*The "Symphonic Poems" of Liszt (twelve in number) stand unsurpassed in the descriptive school of writing, for their wonderful power, wealth of original orchestral combinations, and beauty and variety of rich harmonies and melodious themes. No number of pianos can produce the *coloring* peculiar to orchestral instrumentation, but as all of the "Poems" have been arranged for two pianos by the composer, it is evident he desires their performance in this form, and is willing to risk their success upon the effect to be derived from these instruments. Although but "arrangements," they must be classed among the most effective of the numerous works written for two pianos. The "Mazeppa" is no more brilliant than the "Fest-Klänge," (which is to be given soon), nor more realistic than "Les Preludes," but the wildness of the theme gave the fierce spirit in Liszt an opportunity for expression, which it is evident he could not resist the temptation to take full advantage of, in his treatment of Hugo's poem, which he has followed in preference to the Byronic version.



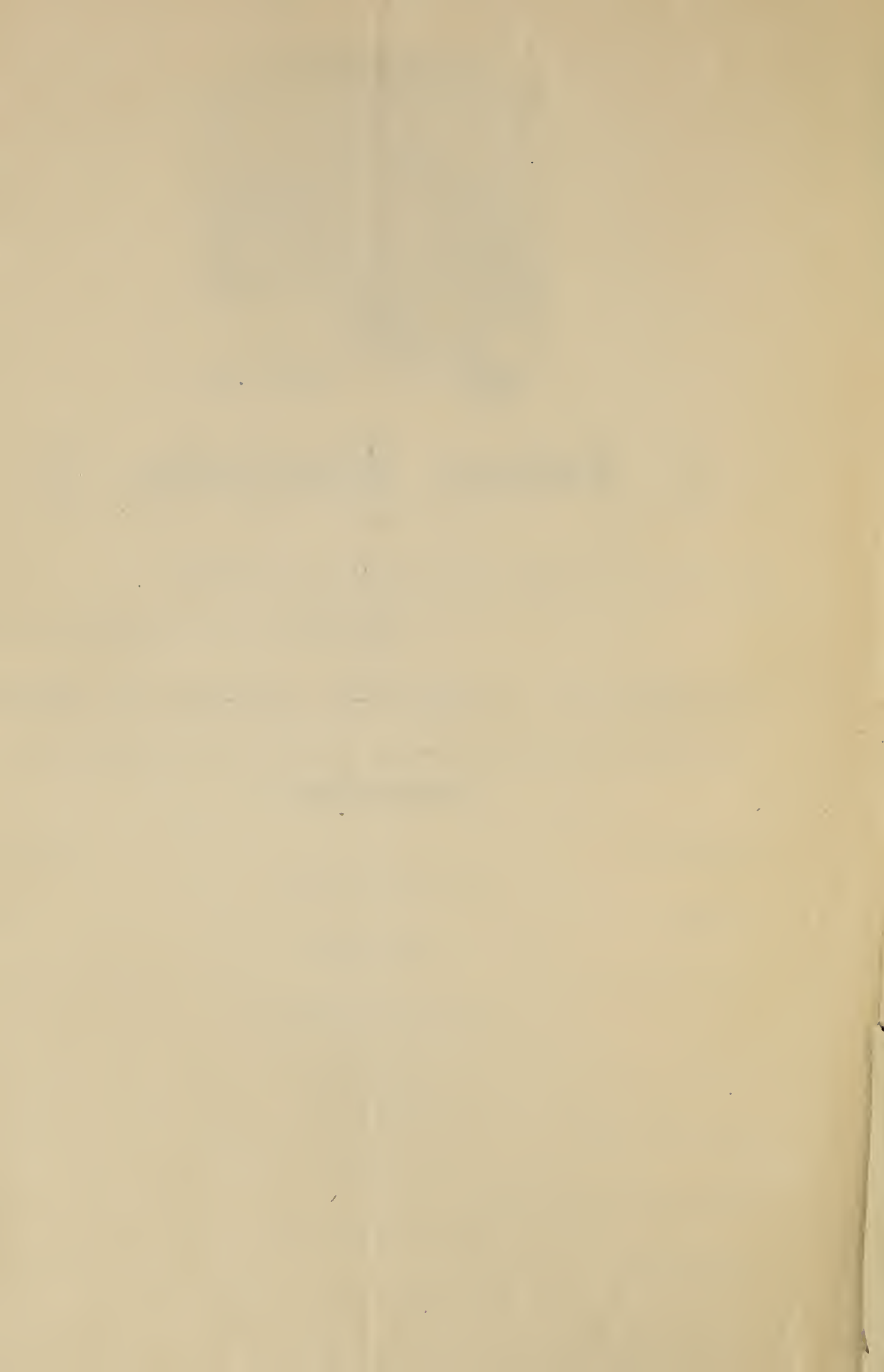

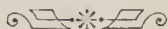

TO THE PUBLIC.

