Item 10. For sheriff's costs, one thousand dollars.

Item 11. For surveys for liens, four hundred dollars: *Provided*, The Controller shall countersign no warrant drawn on this item for a charge exceeding fifty cents for

each survey.

Item 38. For the purchase of iron pipes, fire plugs, stop-cocks, lead, brass castings, iron castings, and other fixtures and materials connected with the laying of pipes, setting of plugs and stops, sixty thousand dollars.

fire plugs, stop-cocks, &c., thirty thousand dollars.

Item 1. For furnishing gas to, and lighting and extinguishing, cleansing and repairing seven thousand four hundred and thirty-five lamps, during the year (at forty-eight dollars each lamp), three hundred and fifty-six thousand eight hundred and eighty dollars.

Item 2. For lighting, extinguishing, cleansing, repairing, and furnishing gas for new lamps to be erected during the year (at twenty-four dollars each lamp), four thousand eight

hundred dollars.

Item 3. For the erection of two hundred new lamps (at twenty-eight dollars and forty-five cents each lamp), five thousand six hundred and ninety dollars.

Item 4. For changing fluid lamps for gas (at seven dollars

and fifty cents each), one hundred and eighty dollars.

Said commission may employ such clerks, rent such rooms, and purchase such materials as shall be required for the performance of the duty herein imposed upon them, and shall have the power to adjust all unfinished matters arising under "An Ordinance to make an appropriation for the payment of bounty to Volunteers under the recent call of the President of the United States," approved December 12, 1863, and of the Supplements thereto, and shall have charge of all the books, papers, vouchers, rolls, etc., in the custody and possession of the commission appointed under said ordinance.

SEC. 2. That no bounty shall be paid hereunder to the

credit of Wards whose quota shall be full.

SEC. 3. That the sum of one million of dollars is hereby appropriated to execute the provisions of this ordinance. Said sum to be refunded from a loan hereafter to be created.

A SUPPLEMENT

To "An Ordinance to provide for gratuitous vaccination," approved July 11th, 1860, and supplements thereto.

Section 1. The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia do ordain, That for the purpose of more effectually providing gratuitous vaccination throughout the City of Philadelphia, and to guard the inhabitants from small-pox, the Board of Health may from time to time appoint such persons to act as vaccine Physicians and collectors of vaccine cases, divide the City into such districts, and may make such rules and regulations for their government as they in their judgment may deem proper and expedient: Provided, however, that the compensation to be paid to such persons shall not exceed twenty-five cents to each physician and fifteen cents to each collector for each and every case collected and successfully vaccinated, and duly reported and vouched to the said Board of Health, except to those appointed for the Twenty-first, Twentysecond, Twenty-third, and Twenty-fourth Wards, for which said services, the physicians shall receive fifty cents and the collectors twenty-five cents for each case therein so collected, successfully vaccinated and duly reported and vouched as aforesaid.

And it shall be the duty of the Board of Health to publish quarterly the number of persons successfully vaccinated in each district, with the names of the physicians; and also to report annually to Councils through the Mayor, the whole number vaccinated in each district during the year, and by whom so vaccinated.

SEC. 2. So much of all ordinances of Councils on the subject of gratuitous vaccination as are inconsistent here-

with, are hereby repealed.

Whereas, A comparison of the official records of the acting Assistant Provost Marshal-General at Philadelphia, with those of the Provost Marshal-General at Washington, shows that the latter has failed to give credit to the first five Congressional Districts of Pennsylvania for 3,679 men, duly enlisted and furnished by those Districts and properly credited by the Provost Marshals of the said District:

And whereas, This discrepancy between the accounts of the officials at Philadelphia and Washington has apparently resulted in an allotment of 2,897 men to the said Districts above and beyond the quotas which can be demanded of them by Act of Congress.

And whereas, The Provost Marshal-General has been unable to give any satisfactory explanation of this discrepancy, while he has persistently refused to allow the accounts to be examined, with a view to trace the cause thereof and to correct any errors which may be found: Therefore,

Resolved, by the Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia, That while we will cheerfully furnish to the Government and to the cause all the troops which we can raise for the defence of the Union, we regard the threatened exaction of these 2,897 men as being without

warrant of law or color of justice.

