ARMY CUTWORM appearing on wheat in parts of Oklahoma. (p. 3).

GREENBUG remains light on small grains in Kansas and Oklahoma. (p. 3).

CHINCH BUG not expected to be a problem in Illinois in 1971. (p. 3).

Detection

An ANTHOMYIID FLY reported for first time from North America. Little is known concerning biology of this European species. This is a new Western Hemisphere record. (p. 5).

New State records include MERCHANT GRAIN BEETLE from Nevada (p. 5), and a CERAMBYCID BEETLE from Tennessee (p. 3).

WEATHER OF THE WEEK ENDING DECEMBER 28

 $\frac{\text{HIGHLIGHTS}}{\text{accumulated}}$: The coldest weather of the season came to some Eastern States. Snow $\frac{\text{accumulated}}{\text{accumulated}}$ to over 100 inches in the higher mountains in Washington and to over 40 inches in parts of Maine.

PRECIPITATION: The week began with wet and windy weather in the Pacific States, rain or freezing rain in the central Great Plains, and dense fog in parts of the Deep South. Freezing rain or drizzle glazed roads from northeastern Kansas across northern Missouri, southern Iowa, and central Illinois and Indiana to parts of Michigan and Ohio. Dense fog in the South reduced visibility to near zero. A storm late Tuesday afternoon produced winds gusting to 63 m.p.h. at Hastings, Nebraska. Snow fell in the western mountains and Northern States. Rain was typical along the Pacific coast and in the Southeast. Areas of heaviest snow were the central and southern Rocky Mountains, and the Northeast from West Virginia to southern New England. At noon Tuesday, 21 inches of snow covered the ground at Flagstaff, Arizona. Most of this had fallen in the previous 48 hours. Late in the week, a large storm dumped heavy snow over the Northeast. Portland, Maine, received 17 inches of snow from the storm. December snowfall totaled over 52 inches and exceeded the previous record total for December by almost 18 inches. By Friday night, 40 inches of snow covered the ground at Eastport, Maine. By Saturday night, 45 inches of snow covered Augusta, Maine.

TEMPERATURE: Temperatures ranged widely last week. Roseau, Minnesota, registered 36 below zero Monday morning in contrast to afternoon readings in the 80's in southern Florida. Wednesday's highest reading at Devils Lake, North Dakota, was 9° below zero, following an early morning temperature of minus 18° . Wednesday's wintry blast plunged temperatures to below zero over the Nebraska Panhandle and held them below freezing throughout the day. While midday readings remained below zero in parts of North Dakota and Minnesota, record warmth continued in some Southeastern States. Macon, Georgia, recorded 82° Wednesday, the highest December temperature of record for that location. Record warmth in the Southeast on Wednesday was followed by much colder weekend weather. Cold weather gripped the entire Nation except the southern portion of the Florida Peninsula. Minimum temperatures at Gainesville, Florida, dropped from 60° Friday morning to 32° Saturday, and to 26° Sunday. Birmingham, Alabama, registered 17° Sunday morning, and freezing temperatures occurred along the gulf coast. Subzero temperatures occurred in the Colorado Rockies and in parts of the Great Basin. Tonopah, Nevada, registered 1° below zero Sunday morning. Temperatures averaged below normal over the northern two thirds of the Nation and above normal from Texas to Georgia and the Carolinas. The Great Basin, the northern Rocky Mountains, and the northern Great Plains averaged 6° to 15° colder than normal. (Summary supplied by Environmental Data Service, ESSA.)

SPECIAL INSECTS OF REGIONAL SIGNIFICANCE

ARMY CUTWORM (Chorizagrotis auxiliaris) - OKLAHOMA - Several larval stages moderate, up to 20 per square foot, in spots of early planted wheat in Kiowa County. (Okla. Coop. Sur.).

CORN LEAF APHID (Rhopalosiphum maidis) - KANSAS - Generally light in wheat surveyed in north-central, central, south-central, and southeast crop districts during period December 5-18. Heaviest counts in Jewell County, up to 10 per row foot, and up to 7.3 per row foot in Labette County. (Redding).

GREENBUG (Schizaphis graminum) - KANSAS - Light in wheat surveyed in north-central, central, south-central, and southeast crop districts during period December 5-18. Heaviest counts in Sedgwick and Harvey Counties, up to 36.3 and 29.3 per row foot, respectively. (Redding). OKLAHOMA - Counts per linear foot of wheat averaged 100 in Kiowa County and ranged 15-25 in Tillman and Jackson Counties. (Okla. Coop. Sur.).

SPOTTED ALFALFA APHID (Therioaphis maculata) - NEW MEXICO - Light in alfalfa near Roswell, Chaves County, (Mathews).

