WAS CHIEF JUSTICE OF PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Had Been in Failing Health Since He Was Victim of Runaway Accident

Toronto, Oct. 12.-Sir Charles Moss chief justice of the court of app for Ontario, died last night, aged

Sir Charles was born sin Coburg Ont., March 8, 1840, and was the sor of the late John M. Moss, a brewer He was educated at a public school and later at Ontario law school, where he was awarded scholarships in 1865, 1866, 1867 and 1868. He successfully practiced his profession in Toronto and was one of the leaders of the bar. In 1897 he was appointed judge of the Ontario court of appeals and had been chief justice of the province since November 21, 1992. In 1997 Sir Charles was knighted by King Edward.

His death, which occurred at 8.30 o'clock at his home on Jarvis street, was the result of a general collapse. Sir Charles had been alling for some months, but his death was not expected. Three days ago he was confined to his bed from extreme weakness and gradually failed. A few hours before his death his condition became rapidly worse and all hope was abandoned.

Sir Charles' illness was caused by a maway accident which occurred when he was returning from the Ontario legislature last session. His carriage was overturned and, although he did not sustain any injuries, his health

POLICE INVESTIGATE VANCOUVER MYSTERY

Mutilated Remains of Unidentified Man Found in Flour Sack

Vancouver, Oct. 12.—Cramped into a small flour sack, over which a coal sack was drawn, and with the torso severed into three pieces, the nude reains of what was once a tall, middle mains of what was once a tail, middle-aged man, were found yesterday after-noon in the light-well of an apartment house at 319 Vernon Drive. The dis-covery was made by Sidney Boden and Jeograp Largelt in the ships of the second George Barnett, two chimney-sweeps, engaged in cleaning the flues of the building.

Immediately following their horrifying discovery, the police were notified and the remains taken to the pariors of an undertaking firm, where Dr. Jeffs, the coroner, and Dr. Curtis performed a short preliminary examination. MOBILIZATION OF U.S. WARSHIPS

One Hundred and Twenty-Seven Vessels Ready for Review by President Taft

placement of 741,590 tons, have been picked by the navy department for this mobilization. Officers and crews total approximately 28,000 persons. Thirty-two first-class battleships fringe the Manhattan shore from West Forty-ninth street to Fort Washington. These, the backbone of the navy, vary in size from the super-Dreadnoughts Arkansas and Wyomning, twins of 26,000 tons displacement each, to the Indiana and Massachusetts, 10,000 odd tons each. Behind them is a double line of torpedo boats, destroyers, armored cruisers, scout them is a double line of torpedo boats, destroyers, armored cruisers, scoutcruisers and, at the northern tip of the line, a fleet of naval militia craft. Submarines, to a half score, and their tenders, are tied up to their docks at the foot of West 133rd street. In last year's mobilization here there were but 24 battleships, and only 99 ships in all.

Value of Western Crops to Producer is Estimated at \$208,000,000

Saskatoon, Sask., Oct. 12.—The Phoenix this morning presents in con-crete form the telegraphic reports of ne fifty correspondents on the crop some fifty correspondents on the crop conditions at their respective points. They are mostly optimistic, the yield and quality being above the average, ranging from 18 to 25 bushels to the acre. Threshing is progressing rapidly, and in the southern part of the province is nearly finished.

Although showers have been freely predicted lately, there has been little to interfere materially with threshing. Shipping, too, has started and already

to interfere materially with threshing. Shipping, too, has started and already the cry has been raised that cars are not forthcoming. So far there has been no real congestion.

None of the elevators have been blocked so far, but the car shortage is a condition that will almost assuredly spread and increase, as the finishing of threshing frees a large force to draw out the grain.

A large quantity of threshed grain ent or should be a is being piled on the ground at some points, but at that it is safer than in the stook. There is little information yet regarding coarse grains, as none is being marketed.

Threshing is well advanced to the south of the city. Reports from Goose Lake and the C. N. R. south line and from points on the C. P. R. Colonsay branch state that from 75 to 90 per cent. of the grain is threshed. Reports from the lines running east and west run from 20 to 50 per cent., while to the north threshing is estimated as low as ten per cent.