Resolved, That we deeply regret that the City of Philadelphia, which has hitherto borne without a murmur her full share of the burdens and hardships of the war, and which is ready hereafter to make all necessary sacrifices without shrinking, should be forced, by these harsh and arbitrary measures to protest against the injustice which is contemplated.

Resolved, That we call upon our representatives in Congress to protect us from this exaction, and to procure for us either through executive or congressional action, an investigation of the errors which presumably exist in the

books of the Provost Marshal General's Bureau.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent, at the earliest possible moment, to each of the members of Congress representing the first five Congressional Districts of Pennsylvania, to the two Senators of the State, to the President of the United States, the Secretary of War, and to the Governor of Pennsylvania.

Item 8. The sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars of the income of the devise of Paul Beck to the "Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of Philadelphia" for supplying the

Poor with Soup, to pay the same as follows:

To the Western Soup Society, three hundred and seventy five dollars, viz.: two hundred and fifty dollars for 1865, and one hundred and twenty-five dollars on account of arrearage of ground rent; and to the Society for supplying the Poor with Soup, the sum of three hundred and seventy-five dollars, viz.: two hundred and fifty dollars for 1865 and one hundred and twenty-five dollars on account of arrearage of ground rent.

Whenever any loan shall be made by virtue thereof, there shall be, by force of this ordinance, annually appropriated out of the income of the corporate estates, and from the sum raised by taxation, a sum sufficient to pay the interest on said certificates; and the further sum of three-tenths of one per centum on the par value of such certificates so issued, shall be appropriated quarterly out of said income and taxes to a sinking fund; which fund, and its accumulations, are hereby especially pledged for the redemption and payment of said certificates.

Regarding the death of the President of the United States.

While indulging the pleasing hopes of peace, afforded by the successes of the National arms, the citizens of Philadelphia, in common with their fellow countrymen, have been appalled by the great calamity which, in the death of the President of the United States, has overtaken them. That the Ruler of a Nation, who derived his high office from inheritance or by appointment, and who had used his great trust for the gratification of his passions, should be assassinated by some victim of his power, has not in the history of human affairs been of rare occurrence; but it has been reserved for this age, so proud of its refinement, and its civilization, to furnish the only instance of the mur-

der of an Executive chosen by the unforced suffrages of a free people, and uniting, as did the late President, a meekness of disposition and loveliness of temper that won the affections of all with whom he had to do. The atrocity of

such a crime is without a parallel.

As if it were possible to augment the wickedness of his act the assassin followed it by the cry "sic semper tyrannis," of one who is not known to have had a personal enemy in the whole land, who is not charged with having inflicted a single personal wrong, whose conspicuous virtues and proverbial honesty of purpose, were endearing him to every heart, and whose only doubtful virtue was his leniency to his country's foes. The country looks for any wrong inflicted on the murderer by his victim, but looks in vain.

Moved by this visitation of Providence, the Councils of the City of Philadelphia, in making this public expression of the grief which pervades all hearts, recommend to their fellow-citizens a renewed devotion of themselves and their all to the safety and perpetuity of their beloved country; a hearty and generous support to Andrew Johnson, whom God has called to administer the affairs of the Nation; a recollection that the life of its most eminent citizens is not an absolute necessity to the great Republic, which cannot, but by annihilation, die, and it is therefore

Resolved, by the Select and Common Councies of the City of Philadelphia, That we bow in submission to the dispensations of an Allwise Creator; that the feeble efforts of human wisdom are valueless to fathom the great designs of God; that faith in His Providence sustains and encourages us to hope and firmly believe His eye is watching, His hand guiding the destinies of our beloved country.

All of which curbing, paving and macadamizing shall be done (excepting the street intersections) at the expense of the owners of property fronting thereon, in accordance with plans and specifications made by the Chief Engineer and Surveyor; shall be completed to his satisfaction and acceptance, and kept in good order and repair by the contractor performing the same for the term of two years

after it has been so finished.

