





This copy contains the correct map, especially cut for the work by Foster, the printer, and is the earliest instance of such work done in the English colonies.

Hubbard was born in England, and came to this country with his father in 1635. He was a member of the first class that was graduated from Harvard College in 1642. About 1657 he was settled at Ipswich, where he lived until his death. He was distinguished, in an age and country of bigots, for his liberality, moderation, and piety; and his *Narrative* has always been regarded as authoritative by historians.

Of the two preliminary contributions in verse, the first, signed J. S., is probably by John Sherman; the second, which is signed B. T., was written by Benjamin Tompson, the earliest native American poet. Comparing Hubbard's work with earlier writers of American history, he says:

This work is a reprint of the Boston edition of the same year (our No. 650). It was printed from a copy containing sheet M in six leaves, and with the blank line on p. 81 of the second part.

| The Printer to the Reader. |, which appeared in the Boston edition and which was really but a list of errata, is omitted; the poetical addresses occupy two leaves instead of three pages; and the errata on p. 88 of the Narrative are omitted, the proper corrections having been made in the text.

The map reëngraved for this edition contains several errors in the names of places, and is engraved on a slightly smaller block. This map may be easily distinguished from the other by the name given to the mountains in New Hampshire. In the Boston edition they are named | The White Hills | and in the London edition | The: VVine Hills=|. We have seen a copy of the latter map without the title printed in the mortise, and with the lower left-hand corner perfect; in nearly all copies this corner is defective, probably owing to the block's having been broken before the greater part, or perhaps any, of the regular edition was printed.

This work traces the wars with the Indians from 1614, including the causes of King Philip's War, and was written to supply the deficiency in Hubbard's Narrative of the Troubles.

This appears to be one of the scarcest of Mather's tracts, apparently not having been reprinted in London. In the preface it is stated: "This following Relation was written neer upon a year ago; fince which a Reverend Author [Mr. Hubbard] hath emitted a Narrative of the troubles which have happened by the Indians in New England, whose pains and industry doth (in my judgment) deserve acknowledgment. Neverthelesse it hath been thought needfull to publish this; Considering that most of the things here insisted on, are not so much as once taken notice of in that Narrative. And although the Pequot war be therein described (and that, as to the substance of the story, truely and impartially) it is not so fully done as is here to be seen."

The Historical Discourse at the end appears to have been printed before the Relation, the putting of both under one title being an afterthought. There were two editions of this second pamphlet. Dr. Samuel A. Green informs us that the title-page of the copy in the Massachusetts Historical Society Library differs from our reproduction and reads, as follows: | [6 lines] | . . . in disappointing | their devices, is declared. | . . . concerning the | Prevalency of Prayer; shewing that New-Englands / late deliverance . . . is an eminent | Answer of Prayer. | [13 lines] | . In 1629, when but seventeen years of age, he left home and joined the Dutch expedition sent out against the Portuguese and Spaniards in Brazil by the Dutch West India Company, under the command of Henrick Cornelifz. Lonck and Deederik van Waerdenburgh. He returned to Holland in 1632, after a service of more than three years in Brazil and the West Indies.

This narrative, covering the period from April, 1629, to December, 1633, was written many years after his return.

This "Instrument of Peace" brought to an end the war declared by the Assembly of Virginia against the Indians in March, 1676. It was signed by "the Queen of Pamunkey, on behalf of her felf and the feveral Indians under her Subjection; the Queen of Waonoke; the King of the Nottoways; the King of the Nancymond Indians; [and] Captain John West, Son to the Queen of Pamunkey," whose marks are given on p. 16. Out of this war, thus happily brought to a close, incidentally arose Bacon's Rebellion.

By Article vII. it is liberally provided "That the faid Indians have and enjoy their wonted conveniences of Oystering, Fishing, and gathering Tuchahoe, Curtenemons, Wild Oats, Rushes, Puckoone, or anything else (for their natural support) not useful to the English, upon the English Dividends; Always provided they first repair to some Publick Magistrate of good Repute, and inform him of their number and business."

This is the original Dutch edition of the first part of the famous general account of the buccaneers. It was translated into Spanish in 1681, and from Spanish into English in 1684. It was also translated into French in 1686.

The advertisement of books at the end is not mentioned by Sabin. The portraits and plates of this copy have English inscriptions and references, and are probably inserted. The two maps, with the inscriptions in Dutch, are probably originals.

This work is the prototype of an entire literature of books of adventures, consisting of novels, romances, and comedies. At the end of the volume (pp. 161-186) is an appendix giving a short account of the possessions, revenues, etc., of the Spaniards in America, and a complete list of all the ecclesiastical functionaries in Spanish America, with notices of their revenues, etc.; perhaps taken from Linschoten (See our No. 252).





This collection of voyages is of especial value because of its account of the discovery of the Mississippi River by Father Marquette in 1673, with the map of the river, which is believed to be the earliest one extant. It also contains a map, with explanations, of the discovery of the country near the North Pole, by the Dutch, in 1681; a description of an overland journey made from Russia to China in 1653; and one of the earliest maps (Tasman's) of Australia, Van Diemen's Land (now Tasmania), and New Zealand.

This is the earliest account we have of the settlers at Port Royal, before their removal to the west bank of the Ashley River in Carolina.

"T. A. Gent" is supposed to be Thomas Ash, who visited this country as a clerk on board His Majesty's Ship *Richmond*, which was on the coast from 1680 to 1682. On his return to England in 1682 he published this work.

The book contains much interesting matter about the country and its products. He speaks of Indian corn as follows: "At Carolina they have lately invented a way of makeing with it good found Beer; but it's strong and heady: By Maceration, when duly fermented, a strong Spirit like Brandy may be drawn off from it, by the help of an Alembick."

There were several J. W.'s among the friends of Edward Randolph, the chief mover in the *quo warranto* proceedings to annul the Massachusetts charter. It is not known which of these the writer of this pamphlet was, or even that he signed his own initials to this production.

This interesting letter is written with a free, flowing, and gossiping pen, and is a most extraordinary production. Its tone is anything but complimentary to the Bostonians, especially those belonging to the Independent Church. The writer says of the people that "For Lying and Cheating they outvie Judas, and all the false Merchants in Hell; and the worst of Drunkards may here find Pot-companions enough, for all their pretences to Sobriety. . . . For Cheating and Lying . . . They make a sport of it here, look upon Cheating as a commendable piece of Ingenuity, and brag of those vile Actions which others are assamed of, commending him that has the most skill to commit a piece of Roguery." Many of the stories related of particular persons, whose initials the author gives, are not such as could be quoted. His account on the last page of the origin of a samous Boston proverb is at least curious, if not amusing.

A Second Edition was published in 1683, in which the marks of the Indian names are supplied in ink, instead of being printed, the printer of that edition evidently not having the use of the characters used in the earlier one.

This is one of the earliest works relating to New Jersey. Ockanickon was a chief of the New Jersey Indians, who desired to be buried among the *Friends*. He was accordingly buried in their churchyard in Burlington, and it is said many tears were shed over his grave both by the Indians and Quakers.

This account of Ockanickon's dying words was translated by the interpreter, Henry Jacob Falckinburs, and sent to a friend in London by John Cripps, a Quaker, in a letter dated "Burlington the 12th of the 5th. Month, 1682," with a request that if it was printed a few copies might be sent to him. It is one of the greatest rarities connected with the history of the New Jersey Indians, as only a few copies were printed.

The work opens with a sort of prefatory letter signed by John Cripps. At the end are imitations of the signatures of Ockanickon and four other Indians, with other names of English witnesses, one man and four women, members of the Society of Friends.

"On the occasion of his examination before the Government and Council of Pennsylvania in 1689, in reply to the question 'By whose order did you print it [the Frame of Government or Charter] in England?' Bradford answered, 'By Governor Penn's.' Wallace's address, p. 52.

"As this is the only edition of the first Charter printed in England before 1689, it must have been printed privately by Bradford on one of his master's (Sowle) presses."—Grolier Club, Bradford Exhibition, 1893, p. 7, No. 1. Sowle was the printer from whom Bradford learned his trade.

This pamphlet contains a Constitution which Penn proposed for the colony, together with certain Laws which had been accepted by the purchasers in England. Some of the latter are very curious, i.e., No. xxxvII., which is an act for the preserving of the public morals. Both the Constitution and Laws were afterwards much altered before going into effect — a fact frequently overlooked.

The book throws no light on the sources of the map; but Kohl, who has a sketch of the map in his Washington collection (no. 211), thinks White's map served for the North Carolina coast, and Wm. Sayle's surveys for the more southerly parts. Kohl says that the boundary line here given between Virginia and Carolina is laid down for the first time on a map. The river May flows from a large 'Ashley lake.'' — WINSOR.

Wilson was secretary to the Proprietors of Carolina. His work relates particularly to the Southern Settlement in that province, and contains much useful and necessary information concerning the natural history of the country, together with its laws and government.



There are copies of the Third and Fourth Editions in the Lenox Library, both without the Directions of Reference (pp. 11-14), and each having the map in its First State.

This Letter was written by Penn after he had been in America over nine months, and may be considered as a report, from personal observation, of what he found his colony to be. Proud, in his History of Pennsylvania (1:246), says: "It is the best account, though only an imperfect sketch, of the original state of the Province, of its Aborigines, and Natural history, that is to be found in those times." It contains a list of the property-holders in Philadelphia, with the numbers affixed to their names indicating the lots they held, as shown in the plan of the city which accompanies the work. This list and plan are usually lacking.

The printer was Andrew Sowle, from whom William Bradford learned his trade. Bradford, the husband of Sowle's daughter, came with Penn to America in 1682. How long he remained in Philadelphia or where he was between 1682 and his second coming from England no one seems to know. It may be that, for a time, he resumed A

This is one of the most interesting and at the same time one of the rarest books relating to Carolina. For further information upon the Fundamental Constitutions see our No. 771.

The author begins by giving "the grounds and reasons of publishing these Sheets." (1) He had "heard of, and feen most of the Relations . . . of this Province of Carolina;" (2) he had "feen the Fundamental Conflitutions of that Province which are not here to be had for mony"; (3) he had had occasion to communicate what he knew to certain friends "having thoughts of removing themselves and families thither," and to direct them to "fuch prints, other papers and perfons," as he "knew might best help them therein."

This led to meetings "with those before mentioned Gent. Planters" and with others, where he "heard many discourses pass for and against the Country". He found that "on both fides . . . they were much in the dark about the true state of that Province; the cause thereof" being, "that these severall Relations were in so many hands"; that the "Fundamental Constitutions" were not known elsewhere; that "by any one account hardly any could receive fuch fatisfaction to answer all their doubts, so as to adventure on so great an undertaking"; that accounts were conflicting; and that "those that tooke most paines in making enquiry . . . wanted the Fundamental Constitutions, which is a great part of the life of this Undertaking." Consequently he thought that "a collection made out of all these might be of use to the people, and thereupon determined to adventure upon the work."

This book is the second work printed by Bradford, in Pennsylvania, and one of the rarest books relating to Pennsylvania. It was long thought to have been printed in London, and it was not until the late Mr. F. D. Stone, librarian of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, called attention to the similarity of the type employed in this work to that found in publications known to be from Bradford's press, that its London origin was questioned. After a most careful comparison with other works printed by Bradford, it was conclusively demonstrated to have been printed by him. For further information upon this point see our note under No. 710.

Thomas Budd, of Somersetshire, afterwards of Philadelphia, arrived at Burlington in West Jersey in 1678, and during his residence held many important public offices. His work shows great intelligence, and a public spirit far in advance of his time.

being inserted." In the First Issue, of which there are copies in the library of the New Jersey Historical Society and Lenox Library, the last paragraph on p. 37 begins with the words, "I find removal likewife allowable in case of perfecution," etc. In the later and more common Issue, of which there is a copy in the Harvard College Library, another paragraph was substituted, beginning with the words, "Where people find themselves straitned in point of their opinion," etc.

The author received a grant of five hundred acres of land from the Proprietors of East-New-Jersey for writing this work; but both he and his wife died on the voyage to this country. The most valuable part of the work is a series of letters from the early settlers of New Jersey to their friends in Scotland, which fills about one third of the volume. The work was plagiarized by Samuel Smith in his History of New-Jersey, 1721. Due importance was first attached to it by James Grahame in his History of the Rise and Progress of the United States, London, 1827.

The author states that, having examined the coast of America "from the River of Canada, Northerly, to the River of May, Southerly, in that part of Flonida now called Caralina," he is obliged to prefer as a place of settlement "East-Jersey, upon the River of Hudson, . . . to any other of the English Plantations upon that coast."

