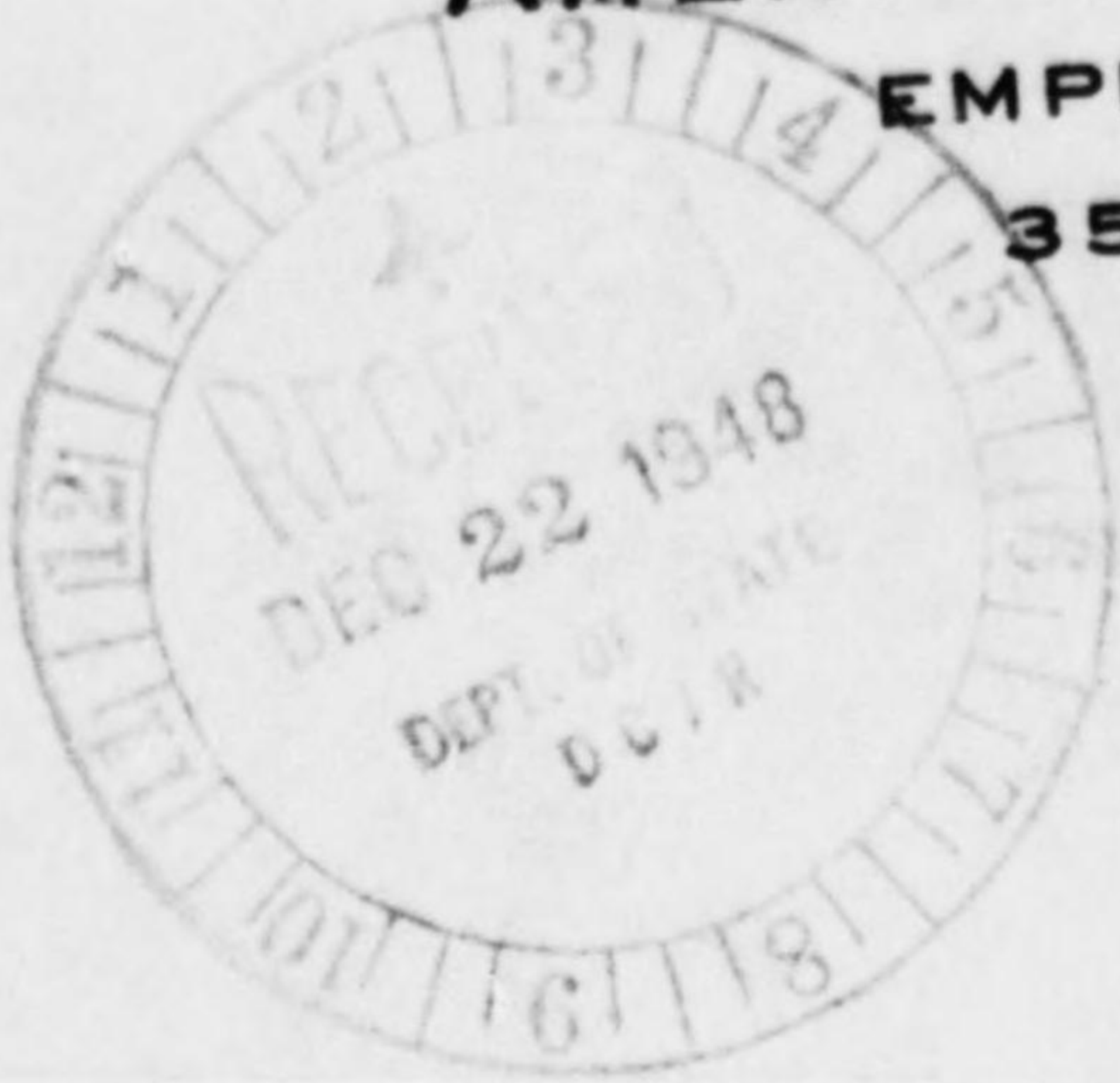

Dear Sir:

I acknowledge, with thanks, receipt of your favor of December 6, 1948, together with Permit to enter Japan, valid for the period from December 3, 1948 to January 3, 1949.

