VARIETIES OF LAWN SEED BEST TO USE If you have measured the amount of Lawn Seed you will sow on your lawn by the amount of money you have appropriated for that purpose—don't see how much seed you can buy for the given amount of money, but if necessary buy less seed and know that it is good. The buying of seed is entirely a matter of confidence: all depends upon the knowledge, experience and trustworthiness of the seedsmen from whom you buy. Don't buy your Lawn Seed by measure; you can easily understand the more chaft, hulls, etc., which are left in the seed the more quickly will it measure. Always purchase by the pound, as good, fresh, solid, heavy, thoroughly recleaned seed weigls, and when you purchase 10 pounds or 100 pounds you are not depending upon someone else's ideas of what a quart or a bushel should be. Often two quarts of measured seed sold for 50 cents does not contain as many good and to be successful at the minimum cost be sure to buy your seed by the pound. The most successful grass in this climate are Kentucky Bhne Grass (Poa pratensis), Red Top Grass (Argrostis Vulgaris) White Dutch Clover (Trifolium repens). Select a good sandy loam, plow the ground as deep as possible, dig out 12 inches deep, put in a layer of 4 inches of food, strong stable manure, and press down; then fill in with good, rich, black loam to the top of the bed 100 lhs. of Kainit to 1,000 square feet of bed; incorporate this thoroughly to depth of 3 inches. After leveling bed off even, stretch a line the length of bed 9 inches from the edge, and with a spade cut a furrow 8 inches deep, set a row of plants along the trench 9 inches apart, with the crowns of the roots 2 inches below the surface, then cover up, make even and plant other rows 9 inches apart.

Sow the last of March or early in April, in an open horder, in rich mellow ground in shallow drills, watering freely in dry weather. By rolling or pressing in the seed, the result will be more satisfactory than when only covered. Gut the tops off once or twice before planting out, to make them stocky. When the plants are 5 or 6 inches high, transplant the dwarf varieties 3 feet and the talter sort 4 feet between the rows; plant 6 inches apart in the rows. Culti-vate well and when large enough, blanch by earthing up. The first operation is that of "handling," generally done hy the beginning of September. After the soil has heen drawn up with the hoe, it i drawn around each plant by hand to keep the leaves firm in upright position and prevent spread-ing. When plants have become "set" in an upright position and the Celery is wanted for early use, they should be "banked." This is done hy throwing the soil up as close to the plants as possible with a plow and finishing it with a spade, hringing the earth nearly up to the tops of the banks. The method employed now for protecting it is by covering the tops of the banks with waterproof felt paper.





Operation
