JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The Sixty-Fifth Session of the Florida Annual Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in the Methodist Church, Miami, Florida, at 9 A. M., December 16, 1908, Bishop Charles B. Galloway in the chair, who conducted the opening religious service.

The roll was called by the Secretary of the last Conference and 73 preachers and 12 laymen reported present.

Frederick Pasco was re-elected Secretary with J. E. Mickler, C. H. Summers, A. H. Cole, A. M. Daiger, F. L. Glennan, Assistants.

9 A. M. and 12 M. were fixed as the hours of meeting and adjournment.

The bar of Conference was fixed to include the main body of the Church.

The Presiding Elders nominated the usual standing committees.

Sundry communications were presented and referred without reading to the appropriate Boards and Committees.

Dr. J. H. Jackson, Jr., greeted the Conference with an appropriate address of welcome in behalf of the Church and the citizens of Miami, to which a fitting response was made by Bishop Galloway.

The following were introduced: Dr. John R. Nelson, Secretary of Board of Missions; Dr. J. E. Dickey, President Emory College; Hon. DuPont Guerry, President Wesleyan Female College; Dr. L. S. Rader, pastor Methodist Episcopal Church, Miami.

Rev. W. N. Wagner transferred from Baltimore Conference, Rev. C. G. Mitchell Baptist Church.

Question 20 was taken up: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

The credentials of W. S. McMannen and J. G. Graham, local elders, surrendered by them were placed in the hands of the Secretary.

Question 20 resumed, and M. H. Norton, J. R. Taylor, W. J. Gray, T. C. Bradford, F. E. Steinmeyer, J. E. Mickler, C. F. Blackburn, T. Williams, H. J. Haeflinger, S. Hardin, R. N. Sanders, A. E. Householder, W. C. Norton, I. S. Patterson, T. F. Roland, J. W. Bigham, E. A. Harrison, N. H. Williams, G. S. Roberts, L. D. Haynes, R. L. Sprinkle, E. A. Townsend, J. S. Collier, H. W. Baker, E. A. SECOND DAY.

Conference convened at 9 A. M., Bishop Galloway in the chair. After a half-hour prayer meeting conducted by Charlie Dunnaway.

The Examining Committee and the Committee on Admission reported favorably, and they were admitted on trial.

Question 2 was taken up: "Who remain on trial? Joseph E. Woodward, Geo. S. Henderson, J. F. Clark, Ignacio Gonzales, Mack O. Williams characters passed, and the Examining Committee reporting favorably, they were admitted to the class of the second year.

Salvatore Pantaleone, Chas. L. Eddy, W. H. G. Slaymaker, Thos. R. Adams, Frank P. McCall, characters passed, and they were left in class of first year, not having been before the Examining Committee.

Dr. J. D. Hammond, Secretary of Education; Dr. W. E. Boggs, of the Presbyterian Church; Dr. W. S. Stanton, of the Baptist Church, Miami; Miss Emma Tucker, of the Woman's Home Mission Society; Dr. A. J. Lamar, agent of the Publishing House, who addressed the Conference.

Hon. Du Pont Guerry, President of Wesleyan Female College, addressed the Conference.

On motion, 10:30 A. M. Friday was fixed as the hour for considering the Home Mission work, especially that contained within the bounds of the Florida Conference.

J. Lawton Moon, J. W. Austin, A. M. Gardner, A. L. Woodward, A. P. Johntry, characters were passed and the Examining Committee reporting favorably, they were advanced to class of fourth year.

R. L. Sumner, R. N. Sanders, M. De Lofeu were left in this class, their characters passing, not having been before the Examining Committee.

W. F. Fletcher, W. G. Fletcher, H. B. Perritt, L. Oser, H. P. Blocker, characters passed, and not having been before the Examining Committee, they were left in class of third year.

A. P. Johntry, on motion, was located.

Daniel B. Sweat and Walter J. Nease were elected elders, their characters passing

and the Examining Committee reporting favorably.

R. Ira Barnett, C. W. Mathison, already elders, their characters passed and they were announced as having completed the course of study.

G. W. Wesley, elder in the Christian Church; Geo. F. Scott, Methodist Episcopal Church; Chas. G. Mitchell, Baptist Church, having signified their assent to our doctrines and discipline, were duly recognized as elders in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Japheth N. Weatherford was recommended by the Committee on Admission and the Gainesville District Conference, was re-admitted.

The subject of Home Missions was taken up. Dr. J. R. Nelson, Missionary Secretary, addressed the Conference.

W. J. Carpenter spoke of the Italian work in Tampa.

H. Dutill and I. S. Patterson addressed the Conference.

Sundry resolutions were read and, on motion, referred to Board of Missions.

J. L. Moon and G. S. Roberts were appointed to secure subscriptions to "Go Forward."

FOURTH DAY.

Conference convened at 9 A. M. Bishop Galloway in the chair. Opened with religious services conducted by E. F. Gates.

Minutes of morning session read and approved.

MEMOIRS

REV. T. W. MOORE.

By Henry E. Partridge.

Theophilus Wilson Moore was born at Mt. Tirzah, N. C., May 3, 1832; was converted when a child of six years; joined the Methodist Church; entered the itinerancy in the North Carolina Conference in 1854; was transferred for a few years for missionary work on the Pacific Coast, back to his home Conference, then to Florida in 1867; and after an honored and useful life of more than fifty years in the Christian ministry, entered his heavenly rest in Miami, Fla., Dec. 30, 1907.

Under the influences of an ancestry sprung from noble blood, the care and prayers of pious parentage, the training of Christian culture, the comradeship of Godly men, and the power of Divine grace, the many admirable traits that were his by nature were developed into a strong, tender and beautiful character and a life conspicuous for its purity, earnestness and devotion to duty and its loyalty to all that is right and good.

He loved books; he loved nature; he loved men; he loved God. He had an enquiring mind, a tender heart, a lofty ideal of life and an unfaltering loyalty to right, As a student he was patient and thorough in his search after truth; as a writer, clear and forceful; as a preacher, instructive and helpful; as a pastor, faithful, painstaking and sympathetic; as a man, modest, manly and courageous; as a Christian, consistent and pious. Never pressing himself forward, but rather retiring from than coveting honors, he was honored by his brethren and his church, respected by all, and beloved by those capable of loving what is pure, good and true.

