GREAT CAMPAIGN IN SUBDIVISION

Glendale and Vicinity Shows Much Activity, Reports Various Interests

Glendale today is the center of one of the greatest subdivision campaigns ever waged in Southern California.

While a great deal is being said about the property lying in Glendale, such as Glendale Heights, Verdugo Woodlands, Fairview, Oakridge, Glendale Gardens, Windsor Place, Glendale Villa, Foothill Gardens, etc., little is known of the development going on in the vicinity.

The Sparr Fruit Company ranch, it is authoritatively stated, will be placed on the market in the near future while two more subdivisions are being placed on the market at Montrose in addition to a half dozen others.

Active Campaigns In Burbank and Eagle Rock, surrounding Glendale, things are equally active and for the time being it would seem that the buying rush is at its peak in this vicinity. Deeds and mortgages would tend to prove this.

Twenty-five lots were sold Sunday in the Montrose and La Cresenta sections, according to Frank B. Turner, who has had considerable experience there. He reports that he sold his own home at the corner of Montrose and Ocean View avenues at a profit of \$650 in a month's time. He has bought the place at the corner of Ocean View and Mira Vista in which to reside.

BUSINESS SECTION OF HOYT, KANSAS, DESTROYED TOPEKA, Kansas, May 23.—Fire today destroyed the business section of Hoyt, fifteen miles north of this city. The loss will total nearly \$100,000.

GOVERNOR OLCOTT RENOMINATED, FIGURES SHOW PORTLAND, Ore., May 23.—Latest figures, compiled from almost complete unofficial returns from Friday's republican primary election, show Governor Ben W. Olcott was renominated over Charles Hall, candidate of the Federated Patriotic Societies and the Ku Klux Klan.

NEGRO CONVICTED OF ATTACK IS HANGED BY MOB MACON, Ga., May 23.—Jim Denson, 20-year-old negro, convicted and sentenced to hang on a charge of having attacked a 75-year-old white woman last January, was taken from the jail at Irvington, Ga., late last night by a mob and lynched, according to reports reaching here today.

CONGRESS INQUIRY OF WAR GRAFT IS SUSPENDED WASHINGTON, May 23.—Congressional investigation of the department of justice in connection with prosecution of war grafters by Attorney General Daugherty, has been suspended indefinitely, it was indicated by Representative Campbell, republican, of Kansas, chairman of the house rules committee.

LEAPS TO HIS DEATH FROM EIGHTEENTH FLOOR NEW YORK, May 23.—J. W. Gasteiger, 50, a hay and grain dealer, this afternoon leaped from the eighteenth floor of the Municipal building and was almost instantly killed. His body struck Samuel D. Jones, who was passing at the time. Jones was knocked unconscious and was taken to a hospital.

BANK CASHIER IS FATALLY SHOT BY BANDIT GANG SAN FRANCISCO, May 23.—Waylaid by three bandits as he was going to his home today, Alexander Rutner, night cashier at the Liberty national bank, was shot and probably fatally wounded by one of the hold-up men. They fled in an automobile after the shooting. It is believed that they were under the impression that Rutner carried large sums of money.

ATTORNEY AND REAL ESTATE MAN ARE INDICTED CHICAGO, May 23.—Indictments were returned in criminal court today against William A. Bither, attorney for the Chicago board of education, and Henry W. Kaup, a real estate man. The two men were charged with conspiracy to operate a confidence game to obtain money under false pretenses in connection with transactions involving the Forrestville, Wendell Philipps and Irving Park schools.

FIND BODY OF BOY CHASED TO SWAMP BY FATHER TUCKERTON, N. J., May 23.—The body of 10-year-old Henry Scheim, who was chased into a swamp by his father on May 8 while the father was chastising him, was found today in a small lake within the town limits here. The boy's face was bruised and immediate steps were taken to determine whether the bruises had been inflicted before or after death. The father, John Scheim, is a farmer.