CORN, SORGHUM, SUGARCANE

CHINCH BUG (Blissus leucopterus) - ILLINOIS - Surveys completed. Populations noneconomic in all but one county. Heaviest count of 298.8 per square foot in Grundy County. State average 26.1 per square foot. Statewide population 4 times greater than 1969. Expect no economic problems for 1971. (Ill. Ins. Rpt.).

SMALL GRAINS

WINTER GRAIN MITE (Penthaleus major) - OKLAHOMA - Heavy on wheat in Kiowa County and light in Jackson County. Ranged 125-150 per linear foot in Tillman County. (Okla. Coop. Sur.).

TURF, PASTURES, RANGELAND

A BILLBUG (Sphenophorus phoeniciensis) - CALIFORNIA - Adults 15 per square yard in Tifgreen lawn at San Diego, San Diego County. (Cal. Coop. Rpt.).

FORAGE LEGUMES

EGYPTIAN ALFALFA WEEVIL (<u>Hypera</u> <u>brunneipennis</u>) - ARIZONA - First adults of season observed in 3 alfalfa fields at <u>Parker Valley</u>, Yuma County. (Ariz. Coop. Sur.).

PEA APHID (Acyrthosiphon pisum) - NEW MEXICO - Light on alfalfa in Chaves and Dona Ana Counties. (N.M. Coop. Rpt.).

SOYBEANS

A CERAMBYCID BEETLE ($\underline{\text{Dectes}}$ $\underline{\text{sayi}}$) -TENNESSEE - Specimens collected on soybeans in Tipton County November $\underline{11}$, $\underline{1970}$, by H.D. Gordon. Determined by C.D. Gordon, confirmed by W.C. Johnson. This is a new State record. Specimens collected at West Tennessee Experiment Station, Madison County, November 20, by J.R. White. This is a new county record. (C.D. Gordon).

A CERAMBYCID BEETLE (<u>Dectes texanus</u> <u>texanus</u>) - NORTH CAROLINA - Surveys on December 8 and 9 indicate <u>species occurs</u> throughout most of Coastal Plains. Heaviest damage (up to 30 percent lodging) occurred in coastal counties where land cleared for soybean cultivation. Damage reported in Washington, Hyde, and Beaufort Counties as of December 18. (Hunt).

CITRUS

TEXAS CITRUS MITE (Eutetranychus banksi) - ARIZONA - Decreasing on lemon trees on Yuma Mesa, Yuma County. (Ariz. Coop. Sur.). CALIFORNIA - Infested oranges, tangerines, lemons, and grapefruit in Bard Valley, Imperial County. (Cal. Coop. Rpt.).

CITRUS RED MITE (Panonychus citri) - ARIZONA - Counts declined on leaves of citrus trees on Yuma Mesa, Yuma County. (Ariz. Coop. Sur.).

COTTONY-CUSHION SCALE (Icerya purchasi) - CALIFORNIA - Adults 2 per leaf on scattered trees in 10-acre lemon grove at Bard, Imperial County. (Cal. Coop. Rpt.).

OTHER TROP. & SUBTROP. FRUITS

NAVEL ORANGEWORM (<u>Paramyelois transitella</u>) - CALIFORNIA - Unusual infestation of one larva per nut in macadamia nuts locally at San Diego, San Diego County. (Cal. Coop. Rpt.).

ORNAMENTALS

A CONIFER APHID (<u>Cinara tujafilina</u>) - OKLAHOMA - Increasing on Payne County arborvitae. Older, <u>undisturbed colonies</u> range up to 75 aphids each and many small, newly formed colonies found in favorable locations. Numbers of alate aphids increased slightly but this stage still not common. (Okla. Coop. Sur.).

WHITE PEACH SCALE (Pseudaulacaspis pentagona) - VIRGINIA - Severe and widespread on Kwansan cherry in City of Alexandria. (Weidhaas).

MAN AND ANIMALS

SCREW-WORM (Cochliomyia hominivorax) - No cases reported in U.S. December 20-26. Total of 278 laboratory-confirmed cases reported in portion of Barrier Zone in Republic of Mexico as follows: Sonora 211, Chihuahua 31, Coahuila 7, Nuevo Leon 5, Tamaulipas 24. Total of 19 cases reported in Mexico south of Barrier Zone. Barrier Zone is area where eradication operation underway to prevent establishment of self-sustaining population in U.S. Sterile screw-worm flies released: Texas 11,568,000; Mexico 89,012,000. (Anim. Health Div.).

COMMON CATTLE GRUB (<u>Hypoderma lineatum</u>) - OKLAHOMA - Ranged 0-21 per head (averaged 8) on steers in Payne County. Moderate on Mayes County cattle. (Okla. Coop. Sur.).