The degree of Doctor of Divinity was worthily conferred upon him by Emory College in 1885. He was called upon to represent his Conference in the General Conference of the Church. For five years he was President of the Conference College. He served as army chaplain during the war between the States. He filled important districts and stations with marked faithfulness, acceptability and success. He loved his brethren, yet was true enough to them and his convictions of right to take stand always against what he conceived to be wrong.

He led a blameless life among us, and dying, left a name and an influence like precious ointment poured forth. We account ourselves blessed in his sweet fellowship, brotherly trust and Christian sympathy and love. The faithful wife of his earlier life and ministry, who so patiently, lovingly and loyally shared his burdens, joys and sorrows, passed to her heavenly home and crown in 1890. The sorrowing one, who linked her fortunes and her love to his in later life, and blessed him with her devotion and trust, is still among us.

The weary soldier, with battle-dented armor, stepped aside at our last gathering, to rest awhile; but waited not long till the voice of the Great Captain called him to a higher and more perfect ministry and glory. Like a former devoted friend and fellow-

laborer, just a year before, and in the same town, he passed from our midst and ranks to join the General Assembly and church of the first born in Heaven.

REV. JOSEPH NORWOOD.

Rev. Joseph Norwood was born in Lee County, Mississippi, near Verona, October 5th, 1851, and died of appoplexy in West Tampa, Fla., January 3rd, 1908. He was converted early in life, and was educated in the common schools and Southern University, Greensboro, Alabama. He was licensed to preach at home, and joined the Texas Conference in 1877, and was immediately transferred to the West Texas Conference, and appointed to the Mexican Mission work, serving on the lower Rio Grande. He was happily married at the close of his first year, October 10th, 1878, to Miss Alma Penn, who through the long toilsome years of his Missionary career, though in delicate health, stood by him nobly, counting all things but dross that she might advance her Redeemer's Kingdom. Bro. Norwood gave full proof of his call to the Missionary work by labors abundant, on the Mexican border and in Mexico as pastor, teacher, editor and Presiding Elder for thirteen years. In the year 1890 he was appointed by the American Bible Society, after the death of Rev. William M. Patterson, its agent to Venezuela and Solombia, South America. For ten years in the midst of physical suffering, in broken health by malarial attacks, and dyspepsia, he traveled and preached and distributed the Bible, the leaves of the tree of life which are for the healing of Nations. Exposed to many dangers and persecutions, his very life many times in danger at the hands of religious fanatics, through wars and revolutions he was able to say none of these things move me. When he came to our Cuban work a few years ago, with his intellectual culture, extensive experience, perfect mastery of the Spanish tongue, deep piety and passion for souls. We all hoped for many years of splendid service and results, but just at the time when prospects seemed brightest, his position as teacher, giving him better access to the children and homes of his people, he was cut down. The good results of his labors, however, in Ybor City and West Tampa abide. Many strong traits adorned the character of our brother. He had the gentleness and tenderness of a woman and at the same time indomitable will power and courage of a hero. Children and the poor loved him; at his funeral while their tears fell, they sorrowed most of all that they should see his face no more. He was a strong and attractive preacher, acceptable in any pulpit of the land. Our brother is survived by his wife and one son and four little foster children, two boys and two girls whom he brought from Columbia, South America. It was his purpose to educate them for mission work in their far away Southern home. Two of them are in college. Segundo, the eldest, is at Southern College. It is the desire of Sister Norwood to carry out the purpose of her husband, so that during the years to come he may have representatives in the land of the Southern Cross, to which he gave the best years of his life.

REV. JOHN S. CRANDELL.

Rev. John S. Crandell was born in Larue County, Kentucky, January 26, 1849.

Was converted and joined the M. E. Church, South, under the ministry of the Rev. M. M. Hunter, of the Louisville Conference, November 6th, 1880.

Was married to Helen Davis Eubank, September 15th, 1881. To this union four children were born, two girls and two boys.

The two girls died in infancy. Two boys, John B., and Lawrence H., are still living.

On November 6th, 1880, he was licensed to preach, by Rev. G. H. Hays, D. D., and the following year traveled as a supply on Peytonsbury Mission, Cumberland County, Kentucky. October 13th, 1881, he was admitted on trial into the Louisville Conference, and was appointed to the Mayne Circuit, Wayne County, Kentucky, which charge he served two years. Was ordained deacon by Bishop Hendrix at Russellville, Ky., September 26th, 1886, and elder at Morganfield, Ky., by Bishop Keener, September 9th, 1889. He served the following charges in the Louisville Conference.

Wayne Circuit, two years; Sharon Grove, three years; Owensboro, two years; Livermore, 2 years; Calhoun, two years; Hebbardsville, one year; Gradyville, one year; Causville, two years; Columbia, one year. He served three years in the St. Louis Conference.

From the St. Louis Conference he transferred to the Florida Conference, where he served eight years, on the following charges: Umatilla, two years; Wildwood, one year; Clearwater, one year; Mayo, one year; Apalachicola, two years; Ft. White, one year.

At Conference in session at Tampa in December, 1907, he was assigned to the Bronson charge, and had just taken hold of the work and attempted to preach once (at Bronson), when he was called by the Master to a higher service. His death occurred at Cedar Key, Friday, 1:30 P. M., January 31st, 1908, after a short illness.

Brother Crandell had only the training gained in our public schools, but by hard study and close application he became an acceptable preacher.

He was self-poised, well informed, had a good voice, under fine control. He was a man of strong common sense. Was genial and sympathetic, which contributed to his success in his pastoral work. His sermons were helpful. He was successful in revivals, but his greatest success was in his pastoral work. He was faithful to the trust, no matter what the charge to which he was assigned.

His faith in Christ was strong, and brought to him sweet peace, and enabled him to so serve his Master here, as to insure him a cultured condition for the higher service to which he was called. He leaves a widow and two sons to mourn their loss of a good, kind and affectionate husband and father. He was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery at Lake City, to await the resurrection.

REV. EDWARD WILSON.

