

The flower attains a height of 6 feet, so headroom must be provided. Scored 91 points before the C. S. A. Committee, and was also awarded the Silver Cup as the best seedling of the year. Bud August 20th onward.

A seedling from Louisa Pockett, which it much resembles; of immense size. Late buds of this variety are occasionally splashed with lavender, in a very novel manner. It does not have the heavy foliage that makes Pockett somewhat of a problem for the cultivator, but the petals on the flower are twisted and whorled to a great extent. If the lavender shaded flowers are desired, select the bud the second week in November. For pure white flowers, take bud August 15th onward. Height 6 feet.

An exquisite deep crimson with an old-gold reverse. Petals are extremely wide and the wonderful combination of crimson and gold is strikingly attractive. Color is shrimp pink. Reflexing variety with the petals hanging down twisted and interlaced in a most pleasing manner. Very deep flowers with petals 9 inches in length. The shape of the flower is very much like that of James Fraser. Height 4 feet. Any bud after August 15th.

The letter A indicates the back of the garden, where the tallest plants have been placed.

The entrance would be a very suitable place for a trellis or arch, over which may be trained two climbing Roses.



The Little Perennial Garden



The Complete Garden \$20.00 One-half of Garden - \$12.00

THIS little garden may be placed on any open space of lawn near the house or porch and any backyard or city lot, twenty-five to one hundred feet in width would accommodate this compact garden and will give a variety of harmonious bloom outside and for cutting from early Spring until late Fall.

Orders for this garden may be received at any time and shipment will be made in the Spring, April 1st to June 15th, and in the Fall, September 1st to November 1st.

In laying out this garden, measure off the distances and drive in stakes at six outside corners and six inside corners, then stretch white cord from stake to stake and in this way the whole garden is outlined and it can be made straight before the digging is commenced. Cut out the sod, leaving clean edges and then dig and thoroughly prepare before planting.



PHYLLIS

A brilliant scarlet with green-gold reverse. Good reds are not any too plentiful and this splendid variety of scarlet and gold will find a welcome awaiting it. The stem is thin, but strong as a whip and the foliage ample for the flower. Height 5 feet. A late crown last of August gave us the best results, as the earlier buds are too crowded with petals. Certificated 86 points by C. S. A.

Large Japanese incurved, similar to Louiseau Rousseau in type and color; strong grower, stiff stem, with foliage well up to bloom.

White, with the faintest possible blush on petals. When well grown is a very fine flower, perfect in form and substance. Will rank with the finest of exhibition flowers. Growth about 5 feet in height. Bud August 20th.

LOUISA POCKETT

MRS. G. G. MASON

Very distinct variety; color blood red with a gold reverse, though very, very little of the gold reverse appears. Its marvelous color will make it eagerly sought for in making collections. Height 5 feet. Crown bud August 20th.

MRS. GILBERT DRABBLE

On an early crown bud from August 10th, this variety produces a marvelous flower; petals are arranged in a whorl, rendering them most attractive. Purest white in color.

MRS. J. LESLIE DAVIS (Pink Turner)

We introduced the original variety (white) in 1912, and two years ago we introduced the yellow variety. It is absolutely identical with Turner in every respect save color, which is a clear lavenderpink. The growth and habit are a duplicate of the original parent and no other description is necessary. Pink Turner will find a premier place on its own merits. Height 5 feet.

MRS. R. C. PULLING

Clear yellow, an English variety, tremendous in size, which has made a wonderful showing in some of the exhibitions. Height $5\frac{1}{2}$ feet. Crown bud August 10th and later.

NAGIRROC

Finest exhibition bronze we have ever distributed; color, deepest glowing orange-bronze, 45 inches in circumference; every petal reflexing, showing the color to the best advantage. This is the variety exhibited at the shows under the provisional name of Golden Champion. Every bud makes a splendid flower. Stem and foliage perfect. Height 5 feet. Any bud after August 15th. Certificated C. S. A.

