I crave your indulgence in the following few lines and hope that your honour will lend your helping hand in the great difficulty nay the life and death question of mine and my family. Not to encroach upon your precious time, I put my request in a nut-shell.

I, Metharam Naroomall, am a British Indian resident of Hyderabad Sind (India). I started my business career in the year 1919 with M/s Utoomal Bazar, Davao City, (Philippine Islands) as their manager. Under the force of certain circumstances I was compelled to sever my connections with this firm in 1940. I then started as an independent business man. Hardly could my business stand on its legs a sweeping gale over-took Philippines; the tyrant Nippon gale which took the Philippines unawares. On the 20th December 1941 the unlucky day of my life a heavy bombing ensued before the Japanese land~~land~~ occupied Davao. I have lost my shop and every thing that it stood for in the blitz. My shop was gutted to fire and under its debris lay the work of 26 years of toil and moil nay sweat and even blood of my life. It was therefore that through the conspiracy of circumstances that

It was therefore that through the conspiracy of circumstances that I was made ~~xxxx xxxxxx~~ poor. The life of a penniless man who had to look after a family of SEVEN members (including small children) in those trying times can very well be imagined than described.

Those were the days of great economic convulsions. Every one hankered after loaves and fishes. It was with the help of some old acquaintances' help that we could sustain our bare lives. Davao was a theatre of war. The condition of the residents who had to pass their time in jungles can very well be

understood. Not to rip up the old sores. I close this side of my life which has hit a hard blow on the future life too.

As already mentioned, I was out at elbows, and I had therefore no hope of returning back to India. At last a silvery line was found in the dark cloud and I was sent to India by the Indian Government through the British Consul General at Manila.

I give below the pecuniary estimates of the loss suffered by me:-

It is one month that I have arrived here. I have been helped by my friends here. I think you will agree with me when I say that I cannot count upon them for long, because the times here also are not so easy. I, therefore, pray for the following two favours.

Firstly and primarily, immediate steps may be taken to get me the compensation for the lost property as a War Damages Claim.

Secondly, suitable employment may be found some where so that I may be able to maintain the members of my family decently, I mean consonant with the social status occupied by me.

I would again beseech your honour in the name of JUSTICE to help me in my hour of distress so that I may be able to look after my family who can look to me only for their maintenance and no one else.

I enclose herewith true copies of the documents in testimony of my lost property. They speak for themselves and I should hardly comment upon them.