SEC. 2. That whenever a majority of the owners of property upon the line of Broad street, as herein designated, shall file a petition in the Department of Highways, asking that said street may be curbed, paved and macadamized, as herein specified, it shall be the duty of the Chief Commissioner of Highways to enter into an agreement on behalf of the City of Philadelphia with the person or persons named in said petition, as the choice of said owners, to perform said work: *Provided*, The person or persons so named have had experience in and are competent pavers; which agreement shall also include the graduation necessary to complete the work described.

Sec. 3. That the contractor, or contractors, who may perform this work shall accept the bills of the amount assessed against the property owners as so much cash paid by the City on this contract, and shall present no claim against the City growing out of or for work done under

the authority of this ordinance, excepting for such excavation and embankment as may be necessary, and for the paving of the street intersections: *Provided*, The cost of excavation shall not exceed the sum of twenty-five cents per cubic yard, and the City to be at no expense for filling, and the paving shall be the same in amount per square yard as paid by the property owners, not exceeding eighty-seven and a-half cents; amounts payable by the City in loans of the City at par.

Section 1. The Select and Common Cruncies of the City of Philadelphia do ordain, That the Mayor of the City of Philadelphia do ordain, That the Mayor of the City of Philadelphia be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase and take possession for the use and benefit of the City, in accordance with the terms of an Act approved April thirteenth, 1844 (See P. L., 264, 1844) as soon as may be possible after the First day of July, eighteen hundred and sixtyfive, of the property now belonging to the Northern Liberties Gas Company, including all the lots of ground, buildings, apparatus used by the said company for manufacture, purification, storage, distribution and sales of gas, and all the material used in the manufacture thereof, the stock of gas on hand and unsold, all the gas mains service and other pipes, meters, and all other appurtenances and tools

of every description used by said company, payable in six per cent. loans of the City of Philadelphia, at par, not ex-

ceeding the sum of four hundred thousand dollars.

SEC. 2. The Mayor of the City is hereby authorized to borrow, on the credit of the City, at a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent. per annum such sums of money as may be required, not exceeding four hundred thousand dollars; and without requiring the payment of any money therefor the City Treasurer is hereby directed, on the requisition of the Mayor, to issue certificates of the loan of the City of Philadelphia, in such amounts and to such parties as he shall designate, not exceeding said sum. Said loan to be used for the conversion of the stock of the Northern Liberties Gas Works, and the principal thereof to be payable at the expiration of fifteen years from the date of such conversion, and not before, without the consent of the holders thereof. The certificates of said loan shall be in the usual form in which certificates heretofore have been issued, and shall be transferable at the office of the City Treasurer.

SEC. 3. That the City of Philadelphia shall set apart, out of the profits of said Gas Works, the sum of twelve per centum per annum on the amount borrowed by virtue of this ordinance, for the purpose of paying the interest thereon and for reimbursing the principal thereof when the same shall be payable; and on or before the thirty-first day of December, and the thirtieth day of June, in every year, until the said loan is redeemed, the sum of six per centum on the amount of said loan shall be paid by the City of Philadelphia to the City Treasurer, who shall apply three per centum thereof to the payment of the interest on said loan, as the same may fall due, and to no other purpose, and the remaining three per centum shall be paid over by the said Treasurer to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, who shall invest the same and its accumulations in the loans of the City of Philadelphia, as a sinking fund, which is hereby specifically pledged to the repayment of said loans; and any surplus remaining after the payment of said loan shall be applied by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund toward the extinguishment of the funded debt of the City of Philadelphia.

Sec. 4. That any ordinances or resolutions, or parts

thereof, of the late District of the Northern Liberties, or of the City of Philadelphia, inconsistent herewith or which are hereby supplied, be and the same are hereby repealed.