This work led nearly two hundred persons to embark in September, 1685, for East New Jersey on the *Henry and Francis*, "a name," says Whitehead, "which deserves as permanent a position in the annals of New Jersey as does that of the *Mayflower* in those of Massachusetts."

This work was reprinted by Whitehead in his East Jersey under the Proprietary Governments, New York, 1846 (2d ed., Newark, 1875).

Mr. Wilberforce Eames, in a letter laid into this book, says: "I can find no record of the edition of *Information and Direction* described on the slip herewith returned, nor do I know of any other copy. The imprint shows that it could not be the first edition. The latter I take to be the one in folio size, described by Joseph Smith in his catalogue of Friends' books (vol. 1, p. 302), and by Sabin in his Dictionary. The Menzies-Murphy copy is now in the Historial Society of Pennsylvania's collection. The ed. of 1686 is prob. the second."

This little brochure, the rarest of Penn's works with which we are acquainted, gives a description of the houses which it was supposed to be the most convenient for the settlers to build. A Dutch edition was published at Amsterdam the same year.

About 1684 the First Edition appeared, a copy of which was sold in the Menzies sale and afterwards in that of the library of Henry C. Murphy.

Neither Smith in his *Friends' Books* nor Sabin knew of this edition. Both record an undated edition, supposedly of 1684.





Byfield, the author of this interesting historical tract, was one of the first settlers of Bristol, Rhode Island, and this letter was written there. It is followed by "The Declaration", which was read in the Council House before the arrest of Governor Andros (as stated in the letter), and is followed by a notice, signed by Waite Winthrop, Simon Bradstreet, and thirteen others, demanding the surrender of Sir Edmond Andros.

This work was reprinted by Peter Force in his Tracts, Vol. 4, No. x.; and by the Prince Society, in the Andros Tracts, 1: 1-10.

On December 19, 1686, Sir Edmund Andros reached Boston and succeeded Dudley as governor. He at once took measures for the erection of an Episcopal Church, and by this and his other distasteful acts soon came to be thoroughly detested by the colony. After a stormy administration he was at length arrested in the spring of 1689 and thrown into prison, and a provincial government was instituted, which lasted until the new charter of 1691 was put in force. At the end of this volume, used as end-papers, are to be found pp. 35 and 36 and the upper half of pp. 37 and 38 of Budd's Good Order established in Pennsilvania & New Jersey (our No. 694); the latter, a half-leaf, being used as a paste-down. The finding of these leaves in this position, together with the finding of other leaves of the same work similarly used in a copy, in the original binding, of Keith's Pretended Antidote Proved Poyson (Philadelphia, 1690), together with a careful comparison of the type used in these several works, led Hildeburn and Stone to the positive conclusion that Budd's Good Order was printed in Philadelphia by William Bradford, the printer of the work here described, and not in London as had been previously supposed.

This is the first of Keith's known publications in this country, and one of the earliest issues of Bradford's press. It was reprinted in London in 1691.

"This work, although written while the author was a member of the Society of Friends, was expressed in such a tone as to cause the Rev. Thomas Barton, an Episcopal Missionary in Central Pennsylvania, to write to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, in 1766, that he often wished that Keith's Presbyterian and Independent Churches brought to the test, could be sent over to every mission.' It was answered by Cotton Mather, James Allen, Joshua Moodey and Samuel Willard in The Principles of the Protestant Religion Maintained.'"—HILDEBURN.

George Keith, by birth a Scotchman, a man of good abilities and well educated, was surveyor-general in New Jersey. In 1689 he was employed by the Society of Friends as a superintendent of their schools. After about two years he began to speak in their religious gatherings; but being, as they asserted, of a turbulent and overbearing nature, he made them considerable trouble, and was forbidden to speak in their meetings. This and other circumstances caused a division among the Friends, and two parties were formed. Bradford, the printer, sided with Keith and his party, and Keith and Budd wrote against the majority. Keith afterwards went to England and

The second impression appeared at London in 1691, under the title Late Memorable Providences, etc. The Appendix contains a reply to George Keith's Churches in New England brought to the Test. For the Edinburgh edition see our No. 765.

This is one of Cotton Mather's most interesting books, and rare in any condition. It contains an astonishing narrative of occurrences in what the author calls "the Metropolis of the English America." There is a curious account of one of the Goodwin children, who, when under the influence of the witches, could read Quaker books, but not the Bible. "A popish Book also she could endure very well." Mather closes the account thus: "I shall therefore add, That my Grandsather Cottons Catechism called Milk for Babes [our No. 473], and The Assemblies Catechism, would bring hideous Convulsions on the Child if she look't into them; tho' she had once learn't them with all the love that could be."

At the bottom of p. 75 Mather says of the two discourses at the end of the book: "The Latter of which was delivered unto my own Congregation; on the Occasion of what besel Goodwin's Children: but the Former of them was deliver'd unto the same Congregation on the Occasion of a horrible Self-murder committed by a possessed woman in the Neighbourhood."

Cotton Mather, the eldest son of Increase Mather, and grandson of John Cotton,

was born in Boston, February 12, 1663. He was graduated from Harvard at the early age of fifteen, and took his second degree at eighteen years, on which occasion he delivered a learned thesis on "The Divine Origin of the Hebrew Points."

Brought up from his earliest years in an atmosphere of erudition, endowed with a prodigious memory and a passion for the acquirement of all kinds of knowledge, and an object of admiration and flattery from childhood, he occupied the most prominent position in New England of any man of his age.

In 1684 he was ordained as an associate of his father in the pastorate of the North Church in Boston. He was not only conversant with the ancient languages, but used with facility French and Spanish, and at least one Indian language.

His library was the largest private collection on the American continent. His style of writing was peculiarly his own, intricate in character and abounding in learned allusions. During the latter part of his life it met with the sharp criticism of his contemporaries. He was a voluminous writer; the list of his separate writings published during his lifetime exceeds 383, few of them of great length, the largest and most important being *The Magnalia Christi Americana*, or Ecclesiastical History of New England, London, 1702 (our No. 806).

- "There by the Statutes of the Colledge, none is to be admitted, before he can write Latin in a pure Style, and translate any ordinary Greek Author.
- "It is customary with them, every Morning in the Colledge-Hall, to read a Chapter out of the Hebrew Bible, and at Night a Chapter out of the Greek Original."
- "Nay, I will be bold to fay, that New England hath out-done the whole World; for among the Indians, who a while fince were mere Heathens, there are not only many Congregations of them, who are converted to the Christian Faith, and the Protestant (which is the only True) Religion: But no less than Four and twenty of those Heathens, are now not only Christians, but Preachers of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. . . . The whole Bible hath been translated into the Indian Language, and there also printed: It's above forty five years since, that truly pious and godly Man, Mr. John Elliot, Minister of the Church at Rocksborough (a Mile from Boston) being warm'd with a Compassionate and Holy Zeal for the Conversion of the Americans, set himself to learn the Indian Tongue, that he might the more easily, and successfully open to

"In this 'Collection of Papers' relating to the Revolution in England under William of Orange, is one by Increase Mather relating to the sufferings in N. England under Androfs — No. X. The paper had been previously published by Janeway in London, under date 1688, and was republished in Boston, same date. Mather was then in London. See 'Andros Tracts' Vol. II. Prince Society.

"Nos. IV. & V. were originally published with No. X. of the papers indicated on the title-page." — MS. note laid in.

This collection is sometimes confused with the "Six Papers" of Bishop Burnet; but it is an entirely different work, and there seems to be no good reason for its being connected with his name.

The last of these papers, A Narrative of the Miferies of New-England, was written by Increase Mather, and relates to the attempt to take away from the New England colonies by Quo Warranto and other proceedings the "ancient Rights and Priviledges" which they had enjoyed under their charters. Complaint is made of the arbitrary acts of Sir Edmund Andros. In order to obtain relief from these evils, Increase Mather undertook a voyage to England. His paper contains a copy of the Petition to the King (probably drawn up by Mather), of John Gibson, aged 87, and George Willow, aged about 86, on behalf of their neighbours the inhabitants of

Cambridge and New England asking for relief; also another petition by Increase Mather and two New England clergymen.

The John Carter Brown Library has a copy (8 pp., 12mo, without title), which Dr. Samuel A. Green thinks was printed at Boston (Green, Early American Imprints, p. 74). It is barely possible that this may be the original London edition of 1687, mentioned by Rich (1:210, No. 8). There was also a Boston edition, reprinted from the London edition and dated 1688 (Sabin, 11, No. 46708).

The author not only records the results of his own missionary life among the savages inhabiting the banks of the St. Lawrence, but gives a very full and interesting account of their peculiar traits of character, their religious rites, mode of life, etc., before these became modified by contact with civilization. Charlevoix, as a Jesuit, quite naturally found the work lacking in interest.

Le Clercq claims for the Recollects the honor of being the first to compile a dictionary of the languages of the Indians in Canada.

Harrisse believes this to be an error, the Jesuits being unsuccessful, as he says, in their endeavors to have it suppressed. Another reason which has been given for its supposed rarity is that "although published by order of the French King, it was, in consequence of its containing passages inadvertently favoring the English pretensions, called in and suppressed."

The work contains many satirical reflections upon the labors of Le Clercq's brethren of the Jesuit Order, who were equally zealous in the task of christianizing the Indians. As he lived in the most cordial relations with them, especially with Father Bigot, it is thought that these reflections must have arisen from political motives. The question has been fully discussed by Field in his *Indian Bibliography* (q.v.). The work is a well written history of the Recollect missions and La Salle's voyages. From an historical point of view its fidelity to the documents upon which it professes to be founded has never been questioned. It is only when this writer on the history of New France speaks of other religious orders that we must read with caution.

The work is particularly valuable as containing the first original account of the discoveries of La Salle, by Father Anastase Douay, who accompanied him. From it Hennepin drew the account of his pretended discovery of the Mississippi River.

This work, commonly known as Bayard's Journal, is a reprint of that which is sometimes referred to as "the lost Bradford Journal". On the title-page the author's name is wrongly spelled "Reyard", but in the text it is spelled "Beyard". Bradford's edition was perhaps the first book printed in New York, the only known copy of which is in the Public Record Office in London.

It is an account of Frontenac's expedition against the Mohawks, led by Mantet, Courtemanche, and La Noue, in 1692, and Governor Fletcher's attempt to repulse the French and Indians who were advancing on Schenectady.

In the preface the author says: "AS this following small Treatise is a short Narrative of some little Check given by the English Gallantry to the Arms and Attempts of France, so far off as the Indian Territories; so it gives us an occasion of confidering, How the Great Lewis may justly plume himself with a Title peculiarly his own, viz. The great Disturber of the World. For, tho the Bloodiest and most Active Scene of that Monarch's Ambition feems bounded within the Confines of Europe; yet is there hardly that most distant Region or Nation, the very utmost Corner of the Universe, but has some Footsteps of his Aspiring Arms."

Firmin was a Suffolk man, who came to New England about 1634, and not long afterward was found practising as a physician at Ipswich, Massachusetts. He married the daughter of Nathaniel Ward, the "Simple Cobler of Aggawam," became a theologian, and returned to England, where he was a minister of the Gospel at Shalford, Essex, until 1662. He then resumed the practice of medicine.

This volume is interesting because of the historical and biographical details in its prefatory epistle, in which the author gives an account of his visit to New-England and of a conversation with Anne Hutchinson.

John A. Lewis, in the New England Historical and Genealogical Register (27: 311), records having seen a copy with the imprint "Boston, Printed and Sold by Benjamin Harris, 1693."

Of all the works of the Mathers, this is perhaps one of the most important and interesting, as exhibiting the prevalence of the delusion which at that time infected New England. Mr. Brinley never succeeded in getting a perfect copy.

The earliest publication relating to the Salem witchcraft was a little pamphlet by Deodat Lawson, issued in the summer of 1692. This is the second, and although dated 1693 on the title-page, was, according to Winsor, published the preceding October. It was no doubt printed and published before the end of the year.

A part of the book had been delivered in a sermon on August 4, 1692. Following the "Discourse" proper are transcripts of the proceedings of the trials of the witches executed at Salem: (1) "The Tryal of G. B."; (2) "The Trial of Briget Bishop", June 2, 1692; (3) "The Tryal of Susanna Martin", June 29, 1692; (4) "The Trial of Elizabeth How", June 30, 1692; (5) "The Trial of Martha Carrier", August 2, 1692. At the end of the book is The Devil Discovered, with a separate pagination.

There were three editions published in London all bearing the date 1693. Copies of all three are in the Lenox Library. This is the First and only complete London Edition. It was probably published in December, 1692, although dated 1693 on the title-page.

