There are laws and policies around the world that are a direct threat to Wikimedia projects and volunteers.

The Global Advocacy team helps the Foundation and affiliates defend against these threats by advocating for laws, public policies, and government actions that protect and support the Wikimedia movement.



Global Advocacy Framework



To protect the community-governed model, we take actions on policies related to access to knowledge and free expression.



To protect the people in our community, we advocate **for privacy rights** and **against mass surveillance.**



To protect the values of our movement, we lead by example by prioritizing **human rights** and countering **disinformation**.

- Copyright
- Liability Protections
- Surveillance
- Human Rights
- Disinformation





How we do it



We work across the movement to educate policymakers so they understand the Wikimedia model;



We work with allies in civil society and the media to promote a positive agenda for internet policy making grounded in access, freedom of expression, privacy, and platform governance based on human rights and counter-disinformation;



We work with industry partners to advance open standards and frameworks that enable and support the widespread sharing of free knowledge.





In 2015 the Wikimedia Foundation sued the United States government's National Security Agency for its mass surveillance. Now, we've petitioned the Supreme Court to review the challenge.