It is most essential that I should spend the month of December in California and I shall not be able to leave for the Far East until the end of this month. I have already made reservation on the Pan American plane which will leave for Hongkong on December 30, 1948. My wife, Marcelle, will be accompanying me on this trip and I shall not be able to be in Japan until the month of February. Consequently, I shall be much obliged if you will be so kind as to extend my Permit to be made valid in Japan from February 3 to March 3, 1949.

Furthermore, my wife and I are travelling on the same passport, and, therefore, it would be very difficult for my wife to return with me from Hongkong to the United States if I were to stop in Japan and to leave her to continue the journey. Would it not, therefore, be possible, under the circumstances, that my wife could be allowed to stay with me in Japan 30 days instead of 60 days. Your kind consideration of this point will be greatly appreciated.

The Department referred your request to the Pacific Military Permit Branch, Department of the Army and in reply the Department has been informed that in view of the prevailing policy and regulations travel to Japan for temporary stay and for personal reasons cannot be given favorable consideration at this time. The Military Permit Branch makes the observation that as Mrs. Vegh is a Chinese national her application should be processed through the Chinese authorities. The Chinese Government maintains a Liaison Mission to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at Tokyo.

The Department of State is in receipt of a cablegram from the American Consulate General at Peiping, China transmitting the application of Paul Schuh for permission to enter Japan to rejoin his wife and children. Mr. Schuh submitted the following information to the Consulate General:

He was born in 1903 (place not given) and is the holder of German passport No. 34 (now invalid) 1943, issued at Yokohama July 24, 1943. His wife's name is Antoinette Schuh, 1030 Karuizawa Nagano-Ken. She is believed to be an employee of the Eighth Army resort hotel Sysoem Nagano. Mr. Schuh is the secretary of the German community organization at Peiping and is presently employed by a photography shop. Prior to the war he was the manager of a plantation in Indonesia.

The Military Permit Section is requested to communicate the substance of this application to the Supreme Commander at Tokyo for his consideration and to advise the Division of Protective Services of any decision reached concerning it. Should the requested permission be granted a memorandum from your office to that effect will be sufficient.

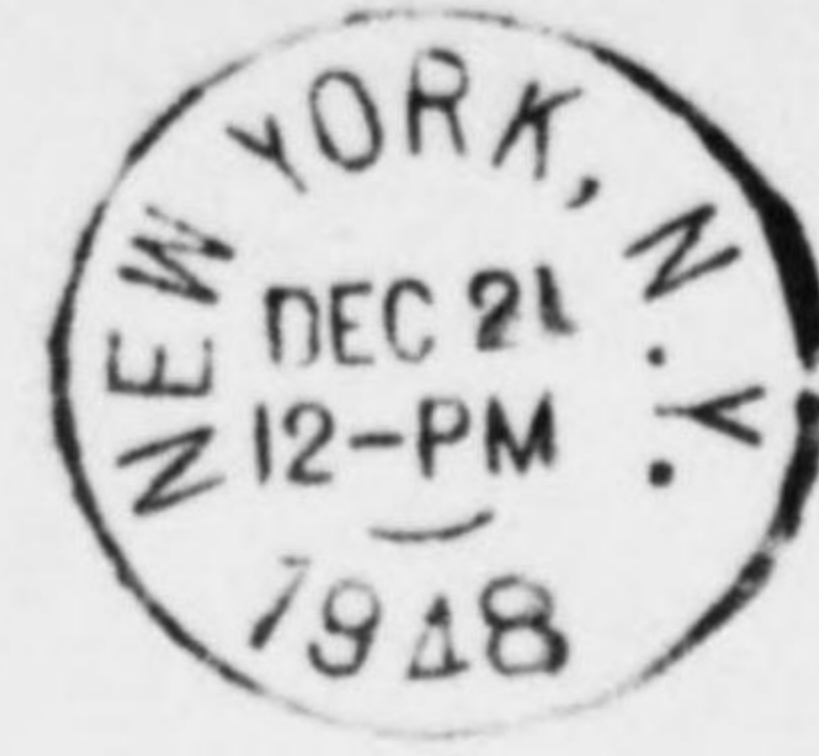

My dear Mr. Melson:

