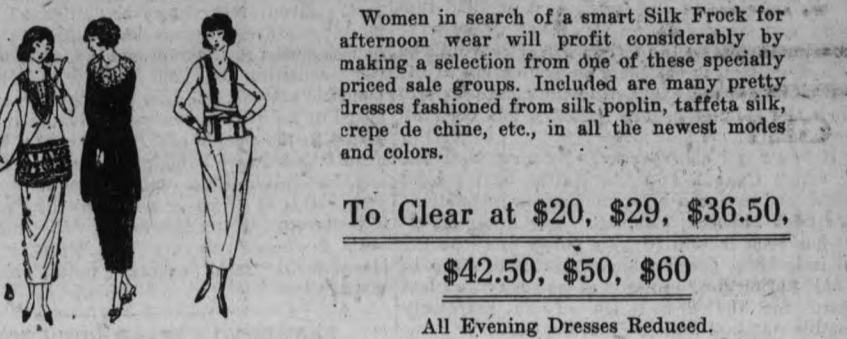

BRITISH COLUMBIA'S FISHERIES.

When the Hon. William Sloan told the International Fisheries Commission during its sittings in this Province in the latter part of 1918 that unless very drastic action was taken to conserve the salmon runs to the Fraser River it would be but a short step to complete extermination of the sockeye he did not exaggerate the condition into which the salmon fishing industry has been allowed to drift.

It is an old controversy, of course, and one for which Canada and the United States have endeavored to find a solution. Certain restrictions have been imposed, although their designed effect has been frustrated by a policy of corporate and individual greed which finds little room in its calculation for the needs of posterity and less regard for the destruction of an extremely valuable national and international asset.

Very considerably perturbed, however, by the lack of concern on the part of the Federal Government Mr. Sloan has furnished a memorandum to the Dominion Minister of Marine and Fisheries in which the whole situation is reviewed. In short the Provincial Commissioner asks the Government of Canada either to take over the fisheries of British Columbia and operate them or else vest within this Province the right to control and operate them itself.

Admittedly, Mr. Sloan advocates a bold policy; at the same time he knows whereof he speaks and if the very proper course he has taken does nothing else it should awaken the Dominion authorities to the seriousness and importance of the situation.

IMPERIAL PRESS CONFERENCE.

Arrangements for the Imperial Press Conference which is to be held in Canada next Summer are being made on a scale proportionate to the great importance of this event. A tour of Canada is part of the programme so far mapped out, and from a business point of view alone the publicity that the country will get directly and indirectly from such a journey will be well worth while. Many of those in overseas countries who are tentatively arranging to come are keenly desirous of seeing and learning something first hand of Canada, whose efforts on the field and behind the fighting line during the war they heartily commended.

A circular recently issued from the office of Lord Atholstan, Chairman of the General and Executive Committees, urging that no effort be spared in the attempt to make the visitors welcome and their stay a pleasure, bears the signatures of many of Canada's prominent men. Sir Robert Borden heads the list, and all the Cabinet Ministers; Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Leader of the Opposition; Hon. W. S. Fielding, and others, are on it. They realize the importance of the gathering, which in itself is an Imperial Conference as much as any at which the delegates are members of Governments only, and from which Canada should benefit in an exceptional degree.

WAS IT ONLY IMAGINARY?

It is reassuring to learn that owing to arrangements made by the sugar refinery in this Province for the year's supply of sugar no shortage is likely to occur after the middle of the present month. But it is surprising to learn from no less an authority than the chairman of the Canadian Trade Commission that actually we have had no shortage at all. This is what he says in a communication to Dr. Tolmie: "For the year 1919 British Columbia has received 72.71 pounds per head of population, based upon a calculation of over 700,000 persons. From these figures it would appear that British Columbia people have fair stocks on hand and being held by jobbers."

The British Columbia people certainly have not "fair stocks on hand," and the jobbers not only have had no stocks but have been frantically trying to get some from the East. One wholesaler for some time was not able to obtain even a reply to his inquiries of eastern refiners. Is the chairman of the Canadian Trade Commission sure British Columbia received 72.71 pounds of sugar per head of its population? And how much has been exported to the eastern States?

TO-DAY'S RAILWAY DECISION.

Never since the National Union of Railwaymen came into being as a powerful trade union entity in Great Britain has its outlook for better working conditions been so favorable as it appears to be under the latest offer of the Government. On the face of it the men have scored a notable victory, although sober judgment agreed that the unskilled railway worker in pre-war days was scandalously paid. Having gained a really tangible concession, however, it would be the height of folly to allow the new scale to trap any section of the N. U. R. membership into the belief that it has only to ask to get. The greater majority of public opinion very probably will endorse the latest offer; but any suggestion of its rejection coupled with the threat of another strike would just as surely align that same majority on the side of the Government in resisting minority dictation. It is to be hoped, therefore, that earlier reports of a refusal on the part of the N. U. R. will be disposed of at to-day's congress, as there are already indications that isolated resolutions designed to refuse the schedule

were cut and dried before the various week-end meetings were held. There is no difficulty in tracing this sort of thing to the lair of the extremist who seeks no settlement save that of his own fashioning.

CREDIT BACK AGAIN.

