


- October 29th (after closing of the WikidataCon 2017) - November 12th

- Participation: n=121 → 60.5 % of conference participants












Q1: What is your age? (n=121)

Q2: What is your gender? (n=121)




#### Years of Involvement with Wikimedia



Q3: Approximately for how many years have you been involved with the Wikimedia movement? (n=120)


### Years of Involvement with Wikidata




Q8: Approximately for how many years have you been involved with Wikidata by now? (n=121)




Q5: In which ways are you involved with Wikidata/ Wikimedia? [multiple answers possible] (n=121)



Q4: What was your main role in which you were participating at the conference? (n=119)



Q7: Did you receive a scholarship for taking part in WikidataCon 2017? (n=121)






Q9: To what extent do you agree or disagree to the following statements? The conference...

- Extremely well organized


### **Negative Remarks**

- Varying quality level of sessions










Q13: How many new working contacts did you make at the conference? (n=118)







#### **Positive Remarks**

# Overall very positive feedback on organizational aspects:

- Very good, smooth, professional organization; "It was the best organized conference I've ever been to!"
- Good WiFi
- Perfect Video streaming/ good documentation
- Warm, welcoming atmosphere
- Good catering & conference location

### **Negative Remarks**

# Not dominating, mostly referring to conference schedule:

- Too tight program schedule/ overlapping sessions; "Simply too packed"
- Lacking room for informal conversations
- Conference party as a start not optimal
  - Participants tired at 1st conference day
  - Participants had not warmed up with each other








#### **Meeting Expectations**

### **Overall Rating**




Q17: What is your overall rating of the conference? (n=116)

## **Summary 1: Background of Respondents**



#### **Background of Respondents**

- The age group between 25 and 44 years old represents for the majority of the survey respondents (72%). With 22%, females were slightly underrepresented among the respondents of the survey (compared to registration data: 30%).
- 70% of the respondents have been involved with the Wikimedia movement for 4 years or more, whereas only 29% have been involved with Wikidata for 4 years or longer. The majority has been involved with Wikidata for less than one year (14%), 1-2 years (25%) or 2-3 years (26%).
- 80% of the respondents described themselves as 'editors on Wikidata'. But 60% are also editors on one of Wikidata's sister projects. Roughly a third also claims to develop internal or external tools or software around Wikidata ('scripts & tools for Wikidata & Wikibase': 33%; 'external tools reusing data from Wikidata': 34%). Of the ones describing themselves as 'Wikimedia editors', a majority (61%) names Wikidata as their main project, followed by Wikipedia (26%) and Wikimedia Commons (7%).
- 63% of the respondents represented for Wikimedia in their main role at the conference (51% volunteers, 12% paid staff). 20% as volunteers or staff of non-Wikimedia organizations and 17% as of "other".
- 43% of the respondents had taken on the role of a host, organizer or main speaker at a session at the conference. (registration data: 78 out of 200 → 39%)

### **Summary 2: Program & Content**



#### **Program & Content**

- The general setup of the WikidataCon received much appreciation: loo% of the respondents judged the conference as **suitable for their own background & experience** ('strongly agree' and 'agree'). In line with the conference's goals, the **opportunity to exchange ideas with others** (98%), an **engaging and community driven feel** (98%) and the **strengthening of own's connection to the Wikidata community** (98%) were affirmed by the participants. Giving this, feeling valued for own's contribution to Wikidata/ Wikimedia projects (91%) and advancing on important issues in own's Wikidata project work (89%) were slightly less prominent.
- Satisfaction ratings for the different program facets were particularly high for the **overall scope and** selection of topics (100% 'very satisfied' or 'satisfied'), the **overall flow and choreography** (93%) and the composition of the audience (92%). Also, 93% of respondents felt satisfied with the engagement of participants during the sessions ('very satisfied' or 'satisfied'). The scope of session formats, the quality of the contributions and the involvement of participants in the program design process received slightly lower, but still very good ratings.
- Open comments on program and content were predominantly positive, especially highlighting the rich program, a great atmosphere and the inspiring exchange with others. Some criticism was aroused by the very long and demanding program schedule (especially on the first day of the conference). Also, dedicated time and space for informal conversations and networking were missed to some extent.

# **Summary 3: Networking**



#### **Networking**

- Getting connected with other Wikidata community members was one major goal of the new WikidataCon conference. Accordingly, 100% of respondents strongly agreed or agreed that the conference helped to gain knowledge from other participants. The conference also strongly facilitated to feel more connected to the Wikidata community (98% 'strongly agree' or 'agree'), to engage in meaningful discussions with others (98%), to share own's knowledge with other participants (96%) and to gain a better understanding about each other's views about Wikidata (94%).
- At least 71% reported that the conference helped them to join or start a concrete initiative. 59% of the respondents reported making up to 10 new working contacts at the conference, 37% making even 11 or more.

# **Summary 4: Organizational Aspects**



#### **Organizational Aspects**

- The organizational aspects of the conference received **very positive ratings**. Above all, the overall **atmosphere of the conference was especially highlighted** (82% 'excellent' and 18% 'good'). The different facets of support by the WikidataCon orga team rated very positive, too: **support during the conference** (100% 'excellent' or good'), **support before the conference** (100%), **support with visa formalities** (100%) and support with traveling/ accommondation (99%, if applicable).
- The registration process, the conference venue and the catering received slightly lower, but still very good evaluation. Some critic was aroused by the accommodation itself and the setup and timing of Friday's welcoming party.
- Open comments emphasized the smooth and very professional organization of the conference.
   Important details like stable WiFi, reliable video streaming or good documentation received much appreciation, too. Negative aspects were clearly not dominating, but again the very tight and demanding program schedule was questioned by some.

## **Summary 5: Overall Evaluation**



#### **Overall Evaluation**

- Overall, participants profited in manifold ways of the conference and really appreciated this first staging
  of a Wikimedia conference especially dedicated to Wikidata and its communities.
- In terms of expectations prior to the conference, the vast majority of the respondents reported that their expectations were met (54%) or even exceeded (44%).
- In the overall rating, **83% judged the conference as 'excellent'** (17% 'good'), which emphasizes that there was a strong need in this community to gather at a dedicated conference.
- 100% agreed that the conference had a **motivating effect for contributing to Wikidata** and/or its related tools (25% 'agree', 75% 'strongly agree'). They also felt **motivated to share their newly aquired knowledge back home** with their peers (35% 'agree', 65% 'strongly agree').



Overall, the various insights from the participant survey deliver first indications for reaching the overall goals of this WikidataCon: An engaging, community-driven program, participants feeling happy and involved, strengthening connections within the Wikidata community and leaving participants motivated for their Wikimedia project work and for sharing their learnings back home.