The receipt is acknowledged of your letter of December 21, 1948 in which you inquire if the validity dates on Military Permit number 16255 granting you permission to enter Japan between December 10, 1948 and January 10, 1949 may be extended to permit of your entry into Japan, probably within a few months, or will it be necessary for you to re-submit your application at that time.

In this connection the Department of State is informed by the Military Permit Office, Washington that the validity dates on the Military Permit in your possession may be extended, provided you enter Japan within six months of its expiration date; otherwise a request for a new Theater clearance would have to be made.

When it is definitely known the date you desire to enter Japan you are requested to return to this Department the Military Permit you now hold. It will then be submitted to the Military Permit Office in order that new validity dates may be stamped thereon.

Subject: Transit Clearance Through Japan for Travel To and From Korea.

The Acting Political Adviser has the honor to report that on December 6, 1948, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, placed in operation a modified policy concerning transit clearance through Japan in connection with travel to or from Korea. In most instances, persons traveling to or from Korea, particularly by commercial airlines, find that present transportation schedules necessitate a stopover of one to three days in Japan. The new policy provides that all persons traveling to or from Korea by way of Japan must, prior to departure, obtain SCAP clearance for any necessary stopover in Japan. A military permit for entry into Japan in such cases is no longer required for U. S. citizens. This modification of policy in effect places U. S. citizens on an equal footing with citizens of other countries, for whom entry clearance for Japan had previously been given locally by SCAP, whereas U. S. citizens had been required to obtain military permits from the Department of the Army, which entailed delays of up to three weeks.

Insofar as possible, requests for transit clearance should include the information normally required for clearance for entry into Japan as set forth in paragraph 7b of GHQ, SCAP Circular No. 19 of June 23, 1948 (copies of which are enclosed for ready reference), which replaced GHQ, SCAP Circular No. 8 of August 30, 1946 as the controlling regulations for entry into Japan. The following items (for each applicant) are suggested as the minimum necessary for expeditious action on requests: full name of individual, citizenship, passport number and validity or description of travel document, proposed place and time of arrival in and departure from Japan, and assurance of entry clearance for Korea (obtained from the Korean Ministry of Foreign Affairs) or admissibility to other country of destination (when appropriate).

Officers of GHQ, SCAP, have informed this Mission that American citizens in the U. S. may send requests for transit clearance en route to Korea to SCAP through the channels now used for transmission of military permit applications. It has further been stated that there is no objection to individuals transmitting requests directly to SCAP, provided such requests contain the necessary information mentioned above, and that the individuals concerned

**CONTROL OF ENTRY AND EXIT OF INDIVIDUALS,
AIRCRAFT AND SURFACE VESSELS INTO AND FROM JAPAN**

	<u>Section</u>

I. GENERAL. 1. Rescission. Circular 8, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, 30 August 1946.

2. Purpose. To establish procedures to be followed in the control of individuals, aircraft and surface vessels entering and leaving Japan, i.e., the four main islands of Hokkaido, Honshu, Shikoku and Kyushu and outlying islands under control of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

3. a. Implementing Agencies.