Winsor says that when Mather finished writing the book, in October, 1692, a duplicate copy of the manuscript was sent to England, so that the book appeared in England at about the same time that it did in Boston. A careful comparison of the Boston with the London edition shows that the latter was printed from the former, instead of from a separate manuscript. In his desire to publish the work as soon as possible, the publisher evidently broke up the Boston copy and gave it out to two or more printers. This, no doubt, accounts for the breaks in pagination noted above. A more cogent reason for this supposition exists in the fact that of the seven errors which appear in the Boston edition, five are repeated in this, two only, and those obvious misprints, being corrected.

In his works on Old Virginia and her Neighbors and The Dutch and Quaker Colonies in America Fiske calls the seventeenth century "the golden age of piracy." In the latter work (2:222) he says: "The difficulties of Governor Fletcher were increased by the prevalence of piracy on the high seas. . . . Piracy throve greatly in the seventeenth century because maritime commerce expanded far more rapidly than the naval facilities for protecting it. Never before had so many ships been afloat and traversing long distances, loaded with cargoes of such immense value. Moreover the practice of privateering, whereby civilized nations sought to supply the deficiencies in their naval force, was extremely liable to degenerate into piracy. The abominable tariff and navigation acts also, by which commerce was stupidly hampered, aroused in mercantile communities a spirit of lawlessness which tolerated the vile pirate, very much as it aided and abetted the noble army of smugglers."

"On September 2, 1692, Governor Fletcher offered to the Council the draft of an act against privateers and pirates recommended to him by their Majesties, which, being approved, was ordered to the House. Here it received its first and second reading on September 3, was read for the third time and engrossed on September 6, 1692. On September 7 it received its first reading in the Council, was read for the third time on September 9, and signed by the governor on September 10, 1692. On the same day it was published by the governor at the city hall in presence of the Assembly and of the Mayor and Aldermen of New York City." — Hasse.

"In the lineage of New England military prowess, a true descendant of Miles Standish and of John Mason was Colonel Benjamin Church; born at Plymouth, Massachusetts, in 1639; founder of Little Compton, where he died in 1718; a matchless guerilla-leader; the most famous Indian-fighter of his day; especially renowned as the conqueror of King Philip, and as the invincible champion of the white men in five other wars against the Indians. In his old age, he put into the hands of his son, Thomas, the memoranda he had kept of his campaigns, and he caused to be written and published, in 1716, 'Entertaining Passages Relating to Philip's War . . . as also of Expeditions more lately made against the Common Enemy and Indian Rebels in the Eastern Parts of New England; 'a book that stirred the very heart of New England, holding 'children from play and old men from the chimney-corner,' having indeed a spell almost beyond the reach of literary art. It is a soldier's bluff narrative of his own dangerous and enticing adventures; it is full of individual incidents - risks, grapplings, bloodshed, leaps in the dark, all manner of stern things. The reader seems to be a listener, and to be sitting by the side of this scarred and ancient paladin of the New England bush-whackers, and to hear his very talk, as he narrates, frankly, vividly, and always with a strong man's modesty, the deeds that once saved every New England man's door-post from being bespattered with the blood of his own wife and children." - TYLER, History of American Literature, 2: 140.





This work is valuable and interesting because it refers to William Bradford and his troubles in Philadelphia. There are references to him on pp. 4 and 5. On p. 5 the writer says that "he, viz. Sam. Jennings, and his Party, did take away from Will. Bradford, the Printer, his yearly Salary of Forty Pounds per Annum, they had bound themselves by Indenture to pay him, for some years to come, without the least just occasion given them; or the last breach of the Indenture on his part, the only pretence they made, being his Printing the Sheet, called, The Christian Faith of the People of God called in scorn, Quakers in Rhode Island, &c. A Paper which hath been well received by many Friends here in England, and elfewhere: And his Printing it without their License or Knowledge, they made so highly criminal in him, as to take from him Forty Pounds per Annum, for fome years to come, being fuch an unparallel'd Instance of Oppression, that I think few parts in Europe, in a thing of that Nature, can produce the like, he being left at liberty by the express Terms of the written Indenture betwixt him and them, to Print what he pleased, or might be for his Profit, that was not against the Government, as nothing of this could, or was pretended to be, (nor indeed was ever any thing that he afterwards Printed, in the least against it) he never refusing to print for them, whatever they required, which none of them can fay he did; but shewed himself always most willing to serve them, in his Art of Printing." This book, printed in New York, was followed during the year by that volume now so precious, The Laws & Acts of the General Assembly for Their Majesties Province of New-York, New York, William Bradford, 1694 (our No. 750).

This is the longest work, with the exception of Maule's Truth Held Forth and Maintained, printed by Bradford at any time prior to 1710, and was printed on paper made at the Rittenhouse mill, of which Bradford was part owner. It is a small quarto volume of 226 pages, and the printer's apology for the typographical errors in it shows that it was not completed until after the author had sailed for England, which event took place in January or February, 1693/4. It was announced in the Almanac for 1694 (our No. 747), printed about October, 1693, as follows: "There is now in the Press a Treatise entituled, Truth advanced above Error, &c....' The appearance of Hebrew letters in its pages has led some to question whether it was printed by Bradford. It is a sufficient answer to say that they also appear in New-England's Spirit of Persecution, printed by him the year before.

Bradford began the publication of a series of almanacs in Philadelphia in 1686, and continued their publication on his removal to New York. The almanac for 1686, dated 1685, was prepared by Samuel Atkins; those for 1687–1713, excepting that for 1688, by Daniel Leeds; that for 1688, by Edward Eaton; and those for 1714–1744, by Titan Leeds. The issue for 1687 was in sheet form.


Daniel Leeds was the father of Titan and Felix Leeds, who were also almanac-makers. This was the first almanac issued in New York. Though its imprint bears the date of 1694, it was no doubt, as was usual with like publications, issued late in the previous year. Bradford, with rare exceptions, continued to the end of his career to date his almanacs with the year for which they were to serve, instead of that in which they were actually printed. Advertisements in his newspapers show that they were generally on sale about October of the preceding year. In that for 1739, in May, is found an entry which has often been quoted: "the printer born the 20th, 1663," which, notwithstanding the inscription (1660) on his tombstone, is now generally admitted to have been the date of his birth.

This almanac is of interest to the bibliographer, from its advertisements of Keith's Truth Advanced in the Correction of Many Gross & burtful Errors and of The Laws & Acts, both of which are dated 1694. Keith's work is announced as "now in the Press", whereas of The Laws & Acts it says: "THE Laws of the Province of New-York will shortly be printed, whereto every one may have recourse to know the exact Time of Markets, Fairs, Courts, Excise, Rates and Imposts upon Goods, & c. and therefore may omit them here."

This is the first of a very remarkable series of New York almanacs, such as exists, probably, in no other collection, public or private. Besides the Bradford and even rarer De Foreest imprints of 1745, 1747, 1748, and 1750 (our Nos. 950, 957, 959, and 969) there is one printed by the Widow Catherine Zenger, 1749 (our No. 964) whose imprint is known only on one other publication. The two varieties of the Parker almanac (our No. 978) are also extremely curious. The series as a whole is of great value as an exhibit of the literature of the people, for the almanac was the only universal bit of popular, light reading of the colonial days.

This appears to be one of the rare cases in which Bradford gave the correct date to the imprint of an almanac. Hildeburn gives the date as 1695, an error which Evans has copied.

In the note-book of Pierre Eugene Du Simitière, now in the Library of Congress, he records, among other things, during September, 1778, the receipt as a present from Dr. William Bryant, of Trenton, of "the almanacks printed at New York by William Bradford for the years 1694, 95, 96, 97, 98 and part of 1700." Of those he names, the four earliest are in the present collection.



This, the earliest edition of the *Laws* of New York, is the most precious work, historically and commercially, issued by the New York press. The copy here described and the Lenox copy are the only known copies which are perfect as issued. It was probably printed between December, 1693, and March, 1694.

From Leeds' Almanack for 1694 (our No. 747), published in October or November, 1693, it appears from the advertisement that Keith's Truth Advanced was then occupying the press. It is most likely that Bradford did not begin the printing of The Laws & Asts until he had finished that work, or in February, 1693-94.

These Laws, as originally issued, contain 22 sheets not previously printed, which must have been finished in about three weeks. The date of publication must, therefore, have been some time in March, 1694.

With The Laws & Acts Bradford included three Acts and A Catalogue of Fees, which he had already printed before the work on this volume was begun. These are included in the table of contents, but without indication as to where they could be found. They should be found at the end of the volume, and are as follows:

The historical importance of the publication of *The Laws* & Ass lies in the fact that it brought together in print laws that had theretofore existed only in manuscript and in different localities. It acquainted the people of New York with the laws as a whole, gave them an idea of their political importance, and strengthened the government within the Province. The first work printed by Bradford in New York is thus both a typographical and an historical monument.



The map, which here appears in its First State, is to be found in its Second State in Campanius' Kort Beskrifning, Stockholm, 1702 (our No. 803).

Acrelius, in his work on New Sweden, says that the book was printed at the royal expense, expressly for the conversion of the American heathen, and that 500 copies were sent to New Sweden. For this reason a very small number of copies must have remained in Sweden. He further states that all the copies were bound with the cipher and arms of Charles XI.

Anders Anton von Kiernman, whose book-plate is found in this volume, was born at Stockholm, of humble parentage, September 27, 1695. He became a savant and statesman of such eminence that King Adolph Fredrik in 1743 elevated him to the rank of a nobleman. His life's work was mainly devoted to historical research, and the most important of his numerous published works was Bibliotheca Svio-Gothica. For many years he was Chief of the Royal Archives; in 1747 he was appointed "the King's Counselor". He died at Stockholm, March 2, 1765.

This translation of Luther's Catechism into the language of the New Jersey Indians (Delaware or Lenni-Lenape) is due to the Swedish missionary Johan Campanius (b. 1601, d. 1683), grandfather of the first Swedish historian of New Sweden, Thomas Campanius. The Catechism appears to be more a paraphrase than a literal translation. Each paragraph of the Delaware version is followed by the Swedish "versio", and that by the text of Luther in Swedish, the latter in larger type. Pages [155]—160 are devoted to a vocabulary of the Mohawk Indians.

Sabin records three varieties of title-page for this work: this one, as reproduced, and two others, in which the word "thither" is divided and occupies the 4th and 5th lines of the title. In one of these there are 17 lines of quotations (Massachusetts Historical Society copy); while in the other there are but 13 lines (Boston Public Library copy). In this there are 17 lines of quotations and the word "thither" is undivided. The text in each appears to be the same.

On pp. 1-5 is the first reprint of the very rare tract The Humble Request of bis Maiesties loyall Subjects, the Gouernour and the Company late gone for New-England, by John Winthrop and others, London, 1630. Only 2 copies of the original edition are known to be in this country, one in the Prince Collection of the Boston Public Library and the other in the John Carter Brown Library.

Joshua Scottow, at whose suggestion this volume was probably printed, seems to have been the earliest person in the colony who had an antiquarian turn of mind. In this work appears for the first time in print Dudley's Letter, which J. Hammond Trumbull characterizes as "the most interesting, as well as the most authentic, document in our early annals." This is the longest letter in this little collection, and fills 19 pages. It was written by Thomas Dudley, Deputy-Governor of the Colony of Massachusetts Bay, to the Countess of Lincoln, on whose estate he had been steward before coming to America. It gives a condensed story of New England affairs, especially of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, from his landing, early in the summer of 1630, to March, 1631, when it was written. "No document in the annals of Boston," says Drake, "will compare in importance with it, and no one can successfully study this period of its history without it."

Writing of the origin of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, Dudley says (p. 11): "Touching the Plantation which we here have begun: it fell out thus. About the Year 1627. Some Friends being together in Lincolnsbire, fell into discourse about New-England, and the Planting of the Gospel there; and after some deliberation, we imparted our reasons, by Letters and Messages, to some in London and the West Country; where it was likewise deliberately thought upon, and at length with often negotiation so ripened, that in the year 1628. We procured a Patent from His Majesty for our Planting between the Massachusetts Bay and Charles River on the South, and the River of Merrimack on the North, and three miles on either side of those Rivers and Bay; . . . And the same year we sent Mr. John Endicott, and some with him, to begin a Plantation; . . ."

This is the First Edition, with the impressions of the maps and of the engraved view of Niagara Falls, each in its earliest state. Hennepin was apparently one of the most popular and widely read writers of his day, many editions of the Nouvelle Découverte being published in French and various translations soon after its first appearance.