ULSTER PLANS TO DEFEND AGAINST INVASION BELFAST, May 23.—Following the arrest early today of about 1500 alleged Sinn Feiners and republicans in Ulster province, the Ulster government took steps for recruiting 25,000 additional members of the Ulster special constabulary. The constabulary will be transformed into a regular army to defend the province from invasion. Orders for the recruiting of reinforcements came direct from Premier Sir James Craig. Sinn Feiners and republicans in Ulster are in panic and many are in flight.

LADY ASTOR GIVES STATEMENT ON PROHIBITION NEW YORK, May 23.—Thousands of friends and admirers of Lady Nancy Astor cheered and waved her farewell as she embarked today on the Aquitania for her homeward voyage in company with Lord Astor. Lord Astor's last act before going on board was to give out to the reporters a statement concerning prohibition, written by Lady Astor. "Prohibition, on the whole, is a good thing for America, I am convinced," Lady Astor declared. "I have talked with all sorts of people on the matter. I have been entertained in the homes of the rich and poor and believe the majority of people favor it, now that they have seen it in operation.

W. C. T. U. STATE PRESIDENT TELLS CONVENTION OF WORK STILL TO BE ACCOMPLISHED

Mrs. Eva C. Wheeler Speaks on Program Of Organization

The annual address of the state president, Mrs. Eva Craven Wheeler of Baldwin Park, was the feature of this afternoon's session at the First Methodist church of the W. C. T. U. convention.

"Exultant joy fills our hearts and loving praise lingers on our lips as we pause in our victorious march to set up the fortieth milestone on the glorious pathway of the W. C. T. U.," stated Mrs. Wheeler.

"Victory and W. C. T. U. are almost synonymous. For forty-eight years the W. C. T. U. has been in a constant contest with mankind's greatest foes and every year our beloved organization has been crowned with success. Every year victory has perched on our banners. God has led us on from victory to victory.

"In a beautiful spot on a rocky coast, watching the tides come and go one is reminded of the work of our organization: patiently, powerfully and persistently wearing away the rocks of prejudice and opposition, stimulating the indifferent, protecting and cleansing the minds of our youth from error and impurity, bearing the breezes of truth and blessing to the suffering and broken-hearted, sweeping away the blight of evil from their lives.

"First Great Victory "The first great victory of the year was the defeat of the anti-Medicine Beer Bill—defeated almost three to one. Then the navy went into the enforcement business. The changed attitude of the public press, especially that recently known as 'the wet press,' is most startling and encouraging.

"Rhode Island, the forty-sixth state, has passed an enforcement law. Only Wisconsin, New Jersey and California have failed to be loyal. "Thirty-two counties and 61 towns in California have passed some kind of a little Volstead law or ordinance. The enlightened women of our state, through their organizations have taken their stand as loyal citizens of the United States in support of the constitution and the proper enforcement of the law.

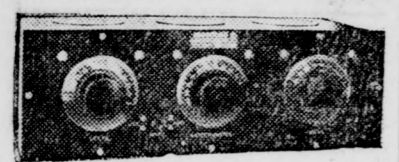

NEW APPARATUS AND DEVICES

By RALPH BROWN
RADIO ENGINEER, CUTTING AND WASHINGTON RADIO CORP.

A DETECTOR AND AMPLIFIER CABINET

The vacuum tube detector and two-stage amplifier cabinet illustrated has a few novel features which may be of interest. One feature is the aluminum frame which unites a front and rear panel in a rugged assembly. All rheostats, sockets and other parts are mounted in this metal frame. The sockets are arranged so that the tubes when inserted will stand vertically. Over each tube position there is a metal gauze protecting cap which can be lifted when a tube is inserted. The brilliancy of each tube filament can be observed through the gauze cap.



Both amplifier tube filaments are controlled from one common rheostat of ample current carrying capacity. A three position cam switch is provided as shown. The head telephones may be con-

nected to either the detector tube or to the two stages of amplification by throwing the cam switch all the way to the left and right, respectively. The middle position provides for extinguishing the filaments of all the tubes when the unit is not in use. When the switch is thrown to the left, detector position, the filaments of the two amplifier tubes are automatically cut off from the storage battery and are extinguished.

