

**TERMS:** Cash with order, in form of money order, check, New York or Chicago draft.


**RESPONSIBILITY:** If your order does not arrive in first class condition we will gladly refill or refund purchase price.

## Giant Darwin Tulips—Gorgeous Colors

 $T\rm HE$  Darwin Tulips were developed in the north of France, supposedly from choice varieties of Bybloem Tulips. Owing to the unusual clearness of the colors, to the substance of the petals, and to their vigorous growth, these seedlings, when they came into the hands of the prominent Dutch firms, seemed worthy of forming a new class of Tulips. In 1889 they were named in honor of Darwin, and offered for sale.



Darwin Tulips are the large, beautiful, cup-shaped variety, carried on long stems. They vary in color from the delicate pinks through to almost black, from delicate lilac to dark purple. The yellow shades can be secured in the Cottage type.

Arrange in clusters of twenty-five or fifty of a color, then you will feel that you can cut a bouquet occasionally without destroying the color effect in your garden.

Plant five to six inches deep, six inches apart. Use bone meal as a fertilizer, two to three handfuls to the square yard.





Sometimes suggestions for color effects aid the prospective buyer of tulips and we have come to the conclusion it would be well to devote some space to this idea. Rev. H. Ewbank and Clara Butt planted in combination are always good. Valentine arranged with Princess Elizabeth as a back ground, or vice versa, is an harmonious effect.


The heavier tones or deep shades must always be brought out with a lighter tone—for instance, La Tulipe Noire is wonderful when Inglescombe Yellow or Mrs. Moon (Cottage) is combined with it.

A beautiful effect in mass planting can be secured by using: Valentine, Faust, Euterpe, Rev. H. Ewbank (all of the purple and lilac tones), set off with yellow, using Walter T. Ware and Mrs. Moon (Cottage type), or with pink by using Baron de la Tonnaye and Aphrodite or Princess Elizabeth.

The bright reds, such as Bartigon, Farncombe Sanders, City of Haarlem, Pres. Taft, Pride of Haarlem and Prof. Rauwenhof are always at their best when planted in mass, or in the foreground of evergreens, or Spirea Van Houttei (Bridal Wreath), which blooms at the same time.



Where pansies, violas, creeping phlox or other low growing plants are used, one can produce a very beautiful effect by

planting tulips in with them, the shorter plant life appears as a carpeting and a planting so arranged seems to be ideal.

When planting tulips in clusters through the perennial borders, using the quantity twelve to twenty-five of a variety according to the size of your borders, plant for effects: Pink against lilac or violet, yellow next to the blue tones, then a soft rose carmine, and build to the stronger shades. The picture in the spring will reward you for the effort and thought of the fall before.

### DIRECTIONS FOR PLANTING

There is an old rule that we think in most cases can be followed, for the planting of all bulbs. "Plant bulbs two and one half times as deep, as the bulb is, in inches, in its greatest diameter."

BREEDER Tulips are considered by many Tulip lovers as the "Art Tulips" of the Tulip family. They blossom in May at the same time as the Darwin and Cottage varieties. The colors are marvelous and rare, not usually found in flowers—purple, blue-black, brown, bronze, dull gold, also shades of red and yellow; in fact, almost any color effect you might wish can be found in this family. The giant blossoms are borne on long stems like the Darwins.

**Planting Instructions.** Plant and treat the same as Darwin Tulips.

Apricot. (24 in.). Apricot-orange, olive base; large flower. 50c per 6; 95c per 12; \$6.25 per 100.

## Reminders

Don Pedro

Plant all Fall bulbs, with the exception of Tulips, as soon as they arrive. Plant Tulips when the leaves of trees fall.

Wilberforce. (32 in.). Soft apricot, edged a clear tone of primrose-yellow, with broader yellow margin inside and green base; a medium sized flower of distinct color, on very tall stem. Splendid for the border. 50c per 6:95c per 12: \$6.25 per 100.

Do not use stable manure unless it can be forked into the soil the Spring before. If fertilizer is needed use bone meal.

In setting bulbs, see that they are set firmly in the soil. Do not allow an air space under them, as this causes water to gather at the base of bulb, and it will rot. Be sure you follow instructions for

planting at proper depth.

## Old English Cottage Tulips

### May-Flowering

THESE Tulips possess a richness in coloring all their own; they come into bloom in May. The form of their flowers will be noticed at once on account of their elegance. Some of them are much like the Darwins, others have long, egg-shaped flowers or gracefully pointed petals. You will find among them the purest yellow, for which we have sought in vain in the other late-flowering Tulips.

sought in vain in the other late-flowering Tulips. This variety of Tulip is found in many colors and shades. When planted in beds or in perennial borders wonderful effects can be obtained with their colors properly contrasted.

properly contrasted. The blooms differ from Darwins in having pointed or oval petals, also being a few days later.

Only really a few of these Tulips can be recommended for forcing. Use deep pots or pans; set the bulbs farther apart than you would Early Tulips. They need plenty of light when brought into the conservatory. Force them slowly under moderate temperature.

### GARDEN SUGGESTION

We think it well to cover the garden in the fall, where perennials and bulbs are planted, with straw or roughage of some type. Leaves, when they become wet, lay so close to the ground, they are liable to smother out many forms of plant life.

To use stable manure, where bulbs are planted, is not advisable; as the ammonia content will more than likely burn the bulbs. If the soil is in need of humus, work manure into the garden the spring before you expect to plant bulbs.

Culture Indoors. In forcing Hyacinths in pots it is necessary to have rich, light soil. Place one bulb in 5-inch pot or four bulbs in 6-inch pot. Cover hole in bottom of pot with a piece of broken pot or stone. Break off any offsets that might appear on base of bulb. Place in pot so that top of bulb will not be more than one-half inch below surface of soil and an inch below edge of pot. Water well and set away in a cool, dark place, covering if you wish with several inches of sand. Let them remain six to ten weeks to establish root growth. Bring them to light as required.

Water Culture. Use Exhibition Size bulbs. Fill glass with soft water so as to nearly touch the bottom of bulb. Put a small piece of charcoal in glass to keep water sweet, and give some nourishment. Put away in a cool, dark, dry place, keep there until roots almost touch bottom of glass. Change water occasionally. Bring to bright light gradually.

**Culture Out-of-Doors.** Bulbs should be set from September to November in a well drained garden spot in earth well spaded, enrich to depth of twelve inches. Bulbs should be planted six



After covering with soil, protect with leaves or litter to a depth of six inches, uncover late in the Spring.