- (1) The Commanding General, Eighth Army, will control the entry into and exit from Japan of the personnel mentioned herein.
- (2) The Commander, Naval Activities Japan, will control the entry and exit and the movement of surface vessels while in Japanese waters.
- (3) The Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, will control the entry and exit and the movement of aircraft into and out of Japan.

b. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will keep the implementing agencies informed as to the action taken on requests for entry into and departure from Japan of individuals, aircraft and surface vessels. This information will include the period of validity of the permit.

c. The Commanding General, Eighth Army, will establish customs, immigration and quarantine controls at ports of entry and exit, both air and surface, utilizing such Japanese agencies as are appropriate. These controls will include:

(Cir 19)

- (1) Medical examinations.
- (2) Required inoculations.
- (3) Customs inspection.
- (4) Maintenance of logistic facilities for the detention of unauthorized personnel arriving in Japan.

d. Implementing agencies shall have power of detention over individuals, aircraft and surface vessels in the event of failure to comply with this directive.

4. Ports of entry for aircraft and surface vessels will be designated by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at the time of approval for entry. Currently, the ports of entry for both aircraft and surface vessels are:

a. Aerial Ports:

- (1) Haneda Air Force Base, Tokyo.
- (2) Iwakuni Air Base, Iwakuni.

b. Surface Ports:

- (1) Otaru
- (2) Hakodate
- (3) Yokohama
- (4) Yokosuka
- (5) Nagoya
- (6) Shimizu
- (7) Kobe
- (8) Kure
- (9) Sasebo
- (10) Miike
- (11) Nagasaki
- (12) Moji (closed for mine clearance).

5. The provisions of this circular do not apply to persons being repatriated to and from Japan under the supervision of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

II. INDIVIDUALS. 6. Authorization to Enter Japan.

a. Military, Naval, Air Force and civilian personnel traveling on official orders for permanent duty with the United States Occupation Forces or for permanent or temporary

7. Requests for authorization to enter Japan must be submitted to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers representative in Japan of the country to enter Japan. Applications for entry into the trade program may be made by either of the firm or of the individual. In the event the country concerned is in Japan, the request will be referred to the representative in Japan representing the individual or, if no such representation exists, to the United States representative in Japan. Requests will be referred to the United States representative in Japan for consideration. Requests must be submitted sufficient time to reach the United States representative in Japan at least ten days prior to departure for Japan.

b. Request for authorization to enter Japan must contain the following information:

- (1) Full name.
- (2) Place and date of birth.
- (3) Citizenship and place of residence.
- (4) Present occupation and organization, if applicable.
- (5) Full explanation of purpose of trip to Japan and work to be done, if applicable, or organization to be employed, if applicable, and designation.
- (6) Particulars of housing arrangements.
- (7) Desired length of stay.

9. Entry into Japan. a. Upon arrival at point of entry each individual will:

- (1) Have in his possession a passport or equivalent travel document (official military travel orders in the case of personnel traveling in uniform) together with a statement in English from an authorized representative of the country of his nationality (in case of commercial entrants, this statement may be from the representative of his firm's nationality, see paragraph 7a) at point of origin, that he has been cleared by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for entry into Japan; this statement will include the information required by paragraph 7b.
- (2) Have in his possession a certificate showing successful vaccination against smallpox and typhoid fever within the preceding twelve months. However, personnel arriving from epidemic smallpox areas may be required to show evidence of a successful vaccination within the

Requirements for Entry. a. Action on requests for entry will be taken by the following regulations:

1. Action on requests for entry will be taken on the request given by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers through the same channels as provided in paragraph 7a.

2. Requests for entry will constitute clearance by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for entry into Japan. Clearance is valid for entry into Japan for a period of six months from date of issuance, unless otherwise specified. In cases where personnel are unable to arrive in Japan within the six-month period of validity must submit a new request.

a. Upon arrival at point of entry:

1. Possession of a passport or other travel document (official travel orders in the case of personnel traveling in uniform) together with a statement in English from an authorized representative of the country of origin (in case of commercial carriers, this statement may be from the representative of his firm's nationality, as provided in paragraph 7a) at point of origin, and clearance by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for entry into Japan; this statement will include information required by paragraph 7b.