"There has been some speculation by Shea and others as to whether certain parts of the volume were printed in another printing-office and with different type from that of the first 312 and ten star pages. We find the paper alike throughout. The

change in the heading after p. 313 is also paralleled at intervals in the pages before p. 313, e.g. pp. 28-40, 66, 78-88, etc. This vagary has no special significance. Chapters 45-76 have their numbering printed in Arabic, while the preceding forty-four chapters were given in Roman numerals. But this does not prove that a different printing-office produced that part of the book. Curiously enough, the 'Table des Chapitres' at the beginning of the volume observes this change from Roman to Arabic numeration, and omits any page reference whatever for the inserted star sig. O, which would go to prove that the 'Table' was printed after all the text was in shape to be tabulated. The type is the same in the text throughout, except the last page, which is printed with a smaller font to bring it within the page—not an unusual circumstance in books of the period. Altogether considered, the volume has evident traces of having been 'built up' while in press. The author's 'Avis au Lecteur' and other

considerations would seem to indicate that he supervised the work personally." — PALTSITS.

In Le Clercq's Premier Établissement de la Foy (our No. 718) had appeared an account by Hennepin's colleague, Father Zenobe Membré, giving an account of La Salle's expedition to the mouth of the Mississippi, in which Membré took part. This account, owing to the rarity of Le Clercq's work, was little known at that time, and Hennepin in this work boldly appropriated it with such verbal changes as to make it appear to be a narrative drawn from his own journal of 1680, thus setting up a claim to having been the first discoverer of the mouth of the Mississippi. Other parts of his work, including accounts of Indian life, were also largely taken from Le Clercq.

"While historians are agreed that the Hennepin books succeeding Louisiane abound in clumsy plagiarisms, and that the new claim of priority over La Salle was mendacious, there is not unanimous opinion as to who was responsible. Charlevoix, Kalm, Bancroft, and Parkman have all pronounced Hennepin to be a falsifier; and so at first did Shea. But later, Shea took opposite ground, and sought to show that an unscrupulous publisher made up the new editions out of such material as lay at hand, apparently without consulting the author. To this charitable view, Poole good-naturedly yields a hesitating adherence." — Thwaites.

Leeds was a member of the Society of Friends. His first quarrel with them was about his almanac for 1688, in which he had added some light, foolish, and unsavory paragraphs, in imitation of the almanacs published in England, which gave great uneasiness and offence to the Friends. The almanac was condemned and attempts made to call it in. Leeds did not withdraw from the Society of Friends until the time of the Keithian schism, in which he did not seem to have taken a very active part. He joined the Church of England, which Keith had also joined, and became his principal coadjutor in the theological war which raged from 1696 to 1706.

This book is a bitter attack on the Society of Friends. In the chapter Of Perfecution and Profecution Leeds mentions "the Imprisoning William Bradford, and

taking away his very Tools that he should get maintenance for his Family by, contrary to the Law of *England*, so justly pleaded by him," etc., "also, their imprisoning *Peter Boss*, till Providence put the Government into the hands of Coll. *Fletcher*, . . . who released him out of Prison. . . .

"Well, to Tryal W. B. [Bradford] was brought, D. Lloyd pleaded hard against him, the Jury had their Charge given by S. Jenings, out they went to try this Crime, but it happening so, that there was two or three upon the Jury that were not Quakers, they stood upon the Nicety (as some of their fellow-Jurors call'd it) of two Evidences, to prove that W. B. printed said Appeal, which not appearing, after about 48 hours the Jury came into Court, and told the Bench, they were not like to agree. To whom A. Cook made this learned speech, viz. Well, seeing, Friends

Calef, in his More Wonders, says that Cotton Mather was the author of this book, and is so unkind as to say that he published it anonymously in order to praise himself.

But he was evidently a sincere admirer of the former governor. He says: "After all, I do not know that I have been, by any personal Obligation or Circumstances, charmed into any Partiality for the Memory of this Worthy Man; but I do here from a real Satisfaction of Conscience concerning him, declare to all the World that I reckon him, to have been really a very Worthy Man; . . . that he left unto the World a notable example of a Disposition to Do Good, and encountered and overcame almost invincible Temptations in doing it."

The work is printed in full in the Magnalia, Book II., pp. 34-75. This volume concludes with an elegy by the writer on Sir William Phips, who died at London February 18, 1694/5.

"A certain filly Scribler, the very First-born of Nonfenficality (and a First-born, too, that one might Salute as the Martyr Polycarp once did the wicked Marcion, (One Tom Maule, at this time living in Salem, hath exposed unto the Publick a Volume of Nonfensical Blasphemies and Heresies, wherein he sets himself to Defend the Indians in their Bloody Villanies, and Revile the Country for Defending it felf against them. And that the Venom of this Pamphlet might be improved unto the Heighth of Slanderous Wickedness, there hath been fince added unto it in another Pamphlet, a parcel of Ingredients compounded for Mischief, as if by the Art of the Apothecary. . . . in [pag. 195.] the same horrible Pamphlet [he says]: God bath well rewarded the Inhabitants of New-England for their Unrighteous Dealings towards the Native Indians, whom now the Lord hath suffered to reward the Inhabitants with a double measure of Blood, by Fire and Sword, &c. And those Unrighteous Dealings he Explains to be the killing of the Indians, (or Murdering of them) by the Old Planters of these Colonies in their First Settlement. 

This is the First Edition of Samuel Sewall's greatest work excepting his *Diaries*, which were not published until the latter part of the nineteenth century (1878-79 and 1882), in the Massachusetts Historical Society's *Collections*, Vols. 45-47.

Samuel Sewall was Judge of the Supreme Court of Massachusetts, which office he held until disqualified by old age and infirmity. "The witchcraft trials were the most serious incidents of his official life. He shared at the time in the prevailing belief in that sad folly; but, unlike his stern associates, he early came to see the terrible mistake he had made, and offered the remarkable confession, which, as it stands in our official records, bears most touching evidence to the purity and elevation of his character. . . . The gentle and aspiring soul of Samuel Sewall is revealed in all that remains of his writing. He gave to a generation somewhat perverse in other things an example of the graces of life, and the beauty of modest and sincere thought." — Goddard in Winsor, Memorial History of Boston, 2: 417-418.

Whoever gets beyond the tough title of this book will find in it a mine of New England history. With the exception of Nathaniel Morton's New England's Memorial (our No. 606), it is perhaps the most important historical work written and printed in New England prior to Prince's Chronological History of New England, Boston, 1736 (our No. 925).

Thomas Bray was the founder of parish libraries in this country, especially in Maryland. He was the founder of the Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge and the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. Appointed by the Bishop of London as his commissary over the churches in Maryland, he at once actively interested himself in seeking missionaries to send to that colony, and projected a scheme for establishing parochial libraries. He was the first advocate of the public library in America, and to his efforts was due the establishment of libraries in most of the parishes of Maryland and in the important towns of the other colonies. No less than thirty-nine libraries, some containing more than a thousand volumes, were established in North America, besides many in foreign lands, during Bray's lifetime. In this work he gives a general view of the English colonies in America, in which he enumerates twenty-nine libraries, of which sixteen were in Maryland and three in the Bermudas.

The earliest Maryland imprint extant, printed over a quarter of a century before Parks set up his press in Annapolis and ten years before Zenger went to Chesterton, was an edition of Bray's sermon *The Necessity of an Early Religion*, printed by Order of the Assembly, by Tho. Reading, for Evan Jones, at Annapolis, in 1700.

The present work was reprinted in the Maryland Historical Society's Fund Publication, No. 37 (Baltimore, 1901), under the editorship of Dr. Bernard C. Steiner.

The finding of these two pieces bound together has probably led some bibliographers to place the whole work under a later date (Winsor, 5:336).

The first scheme of government, called the Fundamental Constitutions of 1669, was prepared by Shaftesbury and the philosopher John Locke for the guidance of the four Estates of Carolina: the Palatine, the Proprietors, the Landgraves, and the Caciques. It was dated July 21, 1669, and consisted of 81 sections. The Second Fundamental Constitutions, consisting of 120 sections, was dated March 1, 1669–70; the Third, of the same number of sections, was dated January 12, 1681–2; the Fourth, containing 121 sections, was dated August 17, 1682; and the Fifth, of 41 sections, was dated April 11, 1698. The Second and Fifth of the series appear in the work here described. Copies of the Second and Third, separately printed, in folio, are in the Lenox Library, as is also (in the Ford Collection) a contemporary MS. copy of the First, which is incomplete, as it lacks sections 1–8.

"One provision, however," says Fiske, speaking of the Fundamental Constitutions, 
"expressed an idea of which Locke was one of the foremost representatives, and 
herein Ashley agreed with him; it was the idea of complete liberty of conscience in 
matters of religion. It was provided that any seven or more persons who could agree 
among themselves upon any sort of notion about God or any plan for worshipping him 
might set up a church and be guaranteed against all interference or molestation. An 
ideal so noble as this was never quite realized in the history of any of the colonies; but 
there can be little doubt that the publication of Locke's 'Fundamental Constitutions' in 
1670, in 1682, and 1698 had much influence in directing toward Carolina the stream 
of Huguenot emigration from France, which was an event of the first importance."

This is one of the long series of early Massachusetts Election Sermons. The Appendix (pp. 89-99) gives an interesting account of a visit made by Grindall Rawson and Samuel Danforth to the "Plantations of the Indians, within this Province", from May 30 to June 24, 1698.

Noyes, who attained some distinction as a writer of grotesque obituary and punning poetry, took a prominent part in the witchcraft prosecutions, and in this sermon even seriously questioned whether the Indians were really worth converting.

"The memory of Nicholas Noyes, who preached in 1698," says Lindsay Swift, is not a sweet savor in New-England history. . . . He fell into the fashion of his age and of his cloth in preaching the 'degeneracy of the times.' In his sermon of ninety-nine pages he draws up his indictments,—irreligion, swearing, and so on, sixteen counts in all,—against his country. Yet, he admits, 'it cannot with truth be asserted, that as yet we are as bad as bad can be; for there is real danger of growing worse.' This mournful Noyes grew 'very corpulent,' and is said to have died choked with blood from the curse of a witch; this end was meted out with a justice more poetical than his obituary verses, for he would not on one occasion pray with John Procter, a condemned witch, when even their dinner had been taken from the poor witch's children by the sheriff. More humane to children than Noyes was Michael Wigglesworth with his liberal eagerness to grant infants in another life 'the easiest room in hell.'"

Thomas had lived in America for about fifteen years, and the information contained in this book is the result of his own observations and experience. It was written to induce the immigration of all who wished to better their worldly condition, and especially of the poor who might subsist in West Jersey "without either begging or stealing". He gives an account of the natural products of the country and the improvements already made and in progress, as well as of the modes of life among the Indians and the prevailing intercourse between them and the settlers. In the Preface the author says: "Nor is there the least question or doubt to be made, but this Noble Spot of Earth will thrive exceedingly."

The work was issued in facsimile by H. A. Brady, New York, 1848, and was reprinted with an introduction by the Burrows Brothers Company of Cleveland in 1903.

This is a fine large copy, with many leaves uncut at the bottom of the page. The author's name is incorrectly spelled on the title-page, but on p. 1, in the list of persons cast away, and at the end, it is correctly spelled "Dickinfon".

This was the first book printed in Philadelphia after Bradford's removal to New York. The narrative begins with the 23d day of the sixth month, called August, 1696 (the wreck took place on September 23d), and closes with his arrival in Philadelphia on the 14th of February, 1697.

Dickinson was a native of Jamaica, who, with his wife, had joined the Society of Friends a short time before embarking on the voyage the misfortunes of which are the subject of this book. He settled in Philadelphia and became one of the most extensive and successful merchants of his time. For further particulars concerning him, see Proud's History of Pennsylvania, 2:119.

The work, except for the title, seems to be identical with A Relation of the First Voyages, etc., recorded in Field, Indian Bibliography, No. 880.

Helps closes a fine eulogium upon Las Casas in the following language: "His career affords, perhaps, a solitary instance of a man who, being neither a conqueror, a discoverer, nor an inventor, has, by the pure force of benevolence, become so notable a figure, that large portions of history cannot be written, or at least cannot be understood, without the narrative of his deeds and efforts being made one of the principal threads upon which the history is strung. . . . Take away all he said, and did, and preached, and wrote, and preserved (for the early historians of the New World owe the records of many of their most valuable facts to him); and the history of the conquest would lose a considerable portion of its most precious materials. . . . He has been justly called 'The Great Apostle of the Indies.''





Bray's library scheme developed into a larger one which took shape in the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and later in the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts.

On Bray's return to England, early in 1700, he found that the Quakers had raised prejudices against the establishment of the Church in Maryland. He refuted their arguments in this *Memorial*, and a bill was passed for the maintenance of the Established Church. A Second Edition of this work appeared in 1701. It was reprinted in the Maryland Historical Society, *Fund Publication*, No. 37, 157-173.

