Winnipeg, June 23 .- (Canadian Press)-Manitoba was visited this morning by a storm which at Portage la Prairie attained cyclonic proportions and caused tremendous damage to property and also, it is feared, considerable loss of life.

One fatality has been reported so far. Charles Spence, aged four, of Portage, was crushed beneath the walls of the family residence and killed instantly.

The storm struck Brandon-at two o'clock, Portage at three and Winnipeg an hour later this morning.

There are no reports from Brandon, as all telegraphic and telephonic communication was broken.