Soon after the Hon. John Hart accepted the portfolio of finance in the Provincial Cabinet in the summer of 1917 he endeavored to float a loan in order that a number of pressing obligations might be disposed of. The cheapest money he could obtain at that time would have cost the Province seven and one-half per cent. Consequently it was deemed wise to await a more favorable opportunity. But it was difficult to convince the financial world that British Columbia actually had changed its methods of doing business with the advent of a new administration. Eventually, however, entrance into the money markets became less difficult; financial houses removed the reproach which had labeled the securities of this Province "deficiency bonds," and six months ago the Treasury disposed of its 5 1/2% twenty-year bonds at 99.32, or a cost to the people of 5.56 per cent. Yesterday negotiations were completed for the sale of two and one-half million dollars' worth of 5% five-year bonds at 97.84, or a cost to the Province of 5.50 per cent. From this record of British Columbia's financial recovery the Minister of the Department may extract both credit and satisfaction.

PROMISING CAREER CUT SHORT.

The untimely death of Mr. Dan Hutchison will be deeply deplored in the community, in which this promising young man was widely known and admired for his marked ability in his calling and his many estimable qualities. The industrial life of the city has sustained a notable loss in his passing and much sympathy will be felt for his relatives in their bereavement.

The Aldermanic chair is the best stepping-stone to the Mayoralty. Experience as an Alderman is not the least qualification of a successful First Magistrate, for municipal business cannot be learned overnight and the business of every municipality has its own peculiar features.

An Order-in-Council has been passed empowering the paper Controller to prevent the export of newsprint from Canadian mills to the United States until the domestic demand has been met. One big paper manufacturer has been defying the Controller, which explains the passage of the Order-in-Council. The Government is doing wisely in protecting the home market in respect of this commodity. It should do the same in regard to other products of which there is none too large a supply in Canada.

We commend to the attention of our readers the communication from Mr. R. S. Day, President of the Royal Jubilee Hospital, regarding the urgent need of greater accommodation at this institution. It is pleasing to note that the newly-organized Kiwanis Club has taken this matter in hand and it is to be hoped practical measures for remedying the disability under which the Hospital is laboring will follow the club's activities.

There is a war profiteer in Vienna who has not heard that Beethoven went west three years before the late Franz Josef was born. Park Lane, too, has become a refuge for those who have fattened upon the war with less ostentation, perhaps, than that which marks their disposal of the soup course. Some of them, mayhap, do not know that Christopher Columbus is dead.

According to the Municipal Health Officer of Quebec tuberculosis is menacing the Province. He declares that the youth of French Canada is threatened. There will come a day sometime, perhaps, when the State will realize its obligation to the helpless and hopeless tubercular subject.

There should be no hesitation in passing the Johnson Street Bridge by-law. To negative the project on January 15 would label us as a house hopelessly divided against itself.

The Soviet "Ambassador" to the United States is not being "invited" to leave according to diplomatic usage. He is being un diplomatically kicked out of the country.

Mothers and widows of British Columbia will hope that the early pension legislation forecasted in Vancouver on Monday will be carried out as a result of the inquiry now being made by the Social Welfare Commission.

WE ALWAYS CLIMB OUT.

Last Spring we Americans were considerably disturbed over the prospect that our British friends were going to smash with a Soviet Government. We could see all the big labor organizations there getting together to govern the country under minority rule. But they didn't. Similarly in the last few weeks the British brethren have been much exercised over the possibility of America reverting to chaos or something equally disagreeable. The coal strike looked to them the end of freedom. But it wasn't. Somehow common sense always comes to the rescue of the English-speaking peoples. They get in a terrible muss—and then climb out. There always are enough level-headed ones on hand to save the situation. It is one of the results of a long tradition of individual initiative and freedom.

SICK OF PARTY POLITICS.

The man with a racial bee in his bonnet never hears much save the buzzing. We are absolutely certain in our own mind that thousands upon thousands of British and Dutch in this country are sick of party politics. They want to see the country get down to solid business and develop its resources and offer their children peaceful and useful and prosperous lives. They have no wish to watch the younger generation spending its days disputing whether it would be better for South Africa to have an elected legislature with a Prime Minister inside it or precisely the same legislature with a President outside it. If General Smuts is strong enough and bold enough to go forward with a big programme of expansion, and let the old petty issues go hang, he will find men rallying round him from all sorts of unexpected quarters. And there will be a new hope in the land, too, which in itself is worth a king's ransom to any people.

BARES DETAILS OF NEW VIADUCT COST

Mayor's Statement Shows Estimate of \$57,890 for Land and Contingencies

Full details regarding the cost of the proposed Johnson Street bridge are embodied in information, the publication of which Mayor Porter authorized to-day. The Mayor, while remarking that there was absolutely nothing to conceal in the matter, stated that in the bridge estimate for the purchase of land, which seems to be the chief bone of contention, represented an item of \$57,890. This includes also provision for all contingencies that may arise. The total cost of the bridge, according to the estimate approved by the City Council will be \$720,000, of which the city will be asked to pay \$420,000 the Provincial Government contributing \$200,000 and the C. P. R. \$100,000. These facts are set forth in the following figures issued by His Worship:

Accompanying is the official estimate for combined C.P.R. and city bridge:

MUST PAY FOR ALL WHEAT HELD

Stocks of December 27 Assessed Fifty Cents Bushel; Flour Advance Coming?

Wholesalers, retailers, grain dealers and all other persons caught with stocks of wheat on their hands on December 27, must immediately furnish a statement to the Canada Wheat Board confessing the exact amount of wheat they had on hand that day, according to an order issued to the trade yesterday afternoon.