In the Preface, the author gives some interesting information concerning Jansen and his press. "The fubfiance of this book was wrote near two years ago, but being backward in my felf to appear in print, as also the press being long expected here before it came, and when come taken up with other important matters intervening, occafioned the delay of its publication till now. . . The chief occasion of there being so many errours, was, the Ptinter being a man of another nation and language, as also not bred to that employment, consequently something unexpert both in language and calling, and the corrector's not being so frequently at hand as the case required," etc.

"Leeds's book was printed by Bradford in New York, in 1697. Pusey's answer was probably written the same year, — when there was no press in Philadelphia; and, after this, the press was 'long expected before it came.' Thomas supposed (Hist. of Printing, 11. 25) 'that when Bradford removed to New York, in 1693, he left Jansen to manage a press in Philadelphia.' It seems certain, however, that the new press was not set up before 1699. In that year were printed Jona. Dickinson's 'God's Protecting Providence' [See our No. 779] and Samuel Jenings's 'Truth Rescued.'" — Trumbull, in Brinley Catalogue.





"Whether Captain William Kidd ever really deserved such a grewsome renown is, however, more or less questionable. He was certainly no ruffian, but an educated mariner who for the greater part of his life was esteemed a model of integrity. He was probably the son of a Presbyterian minister at Greenock, in Scotland. In his marriage certificate, in 1691, he is styled 'gentleman.' At that time he had considerable wealth and lived in a pleasant home on Liberty Street [New York]. In earlier days he seems to have been a navigator in various parts of the world."—
Fiske, Dutch and Quaker Colonies, 2: 226.

"No unimportant man has caused more fear, speculation, and gold-digging, than Captain William Kidd. Along the shores of New England and Long Island, from his day to this, men have dug in the dead of night, directed, as they thought, by the witch-hazel or the divining-rod, to find his buried Gold, and none have found it. 'The Pirate Kidd' was long a bugbear to frighten children, and a name to arouse the cupidity of men. Privateering has been a respectable business, and the slave-traffic was a respectable traffic; and both were engaged in by respectable merchants of New York, Bristol, and Newport, and by merchants in England at the close of the seventeenth century."—C. W. Elliott, New-England History, 2:57.

When Lord Bellomont came to America to succeed Fletcher as Governor of the colony of New York, the neighborhood of New York City was a sort of rendezvous for pirates, and he early began to take measures to suppress their ravages. Colonel Robert Livingston formulated a plan of employing Captain Kidd, who then had a good reputation and a knowledge of the sea. A ship was accordingly fitted out, Livingston and Kidd bearing one fifth of the expense, and Kidd was sent out in 1697 to capture pirates. Instead he turned pirate himself, and while he was never convicted of this charge, he was hanged at Execution Dock for the murder of one of his sailors. Some eminent noblemen, among whom was Lord Bellomont himself, had furnished funds for his fitting out, and they were accused of complicity in his piratical scheme.

The author of this tract was a "person of quality," and "was privy to all the Steps taken by the Earl of *Bellomont*, from his first hearing the name of *Kidd*, till he lest *England*: and in saying so I do in effect affirm, that I was acquainted with every thing that pass'd in that affair."

Whatever may have been Kidd's crimes, it is clear that he did not have a fair trial, and was found guilty on insufficient evidence.



The work was written by Charles Wolley, or Wooley, a clergyman of the Church of England, who accompanied Sir Edmund Andros to New York in 1678. He officiated as chaplain at the Fort until his return to England, July, 1680. His little volume, written after his return to England, but not published until 1701, presents an interesting account of New York at the end of the seventeenth century. The reasons he gives for not publishing his account earlier appear in his preface "To the Reader", as follows:

"The materials of this Journal have laid by me several years expecting that some Landlooper or other in those parts would have done it more methodically, but neither bearing nor reading of any such as yet, and I being taken off from the proper Studies and Offices of my Function, for my unprofitableness, I concluded, that when I couldnot do what I ought, I ought to do what I could, which I shall further endeavour in a second Part: in the mean while, adieu."


He gives considerable space to an account of the Indians and their customs. Speaking of land, he says that it could be bought "in my time at two-pence or three-pence the Acre, for which they have a good Patent or Deed from the Governor.



The Second Edition of this work was published at London in 1703 (our No. 809). Under the second English régime in 1685, when Dongan was governor, Bayard was mayor of New York and a member of the Governor's Council, and drew up the Dongan Charter that was granted in that year.

Under Governor Nanfan, who temporarily succeeded Bellomont, Colonel Bayard, who had brought Leisler to his doom, was himself put on trial, being accused by the Leisler faction of piracy, and of scheming to introduce popery and slavery into New York. He was tried for high treason before Chief-Justice Atwood and sentenced to be hanged, drawn, and quartered; but on appeal to the King in Council the proceedings against him were declared to have been illegal. The narrative of the proceedings throws a strong light on the factious political life of the times.



This is a work of great interest for the history of Pennsylvania. It was written by the grandson, not the son, as stated by Muller, of the Rev. Johan Campanius, who accompanied Governor Printz to New Sweden, arriving at Fort Christina February 15, 1643, where he acted as chaplain of the colony for six years.

This work was chiefly drawn from the manuscripts of his grandfather; the verbal accounts received from his father, who was with the former on the Delaware; and additional facts obtained from the manuscripts of Peter Lindström, an engineer. It is divided into four books: the first treats of America in general; the second, of New Sweden, otherwise called Pennsylvania; the third, of the Indians in New Sweden; and the fourth, of the languages of the Indians, with vocabularies. The work is illustrated with several interesting maps and plates, of no less value than the text.

An English translation, by Peter S. Da Ponceau, was printed in the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, *Memoirs*, 3: Part I., pp. 1–168; which was also issued separately. The book is often improperly catalogued under the name of Holm [i. e. the abbreviated form of *Holmensis*], the Latin name of Stockholm.

The map of New Sweden (p. 12), drawn by "P: Lindström, Ingin: fortif:", in 1654 and 1655, is evidently made with care, and is the oldest general map of Pennsylvania existing. The view of Niagara Falls is copied from the 1697 edition of Hennepin (our No. 762).

Printers have persecuted me. The Author of this Church History ha's all the Reason in the World then to be Patient, tho' his work, be depraved with many Errors of the Press-work. The common Excuse in such cases is, The Distance of the Author from the Press; Here there was the Distance of a thousand Leagues."

The map which accompanies this work seems, in part at least, to have been drawn from Seller's map of New England, which appeared between 1674 and 1676. It has been criticised as made up from old rough drafts, with obsolete names and with scarce any resemblance to the country it was intended to depict.

The following is an extract from Mather's Diary under date of August 30, 1702: "Yesterday, I first saw my Church-History since ye publication of it. A Gentleman arrived here, from New-Castle, in England, that had bought it there. Wherefore, I sett apart this Day, for solemn Thanksgiving unto God, for His Watchful & gracious providence over that Work, & for ye Harvest of so many prayers, & cares, & Tears, & Resignations, as I had Employ'd upon it. My Religious Friend, mr Broomfield, who had been singularly helpful to me in the publication of that great Book (of Twenty shillings price, at London), came to me, at the Close of the Day, to join with me, in some of my Praises to God."

This, the most famous of Cotton Mather's works, though relating generally to New England, is principally devoted to Massachusetts. It is the most famous book produced by any American during colonial times. Filled with a vast amount of valuable material, it is indispensable to the student of New England history; but its statements should be accepted only when corroborated by other contemporaneous writers.

It abounds with the author's conceits and puns, and bears much evidence of his credulity. Largely a compilation from the author's previous publications, it is poorly arranged, and being without an index is difficult to consult. Professor Tyler characterizes the work as follows:

"The 'Magnalia' has great merits; it has, also, fatal defects. In its mighty chaos of fables and blunders and misrepresentations, are of course lodged many single facts of the utmost value, personal reminiscences, social gossip, snatches of conversation, touches of description, traits of character and life, that can be found nowhere else, and that help us to paint for ourselves some living picture of the great men and the great days of early New England; yet herein, also, history and fiction are so jumbled and shuffled together, that it is never possible to tell, without other help than the author's, just where the fiction ends and the history begins. On no disputed question of fact is the unaided testimony of Cotton Mather of much weight; and it is probably true, as a very acute though very unfriendly modern critic of his has declared, that he has 'published more errors of carelessness than any other writer on the history of New England.''

This is the First Edition of the earliest history of Virginia, after Captain John Smith's, and was written primarily to correct Oldmixon. It was published anonymously, and is illustrated with reduced reproductions of engravings from De Bry, by Gribelin. Beverley's style is easy, unsophisticated, and pleasing, and his work is most useful for the period following the Restoration. It was translated into French and appeared in two editions at Orleans and Amsterdam, respectively, in 1707.

"The author had had experience in the public records of the colony, and the books treating the institutional life of the colony and the Indians are both full and satisfactory. The Indian section is particularly full, being based on Smith's and Hariot's accounts [our Nos. 135 and 402] and illustrated by De Bry's engravings [our No. 140]."—Weeks in Larned, Literature of American History, No. 1121.

Winsor thinks Tyler has a little overestimated the merits of this work.

Robert Beverley, its author, who died in 1716, was a native of Virginia, and was Clerk of the Council about 1697, when Andros was governor.



This work relates to the history of the Episcopal Church in Carolina. It severely denounces the famous Exclusion Bill of 1704, requiring all members of the Commons House of the Assembly "to conform to the Religious Worship in this Province, according to the Church of England; and to receive the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, according to the Rites and Vsage of the said Church."

On p. 29 is given an account of the indignities suffered by the Rev. Edward Marston, a minister of the Church of England, because he would not join in upholding this law:

"The worthy and reverend Minister of the Church of England there, has shared with the deepest, in the Suffering Part, from the Violences and Fury of those People, because he would not joyn with them. . . . [He] has been insulted by them in the most barbarous and villanous manner, even in the Streets, his Gown torn off from his Back, whipt with a Horse-whip, and in a most unseemly manner beaten and abused, as by his many and frequent Complaints made to the Proprietors (tho' never regarded) will appear."



"A somewhat circumstantial account of Quelch's behaviour at the execution was given in a sheet supplementing one of the News-Letters, and called An Account of the Behaviour and Last Dying Speeches of John Quelch, John Lambert, Christopher Scudamore, John Miller, Erasmus Peterson, and Peter Roach, the six Pirates that were Executed in Charles River, Boston side, Friday, June 30, 1704.' They walked guarded by forty musketeers, with constables, two ministers, etc., to Scarlet's Wharf, and were thence conveyed by water to the gallows. (Buckingham, Reminiscences, i. 15.) Sewall gives a bustling account of the movements made to capture Quelch and his men. Keith, the whilom Quaker, landed at Boston in June, 1702, as a missionary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, and journeyed from New England to Carolina during the next two years, indulging in theological controversies, which produced a crop of tracts.

This work is an account of his journeyings, but contains little more than an account of his sermons preached at the different places through which he travelled. This pamphlet relates to the unsuccessful expedition against Port Royal made in May, 1707, under command of Colonel March, and is an arraignment of Governor Dudley, charging that he was using his position for his own personal advantage, in illicit trade with Acadia.

"For some account of this remarkable publication, 'arraigning [Gov.] Dudley, with unbounded severity,' see Palfrey's Hist. of N. England, iv. 304-310. The Dedication is signed, A. H. — probably, for Alexander Holmes, one of the subscribers to the Memorial against Dudley, to the Queen. The absurdity of attributing the authorship of this tract to the Rev. John Higginson of Salem — aged 92 — will be apparent to any one who reads a single page of it. Dr. Palfrey, with more probability, suggests (p. 310) that 'Cotton Mather was concerned in the composition:' but 'the smartness and pedantry of the style' are as characteristic of Rev. John Wise of Chebacco (who had an old grudge against Dudley) as of Mather.' — TRUMBULL.

The Queen favored the proposal and issued the instructions here described to the Governors of the different Colonies to aid in rendering the project effective. Vetch placed these proposals before the Governors, but the expedition against Canada fell through, owing to the non-arrival of the fleet promised by the Queen.

This copy formerly belonged to Joseph Ritson, the celebrated critic and antiquary, and has his autograph on the inside of the front cover.

Next to Eliot's Indian Bible, this is the most important monument of the Massachusetts language. It is printed in double columns, with the Indian and English on the same page, the Indian in the first column through the Psalms, and in the second column for the Gospel of John. The Indian title-page is often lacking.

"Mayhew's version of the Psalms and Gospel of John is founded upon Eliot's; but every verse underwent revision, and scarcely one remains without some alteration. The spelling differs considerably from that of Eliot and others, who had learned the language among the Indians of the mainland. In exploring 'the latitudes and corners' of Indian grammar, Mr. Mayhew probably went further than Eliot had gone; and the fact that his work passed through the hands of 'J. Printer' gives it additional value as a monument of the language. James, the Indian printer, learned his trade from Samuel Green in Cambridge, and had worked on both editions of the Indian Bible." — Trumbull in Winsor, Memorial History of Boston, 1: 477.