I shall be glad to show the originals to your

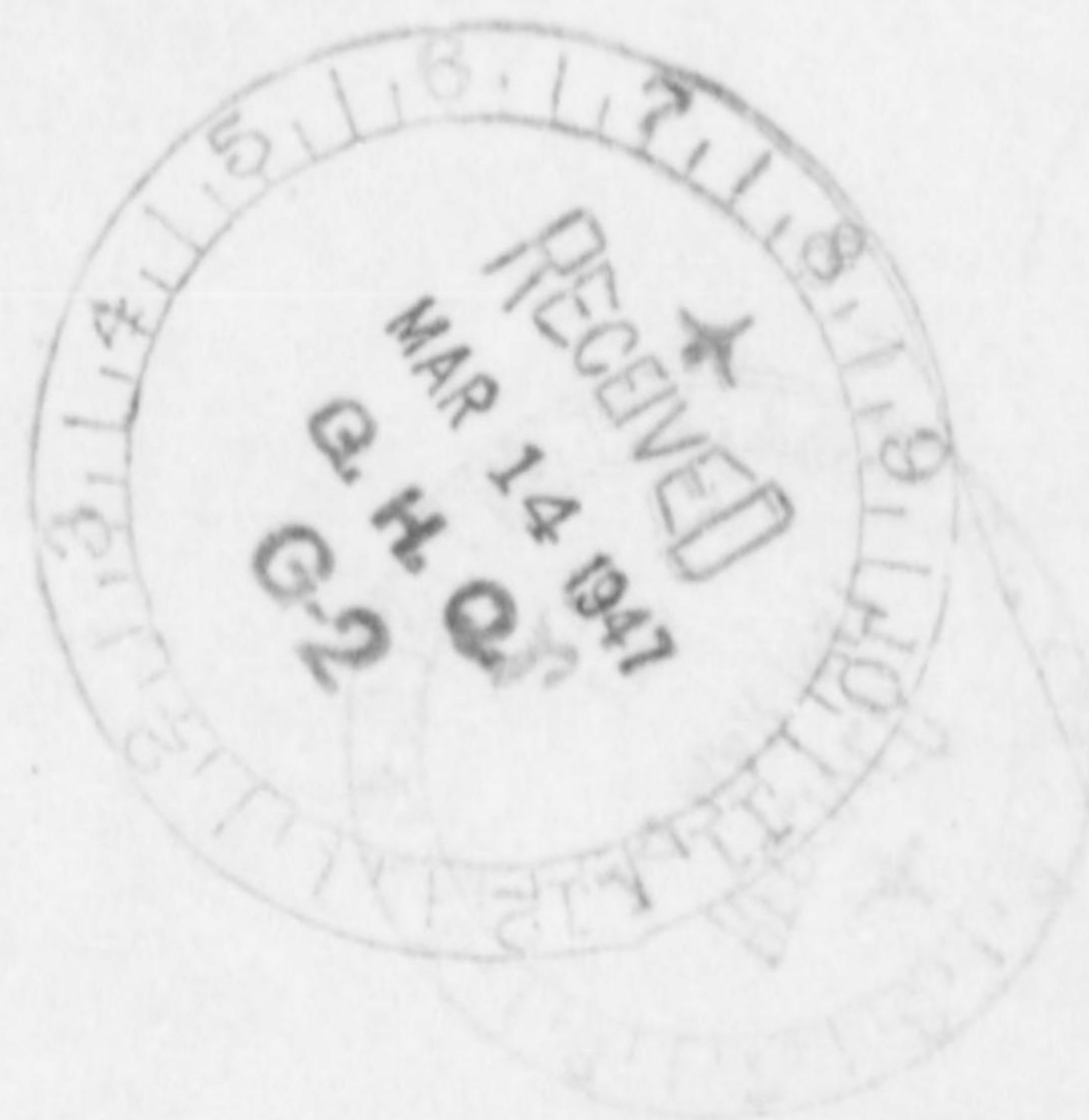

The Diplomatic Section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, presents its compliments to the Indian Liaison Mission in Japan and has the honor to refer to the latter's note no. 521 dated February 14, 1947, enclosing a communication from Mr. V. B. Sheth.

The desire of Mr. Sheth to evict the Japanese tenants from his property is a matter for adjudication by a Japanese civil court. Under the provisions of SCAPIN 77, February 26, 1946, however, the Supreme Commander or his representatives may review civil cases in which United Nations nationals are parties and take such steps as may be necessary to insure that, in the conduct of such cases, the rights of the latter are adequately protected.

General Headquarters therefore suggests to the Mission that Mr. Sheth might seek relief in the Japanese civil courts, reporting any discriminatory practices.

I wrote to you a few days ago that the German gentleman in charge of my radio firm "Shinko Radio Co." was ordered to leave here for Germany. Causing to illness of his sister he has been allowed to postpone his departure for a short period. I beg earnestly to request your Excellency to contact "SCAP" in this matter.

All this time he was managing engineer in charge and it is impossible to replace him. I will have to close the business if he leaves and closing means a great sacrifice. Both he and myself have worked hard and patiently. It was our uphill task. I hope that "SCAP" will not suffer an allied nation firm to go to pieces. The name of the German gentleman is Mr. Gerd Broetje, jun. He was born in Japan, and from his childhood he has been learning radio technics. Had it not been for him this firm would had been a failure. We have just passed the preliminary stage and are now entering the second stage of manufacturing and marketing the product. Mr. Broetje has never taken any part in war or Nazi Party and there is absolutely nothing against him. I am ready to hold myself responsible for his conduct.

The Head of Indian Liaison Mission presents his compliments to the G-2 Foreign Liaison Section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for Allied Powers and has the honour to forward herewith a representative from the Indian Association of Japan requesting that Indian nationals and firms should not be excluded from the scope of the Directives issued by the Supreme Commander for Allied Powers on 18th April and 21st October, 1946 as appears to have been done by the Japanese Government. It is requested that early orders may kindly be issued to redress this legitimate grievance of the Indian Community in Japan.

We wish to bring to your attention the fact that the Japanese Government has excluded Indian individuals and firms from the scope of the directives issued by the SCAP on 18th April and 21st October 1946. The former directive exempted various categories of allied nationals from the application of various financial restrictions imposed by the Japanese Government, and the latter guaranteed their assets in full in spite of any laws that may have been or might be enacted by the Japanese Government.

As a result of this exclusion the Indian individuals and firms are suffering great handicaps and disadvantages, and their assets are being penalised. The exclusion from the former directive has frozen all their funds, and the exclusion from the latter reduces their funds to Yen 15,000 each (First account), and the balances over that sum -- which are very large -- are rendered almost valueless.

We shall be grateful if you will bring this matter to the attention of the SCAP, and obtain a ruling in our favour, and get us included in the scope of the directives mentioned. For your information, we enumerate below the restrictions under which the Indian individuals and firms lived during the war, which entitle them to now have all the privileges of allied foreign nationals:-

4. Indians were not allowed to carry on any business during the war.
5. The movement of all Indians was restricted to a small area around their residences.

The Diplomatic Section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, presents its compliments to the Indian Liaison Mission in Japan and has the honor to state that the Japanese Government has been directed to advise each United Nations national resident in Japan, or who may hereafter return to Japan, and who may demand restitution of his property, to make application through the representative of his Government in Japan to General Headquarters. All such demands are to be submitted in triplicate and should be as complete as possible in detail. The demand will be investigated by General Headquarters and the applicant will be advised with regard to the recovery of his property.

It would be appreciated if interested applicants were advised to follow the prescribed form in preparing their demands and that no claims for loss or damage be included therein. It will be necessary to return to the applicant for correction all demands for restitution which are not in the prescribed form or which contain a claim for loss or damage.

The Indian Liaison Mission in Japan is requested to convey the above information to interested Indian nationals in Japan and to advise that the procedure for submitting claims for the restitution of identifiable looted property seized outside of Japan and for claims for loss or damage is presently under consideration.

Copies of the prescribed forms and of instructions for filing are enclosed. Additional forms may be obtained at any time from this Section.