SIR:—You will discharge all enlisted men on board of the receiving ships, Princeton and Bienville, under your command, who enlisted prior to July 24th, 1864, and all others who enlisted in 1864, for two years, on settlement of their accounts, and refunding a proportionate part of all bounties received by them. The proportional part of local bounties to be refunded will be that paid by the State and town to which the person is credited at the time of his enlistment, or, if preferred, three hundred dollars will be considered the amount paid; and out of it the proportional

part is to be refunded. It will be the duty of the person to be discharged, to produce satisfactory evidence of the local bounty, paid at the time of the enlistment, if less than three hundred dollars. In the case of substitutes, the local bounty only is to be refunded, and not the whole sum which may have been received by them. The statement of any person that his bounty money was lost or stolen will not be considered.

Relative to the City Railroad.

Section 1. The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia do ordain, That the Railroad upon Market street between Eighth street and a point Eighty-three feet west of the western end of the Market Street Bridge over the River Schuylkill, and upon Broad street from the north side of Vine street to the south side of South street shall be in charge of the Superintendent of the City Railroad, who shall be elected every two years by joint ballot of the Select and Common Councils, and shall receive an annual salary of twelve hundred and fifty dollars.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of the City Railroad to receive all tolls which may be chargeable for cars passing over or upon said road, and shall pay the the same monthly into the City treasury. He shall employ the requsite force not exceeding one foreman and four laborers as a repair gang, and make such repairs as may be necessary to keep the road in good order and condition; and such additional force as may be required to keep the

road open for travel in case of snow.

He shall, at the first meeting of Council in November of each year, present a detailed statement of the number of cars that have passed over the road during the year, specifying whether merchandise, express, coal, lime, lumber or pig iron cars, with the amount of tolls received therefor and from whom; also, a detailed statement of appropriations, made by Councils to the City Railroad, with expenditures, showing salaries, labor and new material, with stock on hand, and an account of old material disposed of, and shall collect all penalties as hereinafter provided.

SEC 3. That each and every corporation, firm or individual having a depot, yard or warehouse upon, and a railroad curve or curves connecting with the City Railroad, shall, on or before the fifth day of each month make return under oath or affirmation, to the Superintendent of City Railroad, exhibiting the number of cars carrying freight, with eight wheels and with four wheels, whether conveying merchandise, express, coal, lime, lumber, or pig iron, which have arrived at and departed from said depot, yard or warehouse during the previous month, with the point from which they came and their destination upon said road, and shall pay to the said Superintendent the amount of toll due thereon as designated on toll sheet that may at that time be authorized by ordinance of Councils.

SEC. 4. That no car shall be permitted to pass over the City Railroad, from any railroad connecting therewith, to any other railroad or depot, yard or warehouse not upon the line of the City Railroad, without the owners or driver of team hauling the same previously reporting to and paying the Superintendent of City Railroad, such toll therefor as may be at that time established by Ordinance of Councils: Provided, That for any regular line so transporting freight

over the City Railroad, the said Superintendent shall be authorized to receive monthly reports and payments as

hereinbefore specified.

SEC. 5. That if any owner, agent, consignee or driver, as aforesaid, shall neglect or refuse to make the return and payment to the Superintendent of City Railroad, as herein directed, he, she or they shall incur for every such omission a penalty of ten dollars, to be recovered in the usual manner as penalties now are recoverable, and if owning or using a curve connection with said City Railroad, shall have said privilege revoked and connection severed.

No special contracts for the use of the City Railroad

shall be made without the approval of Councils.

SEC. 6. Warrants for the payment of appropriations made by Councils for expenditure upon the City Railroad shall be drawn by the Superintendent of City Railroad, in

accordance with existing laws.

Sec. 7. That on and after the first day of January, 1866, the rates of toll for ears carrying load over the City Railroad shall be paid in accordance with the following schedule, viz.:

For merchandize cars, 8 wheels, 14 cents per mile.
"Express " 8 " 18 " "

All four-wheeled cars of above class, as well as those carrying lime, lumber or pig iron to pay half rates.

For coal cars, 8 wheels, 22 cents per mile.

For empty cars returning, having passed over City Railroad, carrying freight or going to a depot for freight, there shall be no charge.

For empty cars, without load either way, shall be paid

one cent for each pair of wheels per mile.