On the recto of the first fly-leaf appears this manuscript note by Geo. Livermore: "James, the Printer, was a native Indian, born at Hossanamesitt or Grafton. He was taught to read and write the English language at the Indian Charity School at Cambridge. In 1659, i.e. 50 years before he printed this book, he was put apprentice to Samuel Green, printer at Cambridge, and received the surname of Printer.' He was employed in printing both editions of Eliot's Indian Bible. Eliot in a letter to Robert Boyle, 1682-3, says: "We have but one man, viz. the Indian

Printer, that is able to compose the sheets and correct the Press with understanding.'" For some further particulars in regard to the Indian known as James Printer, or James the Printer, see Littlefield, Early Massachusetts Press, 2:77.

This "blazing and sulphurous poem" first appeared in 1662. No perfect copies are known of the first four American editions, prior to the Fifth Edition, Boston, 1701 (Lenox Library; Brinley copy), and only an imperfect copy in the Massachusetts Historical Society, which Dr. Green thinks may have belonged to the Second Cambridge Edition, probably printed in 1666. Two English editions appeared in London, both anonymous, in 1666 and 1673, copies of which are in the British Museum. It is filled with the theology of the day, and gives a description of the great and last judgment, and attributes to the Divine Being, as Professor Tyler says, "a character the most execrable and loathsome to be met with, perhaps, in any literature, Christian or pagan." The doctrine of infant damnation, held by the Puritan Church, is carried to its logical conclusion, when, in answer to the pleadings of the infants against the injustice of their being cast into hell forever, the Inflexible Judge says:

"You Sinners are, and such a share, as Sinners may expect;
Such you shall have, for I do save none but mine own elect:
Yet to compare your Sin with their, who liv'd a longer time,
I do confess yours is much less, though every Sins a Crime.

"A crime it is, therefore in Blyss you may not hope to dwell; But unto you I shall allow the easiest Room in Hell."



This work was written by Joutel to counteract, in part, the statements made in Tonti's *Dernières découvertes* . . . de M. de la Sale, Paris, 1697, which, though it appeared under Tonti's name, was disowned by him.

La Salle's voyage was begun in 1684. He was assassinated by some of his companions, March 19, 1687. Charlevoix, who knew Joutel, says that he was a very upright man, and the only one of La Salle's party on whom he could rely. Joutel rendered him important services, and after La Salle's assassination he made his way by land to Canada.

The map which accompanies the work was designed by Joutel, and is the first to give the results of the last two voyages of La Salle. It gives a very correct representation of the course of the Mississippi as far as its mouth.

This is the earliest exclusively American catalogue. It is arranged in chronological order, and enters under their representative dates the sections of such collections as Hakluyt and Ramusio. It is devoted particularly to the English colonies, and especially to New England.

In order to advance the interests of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, White Kennett, Bishop of Peterborough, made a collection of books, charts, maps, and documents, with the intention of writing a history of the propagation of Christianity in the English colonies. On the relinquishment of that project he left his collection, by will, to the society. Winsor says the library is still in existence in London, though it lacks many titles in the printed catalogue and contains others not in that volume. The catalogue, of which but 250 copies were printed, was prepared with much care, titles being copied at full length with great accuracy, and gives the name of the printer and the number of pages in each volume. An account of this library, by Charles Deane, may be found in the Massachusetts Historical Society, *Proceedings*, Vol. 20 (1883).

This pamphlet narrates some of the events in the life of Sir Thomas Grantham, especially of his services in Virginia and Bombay.

In 1673, during the war between England and France against Holland, he convoyed twenty-five sail from Virginia to England. Three years later he returned to Virginia, at the time of Bacon's rebellion, of which he gives some account, interspersed with official documents. During this time, it is stated, in the draft of a warrant to Garter and Clarencieux Kings of Arms, for making additions to his coat of arms and alterations in his crest, to the facts of which stated therein Sir Thomas Grantham himself makes oath, that "by means of a personal Acquaintance, formerly between him and some of the principal Officers among the Rebels; at the utmost Hazard of his Life, with exceeding great Honour and Fidelity, [he] so successfully transacted Matters, as partly by Perswasion, and partly by Compulsion and Stratagem, to reduce that Colony to their just Allegiance, and entirely Resettle the Government on its former Basis."

This edition is here described for the first time. A Second Edition (probably differing only in the title), noted by Sabin (7, No. 28323), was published in 1716, copies of which are in the John Carter Brown and Virginia Historical Society Libraries. In 1882 the latter copy, then supposed to be unique, was reprinted in type facsimile, with an introduction by R. A. Brock (Winsor, 3:164). Except for the title-page the Second Edition seems to be a page-for-page and line-for-line reprint of the First.

"This is the first printed collection of the Laws of Pennsylvania", says Hildeburn, "and was intended to give in full all the laws then in force, with the titles of such as were obsolete, expired or repealed. Several acts, and the titles of about a dozen which should have been included, are omitted." It contains the laws passed from the sessions of October and November, 1700, to that from October, 1712, to March, 1713, which had been previously printed from time to time as enacted by the different General Assemblies. An Abstract or Abridgment of the Laws passed by the General Assembly from October 14 to November 27, 1700, and printed by Reynier Jansen in 1701 is known only by the imperfect Copy recorded by Hildeburn (Press in Pennsylvania, 1, No. 79). The paging of the volume here described is very erratic, but the catchwords run regularly throughout the volume, which is badly printed and full of typographical errors.

We are informed by Mr. Theodore L. Cole that there are probably 10 or 12 copies in existence, all of which, except those named below, are in private hands.

This is the first *Mohawk Prayer Book*, and the earliest known book printed in an Indian dialect in New York. Excepting the English title-page and headings to the prayers, it is wholly in the Mohawk language. The *Book of Common Prayer* was first printed in this country by Bradford at New York in 1710 (Brinley, No. 3450).

This translation is based upon that of the Rev. Bernardus Freeman, who ministered to the Indians after the departure of the Rev. Thoroughgood Moore. He presented a copy of this translation to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts. When, in 1712, the Rev. William Andrews was sent as a missionary to these Indians, a copy was sent to him with instructions to print a part in Indian and distribute it among the Indians. Claesse, who was a good interpreter and frequently visited the Onondagas, probably revised and added to the original translation.

Mather tells us in his long introduction, which is one of the best specimens of his composition, and which contains a fine theory of the use of blank verse, that this is the first edition of the Psalms in that form. Many of the Psalms are arranged for long metre or short metre, as explained in the "Admonition Concerning the Tunes."

In this version, which is a close translation of the Hebrew and is rendered into English verse, Mather has utterly disregarded the modern practice of breaking the lines, whether rhymed or not, and has printed them so that each Psalm looks exactly like prose. It may be read as such, or modulated so that it may be sung as lyric verse.

- "OUR VERSION," says Mather, "is fitted unto all the Common TUNES, the Notes whereof are Eight and Six.
- "But some of them are accommodated for a well-known Longer Metre, by putting in Two Syllables of the BLACK LETTER, which are, without any Damage to the Truth of the Translation, sound enclosed between Two such Crotchets as these,

  [ ] And which being left out, the Metre, with the Sense yet remaining entire, is again restored unto the usual, Eight & Six.
- "And some of them are so contrived, that by leaving out what is in the Black Letter [small capitals], between the Two Crotchets, [ ] which may be done without any manner of Damage, they are accommodated unto a well-known Shorter Metre."

The following extract from the Twenty-third Psalm is a specimen of the translation and arrangement. By omitting the words in small capitals (printed in black-letter in the original) the verse is adapted to short metre.

- "The Director of the Pfalmody, need only to say, Sing with the BLACK LETTER, or, Sing without the BLACK LETTER, and the Tune will be fufficiently directed."



From the fact that this work was printed by the same printers and during the same year as the Second Edition of Robert Beverley's History and Present State of Virginia it has been surmised that he is the compiler of the work. It is not an official publication, as is shown by the following extract from the introduction:

"HAVING observed a great Desire in the People for some Years past, and their many Petitions to the late Assemblies, to obtain the Printing of their Laws; and that those Desires were also countenanced by the last Assembly; but not hearing that the Laws at large are likely to receive that Benefit in any short time; I was willing to make an Offering to my Country of the following Abridgement, which I had made for my private Use. This may be an Ease and Satisfaction to many, 'till the larger Volume can be procured.'

We find no record of this edition in any printed bibliography. Winsor, Narrative and Critical History (5:278), mentions several editions of the laws published about this time, but not this one. We are informed by Mr. T. L. Cole that there is a copy in the library of J. S. Bryon of Richmond, Va.

A Second Edition, probably differing in the title-page only, was published in 1728. Of this Edition there is a copy in the Library of Congress. The Deane copy, without title-page, is in the Harvard University Library. Except for the title-page and such parts as are lacking, both these copies are the same as the copy here described.

This work must have had considerable success, as it was reprinted in 1726, 1727, and again, with additions, in 1741.

"The body of the text is devoted to a description of the attractions of the province to the immigrant. The preface contains an account of the entrance of the Mississippi by the vessel which was turned back by Bienville. The appendix is an argument in favor of the claimant's title to the grant, and of England's title to the Mississippi Valley. It contains a curious story of a Massachusetts expedition to New Mexico in 1678, and a claim that La Salle's guides were Indians who accompanied that expedition." — Winsor, 5:69.

This is a compilation from various journals to impress the English public with the great importance of the region described, and to make it jealous of its occupation by the French. Under the name of "Carolana" was comprehended the present State of Georgia, the Floridas, Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana. The whole of this territory was claimed by Doctor Coxe, the father of the author, as proprietor under the Crown. The author explored a great part of it, and lived there for fourteen years. Coxe wished to colonize the banks of the Mississippi near its mouth, in spite of the French claim to the territory.



This work was written by William Burnet, a son of the famous Bishop of Salisbury, and at that time Governor of New York and New Jersey.

Though Bradford's name does not appear on the title-page, it is generally considered to have been from his press, and is typographically the handsomest book which he produced, being printed on thick paper.

Gov. Cadwallader Colden, writing to his son, under date of December 31, 1759, says: "Mr Burnet after he had been some years at New York, applied himself to the study of Scripture prophecy on Principles which he told me he had received from Sr Isaac Newton The prophets he said have a language peculiar to themselves and that if their language be understood the prophecy becomes as easy to be understood as other writings. He had a very extraordinary memory and he had read the prophecies so often over that he could at once point out the chapter and verse in which any subject was treated or any prophetical word was to be found. For some time this study so intirely engrossed his thoughts that upon all occasions he introduced it into discourse even so far that his conversation became disagreable to his best friends. He was zealous to convince them for he said the evidence of Christianity stands on Miracles and the Prophecies are perpetual miracles renewed every time any prophecy is accomplished. . . . But notwithstanding of all the pains he was at and his publishing his thoughts in print I know not that he at any time made one convert tho' perhaps he has wrote better on that subject than any else has don." - New YORK HISTORICAL SOCIETY, Collections; 1868, p. 214.

Jones was rector at Jamestown and professor in the college at Williamsburg, and his book was a missionary enterprise to incite attention among the benevolent in the mother country to the necessities of the colony. His book, says Tyler, "is a book of solid facts and solid suggestions, written in a plain, positive style, just sufficiently tinctured with the gentlemanly egotism of a Virginian and of a Churchman."

It contains an account of the Tramontane Order, the state of the Church, and many other valuable particulars of the then existing order of affairs in Virginia.

The author thinks that the settlement of America by the Europeans is a fulfilment of the scriptural text on his title-page, *Japheth* being the English, *Shem* the Indians, and *Canaan* the negroes.



This gives an account of Lovewell's fatal fight with the Indians at Pequawket (in Fryeburg, Maine), on May 9, 1725. News of the battle reached Boston on the 13th, and on the 16th the Rev. Thomas Symmes, of Bradford, delivered a sermon in that town, based upon information obtained from some of those who had escaped. This was printed with an Historical Preface or Memoirs of the Battle at Piggwacket, and at once became popular, two editions being printed the same year.

The work was reprinted by Frederic Kidder in his Expeditions of Capt. John Lovewell, Boston, 1865.



This is the first volume of verse printed in Connecticut. Mr. Dewey, a maker of cloth at Colchester, Conn., bore the expense of printing this book, on condition that his advertisement be inserted at the end. The preface, by the Rev. John Bulkley, dated at Colchester, December 24, 1724, consists of an elaborate essay on Government. On pp. 19–78 is a long poem entitled: "A Brief Account of the Agency of the Honourable John Winthrop, Esq; in the Court of King Charles the Second, Anno Dom. 1662. When he Obtained for the Colony of Connecticut His Majesty's Gracious Charter.' This poem is of great interest, and has been made much use of by writers on the early history of Connecticut.