We regret that the information we have concerning our dear brother Edward Wilson is very meagre. He was readmitted into the Florida Conference about twelve years ago after having been out of the active work for some time on account of ill-health, but his health was still feeble and his advancing age made it necessary for him about ten years ago to take a superannuated relation, and after many years of suffering God released him.

He might say with Job: "Wearisome nights are appointed unto me," and his days were often full of pain, but he was always bright and cheerful and those of us who knew him remember his sunny face and happy smile. Many years have passed since he met with us in our annual sessions, we have missed him, but we shall see him again and "In the Sweet Bye and Bye, we shall meet on that beautiful shore."

REV. E. J. HOLMES.

Rev. Emory J. Holmes was born in the State of Connecticut, January 10, 1840, and passed away September 3, 1908, at Pidcock, Georgia. Brother Holmes embraced religion while a young man and began thus early to prepare for the work of the Christian ministry, teaching school that he might secure the necessary funds for his intel-

lectual equipment as a minister in the Church of God.

He exercised his talents and gifts as a local minister for eight years, and, in his thirty-eighth year, became a member of the Florida Conference, wherein he served circuits and districts until throat disease forced him to desist.

Brother Holmes was an earnest and effective speaker, careful preparation was his habit, and when he appeared in the pulpit the people knew he had a message from God for them. His style was plain and direct, and many were caused to thank God for the earnest and direct efforts he made to help and bless men. He was a good man, and did much good, and his brethren and neighbors cherish the memory of his life and labors as a precious legacy.

Sick and suffering for thirteen months with rheumatism, he often expressed a desire to depart and be with Christ, and when the moment of release came, he gathered up his feet in death and departed to be forever with the Lord..

REV. ENOCH H. GILES.

Enoch H. Giles was born in Chester County, South Carolina, July 5th, 1836, and died in Arcadia, Florida, October 24th, 1908.

He was a Christian from his earliest childhood, he himself having often said that the first thing he remembered was praying.

At the age of ten he moved with his parents to Florida, where he spent the remainder of his life.

In 1858, at the age of twenty-two, he was called to preach and was admitted on trial at the following session of the Annual Conference, which met in Jacksonville, December 15th. Bishop J. Andrews presiding. That year he was sent to Nassau Mission, possibly the hardest work of the Conference at the time. The following year he served as junior preacher under J. C. Ley on the Micanopy Circuit.

The years 1861 and 1862 were spent serving the Hillsboro Circuit. From Hillsboro Circuit he went in 1863 to Santa Fe, Miss. During the year 1864 and part of '65 he was Chaplain of the Confederate Army, going out with the Florida troops, but in the fall of 65, the war being over, he came back and resumed his labors in the Conference. The years 1866 and 67 were spent on the Brooksville Circuit. It was while here that he was married to Miss Trentham, who lived but a few years, dying in 1870, and leaving him one child. From Brooksville Circuit he went to Crawfordville Circuit, which he faithfully served for two years, 1868 and 69. From 1869 to 1871 he served Brooksville Charge. The years 1872 and 73 were spent as Presiding Elder of Tampa District. In the latter part of the year 1873 he was married, for the second time, to Melvida Wells, who survives him, having labored faithfully at his side for more than thirty-five years, from this union there are three living children.

During the years 1874 and 75 he served the Alafia Circuit and from there he went to Bartow Circuit, serving it two years, 1876 and 1877.

At the Conference in January, 1877, he located and remained in local ranks for four years, but in the Fall of 1881 he was re-admitted, and was appointed to Leesburg Circuit, serving it during the years 1884 and 1885. The four years between 1885 and 1889 were spent on Melrose Circuit and from 1889 to 1892 he served Clearwater Circuit. 1893 and 1894 were spent at Apopka, from Apopka he was appointed to Oviedo, serving it for three years. He went from Oviedo to Punta Gorda, where he labored during the years 1898 and 1899. From Punta Gorda he went to Starke for the year 1900 and 1901. His last appointment as a travelling preacher was Bloomingdale, which he served during the year 1902.

In the Fall of 1902 he superannuated, and for one year lived in Orlando, after

which he moved to Arcadia, where he continued to live until the 24th of October when, after a short illness, in which he suffered little, he peacefully fell asleep.

Bro. Giles' life was a long and useful one, who can estimate the value of his contribution to mankind, eternity alone can reveal it. A man of a bright warm hearted nature, he won people to him by his open friendliness and kind sympathy and impressed all with the guilelessness of his heart and the simplicity of his faith.

One of the best tributes that could be paid to a man was paid him by one of his children in talking to the writer. She said, "We all had unbounded confidence in my father's religion." Indeed in every hour of trouble or sickness the children sought father's prayers, for they felt that he was intimate with God.

It was the writer's pleasure to have Bro. Giles in his charge for months at a time, and while he has talked with him by the hour, no harsh words of criticism of his brethren did he ever hear come from his lips. No discontent or sourness was ever manifest, but he had ever the attitude of one who had "fought a good fight" and was but waiting for the crown.

As we came together in the church for the last tribute of respect and love, the writer was impressed to speak from the words "He that believeth in Me though he were dead yet shall he live," for he felt that the power and influence of such a life could not die. And upon that beautiful Sabbath afternoon as we laid his body to rest we knew that the soul of our brother already raised from the death of sin, had but entered upon its real life.

REV. CHARLES D. WARD.

