In most cases, volunteers address vandalism on Wikipedia in under five minutes. They work tirelessly to defend the projects against misleading information.

Are Wikipedia articles trustworthy?

As an encyclopedia, Wikipedia's goal is reliable content. Articles must be written from a neutral point of view, and information has to be supported by a reliable source. Hundreds of thousands of volunteers fact-check articles around the clock, reverting or correcting inaccurate edits. Wikipedia's articles are accurate and reliable, and their quality improves over time thanks to volunteers working together.

No one owns Wikipedia. Wikipedia is a public interest project, and its content does not portray a particular point of view or support a certain position. Wikipedia is funded by donations, and there is no advertising. It is hosted by the nonprofit Wikimedia Foundation.

Wikimedia volunteer communities are diverse, and so are their worldviews. The more diverse our communities are, the closer we get to a world in which every single human being can freely share in the sum of all knowledge.