In the writings of Wolcott Professor Tyler fails to discover the "ingot of true poetry" which he often found in those of Anne Bradstreet.

"Upon the whole," says he, "the 'Poetical Meditations' of Roger Wolcott are sad rubbish. He himself described them as 'the improvement of some vacant hours.' One finds it hard to imagine by what possibility such things could have been an improvement upon any sort of vacancy likely to occur in this good man's hours. For ourselves, we could have been content, had his hours remained vacant; and putting

our own interpretation on his words, we thoroughly agree with the author himself when, in one place, he drops the judicious observation,

"' These very Meditations are Quite insupportable to bear.'

Philip Ashton was a native of Marblehead, Mass. On the 15th of June, 1722, he, with Nicholas Merritt, his kinsman, was taken prisoner by the pirate Low, at Port Rossaway, Cape Sable, and carried to the West Indies and Central America. He succeeded in making his escape to an uninhabited island near the mainland, from which he was at last rescued, and obtained a passage to New England and landed at Salem May 1, 1725. Mr. Barnard, the minister of Marblehead, preached a sermon

upon the occasion of his return to his native town, and published this narrative of his adventures. The book is full of interesting incidents.



This copy has complimentary verses on pp. 148 and 149 which are lacking in the following number, but this has not the Advertisement found on p. 150 of that copy, which is probably a later issue than the one with the complimentary verses.

In this work Mather defends the labored and bedizened style which he had maintained since the appearance of the *Magnalia*, against, as he says, the blades of the clubs and coffee-houses, who set themselves up as critics.

"In these 150 and more pages is much good advice as useful to the graduates of the Divinity Schools of to-day as to the young men of 200 years ago. His 'Rules of Health' fill seven pages, of which Rule VIII., An Answer to the question 'Shall I simoke Tobacco?' fills more than half. Of books of travel he says:

"I cannot but notify it unto you, that, The English Empire in America, described by One Oldmixon, is the most soolish and faithless Performance in this Kind, that ever Mankind was abused withal. I am desirous, that you proceed and peruse many of the Travels that have been published; and (if you dare not venture upon a Purchas) by conversing with many more than what are exhibited in that Rich Collection which goes under the Name of, Itinerantium atque Navigantium Bibliotheca, you may with little Expence or Hazard become a notable Traveller."

Professor Tyler, speaking of this book, in his American Literature (1:84), says: "Probably the most vigorous and entertaining book that he ever wrote, is one that is also the most characteristic expression of his later mental development, 'Manuductio ad Ministerium,'—a manual of 'directions for a candidate of the ministry,' published at Boston in 1726, only two years before the author's death. . . . The book is written heartily, with real enthusiasm for the subject, and with greater directness and simplicity of style than the author has shown in any other work. Of course, being written by Cotton Mather, it is ostentatious of his vast reading and of his heroic grasp of all studies; it is, also, in some measure, an index to the state of literature, of science, of criticism, of general culture, in New England at that time; and, in many places, it is positively sprightly and amusing."

If it had a last blank leaf it has disappeared with age and use. The blank leaf in this copy has the offset from the last page of the table of contents, thus showing that in all probability there never was a blank leaf at the end forming a companion leaf to that on which the "Table" is printed.

In the Postscript, on p. 208, Cotton Mather acknowledges himself to be the author of this book, which is a sort of historical relation of church discipline in New England.

The author came from England to Portsmouth in 1686 with the design of serving the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel among the Indians, as a missionary, after he had acquainted himself with their language. Whether he ever was engaged in missionary work is unknown. At the time of his death he was Chief-Justice of the province.

His work on Queen Anne's and Lovewell's wars is esteemed the highest authority on those subjects. Bartlett informs us in the John Carter Brown Catalogue (Part 3, Vol. 1, No. 384) that the original manuscript is in the Peter Force Collection at Washington, and that it shows some notable variations from the printed volume.

The second paragraph on p. 116 of the printed copy reads in the manuscript as follows: "So foon as the report came of Capt. Lovewell's disaster, fifty men from New Hampshire, well armed and with twelve days' subsistence, marched thither to bury their dead and draw off the wounded, but were so miserably terrified that in a most shameful and cowardly manner they returned without searching for the wounded or dead or making the least discovery." In the printed work it reads:

The authors of this work were Henry Hartwell, Esquire, of the Royal Council of Virginia; the Rev. James Blair (1656–1743), president of William and Mary College; and Edward Chilton, Esquire, Attorney-General of Virginia, and afterwards of Barbados.

According to Professor Tyler, James Blair was probably the principal writer of this book. Blair, a Scotchman by birth, was president of William and Mary College for fifty years, and occupied many other important positions in the colony. He was "the creator of the healthiest and most extensive intellectual influence that was felt in the southern group of colonies before the Revolution." The book is expertly written and contains many facts respecting the condition of the colony at that time.



After having issued the 1731 edition of Laws, Orders & Ordinances (our No. 914), Bradford, as in the case of the colonial laws, probably continued to print the ordinances currently, giving to them a continuous pagination, with the idea that they should ultimately be bound into a single volume, perhaps, with a newly printed title-page. The law here described appears to have been the current supplement for 1734, and is, so far as known, the only extant copy, Miss Hasse having no knowledge of any other.



This is the earliest known complete copy of "The Little Bible of New England," and was unknown to Ford.

The only earlier edition known is that printed at Boston in 1727, a copy of which, lacking four leaves, is in the Lenox Library.

"For one hundred years this Primer was the school-book of the dissenters of America, and for another hundred, it was frequently reprinted. In the unfavorable locality (in a sectarian sense) of Philadelphia, the accounts of Benjamin Franklin and David Hall show that between 1749 and 1766, or a period of seventeen years, that firm sold thirty-seven thousand one hundred copies. Livermore stated in 1849 that within the last dozen years '100,000 copies of modern editions . . . have been circulated.' An over conservative claim for it is to estimate an annual average sale of twenty thousand copies during a period of one hundred and fifty years, or total sales of three million copies." — FORD.

The earliest forms of primers were originally books of private devotions; later the alphabet was included, so that the rudiments of the language might be put within the reach of those who wished to learn to read. The name "primer," hence, came to be applied to all elementary books for the use of children. But they long continued to combine elementary with religious instruction. It is not unlikely that the early colonists to this country brought their primers with them. The catechism formed an important part of their religious life, especially in the training of the young.

Cotton's little catechism Spiritual Milk for Babes is to be found in this edition, and perhaps in earlier ones, and in this form it came to be more widely known than any other catechism, excepting, of course, the Westminster Assembly's Shorter Catechism.

No copy of the First Edition of the New England Primer is known, nor even the exact date of its appearance.

In an advertisement in Newman's Almanack, entitled News from the Stars, printed at Boston in 1691, the first mention of it is made in an announcement of the "second Impression of The New England Primer, Enlarged," so that it has been determined that it first appeared some time between 1687 and 1690.

The book proved a success from its start, and it took its place beside the Bible on the booksellers' shelves and in the family. So frequently was it printed, and so inevitably was it worn out by use, that each one of the few copies of the earlier half of the eighteenth century that have come down to us is the only copy of the edition known.

In 1897 Paul Leicester Ford published his exhaustive work *The New-England Primer*, in which are included all the editions known at that time; but recent interest and research have brought to light several copies of editions then unknown. The

collections of George Brinley, Charles Deane, George Livermore, and Bishop Hurst, all of which have been dispersed at auction, contained numerous editions, mostly of later date, however. Henry Barnard, of Hartford, Conn., brought together quite a collection, which is now in the Watkinson Library, of that city.

Of other collections, those of Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt and the Lenox Library are among the most complete.

This edition of the Charter was printed by John Peter Zenger, who established the second printing-press in New York City.

He was tried by the governor for an alleged seditious libel contained in his newspaper The New York Weekly Journal, the second newspaper issued in New York.

By this trial, one of the most important that ever took place in the American colonies, was first established the principle that in prosecutions for libel the jury are the judges of both the law and the facts in the case. The liberty of the press was thus secured from assault, and the people were equipped with a most powerful weapon for successfully combating arbitrary power. The right of freely criticising the conduct of public men was thereby secured to the colonists more than fifty years before the celebrated trial of "Junius" gave the same privilege to the people of England. Numerous editions of this famous trial were published, one of which is in the present collection (our No. 1016).

On August 4, 1735, Zenger was acquitted of the charge of libel, and in the issue of his newspaper for August 11th we find the following: "The printer now having got his liberty again, defigns God willing, to Finish and Publish the Charter of the City of New-York next week." This is the first printed edition of the Montgomerie Charter, and the handsomest specimen of printing from Zenger's press.

This is the fourth number of that most famous series of almanacs, the first of which, for the year 1733, was issued by Benjamin Franklin when only twenty-six years of age.

These almanacs, to and including that for 1758, were edited by Franklin himself, and are said to be the only ones ever published that owed their popularity entirely to their literary merit.

After Franklin ceased to edit them they continued to appear until 1800 or later. Excepting his *Autobiography*, they are the most charming and readable of Franklin's writings. In his *Autobiography* he says of them:

"In 1732 I first publish'd my Almanack, under the name of Richard Saunders; it was continu'd by me about twenty-five years, commonly call'd Poor Richard's Almanac. I endeavor'd to make it both entertaining and useful, and it accordingly came to be in such demand, that I reap'd considerable profit from it, vending annually near ten thousand. And observing that it was generally read, scarce any neighborhood in the province being without it, I consider'd it as a proper vehicle for conveying instruction among the common people, who bought scarcely any other books; I therefore filled all the little spaces that occurr'd between the remarkable days in the calendar with proverbial sentences, chiefly such as inculcated industry and srugality, as the means of procuring wealth, and thereby securing virtue."

Poor Richard soon became so popular that it sold as far north as Rhode Island, and as far south as the Carofinas.

"I may add here that there were other narratives of the Pequot War written by actors in it. A narrative by Major John Mason, the commander of the Connecticut forces, was left by him on his death, in manuscript, and was communicated by his grandson to the Rev. Thomas Prince, who published it in 1736. It is the best account of the affair written. Some two or three years after the death of Mason, Mr. Allyn, the Secretary of the colony of Connecticut, sent a narrative of the Pequot War to Increase Mather, who published it in his Relation of the Troubles, etc., 1677 [our No. 654], as of Allyn's composition. Having no preface or titlepage, Mather did not know that it was written by Major Mason, as was afterward fully explained by Prince, who had the entire manuscript from Mason's grandson." — Winsor.

Mason, after saying that he had no thought of this work coming to the press, and that he had been overpersuaded by friends, says: "This with some other Reasons have been Motives to excite me to the enterprizing hereof; no Man that I know of having as yet undertaken to write a general History or Relation; so that there is no Commemoration of Matters respecting this War; how they began, how carried on, and continued nor what Success they had"; to which Prince adds this note:

"The Author Died before the Reverend Mr. William Hubbard and Mr. Increase Mather Published their Accounts of the Pequot War."

Prince spent seven years in the preparation of this work, which he intended to bring down to 1730. It begins, as was customary with the writers of those times, with the creation of the world, and approaches modern times with such fulness of detail and deliberation that it embraces only a few years of New England history. Had he confined himself to New England and finished his work, it would have been of incalculable value.

It was carefully compiled from a large number of authentic records and relations, mostly in the exact words of the respective authorities, the first volume bringing the narrative down to September 7, 1630. It was continued nearly twenty years after, and a portion of a second volume, consisting of 96 pages, continued the narrative to August 5, 1633, breaking off in the middle of a sentence. The whole was reprinted in 1826.

This history of Virginia was to have been one of a series of books on the English plantations. This was the only one of the series ever published. The work was undertaken at the instance of the Society for the Encouragement of Learning, and printed at its expense. Keith depended almost entirely for his information on Beverley, and brings the narrative down to 1723. The author was governor of Virginia from 1717 to 1726. Jefferson says: "He is agreeable enough in ftyle, and passes over events of little importance. Of course he is short, and would be preferred by a foreigner."

This is one of the very earliest editions of the New England Primer that have come down to us, and is the No. 3 in Ford's list. This was the copy there described and the only one of that date which he was able to trace. It is the second known example which contains on its last leaf the woodcut of the queen, "which," Ford says, "was nothing less than the block of the queen in playing cards, for contemporary packs have

just such queens. To find such a print in the godly New England Primer is perhaps the most curious fact yet known, and can only be accounted for by the probability that its purchasers were so ignorant of the appearance of the 'Devil's picture cards' that they did not recognize its prototype." — New-England Primer, p. 50.

