

# Word Pictures

HAT constitutes a good Iris list? Is it the free use of alluring, pretty adjectives? I have purchased many, many varieties whose bloom never did come up to the anticipated picture which the catalogue description had prepared for it. Is it the matterof-fact, terse cold statement of color and habit? What an injustice to Mlle. Schwartz to say merely "Palest mauve"! One cannot carry the true vision of the bloom to the reader by such practice, any more than a painter or photographer can deliver a finished picture of a home from a set of carpenter's blue prints. Many have written me,-give color, height and season. But that, too, is a problem. Our color senses have not all been developed at the same school, and the color pictures as I paint them in words may carry the story to you in a very different set of shades. I know the ideal to which we are all working is to use "Ridgeway's Color Chart." but until I know that all readers have this book available. I hesitate to make free use of the terms, because many, many of them I cannot personally place until I have translated them in the plate sections.

Then, too, the season has so much effect on the habit of the plant that it is dangerous to include reference as to height, and even time of bloom. This year in my notes I included height references, and I see that my office force have included them in some of the descriptions, but I question if these are accurate, as the very dry season we have experienced, and a late freeze, made almost every variety bloom under-height, under-size, and in many cases destroyed the color tones which other seasons have been so attractive.

I have tried in this Price List to give a clear and accurate description of each variety. You no doubt will notice that I have made the descriptions shorter than those in my previous Lists, and I am wondering whether you like these as well as my more "chatty" ones which I hope to continue through my Garden Notes. Do you approve of presenting an Iris list in this manner? I would appreciate your comments and suggestions.

## Garden Notes

No. 19

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<sup>3</sup>HEN I was planning to build a new home, I read quite frequently of "Controlled Heat," and no doubt such an arrangement is a necessity in a modern home, but what we flower lovers need if this year's experiences are criterions of our needs. is "Controlled Weather." The person who can influence the weather department to return to a seasonable, definite schedule, will merit a pension from the entire fraternity. The weather conditions to start were most favorable for early cultivation, but when growth had started, someone on the weather engineering staff tinkered with the heat valves and turned on all the heat in storage, and it took the troubleshooters almost two weeks to locate the trouble and get things back to normal spring temperature. Then for some unaccountable reason the temperature shifted to the other extreme and we had freezing weather for a week during which the plants in my garden experienced a "cold storage" treatment, and then to remedy the error the weatherman's engineering staff returned to the hot, torrid program which brought the blooming season in my garden to an abrupt close. And then too,-it forgot to rain. Under such conditions it is little wonder that the Iris season was not a success in almost every section from which I have had reports.

But my plants staged a wonderful comeback after the freeze, and although the main terminal buds were destroyed, the laterals developed blooms of fair size and good quality, and if one remembered that the bloom stalks were from six to twelve inches under height, there was a real satisfaction in studying the varieties that flowered at this period.

Cardinal, Bruno, Duke of Bedford, Moa, Glamour, and Tenebrae all bloomed for me this year and while each of them have merit, for this season at least Cardinal is my choice. Its rich color tone, fine size and carriage marked it as an Iris of refinement. In fact it was not necessary to call visitors' attention to this Dominion seedling group, for they were easily located and usually held the attention of the Iris lovers for a major portion of their time. A few of my Dominion seedlings did not bloom, so I will have something to look forward to next year. These new seedlings all seem to have developed a hardy strain which Dominion lacked, and I look for a bright future in the Iris world for them.

One of the outstanding things I have seen this season was a clump of MIle. Schwartz that stood forty-two inches high and developed two main bloom stalks, one of which carried thirteen blossoms. It was indeed a magnificent specimen. Although the variety needs some special attention to establish it, if planted in a sheltered position (a south exposure is best in our climate) it will give the owner a thrill during its blooming season.

Iris lovers invariably like the pink toned varieties and in this group Madame Janiaud, Susan Bliss, Aphrodite, Dream, Phyllis Bliss were favorites, with my choice centering on Susan Bliss as it bloomed for me this year. I saw good blooms of Mr. Farr's Georgia at Cincinnati, but I do not have this variety in my collection. I may want to exchange some of my surplus stock for a start of it.