All reports agree that weather has on the whole been favorable and that with a continuance of the present weather threshing will not last long.

The grade of wheat on the whole is excellent, the bulk grading numbering one, two and three Northern. In some places there is complaint of bleaching caused by the rains, but nowhere has there been reports of sprouting grain except at Dalmeny, Rosthern and Duck Lake, where an inconsiderable damag

THOUSAND KILLED AND WOUNDED

The arrival of wounded at the frontier gave rise to rumors in Cettinje that the Montenegrin army had been de-feated.

A special dispatch from Cettinje says official information has reached here that the Montenegrin troops yesterday occupied Dyelopolyoe in the Sanjak of Novipazar without resistance, and are now marching against Cubance.

Desperate fighting for the possession of Barana between the Turkish and Montenegrin troops in the vicinity of Lake Tuscar is in progress. The town has been repeatedly taken and retaken by both sides, says the dispatch from Cettinje to-day.

The Montenegrin general, Lazovitch, bas taken the place of General Bozovitch, who committed suicide when the King reproved him on the field of battle for wasting ammunition.

Capetown, Oct. 12, — Sir Thomas Smart, leader of the opposition in South Africa, recently opened the Unionist campaign in Natal. Miss Scholfield, of the Travellers' Aid, reported that during the past month 13 boats and 23 trains had been met, 58 people having been given assistance. BOARD DISCUSSED

INTERESTING MEETING YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

Pros and Cons of Subject Debated at Quarterly Session

The greater part of the time at the quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade, held yesterday afternoon, was taken up with the consideration of the taken up with the consideration of the pilotage question. Several members of the pilotage commission were present, while the members of the board's special committee who drew up the report were also present, and considerable discussion took place between the two sides, with George Carter, H. B. Thomson and H. G. Wilson leading the attack on the one hand, and F. A. Pauline, chairman of the pilotage commission, with R. L. Drury defending.

The main recommendations of the re-

The main recommendations of the report which had been previously pre-sented to the council of the Board of Trade by its special committee were as

1. That the pilots be paid a monthly

2. That the pilotage authority acquire and provide all necessary equipment required by the pilots in the exercise of

3. That the number of pilots be reduced to three as soon as this can be conveniently done.

After the secretary's reading of the report George Carter rose to move its adoption. He explained that the mem-ners of a special committee had been working for a number of years to make the port the easiest, cheapest and best on the continent of America. He pointed out that the entrance to the harbor was particularly easy, and that there was deep water clear through. They were not fighting individuals, they had no quarrel either with the pilots or with the commission, but each had the good of the city at heart. They had come to the conclusion that the city was suffering from an excess of pilots. The Dominion law made it compulsory to have pilotage in any core in Canada. to have pilotage in any port in Canada. but the committee were determined to see that Victoria should not suffer unduly in the matter. Hitherto the pilotage commission would not meet them. They had turned a deaf ear.

He had taken the matter up with the various cantains and owners pixing into

the port, and by a huge majority these claimed that there was no necessity at all for a pilot in entering the port of Victoria. The amount paid, he claimed too, was exorbitant. He thought something should be done at any rate to reduce the expenditure. H. B. Thomson seconded the adoption of the report. He had always felt that compulsory pilotage, as enforced in Canada and in several parts of the United States, was in the majority of cases unfair both to the port and to the transportation companies. A port which had a difficult channel had an excuse, but in the case of Victoria where the channel was absurdly easy of entry, there was no reason at all for compulsory pilotage,

The company which he represented, he said, was paying in the aelghborhood of \$2,600, for which they got no return. Scattle was free as air except for the slight tonnage tax of two cents per ton, and was known throughout the world as one of the cheapest ports for shipping.

He averred that as Victoria was rapidly growing, in a short time the question of increased service would be taken up by his company. If they gave Victoria two ships per week in place of one their pilotage fees would be doubled. Pilotage cost his company something like ten per cent, or forty cents to the ton.

He reminded the board that he was originally a member of the committee until he had received his appointment on the pilotage. He did not think that optional pilotage would work well, as the system would allow of pilots demanding exorbitant rates, "making