2. Possession of a certificate of successful vaccination against typhoid fever within the last twelve months. However, personnel returning from epidemic smallpox areas are required to show evidence of successful vaccination within the

preceding sixty days. Personnel arriving without the required certificates will be given the necessary vaccinations and placed under observation or surveillance for a sufficient period to determine their freedom from these diseases.

(3) Be subject to customs inspection. Customs declarations will include all property and all moneys, negotiable instruments, and legal and commercial documents which the individual wishes to take into Japan.

b. Before passports or equivalent travel documents are stamped to indicate approval of entry they will be checked against the names of persons approved for clearance by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and furnished the implementing agency (paragraph 3b).

c. Passports or other equivalent travel documents for all personnel will be stamped as follows (see paragraph 10a).

Approval for exit will be included only in cases of personnel defined in paragraph 10a(2) and (3). This notation will be deleted in all other cases.

d. Passengers utilizing commercial air carriers which have been permitted by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to conduct operations through Japan, and who are traveling in transit through Japan will require no documentation or clearance for such intransit passage. Passengers and crews of such aircraft normally will be required to remain at the airport with their aircraft until its departure. If departure of the aircraft is delayed by mechanical failure or adverse weather conditions, passengers will be permitted to depart the area of the airport for billets for overnight stay. Such individuals will be subject to all rules and regulations promulgated by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers as enforced by his designated agents.

e. Passengers utilizing commercial carriers may take conducted tours in Japan without prior clearance if the commercial carrier representative in Japan has been granted permission by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to operate such tours.

10. Exit from Japan. a. The following personnel will not be required to submit individual applications for exit:

- (1) Military, Naval, Air Force, and civilian personnel of the United States occupation forces or British Commonwealth Occupation Force departing Japan on official orders.
- (2) Personnel who enter Japan under the provisions of the private trade program, and who depart within sixty days of entry. Passports of such personnel will be stamped upon entry to indicate approval of exit within sixty days of date of entry.
- (3) Personnel who have permission to enter Japan for any reason for a stay of fifteen days or less. Passports of such personnel will be stamped upon entry to indicate approval of exit within fifteen days from date of entry or within a shorter period, as applicable.

b. Individuals other than those listed in paragraph 10a desiring to leave Japan will submit applications either directly to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers or through their diplomatic or equivalent representative in Japan in sufficient time to reach the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at least ten days prior to the anticipated date of departure from Japan. Applications for exit clearance will be submitted on the attached form (inclosure 1), in triplicate.

c. Upon approval of request for exit clearance, the individual concerned will be notified to report to the Diplomatic Section, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, at Tokyo, or to the Yokohama or Kobe Division of Diplomatic Section, to have the exit permit placed in his passport.

d. At ports of exit, individuals will submit a declaration of all property and a list of all moneys, negotiable instruments, and legal and commercial documents which they intend to take with them from Japan.

e. On departure the passport or other equivalent travel document will be stamped to show place and date of departure. Baggage will be subject to customs inspection upon departure.

11. Exit from and Reentry into Japan. a. Individuals desiring to depart and reenter Japan will submit application on the attached form (inclosure 2) in the same manner as outlined in paragraph 10.

b. Reentry permits will be valid for not more than six months from date of issuance.

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c. Crew members of coasters to conduct operations through Japan will be valid for repeated exit and reentry through the commercial airline concerned. Applications will be in form similar to inclosure 2.

