

It would be possible now to take a selective unofficial straw ballot on the type of sewer Glendale wishes and would spend money for.

It would be possible to establish public opinion here and use it as a potential power through the straw ballot.

The ballot will crystallize public opinion and alleviate the stagnant air of the sewer situation.

The direct result of such action would be that real estate values would be relieved of their present speculative risk.

If through the ballot it is found that the city is overwhelmingly in favor of connection with the Los Angeles outfall, when constructed, an organization can be effected immediately to throw every bit of the individual influence of every citizen of Glendale into Los Angeles for the purpose of landing that outfall for Los Angeles, as the first unit of the Glendale sewer.

If the ballots show the citizens are in the majority against the connection and favor any one of the many other plans advanced, it would be sufficient to halt all efforts to get the outfall for Los Angeles or the connection for Glendale. For it would be a sign that the taxpayers here would not vote bonds for the connection.

Let us have a sign of the mind of greater Glendale as it is shown in the silent voter.

Clean Up Sewer Talk -- Now Despite the action of the advisory committee of the city council, the sewer question is still before the


citizens of Glendale. The committee decided to mark time until the Los Angeles taxpayers shall have decided whether they would back their city administrators in the construction

of their greatly needed outfall sewer. They cannot decide that question until late August. This is four months hence.

Should the Los Angeles taxpapers decide they do not wish to entrust the expenditure of \$12,000,000 to their present administrators, Glendale will have lost four months.

Much can be done between now and the end of August toward defining public opinion and forwarding sewer construction here. Much can be done to aid Los Angeles obtain an outfall sewer.
