CENTER FOR EMPLOYER-EMPLOYEE RELATIONS ESTABLISHED BY CCE

Programs to meet the employe relations needs of public and private organizations will be the function of the new Center for Employer-Employe Relations, recently established at RIT. The center, which will be directed by management consultant Robert E. Stevens of Greece, N.Y., will be adjunct to the College of Continuing Education's Extended Services Division.

The new center's offerings will include seminars and conferences on labor contract negotiations, wage and salary administration, handling employe grievances. It will also conduct research in the employe relations field.

PHI KAPPA PHI CHAPTER INDUCTS 62 NEW MEMBERS, HONORS TOP SOPHOMORES

The RIT chapter of the Phi Kappa Phi National Honor Society held its second awards banquet on May 21 and bestowed membership on 10 juniors, 45 seniors and seven graduate students who fulfilled the high academic requirements. In addition, certificates were presented to six sophomores, selected as the outstanding students in each of the six RIT colleges.

Phi Kappa Phi, which granted a charter to the RIT group last year, serves technological institutions in much the same way that Phi Beta Kappa serves the liberal arts schools. The president of the RIT chapter is Robert Snyder of the mechanical engineering faculty.

DR. YOUNG TO LEAVE FOR ALABAMA POST

Dr. Jerry T. Young, dean of RIT's College of Business since July, 1970, has announced his resignation, in order to take a position as dean of the new College of Business at the University of Alabama branch at Birmingham. Young joined the RIT faculty in 1964, and served as director of the School of Business Administration, before being named associate dean in Sept. 1969.

SA SHUTTLE BUS IN OPERATION; AIRPORT RUNS SCHEDULED

The new Student Association shuttle bus is now in operation, with six daily trips to Southtown Plaza and six to Arlan's Plaza. The Saturday schedule shows three trips to Southtown and two to Arlan's. Four daily and two Saturday trips are timed to provide connections with the RTC buses at Arlan's.

Times for the daily, leaving from the Administration Tower circle, are 9:05\*, 9:50, 10:25\*, 1:00, 1:35, 3:15, 3:40\*, 4:20, 5:00\*, 7:15, 8:30, and 9:30. On Saturdays, the bus leaves the circle at 9:00\*, 10:45, 1:10, 3:10, and 5:30\*. The first two morning trips and last three evening trips, will leave the residence halls ten minutes prior to the circle departure times. Add 15 minutes to the circle departure time to determine the return trip departure time.

On May 28-29 and June 1-4, seven special runs will be made to the Rochester-Monroe County Airport. The bus will leave the residence halls at 8:30, 11:05, 12:30, 2:30, 5:35, 7:30, and 9:30, and leave the circle five minutes later.