III. AIRCRAFT. 12. Control of Aircraft into and from Japan. Those assigned to or serving the Allied Powers will be permitted entry into, or passage through, Japan authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Aircraft flying into and from Japan will follow standard procedures established by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, 11 May 1948. For ports of entry, see paragraph 7a.

c. Requests for authorization for entry will be submitted to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers through the same channels as in paragraph 7a at least ten days prior to the date of entry is desired, and will include the following information:

- (1) Number and type of aircraft
- (2) Markings or identification
- (3) Duration and route of flight
- (4) Purpose of flight
- (5) Names and positions of crew members
- (6) Name of English-speaking representative (other than United States personnel)
- (7) Names of passengers and their destinations
- (8) Description of cargo
- (9) Details of route of flight

d. The representative of the aircraft will be informed of the action taken on approved requests. Requests for flight which are not approved will be valid for a period of thirty days from the date of arrival. Any reentry will require twenty-four hours advance notice.

e. Each aircraft will be equipped with an English-speaking radio.

f. Appropriate clearance will be obtained from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for the entry of the aircraft from Japan; no other clearance is required at any point in Japan unless its landing is authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

n. a. The following personnel will submit individual applications for exit:

Army, Naval, Air Force, and civilian personnel of the United States occupation forces or British Commonwealth Occupation Forces departing Japan on official orders.

Personnel who enter Japan under the provisions of the private trade program, and depart within sixty days of entry. Passports of such personnel will be stamped upon entry to indicate approval of exit within sixty days of date of entry.

Personnel who have permission to enter Japan for any reason for a stay of fifteen days or less. Passports of such personnel will be stamped upon entry to indicate approval of exit within fifteen days from date of entry or within a shorter period, if applicable.

Other than those listed in paragraph 1, personnel who enter Japan will submit applications either to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers or to an equivalent representative in Japan to reach the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers ten days prior to the anticipated date of departure from Japan. Applications for exit clearance will be submitted on the attached form (inclosure 1),

and a copy of request for exit clearance, and the applicant will be notified to report to the General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at Tokyo, or to the Yokohama or Kobe District Headquarters, to have the exit permit issued.

For exit, individuals will submit a passport or other equivalent document, a list of all moneys, negotiable and commercial documents which they are taking with them from Japan.

Passports or other equivalent documents will be stamped to show place and date of entry and will be subject to customs inspection upon entry into Japan.

a. Individuals entering Japan will submit application (inclosure 2) in the same manner as outlined in paragraph 1.

Permits will be valid for not more than six months.

c. Crew members of commercial aircraft permitted to conduct operations through Japan may be granted permits valid for repeated exit and reentry upon application of the commercial airline concerned. Application should be submitted in form similar to inclosure 2.

III. AIRCRAFT. 12. Control of Entry, Passage and Exit of Aircraft into and from Japan. a. Aircraft, other than those assigned to or serving the occupation forces will not be permitted entry into, or passage over Japan unless authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Aircraft flying into or out of Japan will follow standard procedures established in Circular 14, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, 11 May 1948. For ports of entry see paragraph 4a.

c. Requests for authorization for aircraft passage or entry will be submitted to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers through the same channels as prescribed in paragraph 7a at least ten days prior to the date passage or entry is desired, and will include the following information:

- (1) Number and type of aircraft.
- (2) Markings or identification radio call sign.
- (3) Duration and purpose of stopovers.
- (4) Purpose of flight.
- (5) Names and positions of crew members.
- (6) Name of English-speaking crew member (for other than United States or British aircraft).
- (7) Names of passengers, if any, and purpose of their trip.
- (8) Description of cargo to be carried.
- (9) Details of route and timing of flight.

d. The representative of the requesting country will be informed of the action taken on the request. Approved requests will be valid for five days from date for which flight is approved. Any change in estimated time of arrival will require twenty-four hours notice.

e. Each aircraft will have as a member of the crew an English-speaking radio operator.

f. Appropriate clearance will be obtained from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers prior to departure of the aircraft from Japan; no aircraft will take off from any point in Japan unless its latest complete cargo manifest is available.

IV. SURFACE VESSELS. 13. Control of Entry and Exit of Merchant Vessels. a. Merchant vessels other than those assigned to or carrying cargo solely for the occupation forces will not be permitted entry into Japan unless authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. For authorized ports of entry see paragraph 4b.