Rev. Charles Davis Ward was born January 26th, 1860, three miles from Beach Grove, McLean County, Kentucky. He was the son of R. M. and Elizabeth Ward, who were members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the grandson of Rev. James Ward, one of the pioneer Methodist preachers of Kentucky. His early training was of the best. He was baptized by Rev. J. S. McDaniel, 1868. He was converted under the ministry of Rev. M. M. Hunter and received by him into the Church at Beach Grove, Kentucky, in 1873. He was called to the ministry when about nine years of age. He resisted this call nearly nineteen years. In 1889 he was wonderfully blessed in a meeting held by Rev. E. E. Joiner, now a missionary in Brazil. He was licensed to preach at McIn's Chapel, Beach Grove Circuit, by Rev. H. M. Ford, D. D. Admitted on trial at Morganfield, Ky., September, 1889. Received into full connection and ordained deacon by Bishop A. W. Wilson at Cadiz, Ky., September, 1891. Ordained Elder by Bishop C. B. Galloway at Elkton, Ky., September, 1893. Transferred to the Florida Conference 1893. Served Taylor Mission, Lake Worth Mission and Clermont Circuit. At the end of that year he returned to the Louisville Conference. He married Miss Adelia B. Cherry September 27th, 1897. He was received by transfer from the Oklahoma Conference by the Florida Conference held at Palatka, Fla., December 12th-17th, 1906, and sent to the Delray Charge 1907. Rev. Frank M. Thomas, in a letter to me, said of him: He was a splendid, true man, and did effectual work until his health gave way some years ago. Rev. S. W. Lawler, who was his presiding elder, said of him: He was a good man, deeply pious, a good preacher and was succeeding well on his work. He was superannuated by the Conference held at Tampa, Fla., December 12-16, 1907. Sister Ward, in writing of him, said: "Being in poor health, he was not prepared to stand the shock when our little girl Mary Elizabeth died. This shock so crushed him that his health failed rapidly and five months later, the middle of April, 1907, he was confined to his bed and was never able to be up again. Through all this time he grieved for the beautiful young life so soon closed. About ten days

before his death he had an experience that was in every way satisfactory to him, and he became reconciled and could say, It is all right. He was happy in anticipation of the great changes. As Charles Wesley sang so could he,

We for His sake count all things loss;
On earthly good look down;
And joyfully sustain the cross,
Till we receive the crown.
"Longing to see the happy coast,
And mark the heavenly land.

He regretted that he could not say good-bye to his aged mother so far away. When his suffering was most intense he would often say, For our light affliction which is but for a moment worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory.

On the morning of February 7th, 1908, he was in great agony for an hour, then looking up as though his expression changed from that of suffering to that of joy. Then he closed his eyes and was gone.

The mortal affliction is past,
And he is gone to be
Forever with the Lord!
Amen, so let it be
Life from the dead is in that word,
'Tis immortality.

We request the General Board of Missions join us with a like sum. To secure this amount we suggest that the Woman's Home Mission Society, the Sunday Schools, the Epworth Leagues and the Layman's Missionary Conference unite their efforts.

REPORT NO. 3.

In making our report we wish to thank God first of all for his abiding presence with us during the year that is past. Under the Holy Ghost our Church is becoming more and more alive to the great cause of Missions. By means of missionary literature, mission study classes and missionary institutes, we are receiving more missionary information. The fruit of this information is increased activity and zeal.

An epoch was marked in the history of our Church last April when there was held in the city of Chattanooga, Tennessee, the Layman's Missionary Conference, which, judged by any standard, was one of the greatest religious gatherings the world has ever known. Its force is not to be dissipated but conserved and developed until the men of every congregation in our Church shall be shot through with a burning desire to save a lost world. The presence and speeches of Judge W. B. Stubbs, General Secretary of the Layman's Missionary Movement has been an inspiration to us all.

The advance along all lines, both at home and abroad, has been very gratifying. The most significant fact in the work of Methodist Missions in the East is the union of the forces of the three leading Methodisms of Japan, upon a basis of union prepared by the Commissioners duly appointed to perform this work.

The finances of the Church at large have shown increase, notwithstanding the year of money stringency through which we have just passed. The home Church received last year a total from all sources of \$540,523.00, an increase of \$21,307.00. To this we may add the \$226,192.00 received by the Woman's Board, giving a sum total of \$776,716.42 for Foreign Missions, which lacks only \$234,000.00 of making one million dollars for Missions. The Layman's Missionary Movement has challenged the whole

Church to raise next year one million dollars for Missions. This is a challenge from the pew; it will not go unheeded, but arrangements will be perfected whereby this challenge will be accepted.

The Educational Department of the Board of Missions under Rev. Ed. F. Cook, has increased its volume of business nearly fourfold. As this work is pursued, the results will be more and more evident. The Educational Department is the power house for all our missionary machinery.

A great advance has been made in the Home Mission Department, by the establishment of a Joint Commission, representing the Board of Missions, Church Extension and the Woman's Home Mission Society, to adopt and carry forward, with the approval of the three Boards, the work in our Gulf cities, among our French and Italian population, among the miners and mountain whites, and along our frontiers.

We wish to urge all our brethren to see to it that our people are supplied with our missionary literature. We commend especially "Go Forward" to all our people as worthy of their patronage. We urge all who are interested in the better equipment of our missionaries to consider the needs of our Training School at Nashville, Tenn. Also that Mission Study Classes be organized wherever possible.

Our Board feels that we are now entering a new era of advancement. We have taken up with determination, the work in our waste places, on our East Coast, the foreign population in Tampa and Tarpon Springs, and the more adequate caring for of the unchurched in the city of Jacksonville. We are sure of the cooperation of the Conference, as it has always been so cheerfully given.

We have aided this year forty-five charges and one district. Some charges have developed into self-support, and others have been continued. Some have been discontinued. Our city problems are becoming more complicated, but we are trying to solve them as best we can.

Our Conference Missionary Evangelist has had a busy year. He reports many conversions and additions to the Church. We have been especially favored by the presence and speeches of Dr. Jno. R. Nelson. His advice and service have been very profitable.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

We respectfully submit the Annual Report of our Church Extension Board for year 1907-08:

The aim of Church Extension is to see that every congregation may have a suitable house of worship and every charge a comfortable parsonage. The Board has extended aid to 6,957 churches, still there are 2,927 congregations that are homeless. What has been done is indeed marvelous and is a prophecy of yet greater accomplishments in the future. When we consider the import and the importance of Church Extension we must admit that it should have the right of way side by side with the cause of missions, education and other great connectional interests of our Church, and is justly entitled to our most careful consideration and cheerful co-operation.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BIRTHDAY OFFERINGS.

The General Sunday School Board has made an appeal to our schools to establish a system of Birthday offerings, the proceeds to be used for the next two years toward helping to build churches in Oklahoma, where our prospects are so bright, and where our needs are so great. There are 477 homeless congregations in the Oklahoma Conference. Only five schools in our Conference responded. This movement should commend itself to our pastors and Sunday School Superintendents, as furnishing not only an opportunity of doing good, but of training our children and young people to take part and interest in our connectional work.