But four earlier copies are known: one of 1727, in the Lenox Library, Ford's No. 1; one of 1735 (our No. 919); and two of 1737, one in the Vanderbilt collection, the other (very imperfect) in the Watkinson Library. Notwithstanding its slight imperfections, this is a fine and probably unique copy.

It should be noticed that in this edition instead of finding, as in that of 1735 (our No. 919), Spiritual Milk for Boston Babes, Drawn out of the Breasts of both Testaments, for their Souls Nourishment, by John Cotton, we find substituted for it The Shorter Catechism, Agreed upon by the Reverend Assembly of Divines at Westminster.



Jonas Green, whose name appears in the imprint, began printing at Annapolis in 1739.

On the 9th of June, 1739, the House of Delegates of the Province of Maryland appointed a Committee of nine members, among whom were Dr. Charles Carroll and Vachel Denton, to prepare authentic copies of such documents as they should deem necessary, to be transmitted for carrying on certain addresses then pending in Great Britain. This committee was given power by the House to demand and take copies of any Acts of Assembly and other papers from the several officers and offices of the Province.

The right of the committee to make such demands after the prorogation of the House was called in question by Edmond Jenings, Secretary of Maryland, and Levin Gale, Judge of the Land Office, of whom demands had been made for copies of documents, the titles of which are here given.

The matter was brought to the attention of the Council at its meetings, August 1, October 11, 1739, and January 22, 1739/40. It was finally determined that Dr. Carroll and Mr. Denton, or either of them, could have copies as individuals, the intention of the officers named being "to prevent a Compliance with any Request that had been or should be made, with the least appearance of Authority, by any supposed Committee of the Lower House of Assembly, after the Prorogation and during the Interval of the Assembly, but not to impede in any manner their [meaning Dr. Carroll and Mr. Denton] having the Copies they desired."

In this edition the parenthetical clause on p. 171 contains blank spaces for the numbers. In the copy here described the numbers have been printed, as follows: "(in the Town of Augusta alone, there were represented to be 600 white People, and 3000 Pack-horses belonging thereto, who were employed in the Indian Trade." The work was reprinted in London the following year. There are copies of all three editions in the Lenox Library.

In the Preface are quotations from two earlier works relating to Georgia: "a Pampblet printed at London, 1733, entituled, A new and accurate Account of the Provinces of SOUTH-CAROLINA and GEORGIA" (Sabin, 13, No. 56847), and "a Poem entituled, GEORGIA, and Verses upon Mr. Oglethorpe's second Voyage to Georgia. Printed London, 1736" (Sabin, 7, No. 27047).

Tailfer was the chief of a party of malcontents in Savannah, whose conduct became so obnoxious to Governor Oglethorpe that he and others were forced, in September, 1740, to quit the province. He took refuge in South Carolina, where, with Hugh Anderson, David Douglas, and others, he printed this tract.

It contains a masterly statement of the author's alleged grievances against Oglethorpe, and is one of the most expert pieces of writing to be found in our early literature. Tyler (2: 293) says: "It never blusters or scolds. It is always cool, poised, polite, and merciless; and it passes back and forth, with fatal ease, between dreadful fact and equally dreadful invective and raillery."

This copy is uncut and unopened, and has the genuine two blank leaves at the end. There were two editions of this work published in 1742. This one, of 44 pages, is certainly the rarer, and is to be found in the "Addenda" to Hildeburn's *Press in Pennsylvania* (2: 460), where he says that it was printed in Germany. The type-ornament rule near the foot of the title-page is printed in the same characters as those on the second half-title of *A Letter from a Russian Sea-Officer*, London, 1754, and lends plausibility to the supposition that this form of type was made in England and imported by Franklin for use in his Philadelphia press.

The more common edition of only 42 pages, in which the title does not exactly correspond with the one here described, is noted in Stevens, Nuggets (1, No. 496), Hildeburn, Press in Pennsylvania (1, No. 750), and Brinley, Catalogue (No. 3276). It is printed entirely in roman characters instead of being in German text as in the copy here described. There is a copy in the Lenox Library.



This work was translated, with explanatory notes, by Chief-Justice James Logan (1674–1751), next to Penn and Franklin the most important character in the early history of Pennsylvania. It also has a prefatory note by Franklin.

It is generally conceded to be the finest product of Franklin's press, if not of the American press of the eighteenth century. It is really a beautiful specimen of the printer's art, and is printed "in a large and fair Character, that those who begin to think on the Subject of OLD-AGE, (which feldom happens till their Sight is somewhat impair'd by its Approaches) may not, in Reading, by the *Pain* small Letters give the Eyes, feel the *Pleasure* of the Mind in the least allayed."

Franklin in "The Printer to the Reader" calls this masterpiece the "first Translation of a Classic in this Western World"; but in this he was mistaken, for Sandys'



Keimer, in 1729, published in Philadelphia *Epictetus bis Morals*, and Franklin himself, in 1735, had printed a translation of *Cato's Moral Districtes*, attributed to Logan. The present work was reprinted several times in England and this country.

Stevens in his Nuggets says that Franklin carried many copies of this book to England with him and distributed them with evident satisfaction.

This is the First Edition of the work which has come to be known as Horsmanden's "Negro Plot." This copy has the half-title, usually lacking. The headlines on pp. 141, 144, and 145 are irregular, those belonging to the recto pages being on the verso pages and vice versa. Parker, the printer of this volume, was an apprentice to Bradford, and succeeded to his business in 1742. The Second Edition, of which there is a copy in the Lenox Library, was published at London in 1747.

This is one of the most important printed records of the early history of New York City and the main source of information respecting the Negro Plot of 1741, an event which threw the city and even the colonies into a state of fear. "Slavery," says Eugene Lawrence, "has nowhere presented itself in a more odious form than in early New-York. The slaves for a small provocation were whipped and tortured. . . . It is supposed that they formed at this time about one sixth of a population of twelve thousand. . . . The rumor of a plot . . . drove the most reputable citizens into deeds of unexampled cruelty. It forms the darkest blot upon the history of New York." — Wilson, Memorial History of New York, 2: 252.

A close examination of the testimony fails to show that the conspiracy was as wide-spread as was believed at the time. The fires and intended murders were probably only the revengeful acts of a few of the 20 whites and 154 negroes who were indicted on insufficient evidence. Two thirds of the accused were found guilty, and from the list at the end of the book we learn that of these 18 negroes and 2 white persons were hanged, 13 negroes were burned at the stake, and 70 were transported.

The work had become so scarce in 1810 that the editor of the edition of that year (Sabin, 8, No. 33060) admits that he experienced the greatest difficulty in finding a copy.

This work, New York's first contribution to science, was written by Lieutenant-Governor Cadwallader Colden, and is the first draft of chapters 1 and 2 of his larger work Principle of Action in Matter, which appeared in London in 1752. work excited much comment at the time of its publication.

Colden, one of the first of American scientists, was a friend of Linnæus and Franklin, and was also prominent in political life, being Acting Governor of New York during the Stamp-Act agitation, at which time he was burned in effigy in Bowling Green.

"The work seems to have become scarce as early as 1786, for in January of that year Mr. Jefferson, writing to Francis Hopkinson, observes: — 'Many, many years ago, Cadwallader Colden wrote a very small pamphlet on the subjects of Attraction and Impulsion, a copy of which he sent to Monsieur de Buffon. He was so charmed with it that he put it into the hands of a friend to translate, who lost it. It has ever since weighed upon his mind, and he has made repeated trials to have it found in England. But in vain. He applied to me. I am in hopes if you write a line to the booksellers of Philadelphia to rummage their shops, that some of them will find it. Or perhaps some of the careful old people of Philadelphia or New Jersey may have preserved a copy.' Whether Hopkinson was successful does not appear." --Menzies Catalogue.

John Zenger was the only son of John Peter Zenger by his first wise. He learned his trade of his father, and this is the only work known that bears his imprint.

The pamphlet was written by Griffin Jenkins, who is thought to have been a schoolmaster who finally located at Newark, N. J. He had this pamphlet, which relates to the title of lands about Newark, printed at his own expense, and then peddled it about through Newark and Morris County. It is certain that a Griffin Jenkins, of Newark, was attainted of treason in 1779.



This is a document of great historical importance, the renowned *Elizabethtown* Bill in Chancery, in which the claims of the Proprietors against the settlers are set forth.

It was drawn up principally by James Alexander, long a prominent lawyer occupying important positions in both New York and New Jersey, and the owner of large tracts of land in both provinces. It is most ably drawn, gives much valuable information concerning the positions taken by the different parties to the dispute, and seems to show beyond controversy that the defendants' claims were invalid.

The work is made up of six sections, some of which appear to have been printed separately and bound with the *Bill*. All but one are called for on the title-page. An answer to this Bill was filed in 1751, and printed in 1752 (our No. 982).

In the Lenox Library there are two copies like the one here described and two of edition (2). There is also in the Lenox Library a London Edition (with both title-pages) dated 1753, which is only the Williamsburg edition (2) with substituted title-pages. It is possible that copies of edition (1) may also be found with the London title-pages.

This work brings the history of Virginia down only to 1624. The early charters contained in the Appendix give this work its chief value at the present day. The author had the use of the Collingwood transcript of the records of the Virginia Company. Notwithstanding his diffuseness and lack of literary style, his book has become a high authority to later writers.



John Peter Zenger, New York's second printer, died July 28, 1746. His widow, Anna Catharine Zenger, published the New-York Weekly Journal from the time of his death until December, 1748, when she resigned it as well as the business to her stepson, John Zenger. It was during this time that she published the first issue of John Nathan's Hutchins Almanack, at first called Nathan's, but after 1751, Hutchins' New-York Almanack. This is one of the two imprints, known to Hildeburn, bearing her name. It should be noted that the introduction is signed by Hutchins' full name.

"In his almanac for 1762 Hutchins speaks of 'The Encouragement and kind Reception my Labours of this Kind has met with from the year 1737, when I first began in Imitation of my deceased Master, Mr. Titan Leeds.' From this it is evident that he had been compiling an Almanac for many years previous, presumptively that published in the name of John Nathan. This view is endorsed by Mr. Wilberforce Eames, who writes: 'I have taken some pains to look up the Almanacks of 1737-1753, in order to find where Hutchins came in during that period. On referring to his statement in the almanack of 1762, I find that he speaks of the kind reception his labours of this kind had met with from the year 1737, "when I first began in Imitation of my deceased Master, Mr. Titan Leeds." Now, if this means that Titan Leeds was already dead in 1737, who continued the Almanacks under his name, if not his pupil J. N. Hutchins? I find that they were issued in New York by W. Bradford until 1743, and in Philadelphia by Andrew Bradford and others until 1746, which is the latest issue which I find in Hildeburn. In 1747 John Nathan's Almanack began, and I find it noted in Hildeburn's check list until 1751.""-FORD, Journals of Hugh Gaine, 1:87.



At the time this almanac was published Roger Sherman was in business as a country merchant at New Milford, Connecticut. He soon afterwards began the

study of law, and in 1755 he entered upon that public career which was destined to make him one of the best known men in the country.



This is a very reliable work by two of the most eminent observers and naturalists of their day. Bartram made this trip in 1743 with Conrad Weiser, an agent of Pennsylvania, sent to hold a friendly conference with the Iroquois. His principal object in making the trip was to study the flora of the country. He was an expert botanist, and acquired such a reputation that he attracted the attention of Linnæus. His book throws considerable light upon the manners and thoughts of the people with whom he came in contact. It contains a plan and view of the Long House, a form of architecture peculiar to the tribes of the Six Nations.

Kalm's account is the first scientific description, in English, of Niagara Falls.

"And if the first printed four last Months in this Almanack after the Old Stile, be any Trouble to you, or an Eye fore, cut them out, and you'll still have your Almanack compleat, and according to Law, only, be so good as to observe the last Eclipse of the Sun is said to be on the 25th OEober, which being Old Stile; must and will be now on the 5th of November: -- And for the Benefit of those who make use of Kalenders, and have them only for the Old Stile, only let them add eleven to their Number of Days, and they may continue still to use them, 'till they see sit to get others. Readers, farewell and prosper; for this is such a Year as neither you nor I ever saw before, nor ever will again."

The calendar for September has also this note between the 2d and 14th days, the intervening days having been omitted according to the law:

"Now, Readers, you that love your Pillows, delight yourselves with the Thoughts of that live-long Nap of Naps, when you, with many Thousand British Subjects more, shall lie down in Peace, and close your Eyes on the second Day of this Month, and never awake, nor perhaps so much as turn on t'other Side 'till the 14th in the Morning. The Dominical Letter now, is A."


