

ENGLAND.

SEALS OF SOVEREIGNS.

OFFA, KING OF THE MERCIANS. A.D. 790.

1. Sulph. cast; oval, $I_{\frac{1}{4}} \times I_{\frac{1}{8}}$ in. [D. C., A. I.]

Bust in profile, to r., with crown or circlet, on which a floreated ornament is visible.

[OFFA] REX.

From original impression of king's signet ring, attached, en placard, to a grant to St. Denis Abbey in France.

Described by Sir F. Madden, in "Remarks on the Anglo-Saxon Charters granted to the Abbey of St. Denis, and on the seals attached to them."—Arch. Journ. xiii 366.

- 2. Electrotype from original leaden bulla in the Dept. of Mediæval Antiquities. 1½ in. [liii, 28, 29.]
- Ø. A small cross moline, joined at the ends, as appears also on the coins of this king.

R. The same design.

EADGAR, KING OF THE ENGLISH. A.D. 960.

3. Sulph. cast; oval, $I_{\frac{3}{8}} \times I_{\frac{3}{16}}$ in. [D. C., A. 2.]

Bust in profile to r., similar to those of Louis Débonnaire and Charles the Simple. From antique Roman gem.

ÆLFRIC, EARL OF THE MERCIANS. BEFORE A.D. 1007.

4. Red: $1\frac{1}{16}$ in. [xxxv. 94.]

Bust in profile to l., with fillet, the ends of which hang down behind; sword erect in r. h.; the cloak fastened with stud.

H SIGILLVM ÆLFRICI.

From original brass matrix, with an arabesque ornament on the back, in the Brit. Mus.

Engraved in *Archaelogia*, xxiv. 359, with notice by Sir H. Ellis. Sir F. Madden, *Arch. Journ.* xiii., 366, attributes this seal to Leofric, Earl of Mercia, *circ.* A.D. 985.

EDWARD THE CONFESSOR. A.D. 1041-1066.

FIRST SEAL.

- 5. [A.D. 1053-1065.] Red-brown: in fair preservation, but slightly bent; appended by a strip-label. 2\frac{3}{4} in. [Sl. ch. xxxiv. I.]
- Ø. The king, with beard and moustache, on a cushioned throne; his arms raised from the elbow. In a closely fitting tunic, and a loose robe falling in folds between the knees and fastened by a brooch on right shoulder. Open crown of four points. In the r. h. a sceptre topped with fleur-de-lis; in the l. h. an orb; the feet on a projecting footboard.

R. The king, with pointed beard and moustache, enthroned and robed as on *obv*. Helmet or cap strengthened with bars. In r. h. a sceptre with bird at top; in l. h. a sword, resting on the shoulder.

- **6.** Brown: the centre of *rev*. only, the rest discoloured and obliterated; with part of a label. $2\frac{3}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{16}$ in. [xxxiv. 2a.]
- 7. Brown, varnished black on the *obv*.: in fair preservation, but the upper part melted and warped by fire. $2\frac{3}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{16}$ in. [xxxiv. 2b.]
- 8. Dark greenish-brown: cracked and injured by fire; appended by a closely-woven cord of green threads, inserted later. 2\frac{3}{4} in. [Cott. ch. xvii. 5.]
- 9. Cast in lead, from a fine impression, A. D. 1059, unidentified. 23/4 in. [xxxiv. 3.]

12. [A. D. 1052–1056.] Hard yellowish-red: varnished; the edges chipped and wanting. $2\frac{5}{8}$ in. [L. F. C. xxi. 5.]

Ø. The king enthroned, with mound and sceptre with trefoiled top. The details of the drapery and of the throne differ considerably from those of the first seal.

[SIGILLYM EADVVARDI] ANGLO(RVM BASILEI.]

R. The king as in the first seal, with variations in the drapery and throne.

13. Sulph. cast, from an unidentified impression, broken at top. $2\frac{3}{4}$ in. [D. C., A. 3, 4.]

15. Brownish-red: edges imperfect; parts of legend want-

ing. $3\frac{1}{4}$ in. [xxxix. 8.]