SEC. 8. That this Ordinance shall take effect on and after January 1st; 1866, and all ordinances, or parts of ordinances, conflicting with this Ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

AN ORDINANCE

To make uniform rules and regulations for the government of the Public Market Houses of the City of Philadelphia.

SECTION 1. The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia do ordain. That the stalls and stands within the several public market houses and places, for the use of which rents may be lawfully charged by the City, shall annually on such days as the Commissioner of Markets shall appoint, be let to such persons as by law or ordinance are entitled to rent the same at such prices as are now, or may be established by ordinance or regulation of the Department of Market Houses, and it shall be lawful for parties renting stalls or stands to pay the rent thereof to the Commissioner of Market Houses semi-annually in advance.

SEC. 2. That the Commissioner of Markets shall give at least ten days notice by advertisement in two or more public newspapers, or by bills posted at the corners of the market houses, that the said stands and stalls will be rented

as aforesaid.

SEC. 3. That every farmer being a lessee of any stall or stand in any of the public market houses, who shall underlet such stall or stand to any farmer by virtue of any Act of Assembly, shall immediately upon making such lease, furnish the name of such under lessee to the Commissioner with the date of such lease and the length of time for which the same is to continue, in default of which the said stall or stalls shall be forfeited.

SEC. 4. Any butcher renting a stall in either of the public market houses, who shall at any time omit to occupy the same for three successive market days in the regular exercise of his business, without presenting to the Commissioner a satisfactory reason for such omission, or shall fail to properly have a transfer of lease recorded in the books of the Commissioner of Markets, shall be deemed to have abandoned such stall or stalls to the city, together with the rents which have been paid thereon; and the said Commissioner may rent such stalls or stands for the rest of the year, to any person entitled by law or ordinance to rent the same.

SEC. 5. No person shall, without authority, occupy any of the said stalls or stands, or expose thereon any articles for sale, or shall use the same for purposes other than those for which they are appropriated, without permission from

the Commissioner of Markets.

SEC. 6. No person shall sell or expose for sale within the public markets and market places, any live animals, except poultry, game, small pigs and fish, nor any strong beer or spirituous liquor, mixed or unmixed, nor shall any beast be killed, nor any meat or fish be cured or salted, nor shall fish be cleaned, nor shall any pickle, garbage, rough fat, uncleaned tripe, cattle feet or offal matter be laid, placed or thrown out in said market houses or places: *Provided*, That it shall not prevent butchers from corning meat.

SEC. 7. That horses and vehicles of whatever kind which shall be brought to the market houses or market places for the purpose of there depositing articles for sale, shall be forthwith unladen and removed from the market limits, and such as shall be brought for the purpose of taking away articles remaining unsold, shall be laden and removed

in like manner.

Sec. 8. No barrow or other vehicle shall be brought into the market houses; no horse or other animal shall be fastened to any of the columns, piers or fixtures of the market houses.

SEC. 9. That no person shall wilfully injure or deface any part or fixture, or appurtenance of any public market

house.

SEC. 10. That persons occupying stalls or stands, shall, when leaving them, remove therefrom all blocks, benches, tubs, baskets and other articles used by them; or those

occupying stalls shall secure such property beneath them by strong chains and locks; the movable posts and bars, where such shall be used, shall in like manner be secured in the places provided for them by the persons occupying such stalls.

SEC. 11. That the renters and occupiers of stands under the eaves, and at the ends of the market houses, shall not attach thereto any posts, railing or other appendage; but shall provide themselves with benches, tables or detached stalls, which shall not exceed in length the permanent stalls at the side of which they may be placed, and shall be arranged in such manner as not to obstruct the passages of the market house, or interfere with the free access to any part thereof, except by permission of the Commissioner of Markets.

SEC. 12. That no person shall use steelyards or spring balances within the market houses, market places or market limits, nor shall sale be made by other weights and measures than such as shall have been legally regulated and stamped,

and by just scales.

