REPORT.

We deeply regret that we are obliged to report for the past year a series of interruptions to the work of the Home, — interruptions so serious as to need some explanation.

During the past year, 186 children have been received into the Home, as against 248 the preceding year. This smaller number, we believe, is due entirely to the contagious diseases with which the Home has been afflicted from time to time. Measles, whooping-cough and diphtheria have at different times caused the Home to be closed to admissions for a total of over twelve weeks. In other words, for three months of the year no new cases could be received and our work was obliged to stop. As a consequence, instead of having under our charge 45 children (the number we can easily take), we have had on an average not more than 30 to 35, and at times not over 27 or 28. The diseases in every case excepting one, where one child only was sick, have been brought into the Home by children received temporarily or, as in the case of whooping-cough, by children returned from the City Hospital, where they had been exposed to the disease. We try to exercise every care in examining children brought to us, but it is evident we cannot discover, previous to the admission of the child, whether or not it has been exposed to any contagious disease. All institutions

admitting children for temporary treatment are exposed like ourselves to the liability of having a contagious disease brought into the house and none escape continuously. Our experience the past year has been more severe than usual.

With the addition of sickness to our other cares there is, of necessity, not only no diminution of our expenses but, instead, an increase.

Another reason for expecting larger expenses in the future is the greater proportion of children received temporarily rather than for adoption. The tendency of our work to develop in the former direction we have already noticed and remarked at different times at our monthly meetings. At the present time we have only four children in the Home for adoption and during the year have had four adopted from the Home, as against eight placed for adoption the year before. The smaller number of children surrendered to us for adoption may be largely accounted for by the increased aid now obtainable by mothers who wish if possible to keep their children with them; in fact, the more temporary cases helped by us, especially when the children are very young, lessens the probability of the children being surrendered to us for adoption.

We receive at times in our youngest nursery for temporary relief babies less than a year old. If we are to continue to lower the age at which we shall receive infants or to admit many of the youngest age now received, we must be prepared to increase our force of nurses and our expenses generally. That there is a field for good work in helping such cases we firmly believe, but we cannot extend our help in that direction without a greatly increased income

and at all events only after most careful consideration of the difficulties to be overcome.

Our thanks are due to Drs. E. L. Twombly and G. A. Webster and Albert J. Shaw, for their devoted care of the children. We are indebted also to the Young Men's Christian Union (managers of the country work) for carriage drives.