A potentiometer is mounted within the cabinet, which provides for critical adjustment of the plate voltage. The potentiometer resistance is connected across the filament or "A" battery, and the variable contact is connected to the plate circuit. Provision is made for changing the grid leak resistance, when necessary for maximum efficiency on various wave lengths.

The amplifying transformers used are constructed without lap joints, and the cores are of thin laminations. The transformer windings are properly proportioned to give large amplification with minimum signal distortion.

RADIO EXPLAINED

THE CURRENT INDICATOR

The pulsating direct current flowing in a receiving antenna cannot be seen, heard, smelled or in any way detected by a human sense without some kind of an indicator or translating device. There are many devices which might come to mind as being possible. But any device suitable for the purpose must be capable of responding well to very feeble currents. A highly satisfactory device is the magnetic telephone receiver, which contains two electro-magnets wound with rather fine insulated wire and so arranged that they act upon a rather thin metal diaphragm. When the electric current flows through the magnet windings the diaphragm is pulled towards the magnets, and the degree of diaphragm deflection depends upon the strength of the current flowing. When no current flows the diaphragm assumes a normal position. This normal position is that determined by the amount of attraction exerted upon the diaphragm by the permanent magnets of the receiver. An increase and decrease of the strength of current flowing through the magnet windings produce a corresponding pull and release of the diaphragm. If the current is a pulsating one the diaphragms are pulled and released once for each pulsation and will be forced to vibrate at the frequency of the pulsations. If the pulsations are at

such a rate that the diaphragm vibrations produce audible sound then a response which is perceived by the sense of hearing is produced. The tone of the sound depends on the rate of diaphragm vibration which, in turn, depends upon the frequency of the pulsations. The effective resistance of the magnet windings to very high frequency currents is very great, and currents of such frequencies cannot pass. This is the reason for rectifying the oscillations into pulsations of direct current. But again, if the pulsations are of a frequency which is beyond the ability of the human ear to detect, no sound is heard, even though the diaphragm should be capable of vibrating so rapidly. As a matter of fact, the diaphragm is not capable of vibrating to any extent whatever at such a high frequency.

If the radio waves sweeping across the receiving antenna system are damped there are groups of high frequency ether oscillations, and the frequency of the group production is made an audible frequency at the sending station. This, then, causes groups of pulsating current in the receiving antenna circuit, which contains a rectifier in series with the current indicator (telephone receiver). Take one group as an illustration. The rectifier allows current to pass, let us say, from the ground to the end of the antenna. This charges the antenna, since no current flows in the opposite direction during the group of pulsations. At the end of the group the antenna will attempt to discharge to ground through the rectifier and telephone. If the rectifier allows a small current to flow to ground this can be accomplished, but in practice it is advisable to connect the telephones around the rectifier so that the antenna charge can leak to ground through the magnet windings. For each group of oscillations, then, there is an accumulation of electric charge on the antenna which discharges to ground at the end of the group. The discharge takes place through the telephone receiver, since it cannot take place readily through the rectifier, which is in shunt to it. The groups are at an audible frequency rate, and, since there is one pull and release of the diaphragm for each group, the diaphragm will vibrate comparatively strongly at the group frequency.

Questions on Radio and Their Answers

Question: Can two pairs of phones be used on a crystal set? I have tried it but found the intensity greatly decreased. How should they be connected?—C. W. 1301 W. 38th Pl., L. A.

Answer: You can use two sets of head phones, but they should have the same resistance—that is, two pairs of 2000 ohm phones connected in series or in parallel should not greatly reduce the signal strength, but should you connect a set of 2000 ohm and 3000 ohm phones to the same set it will greatly weaken the signals.

Question: Please tell me if there are certain spots on a piece of crystal used in a crystal detector that are more sensitive than other spots, or when I find a sensitive spot on my crystal and hear the signals, is it useless to look for a more sensitive spot?—C. R. T., Glendale.