SEC. 13. No person shall bring to the market houses or market places for sale, any bread, lard, butter or other provisions in lumps, loaves or other parcels, as or for a greater weight or measure than the true weight and measure thereof, or shall employ any device for imposition or fraud in

the sale of any provisions.

SEC. 14. That no person, except farmers bringing the produce of their farms to market, shall sell or expose for sale any butchers' meat, in any of the streets or other highways of the city, south of Lehigh avenue, east of the river Schuylkill, or north of Morris street, in any cart, wagon or other carriage, nor shall carry about the same therein for sale.

Sec. 15. That no person shall smoke a segar, pipe or pipes, or carry any open umbrella during market hours, in any public market house within the City of Philadelphia.

SEC. 16. That it shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Markets, whenever application may be made to him for that purpose, to designate places in the public streets from which oysters may be sold from carts or wagons, during the months in which oysters may now by law be exposed or sale: *Provided*, That not more than one such place shall be designated in any square, nor shall more than one cart

or wagon be allowed to stand therein, and that no person or persons using such place designated, shall suffer his, her or their cart or wagon, nor suffer or permit any oyster shells to remain thereon after sundown.

Sec. 17. That no person or persons shall expose or offer for sale any fruits, vegetables, &c., from any barrow, cart or other vehicle, within two squares of the line of any pub-

lic market house, during market hours.

SEC. 18. That hereafter any person or persons occupying any of the stalls or stands in any of the public market houses, shall vacate the same at three o'clock, P. M., except on Saturdays and then at nine o'clock, P. M.: Provided, That no part of this ordinance shall be construed to establish night markets where they do not now exist, except upon the application of one-third of the occupants of any section to the Commissioner of Markets to hold market on Saturday evening until nine o'clock, P. M.

SEC. 19. Any person or persons who shall be guilty of violating any of the provisions of the above ordinance, shall pay for each and every such offence such fines as are hereafter stipulated, together with costs thereon to be recoverable as fines are now recovered by law. The

penalties follow:

Sections 12 and 14, the sum of twenty dollars.

" 9 and 17, " ten "

" 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 11, 13, 16, and 18, the sum of five dollars.

" 15, the sum of two dollars.

SEC. 20. That any ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with any of the provisions of the above ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

Item 10. For the Prisons, the sum of seven cents.

Item 13. For the remaining expenses of the municipality,

the sum of twenty-seven cents.

And said amounts are hereby declared to be appropriated for said objects, subject to further direction by ordinance; and it shall be the duty of the Receiver of Taxes to cause to be printed on the tax bills the rates voted for

the objects hereinbefore mentioned.

SEC. 3. On all such portions of assessed property marked "rural", only two thirds of the tax shall be levied; and no part of that set apart for the relief and employment of the poor, shall be levied on the assessed property situate in the Wards where houses for the accommodation of the poor are provided, as required by the eighteenth section of the Act

of February 2, 1854.

SEC. 4. That in pursuance of the power vested in the Councils of Philadelphia by "A Further Supplement to an Act to incorporate the City of Philadelphia," approved April 17, 1861, there shall be the following allowance made to the payers of taxes, and penalty added for the non-payment by the Receiver of Taxes, to wit: at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum from the date of the payment until the first day of January, if paid before the first day of September; if paid after the first day of September, and on or before the first day of October, an addition of one per cent., and if not paid until after the first day of October, then an addition of two per cent, shall be added to and payable on the same; and if not paid until after the first day of Decem-

ber, then an addition of three per cent. shall be added to and payable on the same.

AN ORDINANCE

To revise the wharf line on the River Schuylkill between Chestnut and South street, Twenty-fourth Ward.