Music is unselfish. It is something which to be of service must be given out to others. Hence that system of musical instruction which best prepares our sons and daughters to express—to give out to others—the purest and most exalted feelings and sentiments, is best calculated to serve humanity. Mendelssohn well understood this when he founded the Conservatory in Leipzig, and in connection therewith uttered the following opinion :

“An institution such as the Conservatory, whose object is to give its pupils an opportunity of making themselves thoroughly acquainted with all those branches of study, the knowledge of which is necessary and indispensable to the educated musician, and to educate them theoretically and practically in the same, has this advantage over the private instruction of the individual, that by the participation of several in the same lesson and in the same studies, a true musical feeling is awakened and kept fresh among the pupils, that it promotes industry and spurs on to emulation; and that it is a preservative against one-sidedness of education and taste,—a tendency against which every artist, even in the student years, should be upon his guard.”

The progressive steps in the Conservatory system which lead the student into self-mastery and control in using his faculties for the public good are, 1st, the class lessons as described above by Mendelssohn, 2nd, the frequent pupils' recitals, and 3rd, the public concerts. The recital of to-day, practically a public examination of students, is of the latter class, and the participants are only a small portion of the number prepared to take part. These recitals are given four times in each scholastic year, and the New England Conservatory being located in Boston, secures for its Quarterlies such audiences as can be brought together in no other American city.

In addition to these advantages, there are free classes in other and kindred branches of study, recitals, concerts by eminent teachers, lectures by well-known specialists, etc., amounting in all to 125 hours per term. Notwithstanding these unparalleled advantages, the same low rates of tuition prevail, viz., \$15 per term for beginners, and \$20 for advanced students. Thorough instruction is given in all departments of Music; in Piano and Organ Tuning; in Drawing, Painting and Modelling; in Elocution; in Literature; in the English branches and in Modern Languages.

The increased facilities secured in the new building on Franklin Square, and the widened curriculum of study, attracted to its halls last year 1989 students, and the attendance this year promises to be even larger. The special opportunities furnished for the preparation of teachers, and the high standards required by the Conservatory before recommendation for positions, has created a demand for its graduates in remunerative school positions which the Institution is quite unable to supply. The musical profession offers a better field to-day than ever before for talented young men and women who have adequate preparation for their work, and the Director will be glad to confer with any who contemplate entering this field.

Liszt stands without a peer in the composition of "Symphonic Poems" or "Programme Music," and it is difficult to conceive of anything more brilliantly effective than "Fest-Klange." It is No. 7 of twelve descriptive pieces of this class, many of which have never been heard in this country—"Tasso," "Les Preludes," "Orpheus," and "Mazeppa" being the only ones yet known to any extent in America. It is acknowledged by contemporaneous writers that Liszt has had the most wonderfully brilliant career of any artist the world has ever known, both as pianist and writer. In 1856 he was created an Abbé, and is probably the most revered of living musicians.

Persons are earnestly requested not to interrupt the performance of "Fest-Klange" (which occupies about ten minutes) by any preparations for leaving.

TO THE PUBLIC.

It is a custom of the New England Conservatory to give a weekly *Soirée Musicale*, patterned after those given every Friday Evening at the Royal Conservatory in Leipzig for now over thirty years, and originated by Mendelssohn himself when he founded the Institution. These *Musicales* are participated in by the teachers and their most proficient pupils, and admission was originally confined to the teachers and students of the Conservatory. But responding to the requests of parents and friends, the barriers have been to a certain extent removed, and the chief limitation is now the capacity of the hall, which seats but about 500 or 600, less than one-third of the number of students in attendance during the year. As this fact sometimes discourages the coming in of pupils and friends from distant parts of the city, and the suburban towns, it has been decided to give a series of concerts in these localities, for the accommodation of those who may be interested. The second in the series is that which occurs to-night, the programme of which is herewith presented.

It may not be out of place here to state that these classical concerts are among the many advantages which students of the Conservatory enjoy. In addition to these, there are free classes in other and kindred branches of study, recitals, concerts by eminent teachers, lectures by well-known specialists, etc., amounting in all to 125 hours per term. Notwithstanding these unparalleled advantages, the same low rates of tuition prevail, viz., \$15 per term for beginners, and \$20 for advanced students. Thorough instruction is given in all departments of Music; in Piano and Organ Tuning; in Drawing, Painting and Modelling; in Elocution; in Literature; in the English branches and in Modern Languages.