Along with this statement they must send a cheque paying the Government at the rate of fifty cents for each bushel they had on hand then. The order includes not only grain held in stock, but also that in a semi-manufactured state passing through mills. The money collected goes to the credit of the Canada Wheat Board.

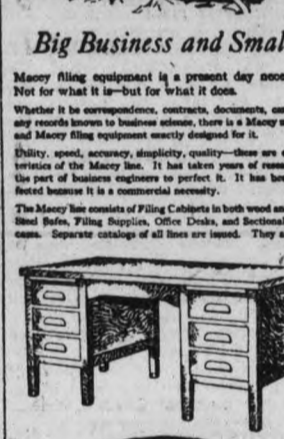
The object of the assessment is to prevent dealers and others selling wheat below the new market price which was raised 50 cents a bushel on December 27. It was feared in some quarters that dealers who had large stocks, bought at the old price, might sell below the new price to draw trade by their cut rates. The 50 cent assessment, however, places all dealers on the same standard cost price and precludes underselling. It also precludes dealers from making an extra profit on the stocks they had on hand.

WOMEN'S PLATFORM IS NOW PROPOSED

National Council Prepares Draft of Plank for Women Voters' Consideration

Drastic reforms in the hitherto accepted standards of the body politic are aimed at in a suggested women's platform which has been evolved by a committee of the National Council of Women, and is being distributed broadcast among the Local Councils of the Dominion for their consideration.

Purely Tentative.

This purely tentative platform is the outcome of a decision made at an executive meeting of the National Council, when representatives of the various provinces and of all shades of politics were present. The discussion at that meeting centered upon the responsibilities of women under the recently-acquired franchise and the opinion was generally expressed that were the women merely to fall in line behind the two accepted political parties their vote would be of little help to the country.

On the other hand, while it was not desirable to form a woman's party, it was obvious that there are certain principles which should demand the support of the women of all parties.

It was therefore agreed to give an opportunity to the women of Canada to express themselves as to what, in their opinion, were the most urgent and fundamental of the principles or objects, and then sum them up in what might be called a Canadian Women's Platform.

Committee Formed.

A committee was arranged with representatives from each province, with sub-committee of the whole at Ottawa, to carry out this plan.

Through the convener of the committee, Mrs. Adam Shortt, there has been issued a report of the findings of the committee in their work of drafting a "possible women's platform." The planks in the platform are made up of material secured from the members in reply to a circular letter sent out from ocean to ocean, and which the committee believes expresses not only the consensus of opinion of the vast membership of the leading national organizations of Canadian, but of Canadian women, containing as it does representatives of all other prominent organizations.

Women's Platform.

Basis: Truth, Justice, Righteousness; Loyalty.

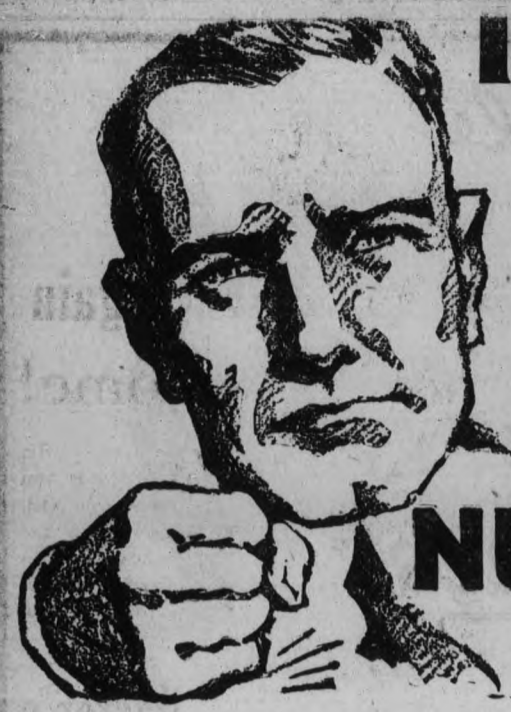

PUTS SALMON FISHERY CONDITIONS SQUARELY UP TO FEDERAL GOVT.

(Continued from page 1.)

River and cities in his memorandum an abridged text of his evidence given before the American-Canadian Fisheries Commission at its sitting in Vancouver in the latter part of 1918. On that occasion, it will be recalled, the Commissioner declared that the run of sockeye to the Fraser River was perilously near to extermination and that actual extermination might be expected unless the proper kind of regulations were framed and enforced.

AN OLD PROMISE.

At the outset of his memorandum to Mr. Ballantyne, the Provincial Commissioner refers to the Dominion Fisheries Commission of 1905-07 and its recommendation that "effective measures for securing some limitation of the exploitation of the northern waters of British Columbia be adopted."

"The Dominion-Provincial Boat Rating Commission of 1910," the Commissioner proceeds, "reported against any increase in canneries or boats, and no increase was granted. There are now some ten more salmon canneries in the North than there were in 1908, and many more gill and purse nets, and the deadly drag-seines are being operated, and traps have been installed in some localities. In 1917 the Dominion Commission, following Mr. Sloan's lead, thought the North, reported that in their judgment neither the ambitions of an individual nor the business strategy of a company is in itself sufficient ground for a change of public policy, and we do not regard the general policy of the Department's canning policy which began in 1918, as having improved the situation from the public point of view, and we believe that the removal of all restrictions, under the present conditions as to supply of salmon, would only open the way towards inefficiency and loss."

