

American investors have no-fear of an export duty on ores, but they do not know but that at any time an import tariff may deprive them of necessary Canadian ores, and virtually ruin any American smelter depending apon that source. The subsidy voted by the Canadian government for the refining of lead in Canada, so far as it has any influence, will also tend to divert smelting enterprises toward the Canadian side. The arrangement for amelting in bond in the United States has not proved satisfactory to the smelters nor to the Canadian mine owners.

The transportation interests, of which J. J. Hill is the moving spirit, also bring an influence to bear in favor of smelting on the Canadian side. In fact, the Canadian smelters are dependent on the completion of the branch lines he is pushing into southern British Columbia. The silver and gold ores of Republic in Washington will also find their way to southern British Columbia to be smelted.

The railway now under construction

from the Crow's Nest Pass coal region to connect at the international boundary with a branch line from Jenning, Mont, on the Grent Northern railway, will bring coal and coke from the Crow's Nest Pass into active competition with American mines. The Crow's Nest Pass coal is a new element in the fuel supply of the mining states, but the output of the mines has grown from less than 10,000 tons in 1808 to 425,000 tons in 1901. The capacity of the company's plant is now about 3,000 tons a day, or 1,000,000 tons a year, and this will be greatly enlarged in the near future. The coal measures are estimated to contain two thousand million tons. As this is of excellent quality, both for coking and steam producing, and the Canadian demand, including that of the Canadian Profile railway, is only about 500 tons a day, this coal must find its market in the mining districts of Montana, Idaho and Washington. American coal miners must bestir themselves if they would meet the competition of this energetic and powerful Canadian fival. There is an abundance of coal of good quality for coke and steam between the forty-iffth parallel and the international boundary, the state of Montana alone having coal deposits proved to contain 1,755,000,000 tons, This estimate includes some districts only partially explored, and will be largely, exceeded as surveys from the Crow's Nest Pass coal region

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



In the French Chamber of Deputies voting by rising from the seat ("par assis et leve") is replaced by "scrutin public" if the result of the first vote has been doublind or is challenged by a single Deputy. "Scrutin public" is also the method if twenty deputies have previously signed a requisition for it, and it is obligatory in regard to all bills concerning loans and taxation. It is, in fact, the method almost invariably followed in any division of importance, and is carried out as follows:

The president requests the deputies to take their seats. Each deputy has two voting tickets on which his name is written, one white and one blue, the former being "Yen" the lafter "Nay." The ushers, one of whom is alloted to each section of the chamber, then take around urns into which each deputy drops his voting ticket. When all the votes have thus been collected, the president required.

drops his voting ticket. When all the votes have thus been collected, the president declares the ballot closed. The urns are taken to the tribune, where the votes are counted by the secretaries and the result proclaimed by the president.

If forty thembers request it, deputies must advance to the tribune to deposit their own voting tickets. The roll call is occasionally adopted to insure greater accuracy.

when a division takes place in the German Reichstag a full quorum of 397—members must be present. Members stand for the first vote, and the semicircular form of the chamber enables them to be more easily counted. In case of doubt members leave the chamber and vote by entering through opposite doors, much as in our own House of Commons. This does not apply, however, to clothing, which is changed once a year.

These northernmost people, almost infruman in their manner of living, are still in their relation to each other and to the rest of mankind, very human. They have a deep sense of honor, a wholesome