LOAN FUND DAY.

Loan Fund Day—May 10, 1908—was observed by many of our schools and Epworth Leagues. Only ten contributions, however, were made by our Conference, amounting to \$131.20, and about one-third of this was contributed by one Church—Monticello. Had the entire Conference responded results would have been much more satisfactory.

OUR J. C. LEY LOAN FUND.

Our Conference Board of Church Extension has undertaken to raise \$5,000.00 by putting annually an assessment of \$100 on each District. We have \$281.00 to report raised on this Fund this year. This special assessment should not be merged into the general assessment, but should be kept separate therefrom.

OUR WASHINGTON CITY CHURCH.

This is a great enterprise, looking to the building of a Church in the Capitol City of the Nation, that would represent our Methodism. The movement appeals as well to our Church as also to our civic pride. Failure would be a disgrace.

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE FLORIDA CONFERENCE
FOR THE YEAR 1908.**

To the Bishop and Members of the Florida Conference:

Dear Brethren: We, your Board of Education, beg leave to make the following report:

We are much gratified to learn that notwithstanding the financial depression from which the whole country has more or less suffered during the past year there has been a reasonable degree of prosperity and advancement along the whole line of our educational work. The efforts of our General Board to unify the interests and energize the efforts of our institutions of learning are meeting with sympathetic co-operation from our educational authorities, so that more work and better work is being done than ever before. We are especially pleased to know that our leaders are in no wise disposed to yield to the subtle efforts that are being made to wean them from their allegiance to denominational schools. We are convinced that schools of any grade which repudiate denominational control should be deprived of denominational support.

We rejoice also to learn that the two colleges of our sister State of Georgia, viz.: Emory and Wesleyan Female College, are keeping abreast of the times in enhancing the value of their properties, increasing the amount of their endowments and strengthening the efficiency of their equipments, so as adequately to meet the needs of our church and the constituencies which they serve. We most heartily commend them to those of our people who contemplate sending their sons and daughters beyond the limits of this State when they shall have exhausted their school resources at home.

We feel profoundly grateful to our Heavenly Father for the continued success and prosperity of our own Southern College at Sutherland. This institution has a property

valuation of over \$185,00, an endowment of over \$3,000, employs 18 professors, and has enrolled this year 215 pupils. We rejoice at the measure of success which has attended the efforts of its financial agent and others to increase its endowment, and we sincerely hope that every proper means will be used the coming year to the amount set for its attainment at our last Conference. We feel that the intellectual and moral well being of our children and youth cannot be entrusted to safer or more competent hands than those of the president and faculty of Southern College.

We request the Bishop to appoint Rev. Dr. J. P. Hilburn as President of Southern College, and Rev. I. C. Jenkins as Vice-President and professor in the same.

We also request the Bishop to appoint Rev. R. N. Sanders as a student in the Nashville Training School, and F. J. Patterson and T. R. Adams to Vanderbilt.

We recommend the following apportionment of the Endowment Fund for Southern College for the various Presiding Elders' Districts:

We submit the following regulations governing the lending of funds of this Conference to applicants for aid:

Report of Committee appointed to Define Conditions of Lending Money from the Loan Fund.

1. The applicant for aid from the Loan Fund shall be duly licensed to preach in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
2. He shall attend a school approved by the Florida Annual Conference Board of Education.
3. He shall agree to serve under the appointment of the Florida Annual Conference one year for every one hundred dollars (\$100) or fraction thereof received from the Loan Fund, or when going elsewhere return immediately the money with interest to the Board of Education.
4. Notes with such security as the Board may approve shall be given bearing no interest during the time spent in school, and bearing six per cent (6%) interest thereafter till paid.
5. The Board of Education may give credit af one hundred dollars (\$100) per year to any beneficiary who serves in the Florida Annual Conference on a salary of less than four hundred dollars (\$400) per year.

6. We recommend that the Board of Education approve Southern College for beneficiaries of this fund to attend.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SOUTHERN COLLEGE.

To the Annual Conference in session at Miami, Fla., December 16th, 1908.

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

The Trustees, whom you have placed in charge of Southern College, come to you with another Annual report, in order that you may determine with what wisdom they have discharged the trust which you have committed to their hands.

Repairs have been made this year in repainting the girl's dormitory at an expense of about One Thousand Dollars; new steam pump and water tank have been put in, with pipes connecting with the boys' dormitory, thus insuring against a possible shortage of water; and an orange and grapefruit grove of about three acres has been set out, which is in a thrifty growing condition; but, for want of funds, we have been forced to leave off the fitting up of two or three rooms under the Administration building, the beautifying of the grounds, and repairs on the boys' dormitory, all of which we sorely need.

Among the internal improvements enterprised this year are, the reorganization of the Sub-Collegiate and Academic Departments on a better basis, making our preparatory school one of the best institutions of the kind in the State; also, great improvements in the management of the boys' dormitory. At present there are five members of the Faculty that have rooms in the boys' dormitory, three of whom have their wives with them; and under the wise supervision of Prof. Platt the atmosphere has become much more home-like than heretofore, and the boys are showing their appreciation by advancement in character and discipline.

The Music Department this year is larger and better than ever before, and we have had to turn away some pupils who desired to take lessons under Prof. Mora.

The Faculty consists of seventeen teachers and the President, and, without any reflection upon others, they are the ablest Faculty we have ever had. They are every one of them enthusiastic in regard to their own special class work, which is not only encouraging in relation to the present, but speaks volumes of hopefulness in relation to the future.

President Hilburn is wise and economical in his administration, and abundant and fruitful in his labors, holding the respect and confidence, not only of the Faculty, but of the student body and patrons as well.

The Summer School, while not largely attended, was a success in every sense of the word. Quite a number of teachers prepared for their examinations, and a number of pupils by taking certain studies in which they were deficient, were enabled to shorten their College work a year, and thus save themselves considerable expense. In this connection we wish to emphasize the fact that our Curriculum is in advance of that required by our General Board of Education for a College of B. Grade.

During the Scholastic year ending June 1st, 1908, the income of the College paid all of its running expenses, including the salaries of teachers, but, this year, with an addition of three teachers, and a corresponding increase in the pay roll, it is exceed-

ingly doubtful whether we can accomplish it.

