Incident #200, a, b, c -- Crescent City, California -- 17 October 1943

This incident has no astronomical explanation.

Although the four observers had no technical training, their reports are remarkably consistent. The object was in sight several minutes, too long to be a meteor; it made a banking turn of  $45^{\circ}$  and appeared to reflect sunlight very strongly. The speed was great but not excessive.

The object seen could have been an advertising blimp, a balloon, or an aircraft. The banking turn appears to rule out the balloon, unless this was a subjective impression caused by the turning of the balloon in the wind.

1. Reference is made to letter from your headquarters, MCIAKS, dated 9 March 1949, subject "Unidentified Flying Objects," and first endorsement thereto by this headquarters, dated 31 March 1949.

2. The incident summaries 173 through 233 have been checked against routine weather-balloon ascents made by the Air Force, Navy and Weather Bureau. Comments based on this review are inclosed.

3. It is recommended that the "Guide To Investigation Of Unidentified Aerial Objects" be changed as follows: Item 13, "Direction of Flight of Object," should be clarified so that vertical and horizontal motions are distinguished if possible, and so that motion is specified as the direction towards which the object appears to move. "Relative to Radar Settings" should include a statement of the type of radar set used.

While conversing with Mr. [redacted] on Battery Point, Crescent City, Calif., Mrs. [redacted], housewife, saw a small silver-colored object that reflected light. The object was elliptic in shape and was traveling very fast in a southerly direction and remained in sight for 2 minutes. It was traveling about 5,000 feet higher than a plane flying north. Shortly after sighting, the object made a sharp bank of about 45° to the right then resumed its course, disappearing to sea. No smoke or noise was heard from the object. At all times the object gave off a brilliant flash like that of sunlight on a glass mirror.

Mrs. [redacted] is 70 years of age, of Swiss extraction, and is a long-time resident of Crescent City. She is of average intelligence, and has a good character and reputation. She had no idea of speed, range or altitude. She thought the object different than any other airborne craft she had ever seen. The brightness of the object impressed her most.

1. This Command is charged with the investigation of all reported sightings of unidentified aerial objects. In accomplishing such investigations existing military investigative agencies are utilized. However, no known investigative agencies are located within the immediate vicinity of Crescent City, California, where sighting mentioned in basic letter occurred.

2. The assistance of Coast Guard personnel is therefore requested in conducting an interview of the individual witnesses who reported the Crescent City sighting.

3. It is desired that pertinent questions outlined in inclosed form, Essential Elements of Information (EEI) be answered. It is particularly important that information requested under "General" of the attached form be obtained.

4. All persons should be advised to avoid publicity in this matter.

It should be pointed out that, since the object was in sight just a few seconds, even a conventional aircraft under peculiar lighting conditions might have given the reported appearance. The estimated distance of 500 feet, if correct, should have allowed much more detailed observation. Probably the distance is grossly underestimated.

With 104 incidents thus eliminated, there remain thirty-four which contain some evidence but have no apparent ready explanation. This statement is true only under the assumption that the evidence is accepted as reliable and accurate. When psychological and physiological factors are taken into consideration, all of these incidents can be explained rationally, as pointed out by Rand Corporation and Dr. Fites of Air Materiel Command Aero-Medical Laboratory (see Appendix "F" and "G").

There are sufficient psychological explanations for the reported unidentified flying objects to provide plausible explanations for most reports not otherwise explainable. These errors in identifying real stimuli result chiefly from inability to estimate speed, distance, and size.

All of the remaining 34 incidents are treated in detail in this report. These incidents form no pattern in regard to area of sighting, type of object, or manner of performance. There are indications, however, that some sightings were influenced by earlier reports which probably would not have been considered unusual or reported had there been no publicity.

VII. Summary of NAC Evaluation of Remaining Reports

The remaining unexplained incidents (see Appendix "F") exhibited common characteristics. Two of them, by statements of the reporters, could not have been made had the witnesses not read of the Mt. Shasta incident (Incident No. 17). Most were distributed without pattern throughout the United States. A few were outside the U. S. No two descriptions of appearance or performance were exactly alike. The reported sightings occurred at various times of day and year.