OSCAR LUCAS

Eliminate Useless Charges. Arguing that it should be the first policy of the Government to prevent depletion, to ensure continuance, and at the same time to eliminate useless and excessive overhead charges, Mr. Sloan says that his plan would conserve the supply and increase the earnings of the individual fisherman.

GREATEST ASSET IN DANGER.

Concluding his specific observations to the Fisheries Minister, Mr. Sloan points out the advantages of his proposal and observes that the fish of this Province belong to the people of Canada and constitute one of their greatest national assets. Unlike the minerals of the country, which cannot be replaced, the fisheries, the Minister emphasizes, will last for all time if judicious measures are taken. The fish will spend to their own perpetuation without cost if they get the opportunity; but they will entirely disappear, the memorandum says, if left to corporate and individual control.

EITHER, OR.

There is then cited the resolution of the Special Committee of the British Columbia Legislature—adopted unanimously at its last session—in which notice is served upon the Dominion Government that it either take the necessary steps towards development with proper conservation plans, or turn over the fisheries of the Province to the Government of British Columbia. So far as is known, the Minister, it is suggested, no consideration has yet been given to the resolution in question by the authorities at Ottawa.

AN OLD PROMISE.

At the outset of his memorandum to Mr. Ballantyne, the Provincial Commissioner refers to the Dominion Fisheries Commission of 1905-07 and its recommendation that "effective measures for securing some limitation of the exploitation of the northern waters of British Columbia be adopted."

"The Dominion-Provincial Boat Rating Commission of 1910," the Commissioner proceeds, "reported against any increase in canneries or boats, and no increase was granted. There are now some ten more salmon canneries in the North than there were in 1908, and many more gill and purse nets, and the deadly drag-seines are being operated, and traps have been installed in some localities. In 1917 the Dominion Commission, following Mr. Sloan's lead, thought the North, reported that in their judgment neither the ambitions of an individual nor the business strategy of a company is in itself sufficient ground for a change of public policy, and we do not regard the general policy of the Department's canning policy which began in 1918, as having improved the situation from the public point of view, and we believe that the removal of all restrictions, under the present conditions as to supply of salmon, would only open the way towards inefficiency and loss."

OSCAR LUCAS

Eliminate Useless Charges. Arguing that it should be the first policy of the Government to prevent depletion, to ensure continuance, and at the same time to eliminate useless and excessive overhead charges, Mr. Sloan says that his plan would conserve the supply and increase the earnings of the individual fisherman.

GREATEST ASSET IN DANGER.

Concluding his specific observations to the Fisheries Minister, Mr. Sloan points out the advantages of his proposal and observes that the fish of this Province belong to the people of Canada and constitute one of their greatest national assets. Unlike the minerals of the country, which cannot be replaced, the fisheries, the Minister emphasizes, will last for all time if judicious measures are taken. The fish will spend to their own perpetuation without cost if they get the opportunity; but they will entirely disappear, the memorandum says, if left to corporate and individual control.

EITHER, OR.

There is then cited the resolution of the Special Committee of the British Columbia Legislature—adopted unanimously at its last session—in which notice is served upon the Dominion Government that it either take the necessary steps towards development with proper conservation plans, or turn over the fisheries of the Province to the Government of British Columbia. So far as is known, the Minister, it is suggested, no consideration has yet been given to the resolution in question by the authorities at Ottawa.

PROVINCIAL SEED FAIR AT KAMLOOPS

Will Be Held For Two Days at End of Month; Fifty Classes

Fifty classes are provided at the Provincial Seed Fair, to be held at Kamloops on January 27 and 28. Entry forms may be obtained from the Department of Agriculture here and the District Agriculturalist at Kamloops, George C. Hay.

The show will be held under the joint auspices of the Department and the B. C. Seedgrowers' Association. Meetings of seedgrowers will be held simultaneously with the exhibition.

In addition to the usual classes for commercial roots, cereals and vegetables, the prize list has classes for annual flowering seeds, and perennial flowering seeds. There will be district and growers classes, and also a display illustrating the gathering and cleaning of seeds, as well as results accruing from treating seed grain or potatoes with preventives. The entry form must reach Kamloops by January 24. It is the intention to issue a seedgrowers directory as soon as possible after the exhibition.

MARKET PROSPERED GREATLY LAST YEAR

Increase in the sale of products at the Public Market is noted in a report made by Market Superintendent A. G. Robertson to Alderman Robert Dinsdale, Chairman of the Market Committee. The turnover in the market during the past year, the report states, amounted to \$233,896.65 as compared with \$221,569.95 last year, an increase of \$933.24. In 1918 revenue to the city, made up by stallholders' fees was \$4,267.75, and this sum was increased to \$5,159.15 last year.

CRITICIZE ISSUE

R.N.W.M.P. Veterans' Association Dissatisfied With "Scarlet and Gold."

"Scarlet and Gold," the official publication of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police Veterans' Association, came in for a lot of criticism at the regular monthly meeting of the local branch of the association held last night. The members took exception to the current number which they intimated contained articles and information contrary to the best traditions of the force. Members claimed that it was entirely too self-laudatory.

Military Trained Athletes Will Represent England at Antwerp

With Few of the 1912 Representatives Available, English Competitors Will Be Practically Novices

New York, Jan. 7.—Reports from England indicate that the English athletic authorities are actively engaged in preparing for active participation in the Olympic games to be held at Antwerp, Belgium, next Summer. Despite the fact that Great Britain lost hundreds of her best athletes during the war the United Kingdom in making selections for the games next year, will have more material to draw from than ever before, according to experts. This somewhat anomalous situation is due to the creation of a great new body of athletes as the result of military training and outdoor life at the front.