Answer: Some spots are much more sensitive than others, and as you are well aware there are other spots that give no results whatsoever. If you will hook up a buzzer on your crystal set, you will find that it will save you a whole lot of time in finding the sensitive spot, as, with this attachment to your set, you can quickly find the most sensitive spot on the whole piece of crystal.

Question: Please tell me the approximate price of a set containing a detector bulb and two steps of amplification?—H. B. W., Eagle Rock.

Answer: Without the bulbs, batteries or phones such a set retails around thirty-five or forty dollars. Figuring your detector bulb at \$6; your two amplifiers at \$5 each, call your "A" battery \$20 and "B" battery \$6, phones about \$10 would bring such a set up around \$95, and if you want a loud speaker on it, figure \$45 in addition.

VALLEY TO BATTLE WATERLOGGING RICH LAND

Owensmouth, Marian and Van Nuys C. of C. Plan Drainage District

Intensive irrigation and abundance of rainfall in the last two seasons have combined to cause a condition in certain parts of the San Fernando valley that will become serious if steps are not taken at once to remedy it, says the Van Nuys News.

In the flatter parts of the valley west of Van Nuys and through to Owensmouth the water level has risen until in many places it is within a few feet of the surface, with the result that several orchards have died and spots of alkali have been caused. If this condition, which is not serious now, is not recognized by the land owners and steps are not taken to provide further drainage, it will preclude the future development of about 6400 acres for fruit growing and other uses, and it will restrict the use of lands to alfalfa growing and certain kinds of vegetables and trees.

The remedy seems to be in the deepening of the channel of the Los Angeles river, which follows the lower part of the valley and the digging of several lateral ditches north and south through the territory affected. The development of wells by individuals for irrigation use would also help the situation.

The matter now has the deep consideration of the Owensmouth, Marian and Van Nuys Chamber of Commerce and the officials of these organizations are planning for an early meeting when the importance of forming a drainage district will be presented to the owners of the lands in the threatened area.

Walnut Growers Elect

The San Fernando Valley Walnut Growers' Association stockholders at their annual meeting elected Albert Brant, Mark Grimes, A. P. Stockwell, Elmer Ball and Mr. Chase as their directors. Later, the directors met and elected the officers as follows: Albert Brant, Owensmouth, president; Mr. Chase, Venice, vice-president; Mark Grimes, Van Nuys, secretary, and A. P. Stockwell, Lankershim, treasurer.

Deciduous Growers Meet

Spring and summer treatment of deciduous trees, including thinning of fruit, will be the major subject for discussion and demonstration at a field meeting May 23, at 2 p. m., on the W. F. Clark ranch, Vanowen street and Woodman avenue, Van Nuys, for deciduous growers, to be held by the Agricultural Extension service under the auspices of the Farm Bureau. An excellent program has been arranged. Dr. J. C. Whitten, head of the Division of Pomology and nationally renowned horticulturist, will speak on spring and summer treatment of "Deciduous Trees and Thinning of Fruit," following with a demonstration of his ideas.

Busy Making Soap

The addition to the Jergens soap factory at Burbank is just about completed and will be ready for use in ten days. This improvement will permit of an expansion of the present work and is much needed as the company is having a steady increase in orders. The plant is working now to full capacity and for a month was obliged to work several hours at night for three nights in the week in order to keep up with the demand.

The new directories of the San Fernando Valley, compiled by the Los Angeles Directory company, shows a large increase in the number of names over the one issued two years ago and is indicative of the rapid growth of population in the valley. The communities covered include Van Nuys, San Fernando, Burbank, Lankershim, Marian and Zelzah.

Set for Rural Comedy

C. H. Christie, producer of the famous comedy films that have proven so popular throughout the country, has become a Van Nuys ranch owner. Mr. Christie purchased last week the ten-acre, improved fruit ranch, owned by Roy S. Meade, and adjoining the ranch of Carl B. Barkla near West Sherman Way.