SHORT-NOSED CATTLE LOUSE (<u>Haematopinus eurysternus</u>) - OKLAHOMA - Averaged less than 1 per hair part on Payne County steers. Light on cattle in Mayes County. (Okla. Coop. Sur.).

NORTHERN FOWL MITE (Ornithonyssus sylviarum) - ARKANSAS - Few reports of heavy infestations on caged layers in Benton County. (Boyer, Dec. 18).

BLOODSUCKING CONENOSE (Triatoma sanguisuga) - OKLAHOMA - Several adults and nymphs found in woodpile at Stillwater, Payne County. Probably feeding on wood rats in woodpile. (Okla. Coop. Sur.).

HOUSEHOLDS AND STRUCTURES

BROWN-BANDED COCKROACH (Supella longipalpa) - NEVADA - Heavy in home at Elko, Elko County, October 6, $\overline{1970}$. Collected by H. Voight. Determined by R.C. Bechtel. This is a new county record. (Bechtel).

AN EARWIG (<u>Lapidura riparia</u>) - ARIZONA - Number one household pest at Yuma, Yuma County. Also numerous in residential areas in central and southern parts of State. (Ariz. Coop. Sur.).

STORED PRODUCTS

MERCHANT GRAIN BEETLE (Oryzaephilus mercator) - NEVADA - Heavy in dog food in home at Las Vegas, Clark County, September 15, 1970. Collected by D. Barton. Determined by R.C. Bechtel. This is a new State record. (Bechtel).

BENEFICIAL INSECTS

A WEEVIL (Phrydiuchus spilmani) - OREGON - Additional release of 200+ adults in Lake County November 1970. About 350 adults released at 4 sites in October and November 1969. Fall examination revealed light populations of first generation present at release site one. Low egg counts at sites one and two indicated progeny would not result in high enough populations for control of Salvia aethiopis (Mediterranean sage). Additional adult releases at or adjacent to these sites made to augment existing populations. (Isley). See CEIR 19(42):793 and 19(46):836. (PPD).

A PUNCTURE-VINE SEED WEEVIL (<u>Microlarinus lareynii</u>) - CALIFORNIA - Hibernating adults 3 per trunk on walnut trees at Butte City, Glenn County. This beneficial species host specific for puncture-vine, but seeks shelter on anything appropriate in fall and winter. (Cal. Coop. Rpt.).

HONEY BEE (Apis mellifera) - ARIZONA - Inspected 27 apiaries with 1,870 colonies during November; 541 colonies found dead. Burned 18 colonies infected with American foulbrood disease. (Ariz. Coop. Sur.).

FEDERAL AND STATE PLANT PROTECTION PROGRAMS

A GRASSHOPPER (Ageneotettix deorum) - NEVADA - Collected at Carson City, Ormsby County, August $\overline{20}$, $\overline{1970}$, by $\overline{J.R.}$ Adams. Determined by R.C. Bechtel. This is a new county record. (Bechtel).

DETECTION

New Western Hemisphere Record - AN ANTHOMYIID FLY (Emmesomyia socia (Fallen)) - NEW YORK - Two adult males collected from cells of Oxybelus uniglumis quadrinotatus (a sphecid wasp) August 6 and 8, 1970, south of Auburn, Cayuga County, by D.J. Peckham. Determined by G.C. Steyskal. This fly is a European species and was probably introduced into this country in soil. Little is known concerning the biological aspects of this species. (PPD).

New State Records - A CERAMBYCID BEETLE (Dectes sayi) TENNESSEE - Tipton County (p. 3). MERCHANT GRAIN BEETLE (Oryzaephilus mercator) NEVADA - Clark County (p. 5).

New County Records - BROWN-BANDED COCKROACH (Supella longipalpa) NEVADA - Elko (p. 4). A CERAMBYCID BEETLE (Dectes sayi) TENNESSEE - Madison (p. 3). A GRASS-HOPPER (Ageneotettix deorum) NEVADA - Ormsby (p. 5).

LIGHT TRAP COLLECTIONS

Florida - Gainesville, 12/18-22, BL - Armyworm (Pseudaletia unipuncta) 1, black cutworm (Agrotis ipsilon) 1, granulate cutworm (Feltia subterranea) 4.

INSECT DETECTION IN THE UNITED STATES - 1970

Eleven new United States records were reported in the Cooperative Economic Insect Report during the year. These included 8 species new to the Western Hemisphere - 7 in Hawaii and 1 in New York. There were also 123 new State records reported. States having 5 or more were Hawaii 17, Oregon 10, Utah 10, California 9, Pennsylvania 9, Arizona 6, Missouri 6, Florida 5, West Virginia 5, and Wisconsin 5. These reports included 1 flatworm, 1 nematode, and one slug, as well as insects and related arthropods.