WHEREAS, By the Act of Legislature, passed February 2nd, 1854, entitled a further Supplement to an Act to incorporate the City of Philadelphia, it is made the duty of the Councils of the City of Philadelphia to fix the lines beyond which no wharf or pier shall be constructed, &c., &c. Now therefore:

Section 1. The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia do ordain, That the easternmost line, to which wharves may be constructed into the River Schuylkill, from the western side thereof, between the south side of the second wharf below Chestnut street, to the south side of the Alms-house ferry wharf opposite South street, shall be and the same is hereby revised, fixed and determined according to the description herein set forth, to wit,—beginning at an angle at the second wharf below Chestnut street, in the wharf line now established upon the western side of the River Schuylkill, and approved by Board of Wardens October 6th, 1851; said angle being at the distance of one hundred and forty-five feet, south of the south line of Chestnut street, and five hundred and twenty-two feet east of the east line of Bridgewater street, as now fixed; thence to a point upon the northern line of Walnut street, four hundred and thirty-six feet eastward from the east side of Bridgewater or Thirtieth street, as now established; thence to the north line of Locust street, three hundred feet eastward from the east line of said Bridgewater or Thirtieth street; thence to a point on Spruce street, at the distance of twenty-five feet eastward from the east line of said Bridgewater or Thirtieth street, and at the distance of five hundred feet three inches southward from the north line of Locust street; thence to the south side of the Almshouse wharf at a point twelve feet easterly thereof in line of South street.

SEC. 2. That if any person or persons, after the publication of this ordinance, shall erect or extend any wharf, or building in the nature of a wharf, into the tideway of the River Schuylkill, contrary to law, or beyond the line estab-

lished by this ordinance, or any Wardens' line which may be established upon the navigable waters within the City of Philadelphia, he, she or they, so offending, shall, upon conviction thereof, before the Court of Quarter Sessions of the City of Philadelphia, forfeit and pay the sum of four thousand dollars, to the use of the said City of Philadelphia, to be recovered in the same manner as other fines and foreitures are recoverable by law, and the Board of Port Wardens may, upon the conviction of the offender as aforesaid, cause the said wharf, or other building in the nature of a wharf, to be removed or abated, and if the expense of said removal or abatement exceed the fine and forfeiture affixed by the Court, the excess shall be recovered in a civil suit against the offender, before the District Court of the City of Philadelphia.

SEC. 3. Prior to the commencement of any new wharf or to the extension of any wharf, the correct lines shall be furnished by the District Surveyor, who shall be entitled to a fee, in advance, of two dollars for each and every ten feet width of wharf, and who shall prepare a minute and detailed plan of the location of said wharf, for the owner thereof, and shall deposit a duplicate thereof, in the Department of Surveys, and on application to the Board of Port Wardens for a permit for the construction or extension of a wharf, a minute and detailed plan of Survey of said wharf shall be furnished the said Board, to be filed in their

office.

3d. To invest in the loan of the City of Philadelphia, nine hundred and ninety-eight dollars and thirty-six cents (\$998.36).

Item 5. Of the income of the legacy of John Scott, of three thousand dollars, eight hundred and twenty-three dollars and twelve cents (\$3,823.12).

The sum of five hundred dollars of the income of the devise of Paul Beck to "Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of Philadelphia," for supplying the poor with soup, to pay the same, as follows: to the Western Soup Society, two hundred and fifty (\$250) dollars for the year 1866, and to the Society for supplying the Poor with Soup, two hundred and fifty (\$250) dollars for the year 1866.

Item 8. Of the income of the devise of Samuel Scotten, twelve (\$12) dollars, to pay for Bread for the Poor of the City of Philadelphia and the District of Southwark.

Item 9. The sum of five hundred and ninety-four dollars out of the income of the bequest of Stephen Girard, to "the corporation of the Public Schools for the City and County of Philadelphia," in trust for the schools of the First Section of the First School District of Pennsylvania, to pay the same in equal portions for the use of the Public Schools in the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth Wards, the said wards constituting what was at the time of said bequest the First Section of the First School District aforesaid.

Item 10. The sum of four thousand and thirty-eight dollars and fifty-two cents to invest in the loan of the City of Philadelphia, and to pay the following expenses incurred and to be incurred in the management of and visiting the lands in Centre County, Pa., bequeathed to the City of Philadelphia in trust by Dr. Elias Boudinot, as follows:

For attorney's fees, one hundred (\$100) dollars.

For taxes for 1864, 1865 and 1866, six hundred and fifty dollars (\$650.)