All Green Men.

Very few of the Olympic team of 1912 will be available for the coming games. Some of them are dead, and others are too old to compete. It is also true that the majority of the new athletes are "green" men. They are good material but they need polishing and experience. However, English sportsmen believe that they will be well represented on the cinder track; although admittedly weak in field events. It is understood that Australia and New Zealand, which have strong teams, will unite to enter the games as separate from the Mother Country.

Sport a Hobby.

England is not, and never has been, particularly enthusiastic over the Olympic games although the prospect of going to win is possible. The Englishman makes sports a hobby to which he turns his attention after his regular day's work is done. He objects strenuously to the specialization and long training necessary for this virtually amounts to professionalism, even though the competitor receives no money. The man who devotes his whole attention to sports is, to all intents and purposes, a professional, it is maintained.

A Cambridge Runner.

It is too early to forecast what Cambridge and Oxford Universities will produce in the way of athletes, as they have just resumed work interrupted by the war. Cambridge, however, has at least one star runner in G. M. Butler, quarter-mile champion for England. Butler won his title by covering this distance in 49 4-5 seconds and believe he can lower this to a beyond. Among the promising new sprinters is W. A. Hill, a youngster who recently captured the English championship for the 100 and 220 yards in the hundred yards dash, and it is believed that he is capable of doing better with training. Sergeant-Major Mawby also has done the hundred in 9-10. Mawby is not a beginner, but lately has developed greatly.

A. G. Hill to Compete.

Great expectations are placed in A. G. Hill, an old-timer, who holds the English championship for the half-mile and the mile. He has done the half in 1:55 and the mile in 4:15 4-5. He also won the four-mile championship of England in 1910. Hill is about 34 or 35 years of age, but it is claimed in sporting circles that he is capable of going several more years. It is believed that he has done the mile in 4:15 in practice.

Delighted Australians.

Having won the title of world's sculling champion from Ernest Barry, of England, on the Thames, late in October, Alfred Felton, of Australia, now has the right to name the course on which the next race shall be decided. There is little doubt that he will choose the Australian course on the Parramatta River which measures three miles, 330 yards. This will mean a revival in what was at one time Australia's premier aquatic sport. Having shunned in the Commonwealth since Richard Arnot lost the world's sculling championship to Barry on the Thames in 1912, Felton's first challenger will probably be James Padden, the champion of Australia. Felton is an ex-soldier. His victory over Barry was unexpected and the bringing back of the title to Australia caused much enthusiasm in sporting circles there.

Government Also Consents to Try Community Farm Plan Here

Hill Farm, the 300-acre property of J. S. H. Matson at Cobble Hill, has been taken over by the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment on a rental basis for the purpose of carrying on vocation re-training work in poultry, horticulture, agriculture and dairying. Sub-normal cases of men who find it impossible to compete in the ordinary labor market and become self supporting will also be kept on the farm on a community basis, although they will be kept separate from the ordinary students.

The local officials are very much pleased to think that Ottawa has allowed them to initiate a policy of this kind on Vancouver Island, as they feel that there is no place in Canada better suited for the innovation. The plan is somewhat similar to the Cloverdale farm, Surrey, for the Lower Mainland.

WHEREAS, in grateful remembrance of those who have died in the service of the country in the great war, it has been deemed expedient to erect a fitting memorial; AND WHEREAS, the great war has brought to light the fact that a large proportion of our people are suffering from defects that might have been remedied in childhood; AND WHEREAS, the report of the School Health Officer shows that a large proportion of the children attending the various schools are suffering from minor ailments which may be cured by simple operations;

AND WHEREAS, in order to carry out such minor operations it is necessary that suitable hospital accommodation should be provided; AND WHEREAS, the Council have decided that the most fitting memorial that can be erected is "A Health Centre," from which can radiate improved health for the present and future generations, and have accordingly passed By-law No. 207 authorizing the erection of buildings to be used and maintained as a house for infirm, disabled and aged persons and for general hospital purposes;

AND WHEREAS, it is estimated that the erection of suitable buildings and the incidental expenses in connection therewith will cost the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00); AND WHEREAS, it will be necessary to borrow the said sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) on the credit of the Municipality and to issue debentures therefor, payable in ten years from the date thereof, and bearing interest at the rate of five and a half per cent. (\$5 1/2%) per annum, which is the amount of debt intended to be created by this By-law;

TWO LOCAL FIRMS INCLUDED IN SHIPBUILDING CONCERNS ON OTTAWA DELEGATION

Request Made to Government to Give Bonus of \$10 Per Displacement Ton for Ten-Year Period—Effect on Industry

Ottawa, Jan. 7.—(Canadian Press).—Representatives of seventeen shipbuilding companies waited on the Government at noon to-day to urge assistance to shipbuilding in Canada. They requested that for a term of ten years the Government should grant a bonus of \$10 per displacement ton and \$10 per indicated horsepower on steel ships built in Canada and completed after April 1, 1920. Without this assistance, the delegation claimed, existing plants could not be continuously employed and the breaking up of the organization would necessarily follow. This, it was added, would throw large numbers of men out of employment and undo "much of the good which the Government had achieved by means of the encouragement given to the shipbuilding industry and in the employment of returned soldiers and men previously at work on munitions."