- b. (1) Applications for entry of merchant vessels into Japanese ports will be submitted directly to Civil Transportation Section, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, by the vessels' agents in Japan. Eight copies of the application will be provided. In instances when a vessel requiring permission to enter Japan does not have agency representation in Japan at the time the application is required, application for entry may be submitted by the vessel owner through the same channels as prescribed in paragraph 7a. Each application for entry will be submitted in sufficient time to reach the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at least ten days prior to the date on which the vessel is expected to arrive in Japan.
- (2) Applicants will be informed of action taken on all requests. One copy of each approved application for entry will be returned to the applicant with a notation indicating approval.
- (3) Approved applications for entry will be valid for one month from the date for which entry is authorized. Within this limitation, however, any changes in vessels' arrival time from those dates shown in applications for entry should be given informally, if possible, to Civil Transportation Section, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

c. Applications for entry will contain the following information:

- (1) Name of vessel.
- (2) Radio call sign of vessel.
- (3) Port into which entry is requested, and the estimated date of vessel's arrival.

 - (b) Gross register tonnage and net register tonnage.
 - (c) Name of the vessel's operator.
- (7) Status of the applicant in relation to the vessel for which entry is requested. (e.g. "The applicant is the vessel-operator's local representative," "The applicant is general agent in Japan for the vessel's operator," "The applicant is loading broker for the vessel.").

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Inclosure 3 to this circular is a pro-forma application for entry of a merchant vessel.

- d. (1) Each vessel authorized to enter a Japanese port will establish radio contact with station WVVV at Yokohama, 120, 48 and 24 hours prior to its estimated time of arrival at a Japanese port. At each of these three times, the vessel will transmit a message addressed to Commanding General, Eighth United States Army, indicating the port to which it is proceeding and latest estimate of its arrival time. Any other pertinent information may be included in these messages.
- (2) Coastal radio station WVVV is operated by the United States Army and handles official messages pertaining to shipping on frequencies of 428, 4255, 8510, 12765 and 17020 kilocycles. Frequencies of 8510 and 12765 kilocycles are guarded continuously and may be used for handling traffic. However, if communication on these two frequencies is difficult, ships will be requested to change to 428, 4255 or 17020 kilocycles. The frequency of 500 kilocycles is also guarded continuously, but is limited to initial contact and distress messages.
- e. (1) Upon the arrival of any vessel at a Japanese port, the Master will provide the United States Army authorities at the port with two copies of the vessel's inward cargo manifest showing all cargo to be discharged from the vessel at the port. The Master will also make the following documents available for inspection by the United States Army authorities at the port:
- (a) Vessel's certificate of registry.
 - (b) Vessel's articles.
 - (c) A list of the names of any crew members and passengers who desire to go ashore.
- (2) United States Army authorities at each port will provide the Master of each entering vessel with a copy of the port regulations.
- f. (1) Any vessel which has been granted clearance into a Japanese port will be permitted to remain in that port a reasonable length of time.
- (2) Crew members and passengers of any such vessel will remain in the port until the vessel departs, unless they are otherwise authorized to enter under the general

The Master will also make the following documents available for inspection by the United States Army authorities at the port:

1. The vessel's certificate of registry.

2. The vessel's articles.

3. A list of the names of any crew members and passengers who desire to go ashore.

4. A copy of the regulations of the United States Army authorities at each port to which the Master of each entering vessel is to submit a copy of the port regulations.

5. A copy of the clearance which has been granted to the vessel at that port which will be permitted to remain at that port a reasonable length of time.