Ø. The king on horseback to the r., in coat of mail and conical helmet and spurred; in r. h. a long lance with three streamers; in l. h. a kite-shaped shield, held by a strap, showing the interior. Horse trappings: a small, plain saddle, and stirrup, breast-band, girth, and head-gear.

between two dotted circles.

R. The king, enthroned, with a crown fleury of three trefoiled points, and loose robe falling in folds between the knees, with arms and feet apparently bare; both arms extended and raised from the elbow; in r. h. a sword erect; in l. h. an orb, surmounted by a tall cross pattée fitchée. Throne without back; cushions on the seat; the base having three small arches, which rest on a plinth also having arches in nearly vertically corresponding positions.

The legends, taken together, form a distich:—

- 16. [A.D. 1067?] Dark brown: much injured, and the *obv.* nearly obliterated by fire. Appended by a red plaited silk cord, stitched to a 12th cent. copy of a charter of A.D. 1067. $2\frac{5}{8}$ in. [Cott. ch. vi. 3.]
- 17. [Before A.D. 1072?] Brown: in good preservation, but edges injured in places; appended by a strip-label. 3\frac{3}{6} in. [Add. ch. 11,205.]
 - 18. Sulphur casts of No. 13. [D. C., A. 9, 10.]
- 19. [About A.D. 1071, 1072.] Casts, in red plaster: from an original impression, broken on the left, appended by a strip-label to a charter in Hereford Cathedral. [xliii. 47, 48.]

R. As in former seal; but with differences in relative positions of arches in throne, and of the sword towards the king's head.

- **22.** A.D. 1094–1096. Sulph. cast from an impression attached to a charter in Durham Cathedral. $3\frac{3}{10}$ in. [D.C., A. 13, 14.]
- Ø. King enthroned, with open crown of five points of which the central and lateral end in crosses or fleurs-de-lis, with two chin-straps hanging loosely at sides, the ends trefoiled; tunic with tight sleeves, and short cloak fastened at throat and adorned with broad border showing circular pattern. In r. h. up-raised a broad-sword, with point towards the king's head, at broad part of blade a deep channel. In l. h. an orb with long cross pattée pommettée. Throne, cushioned, and square, but curves outwardly at top and bottom; at narrow part two bands, the upper broader than lower. In upper panel three small arches; in lower, a rectangular foot-board also betw. three arches. In field on each side, a circle filled with rose of six leaves.

R. King on horseback to the r., in hauberk of chain-mail, represented by circular dots, some by contraction of the wax appearing annular; helmet conical, spiked, and with nasal projection; goad-spur; long lance with three streamers in r. h.; sword on king's left side and hanging down below the horse. In l. h. a kite-shaped and bordered shield, seen from interior, held by strap. Horse-trappings: a breastband with ball-fringe, small saddle and stirrup, loose reins.

FIRST SEAL. c. A.D. 1100.

23. Sulph. casts from the fragmentary seal in Durham Cathedral, "2da. 1ma. Regalium, L. 1, No. 1." $2\frac{3}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{2}$ in. [li. 14, 15.]

Ø. King, seated in majesty, in an undercoat with sleeves tight at wrists, and loose skirts reaching below knees; and long flowing cloak fastened at throat and spreading out behind, which has a border, with indications of a fur of symmetrical

pattern. On the head a cap-shaped crown, with three fleurs-de-lis, one at top and one at either side, and two chin-straps hanging loosely at sides, the ends having buckles in shape of trefoils. In r. h., extended outwards from elbow, a sword is held almost perpendicularly. In l. h., similarly extended, an orb, ensigned with a long cross pattée pommettée. Throne, apparently square, and closely resembling that of William II.; the centre curves with a bold cusp inwards, with a string-course, and is the narrowest part. In lower of two compartments thus made, is a footboard, not enough remaining to show original size. On throne a flat cushion with square edge, carrying at each end a hemispherical ornament, intended for pillow.

∰ H GLORVM.

R. King, hauberk of chain-mail; conical helmet, having a blunt point at crown of head, and perhaps armed with projecting nose-piece; single pointed spur of goad form; long lance to which is attached a banner, charged with cross moline, and three pairs of waving streamers. No indication of sword. In l. h., held by interior strap, a kite-shaped shield, seen from within. The horse is walking to the r. h., caparisoned with breast-band, which is ornamented by five globular pendants equi-distant. Saddle of small dimensions; with stirrups. The loosely gathered reins are held up in l. h., which also sustains shield.