CHARLOTTE LAID UP FOR SHAFT REPAIRS

Ferry Boat Suffered Slight Damage Striking Vancouver Pier

To have repairs effected to her shaft the C. P. R. steamship Princess Charlotte has been temporarily withdrawn from the triangular service. The contemplated repair work is not extensive, but will mean that the steamer will be out of commission for about three days. The Princess Charlotte was at the mouth of the river, and the Indians, knowing that disaster would follow such an attempt, signalled from the beach a more favorable place for attempting a landing. Even this place required good seamanship to effect a landing as a heavy surf was breaking. As the vessel entered the surf her boilers exploded, blowing one man through the cabin. A sea then struck the vessel and in her disabled condition she keeled right over. The Indians rescued the men in the breakers off Carmanah Point and made heroic efforts to save them. TACTICIAN FIXED FOR PACIFIC ROUTE

Big Steamship Is Coming Out From Liverpool in Harrison Direct Service

Diverted from the United Kingdom-Calcutta route, the 11,000-ton steamship Tactician, of the Harrison Direct Line, will steam from Liverpool for Victoria and other North Pacific Coast ports January 15, according to advices received by Balfour, Guthrie & Co., coast agents for the British line. The coming voyage of the Tactician will be her first in the North Pacific trade and she is also the largest of the fleet yet placed on this route. The Tactician will come out by way of the Panama Canal and will arrive on Puget Sound in March.

Fire on Galicia
The next Harrison boat to reach this port will be the Crown of Galicia, now steaming up the coast. The fire which broke out on board the Crown of Galicia while she was in the Panama Canal zone, it has been learned, was confined to No. 4 hold. Cargo in this hold was damaged by fire and water, but no other hold was affected by the conflagration. The Crown of Galicia is now at San Francisco on her way to this port.

MAQUINNA IN PORT.
The steamer Princess Maquinna was in port this morning from the west coast of Vancouver Island.

MEN RESCUED BY HEROIC INDIANS

Natives Plunged Into Boiling Surf and Rescued Two Men at Carmanah

Rescued from the breakers off Carmanah through the heroic efforts of three British Columbia Indians, August Boine and John Jensen, both of Victoria, were brought down from the West Coast by the C.P.R. steamer Princess Maquinna last night and removed to St. Joseph's Hospital for treatment. The two men were injured in the battle with the elements and were in an exhausted condition.

Three Indians, on the afternoon of January 2, noticed a little vessel apparently in distress bearing into the mouth of the river, and the Indians, knowing that disaster would follow such an attempt, signalled from the beach a more favorable place for attempting a landing. Even this place required good seamanship to effect a landing as a heavy surf was breaking.

As the vessel entered the surf her boilers exploded, blowing one man through the cabin. A sea then struck the vessel and in her disabled condition she keeled right over. The Indians rescued the men in the breakers off Carmanah Point and made heroic efforts to save them. There were only two men at the village of Carmanah at the time, Jimmy Night-time and Lemo Williams, both Indians. WHALING COMPANY HAS NEW MANAGER

Capt. George Le Marquand, Formerly of Bay City, Takes Over Management Here

Captain George Le Marquand has been appointed manager of the Consolidated Whaling Corporation's plant, succeeding Sidney C. Ruck, who has severed his connection with the whaling concern, it was announced to-day.

William N. Kelly, superintendent engineer, has also left the service of the whaling concern, but no appointment has yet been made to fill the vacated position. In connection with the changes in management it is understood that Edward Schapfen, for many years chief mechanic at the C.P.R. machine shops here, will become one of the managers of the company's whaling stations.

Captain Le Marquand was formerly manager of the whaling company's plant at Bay City, Washington. The Consolidated Whaling Corporation, formerly known as the Victoria Whaling Company, comprises the amalgamated interests of various large whaling concerns on the Pacific Coast. The British Columbia stations operated by the concern are at Kyuquot, on the West coast of Vancouver Island; and Rose Harbor and Naden Harbor, Queen Charlotte Islands. Other plants are located at Bay City, Washington, and at Akutan, Aleutian Islands.

Sixteen steam whalers are operated by the corporation, eight out of the port of Victoria and distributed among the British Columbia stations, four out of Bay City and four at Akutan. Other tonnage under the company's flag are the whaling tenders Gray and Eilhu Thomson.

The incorporation of the Consolidated Whaling Corporation involved the taking over of plant of the North Pacific Sea Products Company which formerly operated the Aleutian station and several steam whalers belonging to that concern. The headquarters of the Consolidated Whaling Corporation are at Victoria.

New York, Jan. 7.—After one of the roughest voyages in its history, the La Touraine, French Line steamer, which was in port to-day with several life-boats missing and the port side of her deck smashed, she had 659 passengers aboard.

Among the passengers held by the immigration authorities were five young French women on their way to California, one to marry a former sergeant in the American army and the others to go to relatives. On pooling their money it was found there was not sufficient to pay all the railroad fares and leave a proper margin for expenses.

AFRICA MARU WILL TAKE OUT CREW OF EASTERN KNIGHT
On her outward voyage to the Orient the O. S. K. liner Africa Maru will leave this port at 6 o'clock to-morrow evening. She is now completing her cargo on Puget Sound.

The Japanese crew which brought to this coast the American Shipping Board's steamer Eastern Knight will return to Japan aboard the Africa Maru.