The property in High Springs, in which the College holds a half interest, consisting mainly of two buildings which have been profitably rented, has burned during the year, with an insurance of only Thirteen Hundred Dollars. This involves a loss to the College of probably Five Hundred Dollars.

We have renewed and increased our insurance policies this year to an aggregate of \$42,500, the policies running five years. Of the premiums due on these policies we owe about Thirteen Hundred Dollars.

The enrollment for the Scholastic year ending in May, 1908, was 215.

The plan of endowing the College was launched at a time of great financial depression and stringency; yet the Agent's report indicates that \$3,426.79 has been collected in cash and \$13,494.21 in subscriptions running one, two, three and four years. These results may seem to be small, yet when it is considered we have this year passed through so hard a financial year, we are encouraged to believe that with nearly one-fourth of the amount asked for, already secured in pledges, an intelligent and persistent campaign will crown our labors with complete success.

We would call the attention of the Conference to your action of last year in relation to the endowment of Southern College, as follows: "That the Board of Education be authorized to make an apportionment of the sum of \$110,000 in four annual installments, dividing the amount yearly in the different Districts according to the pro-rata used in dividing the regular assessments for Education.

"That the District Stewards divide the amounts apportioned as a special for SOUTHERN COLLEGE among the various pastoral charges till the entire sum of \$110,000 be collected. Each charge to collect the sum so apportioned as the Pastor and Presiding Elder may direct; and of the amount thus collected, \$10,000 be set aside for improvements and repairs."

REPORT NO. 1—JOINT BOARD OF FINANCE.

We have received a communication from Dr. W. F. Tillett, President, and J. R. Stewart, Secretary of the Endowment Fund for Superannuates and the Widows and Orphans of Preachers. The Fund now amounts to \$132,000 in cash assets, and as much more in gross assets. The Board of Management has declared a dividend of \$3,600, of which the Florida Conference receives \$9.

Many, but ineffectual attempts have been made to get the pastors to bring this great enterprise prominently before the Church and take collections for the Fund. Out of 6,000 pastoral charges, only 200 have reported collections. The General Board recommends that each Conference levy a small assessment on the charges for this Fund. A number of Conferences have so ordered. In view, however, of conditions now obtaining with us, your Joint Board deems it unwise to levy a distinct assessment for the Fund, but recommends for adoption by the Conference the following:

Resolved, That every pastor be called on to raise from his pastoral charge for this Fund, an amount equal to one per cent on pastor's salary, the same to be remitted to Conference Treasurer

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

For the information of the Conference, we gather from the report of General Secretary the following statements and figures:

1. The Secretary says: "The year now closing has been, all things considered,

the most prosperous in the history of the Epworth Leagues in our Church."

2. The results flowing from the League assemblies of the past few years justify the indorsement and authorization of this new move in League work, by the last General Conference.

3. The last general minutes shown the total membership of the League to be 127,924, an increase of 4,233 for the past year.

The tables of the Statistical Secretary make the following showing of the work in our Conference: Senior Leagues this year 83, a gain of 5. Senior League members 2,792, a gain of 291.

Junior Leagues 37, the same number reported last year. Junior members, 1,245, a loss of 70.

Raised by the Leagues for Missions, \$512, a falling off of \$257.

This showing certainly is not all that might be desired. If it were possible this important interest should be laid with greater emphasis upon the hearts of the preachers, that the work may be advanced, not only as to the number of chapters and the members in them, but that the work may be systematized and the League may make its legitimate contribution to the spiritual good of our young people.

We wish to commend the Tallahassee District for its action in holding a District League Conference this year.

Again this year as last, we would recommend the holding of District League Conferences and the more especially as our distances are so great as to prevent a large number of our young people from attending our State League Conferences.

We congratulate the management of the Epworth Era and the League Columns in our Advocate and recommend to the Leagues an unstinted use of these absolute essentials to successful League work.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

During the year just closed the Secretary visited eighty schools, was three times in communication with Superintendents and Officers in the test of different features of Sunday School work, and assisted in the organization of a large number of adult Bible classes. On the whole, we are able to report an eminently satisfactory year. There are now on roll 2,086, 2,039 officers and teachers and 18,104, 18,788 scholars. About 30 schools have become actively interested in the Endowment of Southern College, from whom already \$1,000 has been pledged. Practically the whole Sunday Schools movement of the state is in line with Missionary enterprise.

We rejoice to note that the General Sunday School Secretary furnishes the gratifying statement of large increase during the past year, this representing an increase of 63 new schools, 2,517 officers and teachers, and 43 pupils.

We submit for information of the Conference the Board's financial statement. Accounts have all been audited.

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE FLORIDA METHODIST
ORPHANAGE AT ENTERPRISE, FLORIDA.**

To the Bishop and Members of the Florida Annual Conference M. E. Church, South:

We, your Board of Trustees of the Florida Methodist Orphanage, would submit the following report and recommendations for your approval and indorsement:

Some time ago tentative arrangements were entered into by the Board of Trustees, Enterprise, Fla., the valuable property, consisting of a large building and eight town lots of and the Orphanage Board, acting jointly, to secure from Miss Emma Tucker, at Enterprise fine rich land, and also a tract of forty acres of land adjacent to Enterprise. This property, we estimate to be worth, at a fair valuation, at least \$8,000.

Miss Tucker, in her earnest desire to see this good work established here, offered this property to the church for an Orphanage for \$1,250. After careful investigation and inspection by the Trustees, her generous offer was accepted and it became the property of the M. E. Church, South, by warranty deed from Miss Tucker, which includes the Disciplinary Trust Clause.

An experienced lady of fine executive ability, Mrs. Brooks, has been placed as matron in charge, assisted by Miss Hendry.

Two orphan children have been placed in the Home, and there are now some fourteen children in the Home under the care of those ladies, only two of them are at our expense. So, brethren, we have the Orphanage actually launched and in running order in one of the most beautiful garden spots of Florida, on the banks of Lake Monroe, five miles from Sanford in a quiet, retired spot yet easy of access by boat or

railroad. It is quite close to Epworth Inn, which the owners propose to make a great center for religious training and Christian work.