R. As in first seal, with considerable variations in proportion of details.

THIRD SEAL.

25. [A.D. 1103-1106.] Brownish-white: varnished a dark colour, lower part and edges destroyed. App. by label, cut at right angles to side of charter. 23 in. [Cott. ch. vii. 1.]

Ø. King enthroned. Closely fitting tunic, with short sleeves, over it a loose cloak with embroidered border, gathered up by button and thrown over l. arm, and floating outwards on either side and behind throne. Crown has apparently two appendages for fastening beneath the chin. In r. h. a sword, sloping towards head; in l. h. an orb and cross pattée, on which is a bird to the l. Throne without back, cushioned, front legs enriched with rings and studs; on front panel two semicircular arches.

- Ø. Generally resembles previous seal, but with variations in details.

R. Generally resembles previous seal, but with varied proportions. On flag a cross pattée.

- 27. [A.D. 1103-1106.] Brownish-white: faced with varnish, which has peeled away in parts. Centre only; app. by broad label at right angles to left side of charter. [L. F. C. xxix. 5.]
- 28. [A.D. 1109.] Brown: with coating of darker brown varnish. Centre only; app. by a bright green silk bobbin, plaited. [Harl. ch. 43 C. 11.]
- **29**, **30**. Duplicate sulph. casts of No. **26**. [D. C., A. 15, 16; 17, 18.]

- **31.** [About A.D. 1124–1133.] Green: varnished; a good impression. $3\frac{3}{8}$ in. [Cott. ch. vii. 2.]
- Ø. Generally resembles previous seal, with differences in details. In field on each side of king a star of eight points, the points in saltire, ending in a ball.

HENRICVS DE[I] GRA[CI]A REX ANGLORVM. within two dotted circles.

R. King on horseback to r.; hauberk and continuous coif of chain-mail, plain goad-spur; in r. h. a sword slightly turned to the l., the point entering the legend; in r. h. an oval shield, showing inner side, riveted. Horse trappings: reins, head-gear, bridle, breast-band with seven ball-pendants, saddle, and girth.

中 HENRICVS DEI GRATIA DVX NORMANNORVM. within two dotted circles.

- **32.** Red: originally a fine impression, but lower part now wanting. [xxxix. 9.]
- **33.** Yellowish-white: varnished; edges and legend wanting. [Sl. ch. xxxii. 50 A.]
- **34.** Light red: a fair, but imperfect impression. [Sl. ch. xxxv. 1a.]
- **35.** [A.D. 1121.] White: indistinct; edge and outer parts destroyed, the field flaked and bruised. [Harl. ch. 111 B. 46.]
- **36.** [About A.D. 1100–1123.] Brownish-green: edge of the *obv*. defective. [Harl. ch. 43 C. 12.]
- **37.** [About A.D. 1107–1115, or 1120–1123.] White: a thin, but formerly fine impression. [Cott. ch. xi. 60.]
- **38.** [About A.D. 1123–1125.] Red: legends wanting; *rev.* very indistinct. Enclosed in old case of damasked stuff. [L. F. C. xxi. 6.]
- **39**. White: small portion of centre only. [Add. ch. 19,572.]
- **40.** [c. A.D. 1120–1135.] Green: fragment of centre only, varnished a dark colour. [Harl. ch. 111 B. 47.]
- **41**, **42**. Duplicate sulph. casts from No. 31. [D. C., A. 19, 20; 21, 22.]

This seal does not appear to have ever been published or engraved. From the smallness of its dimensions it has been doubted whether it should be classed among the great seals of Sovereigns. But the style of the legend coincides exactly with that on the great seal of King John, and on the first great seal of Henry III. The work of the seal is very fine, and quite equal in point of art to the great seals mentioned above. The seal described in Douët D'Arcq's Collection de Sceaux, No. 10,013, is from this type, with legend altered under the circumstances pointed out on p. 18.

This constitutes a very notable alteration, and is believed to typify the cessation of the war with France.†