GALLEY OF TECO GUTTED BY FIRE AT JAMES ISLAND

Vancouver, Jan. 7.—The galley and messroom, lifeboats and one of the staterooms of the steamer Teco engaged in general freighting between this port and Victoria and the Gulf Islands, were gutted by fire, which broke out on Sunday morning while the vessel was lying at the wharf at James Island. The crew subdued the flames after a hard fight. The steamer has arrived here.

AID APPROACHING CANADIAN SPINNER ADRIFT IN ICE

Quebec, Jan. 7.—The Canadian Government steamer Montcalm, at 8:40 this morning was only six miles away from the Canadian Spinner, which has been drifting with the ice for twenty-two days. It is expected the rescue ship will connect with the disabled steamer some time this afternoon. Both ships are at present about sixteen miles offshore, just opposite the Southwest point of Anticosti.

CHOLBERG LEASE IS NOW TO BE RENEWED

Premier Assures Head of New Concern That There Will Be No Delay

No delay will mark the Provincial Cabinet's treatment of an application from the Cholberg Ship Company for an extension of its lease on the former Songhees Reserve, was the statement made to The Times representative by Premier Oliver this morning following an interview with Chris Cholberg, who recently has formed a new concern to handle additional ship contracts.

The existing lease has almost expired and the Cholberg Company is desirous of renewing it with certain additional concessions in the matter of areas. For instance, a small corner between the present spur track and the E. & N. Railway ground to the west of the Victoria Harbor Marine Company's fence is required for the purpose of providing space for the storage of material. Similarly a small adjacent "water hole" is required which the company may keep its logs.

Mr. Oliver said that he saw no objection to renewing the lease with the additional accommodation included for a period of twelve, fifteen or eighteen months, and upon receipt of a written application the Cabinet would deal with it at once. If the lease were required for a longer period, however, Mr. Cholberg was asked to submit an application for a permanent arrangement.

BOAT HAS PROPELLER WHICH DISAPPEARS

Craft Will Be Brought From Ontario Factory; May Be Manufactured Here

A new type of small power boat may be built in Victoria in the not distant future. It is known as the Disappearing Propeller Boat, and as the name implies, it differs in construction from the ordinary launch. The feature of the craft is a trunk similar to the centreboard trunk of a sailing craft, but of ample proportions to accommodate the propeller. Into this the propeller is lifted either entirely or partly, as the occasion may require.

When seen at the Empress Hotel, C. French, British Columbia representative of the builders, stated that at present the boats are built in Ontario, but it is the ultimate expectation that craft to fill the orders received in this Province will be built in Victoria. The first consignment from the Ontario factory is to arrive on this coast in February.

For next Summer Mr. French is contemplating a small fleet of the craft, to be stationed at the Causeway, where they will take Summer tourists on fishing jaunts. As at present built the boats are primarily pleasure craft, but the device may be adapted to the needs of professional fishermen. Either sportsman or professional fisherman they are said to be well adapted for salmon trolling, the propeller scheme being such that any speed, from that of a motor, may be obtained by a simple one-hand operation. Another advantage is that the motors are noiseless, being fitted with Maxim Silencers. It is a Canadian invention, and the entire manufacturing, both of the hulls and engines, is done in the Dominion.

WOULD GREATLY AID SHIPPING ON COAST

Capt. H. Pybus Urges Establishment of Directional Wireless Stations

Vancouver, Jan. 7.—The use of directional wireless on the coast of British Columbia would prevent many wrecks, loss of time and consequent expenditure of fuel, to say nothing of the mental anxiety to masters of ships approaching and navigating the British Columbia coast, declares Capt. Henry Pybus, in a letter to the Vancouver Board of Trade, in which he replies to statements made in a letter to the Board by Deputy Minister of Naval Affairs Desbarats.

The Board wrote the Deputy Minister urging the use of directional wireless on this coast, but in reply the Deputy Minister stated that while it was true the Department had used directional wireless on the east coast the service was still in the experimental stage, and therefore could not be installed on this coast. Captain Pybus contends that the system is out of the experimental stage and was constantly in use during the war in the North Sea and English Channel and was the method applied to hunting submarines and finding a way through the mine fields. He again urges that every endeavor be put forward to bring about the installation of the system on this coast and says there is no doubt that the American Government could be induced to co-operate in installing the system in Lynn and Clarence Straits. He adds that he has just received word from the secretary of the Shipping Federation of Montreal, stating that directional wireless stations installed on the east coast have been found to be a splendid aid to navigation.

WORK RESUMED AT DAVIE SHIPBUILDING PLANT AT LAUZON

Quebec, Jan. 7.—Work was resumed full blast to-day at the shipyards of the Davie Shipbuilding Company at Lauzon. Fifteen hundred men were employed there before closing and to-day one thousand were taken on. The balance of the suspended employees will gradually be taken back as operations are resumed. There have been changes in the management of the plant, the Canada Steamships Lines not having taken over the plant as was rumored last week.

DAN HUTCHISON CROSSES DIVIDE

Progressive Local Engineer Suddenly Succumbs to Attack of Pneumonia

In the death of Dan Hutchison, manager of the engineering firm of Hutchison Bros. & Co. Ltd., Victoria, loses one of its most enterprising and progressive business men.