It is also blessed with the abundant medicinal waters of the famous Benson Springs.

Here we propose, by the help of God and the co-operation of all good people, to found a noble Christian institution for the relief, education and training of destitute, fatherless and motherless children, who may look to us for help.

Now, whereas, we, in the providence of God and by order of this Conference, have been placed in charge of the Florida Methodist Orphanage, to foster, care for, and manage for the best interests of destitute, helpless orphans, for the good of humanity and the glory of the Master, whose delight was to feed the hungry, clothe the naked and bind up the wounds of the afflicted,

And, whereas, this is one of the very greatest interests of the church and of humanity, one of the most approved by the Master Himself; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board, realizing the heavy responsibility of this great work, and the urgent need of the hearty co-operation of both the ministry and the laity of the church, earnestly appeal to all our preachers to bring this matter before their people and use such means and methods as in their godly judgment may best effect results, interesting their people in this great undertaking; be it further

Resolved, That the Annual Conference set apart the fourth Sunday in March, 1909, to be called Orphanage Day, on which each pastor be requested to preach on this subject and take an offering for the support of the Orphanage, and the development of the property now in our possession. Be it further

Resolved, That the children in our Sunday schools should be interested, instructed and encouraged in this good work. To that end we ask that this Conference recommend that the fifth Sundays be designated as Orphanage Sundays and contributions taken on those days for the Orphanage. Be it further

Resolved, That, as one of the immediate and pressing needs of the Home is furniture, bed-room furnishings and clothing, we invite the Epworth Leagues, Woman's Missionary Societies and others to supply these necessities. Be it further

Resolved, That we ask this Annual Conference for authority to incorporate this institution under the laws of the State of Florida, and under the general direction of the Florida Annual Conference M. E. Church, South, which body shall elect the Board of Trustees.

earnest searchers for truth, which indicates clearly a desire for the continuance of this spirit of advancement.

The Review is among the very best of its family; is ably edited by a brilliant mind, which gives oftentimes in concrete form, fine articles that show an excellence in literary attainment of its maker that should commend itself to every preacher and lover of best thought, in the solution of many problems of the day.

The Florida Christian Advocate, in connection with our general organ, is well and largely filling the demand of our Church locally since it has ceased, we hope its itineracy, and has become localized, has sprung into renewed life again, and dressed in a new garb, emanating from ourselves as publishers under the leadership again, as heretofore under the direction of Dr. Pasco will continue to attract the admiration of many more of our Church and become a mighty power in moulding thought and directing the energies of the Church.

We most earnestly commend the brethren in the hour of peril, who came to its relief without compensation, to bridge it over till the coming of our Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We shall not endeavor to describe to you the woes of the rum traffic. Genius has exhausted itself in trying to portray its evils; they are at every man's door and speak for themselves.

We all recognize that the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors are the prolific cause of much of the crime and suffering of our people. Experience has proven that moral suasion is altogether inadequate to either suppress or regulate it and only the strong arm of the law can destroy this monster.

It is not rhetoric that we need but righteousness; not resolutions only of deliberative bodies, but relentless and universal war upon the enemy.

Our State has become a dumping ground of the adjacent dry territory. The moral filth of their deposit is a stench in the nostrile of decency and an outrage upon society. The demoralizing influence of the liquor traffic as entrenched in our cities and laying its bloody and powerful hand upon our legislative bodies is just the devil, without sufficient disguise to conceal himself. That we must have deliverance is certain or else we shall have to look upon our lovely State blighted by this terrible curse.

We rejoice in the victories of our sister States and in the earnest prayers that are ascending to God for our emancipation. We believe that victory shall come to us when the moral forces of the country shall obliterate political, sectional and ecclesiastical lines; and with money, tongue, pen and ballot exert their full powers for State prohibition and the unflinching enforcement of our prohibition laws; therefore be it

Resolved, That we shall each by sermons, lectures and mass meetings at home, and elsewhere in the State, as far as we are able, seek to create and organize prohibition sentiment, and that we bring the impact of our combined powers to secure an amendment to the Constitution of the State to provide for State prohibition.

Resolved second, That we recommend that the Bishop appoint J. W. Bigham, W. J. Carpenter and I. S. Patterson as a committee to co-operate with Florida Anti-Saloon League in its work, and that Geo. I. Davis and Rev. T. Griffith be appointed as members of its State Board of Trustees.

Resolved third, That each Presiding Elder appoint a day on which all the preach-

ers in his District shall be called together for the consideration of this question, and the laying of the best plans for accomplishing the work; and that this be done as soon as practicable.

Resolved fourth, That we endorse the W. C. T. U. and the Anti-Saloon League of Florida, and urge the heartiest co-operation with these two great temperance organizations.

Resolved fifth, That the second Sunday in March shall be observed as Conference Temperance Day, and that these resolutions then be read in all of our churches and such sermons, addresses, etc., be delivered as shall be calculated to arouse the people and bestir them to activity.

In the name of decency, in the name of the virtue of our womanhood; in the name of the innocent and helpless sufferers; in the name of every patriot whose blood was shed for our freedom; in the name of the God under whose banner we fight, we propose eternal and uncompromising war upon the liquor traffic.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

We, your Committee on Sabbath Observance, beg to submit the following report:

Realizing that the Sabbath cause is of vast importance, and that there never was a time when a quiet, worshipful Sabbath was more needed than in this busy, worldly century, we urge upon our preachers and people the protection of the Christian Sabbath, that it may be preserved as a day of rest and worship to our people. An institution that is so sacred and so divine, deserves our most careful consideration. Among those who desecrate our Christian Sabbath are to be found certain professing Christians who are endeavoring to bring into prominence again the old Jewish Sabbath, and that despite the fact that almost the whole of Christendom is agreed on the Sabbath as it is now observed; and despite the fact, further, that while the old Jewish Sabbath commemorates the finished work of Creation, the Christian Sabbath commemorates the world's greatest event—the resurrection of Christ, the coming of the Holy Spirit, and the New Creation; therefore, it behooves us not only to discourage the efforts of all such professing Christians, but to endeavor to check them by appeals from our pulpits and if necessary to insist on the enforcement of the law, that our Holy Sabbath may not be trampled under foot in the very presence of worshipping congregations.