Pallida Aurora gave most satisfactory bloom this year; it developed fair height considering our growing conditions and its rosy lilac blooms were carried well. It is worthy a place in any collection. Gnome also attracted attention from visitors. Her Majesty, Queen of May and Mrs. Alan Gray were still popular in the standard lilac-pink group.

Bluet with its clear blue color and profuse bloom is always a garden favorite and this year was no exception. It is a splendid low-growing landscape variety. Miss Sturtevant's Cordon Bleu fills the same need in a darker shade, blooming I believe a little later in the season. Suffren (Bliss) pleased me very much as a blue Iris. It has a good clear color tone, splendid size and quality. It was one of the best of the blue group to bloom in my garden this year. I think there is also a place for Drake. It has a good growing habit and reminds one of Miranda and Pallida Dalmatica. Corrida in my opinion is the best tall blue variety for landscape work.

Peau Rouge, Deuil de Valery Mayet, and Saul shared

honors in the red toned group. I thought the colors of Deuil de Valery Mayet harmonized better than those in Peau Rouge, but I found many enthusiasts who believed I was wrong in my conclusions. Red Riding Hood (Koehler), although small in size, developed good color tone and I believe has a place in our gardens.

Sunset (Ochracea Coerulea) with its tan toned lavender was a great favorite. It is as well named as Afterglow, and I am confident that it should be in every Iris collection. I hope to get Madame Durrand acclimated, for it is the best in this group. Lionel Millet fits in very well here, as the small bloom of harmonizing colors of azure blue and old gold have excellent form and carriage.

I am glad that Mr. Wallace, Mr. Wassenberg, Mr. Wister and I found Queen Mary when in France three years ago, as it has proven to be the most satisfactory white Iris in my garden. Its splendid clear white color, and profusion of bloom, wins for it high praise from all visitors. Balaruc developed a fine clear white bloom, and I believe it will merit a place with the world's best whites. Mystic (Bliss) gave a white bloom of good size, and the dainty violet markings on the haft gives the variety the same artistic air which makes Madame Chobaut so popular. It is one of the varieties that invites close inspection and study.

Mary Gibson (Perry) will appeal to Iris enthusiasts who like Madame Cheri and Quaker Lady. It is larger than Quaker Lady and the bright effect of its color tone attracts attention in the garden. Its blooms, while not extremely large, are good size and are carried well on tall bloom stalks. I will look forward to seeing it again next year.

Ann Page (Hort) with its pale lavender blooms of large size had a prolonged blooming season that made the variety a great favorite with visitors, especially those who could come to the garden for numerous visits. It has splendid color, good quality, and texture, fine growing habit, and in fact according to this year's record is an ideal Iris. I am glad that I have it in my collection.

Mrs. Dean's Margery produced blooms of large size which drew attention to it. I want to watch it next season.

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Miss Sturtevant's Shekinah was the best yellow in my garden this year. It had very little competition, as Yellow Hammer and Empire, which I admired last year, did not bloom this season. Many visitors picked out Sherwin Wright as a good yellow, but when the bloom was brought inside they quickly changed and selected the lighter tone of yellow as the most satisfactory. Sherwin Wright and Aurea are splendid garden varieties, but have little value for cut bloom.

In the darker varieties, Gaudichau, Seminole, Archeveque, and Opera were favorites. Nimbus developed the darkest bloom I have seen on any Iris, but the freeze so damaged the bud that it could not give a normal bloom. It will be an anticipated pleasure to watch it develop next year.

In the beardless group Perry's Blue, Snow Queen, and Emperor were favorites, with most of the comments centering on Perry's Blue. Its delicate coloring makes a very artistic effect in mass, and I believe the variety has a place in group plantings. Emperor with its rich purple bloom and extremely wide falls appealed to many visitors. The white variety, Snow Queen, is always popular, and George Wallace with its tinted veined falls found several admirers.

Since the close of our blooming season, we have had splendid growing weather and many of my Irises which were transplanted last year have developed into good healthy clumps and I anticipate a very successful blooming season next year. Of course, it all depends upon our weather schedule, but a gardener invariably gets into the habit of looking for the best, in fact, I think that this is one of the assets of our garden experiences,—the hope and anticipation of new surprises and better bloom each succeeding year, offsets our disappointments and prepares us to enjoy the pleasures of another season.