The sudden passing of Mr. Hutchison, who died yesterday afternoon in St. Joseph's Hospital following an attack of pneumonia, came as a great shock to those who were intimately acquainted with the prominent engineer. It was only a few days ago that Mr. Hutchison was forced to abandon active control of the local works and take to his bed. Pneumonia developed and the end came very suddenly. The late Dan Hutchison was manager of the local firm of Hutchison Bros. & Co. Ltd., ever since the removal of the prominent engineer from the firm started in a small way as a machine shop, engaging in general machine and automobile repair work.

Served Afloat.

Leaving his profession as marine engineer with the C. P. R. boats on the Pacific, Dan Hutchison opened an automobile repair shop on Broughton Street fifteen years ago on the site where the Pemberton Block now stands. The erection of this building and the completion of the Hutchison shop and it was then that the firm of Hutchison Bros. & Co. Ltd., was incorporated and a machine shop started in the Rock Bay district, with the three Hutchison Brothers as working partners. In the intervening years the business has been gradually developed until at the present time the firm is handling large marine engineering contracts. It was the Hutchison firm that manufactured the standards for Victoria's cluster light system. Over a thousand of these handsomely designed cluster light standards were turned out by the firm for the city. The firm also manufactured the standards for the lighting systems of the Uplands Park and at Kamloops. When the need for munitions arose, following the outbreak of the Great War, the Hutchison firm displayed patriotic enterprise by converting its plant into a munitions factory, and for three years the concern was almost exclusively engaged in the manufacture of eighteen-pounder shells for the Imperial Munitions Board.

Then the demand for wooden tonnage opened up new opportunities, and the firm was fully alive to the situation. It secured contracts from the Imperial Munitions Board for the manufacture of twenty-seven steering engines and sixty-four steam winches, and propelling engines were assembled and installed aboard the 2,500-ton wooden steamship War Skeena.

Enterprise Shown.

In August, 1918, the Foundation Company of British Columbia, Ltd., secured the French contract for the construction of twenty 3,000-ton wooden steamships, and in line with its policy of encouraging British Columbia industries, placed a contract with Hutchison Bros. & Co. Ltd., for the construction of three sets of marine engines, comprising six separate units. It was here that Dan Hutchison displayed enterprise that was characteristic of the man. For a comparatively small firm it was a big job to tackle. The firm went ahead with its plans, expanded its plant on Bay Street and built a new foundry on Garbally Road.

The marine engines were delivered in contract time and the first set were installed in the steamship Winnipeg. On her trials the Winnipeg established a speed of 13.52 knots over two and a half knots better than contract speed, a record that was not eclipsed by any other vessel of the fleet. The Hutchison engines proved to be the best constructed and as a result, the Victoria-built engines won high praise in marine circles throughout the country. On the completion of this contract the company planned to construct Diesel oil engines, but the plans had not materialized when the head of the firm passed away. Mr. Hutchison was educated for the engineering profession in some of the most noted engineering schools in the United Kingdom.

Born at Belfast.

Born in Belfast, Ireland, in 1882, he came over to Canada with the rest of his family in 1887 and reached Victoria in 1894. He served an apprenticeship with the local firm of Spratt & Gray, and then went aboard the Empress of China as an engineer. He got his chief's ticket when still a couple of months under the age limit, which was twenty-one.

Mr. Hutchison was an expert in his chosen profession. Apart from his technical ability he had many other excellent qualities and was a keen business man constantly on the alert for new openings. He was a good fellow with his employees and universally liked.

Three brothers, Robert, electrical superintendent of the Hutchison plant; Matthew, City Electrician, and Tom, engineer and assistant observer at the astrophysical observatory, survive in this city, while another brother, John, resides in Halifax. The late Mr. Hutchison leaves a seven-year-old daughter, Ellen here. His wife died thirteen months ago. Two sisters also survive him, these being Mrs. W. Cook, of Vancouver, and Mrs. A. E. Boyd, Queen's.

The funeral arrangements have been completed and the well known engineer will be laid to rest in the Ross Bay Cemetery to-morrow afternoon. The remains are resting in Sand's Funeral Chapel. During the ceremony the Hutchison plant will remain closed.

ESQUIMALT VOTERS WANT JITNEYS FREED

But They Are Against Ward System; Candidates For Council Speak

Great enthusiasm for jitneys and the abolition of the ward system in Esquimalt was shown at last crowded meeting of the Esquimalt Property Owners' Association at Kent's Hall, presided over by Arthur Kent. The meeting was called to hear candidates for the municipal council.

Jitneys are now allowed to ply in Esquimalt but they have to put up such a heavy bond that they can operate only surreptitiously, taking down their signs when crossing the municipal boundary line and keeping out of sight of the Esquimalt police force. The meeting last night almost unanimously decided that jitneys should be allowed free entry and the regulations changed so that they will not be compelled to spend most of their time dodging police when they do cross the municipal line.

At present there are three wards in the municipality each represented by two councillors. The plan now is to elect the six councillors from the municipality as a whole.

Candidates were asked what they thought of the platform of the Property Owners' Association, but several of them had not even seen it and others were not able to give answers. They will be given opportunities later to express their opinions publicly.

John Jardine and Alex. Lockley, the candidates for Reeve, gave campaign speeches. The candidates for the Council who spoke were: S. A. Pomeroy, J. F. Mesher and Luscombe, for Ward One; George Bridle, George Wise, for Ward Two; Robert Porter, and Dr. J. W. Macdonald, for Ward Three. Messrs. Robert Anderson, Newell, M. Spratt and W. J. Cave, the other candidates, were not present.