Also we urge that we cry out, as a church, and as a people, against Sunday amusements, especially against Sunday baseball, which is one of the most demoralizing in the whole catalogue of such amusements. In some of the cities of our State, the promoters of such amusements are endeavoring to override the State law and have their Sunday games of ball in spite of the law, but since there is a State law against all such and a law which has been fully tested in our courts and found to be constitutional, we recommend that we put ourselves on record, not only as being strongly opposed to such Sabbath breaking, but also as determined to do our utmost to bring to pass the enforcement of the law and thus preserve the sanctity of the Sabbath.

Finally, we are in full sympathy with "The Sunday League of America," an organization which stands for the preservation of the Sabbath, and in endorsing this League and pledging it our hearty co-operation we cannot better express ourselves, or assure our support, than in the words of the Committee on Sabbath Observance in the report at the General Conference, held May, 1906, at Birmingham. from which we take the following:

"The Sunday League of America stands for the highest ethical ideal of the Sab-

bath and seeks to accentuate the American interpretation of sanctity. Its object is to preserve the day of the Decalogue as a season of rest, thus contributing to the mental, religious, and physical upbuilding of all classes of our people.

"A vast majority of the immigrants coming to our shores are from countries where an orderly and worshipful Sabbath is unknown. This infusion of foreign life is fast changing our old-time Sabbath into a lawless holiday, filled with drunkenness, gambling, debilitating sports, destructive of body, mind and soul. The work of the Sunday League is especially designed to arrest and correct this evil by creating a sentiment in favor of wholesome and comprehensive Sunday laws, and of the enforcement of the same when enacted.

"The Sunday League of America has the indorsement and helpful co-operation of multitudes of the most distinguished citizens of the country, including Hon. Theodore Roosevelt, President; Hon. C. W. Fairbanks, Vice-President; Hon. Hoke Smith, and Governor John M. Patterson, of Ohio, the latter of whom are numbered among its officers.

"The work of this League needs and claims the help of every thoughtful American citizen, especially does it make and urge this claim upon the ministers of the Evangelical Churches of America, to whom the American Sunday must look for its protection and perpetuation.

"Resolved, That we pledge to the Sunday League of America, and all other legitimate organizations and agencies our good will and hearty co-operation, in order that laws of Sunday observance already existing upon our statute books may be enforced, as well as that needed laws may be enacted, for the suppression of all forms of Sabbath desecration prompted by pleasure and greed, as ball games, bicycle tournaments, horse racing, theatres, boat and railroad excursions, the open saloon, and the buying and selling of anything except in cases of absolute necessity or mercy. We claim our right as American citizens to the privileges and blessings of the American Sabbath affirming that it is too late a day for us to surrender to aliens and other foes this priceless heritage which we claim in behalf of home and church and nation."

1st. That we ratify and confirm the declaration and resolution adopted by the Chattanooga Convention as set out in the "Call of God to Men," and urge all our laymen and preachers to read said book and get in touch with the spirit of that great Conference.

2nd. That it shall be our determined effort to place the world's evangelization upon the hearts of the men of our Church and to put in operation the plan adopted by the Chattanooga Convention to get our laymen to work.

3rd. That as an expression of our gratitude to God and our interest in world evangelization, we will, in addition to the assessments ordered by the Board of Missions, raise within the bounds of our Conference the sum of \$5,000.00, to be used in such work as the constituted authorities consider most urgent.

4th. We urge our Conference District and Church Lay Leaders to cooperate with the pastors and stewards in providing for all regular church assessments at the earliest possible date, so that the raising of this special fund will not interfere therewith.

5th. We believe that honoring the Lord with our substance and the first fruits of all our increase is not only a source of prosperity, but of growth in grace, and we urge our lay leaders to put into the hands of all our men a copy of Bishop Key's sermon and other leaflets on the subject of Christian liberality.

THE CALL TO THE MINISTRY.

Whereas, The number of preachers in the Florida Conference is seriously inadequate for the full supplying of the pastoral charges of this Conference, necessitating the employment of many supplies; therefore

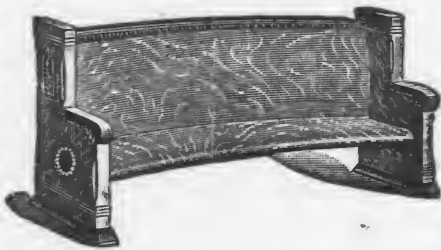
WILLIAM FLETCHER ALEXANDER.

William Fletcher Alexander was born in Allen county, Kentucky, November 21, 1833. He came of that strong stock of former days, his grandfather having been one of the Alexanders of Mecklenburg County, N. C., all Scotch Presbyterians, until this one moved to Kentucky. On his mother's side they were Methodist pioneers. His maternal grandfather, Rev. Chas. Holliday, was a gifted preacher in his day, in 1825 was agent of the Methodist Publishing House in Cincinnati. Mr. Alexander was graduated from the Ohio Wesleyan at Delaware in 1857, and one of his great joys, as he grew older, was to recall his friends of those years, among whom Bishop C. C. McCabe had been room-mate for three years. He taught for a number of years after his graduation. There were two older brothers, preachers in the Louisiana Conference, Dr. Frank Alexander and Rev. Robert R. Alexander, and he went down there in 1862 to teach and later joined the Louisiana Conference, too. He was married in 1870 to Miss Emma Jeffries of that State. There was one child, his son, Marcus, and shortly afterward his wife died. He took his little boy back to his mother in Kentucky and remained in the Louisville Conference until 1886 when he came to Florida, where his life has been before you until January 19, 1908, when painlessly, without a groan or struggle, God called him.

He was a close student, loved his books like friends, especially his Bible. He was not a great preacher, but was a faithful pastor and loved by all classes. His disposition was quiet and retiring. The devotion between himself and his son was very beautiful. He was married a second time in December, 1905, to Miss Mary W. Bruce, of Kentucky, engaged at that time in the Cuban Mission in Ybor City. He was much interested in the evangelization of Spanish-speaking people and learned the Spanish language very thoroughly. Later he was much interested in the development of the Italian Mission. He went to St. Petersburg to live in the summer of 1907, and from thence to his home above.