6. The names and passengers of any such vessels which remain in the port until the next departure, unless they are otherwise authorized to enter under the general provisions for entry of individuals set forth in Section II of this circular.

g. Prior to the departure of any vessel from a Japanese port into which it has previously been cleared, the Master of the vessel will accomplish the following:

- (1) Deposit with the United States Army authorities at the port, or insure that the vessel's agent so deposits, one copy of the vessel's outward cargo manifest showing all cargo loaded into the vessel at the port.
- (2) Obtain from the United States Army authorities at the port an outward clearance, indicating the vessel's next port of call and the route to be followed.

14. Control of Entry and Exit of Combatant Ships.

a. Combatant ships other than those assigned to support or supporting the occupation forces will not be permitted entry into Japan unless authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Requests for authorization for entry of combatant ships will be submitted to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers through the same channels as prescribed in paragraph 7a, and will contain the following information:

- (1) Name and type of vessel, giving length, beam and draft.
- (2) Radio call sign of vessel.
- (3) Number of officers and men in the crew.
- (4) Ports to be visited with estimated date of arrival and departure from each port.
- (5) Name and rank of Commanding Officer.
- (6) Name and rank of Flag or General Officer, or very important persons on board as passengers.
- (7) Purpose of visit.
- (8) Brief statements of any special facilities required.
- (9) Whether vessels have current information on mine-fields in Japan. Course to be followed in Japanese waters.
- (10) Complete description of all cargo carried, which is to be unloaded in Japan.

c. While in Japanese waters, combatant ships will report to the Commander, Naval Activities Japan, for operational control for navigational purposes.

d. A complete list of passengers for Japan with identifying particulars will be presented with the manifest to the port of disembarkation.

e. Crew and passengers for Japan will be cleared for entry in accordance with the provisions for entry of individuals in section II.

f. A complete description of all cargo to be loaded at any point in Japan will be presented to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for prior approval.

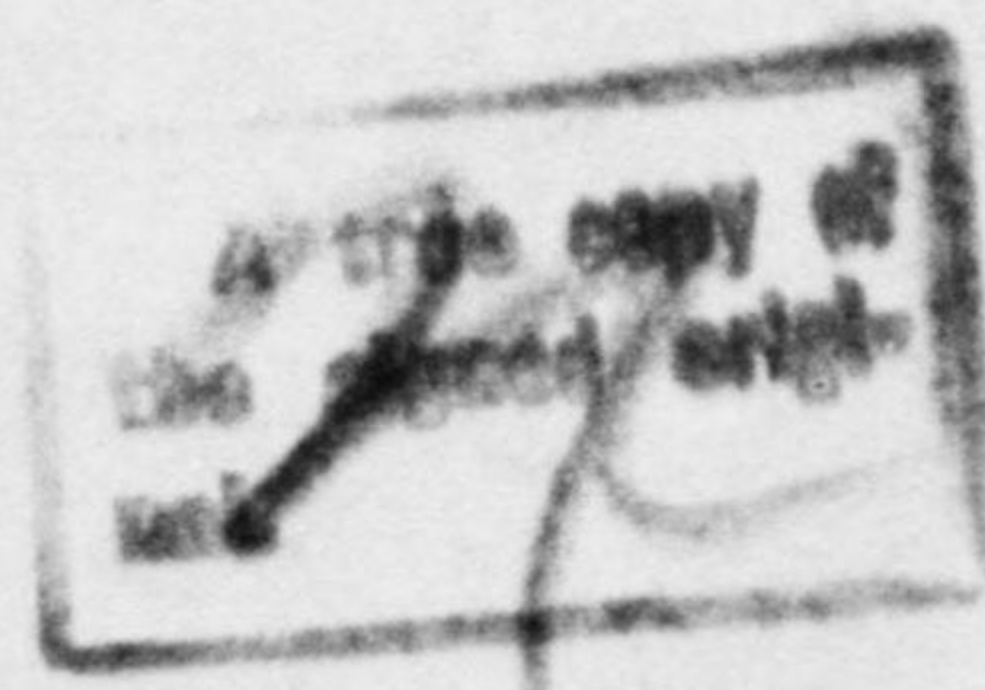