POCKETT'S CRIMSON

The greatest thing in its color ever sent out. Crimson with a gold reverse. Makes a flower 9 inches across; splendid grower, with foliage right up to the flower.

PRESIDENT JOHN EVERITT

Color, very unique chamois-buff; when first openng the petals are very closely incurved, forming a perfect ball, 27 inches in circumference. As the flower develops, the center petals open outward and show considerable of the bronzy-crimson reverse. Very dwarf, robust grower, and one of the largest flowers in the collection. May be best described as an improvement on Chas. H. Totty, which has been for years the standard chestnut-bronze in the exhibition type. Petals long and graceful, with the habit of the plant leaving nothing to be desired in foliage or stem. Height 5 feet. Bud August 15th and later.

Warm, bronzy-red in color, with clean, heavy foliage right up to the flower. Certificated by the New York Florists' Club on October 14th. Take bud any time after August 10th. Height 5 feet.

QUEEN MARY

When taken on a bud in July produces an enormous flower; too early for any but the earliest exhibitions. Pure white in color.

ROSE DAY

One of Pockett's masterpieces, and named in honor of his daughter. An exquisite flower of rose-pink; the lower petals droop and the upper petals are beautifully incurved. Foliage carried right up to the flower on immense stems, holding up the growth which is most vigorous and healthy. Height, 4 feet. Bud August 20th onward.

VERMONT

A most welcome addition to our exhibition list of pinks. The flowers are of enormous size, reminding one very much of the old variety M. L. Rosseau. Every bud produces a perfect flower and we feel sure Vermont will rank as one of the very best pink varieties in cultivation. Bud August 1st to 15th. Height $5\frac{1}{2}$ to 6 feet.

ANTIQUE

A deep bronze sport of the favorite Dr. Enguehard. It is a duplicate of Enguehard in all respects save color. We recommend this variety to commercial growers where bronze varieties are popular. Treat similar to the parent in every way.

BRONZE UNAKA

A bronze sport of the popular Unaka and to the commercial men will be a very valuable acquisition, since there are no other bronze varieties coming in so early in the season, the first week in October. Color very attractive bronze; any commercial grower who can grow Unaka should also grow this bronze companion—which is a duplicate in growth, foliage, and everything else except color.

CHAS. RAGER

One of the best known incurving whites.

CHRYSOLORA

This variety can be briefly described as an early Col. D. Appleton, coming in 15 days earlier; is of larger size, stronger stem, not quite as tall, and in color is intermediate between this variety and Major Bonnaffon. Best buds are those selected August 1st to 15th.

CHIEFTAIN

A beautiful, incurving pink of perfect shape. Certificated in Boston, Philadelphia and Chicago. Perhaps the finest incurved pink commercial variety in cultivation today.

COLONEL APPLETON

At one time the most largely grown yellow in cultivation. It is too well known to need description.

White; fine, large blooms on very strong stems; largely grown for its period, which is early midseason.

ODESSA

Bright yellow, incurving form. A seedling from Merza, but much cleaner in growth.

ORANGE QUEEN

A burnt orange in color, coming at Thanksgiving time, its color in keeping with the season. Loosely incurved form, maturing November 20th from September 10th buds.

PACIFIC SUPREME

Bright pink, coming into flower about ten days after Glory of the Pacific.

POLLY ROSE

Splendid white. Very easily handled and grown in large quantities for the wholesale market.

ROMAN GOLD

Beautiful incurving bronzy yellow; excellent midseason variety.

SMITH'S ADVANCE

One of the earliest large flowering white varieties; can be had by September 15th.

UNAKA

The long-sought early October pink Chrysanthemum. A broad-petaled Japanese incurved of great depth and size for so early a variety.

WELLS' LATE PINK

One of the finest things sent out in its color in many years; flowering from November 10th onward. Crown bud after August 25th.

WHITE CHIEFTAIN



HARDY GARDEN SECTION

The varieties that follow are all perfectly hardy, providing they are grown in a section that is not too wet. If the stock plants are water-soaked all Winter, or frozen up in cakes of ice, they will not survive, but given congenial growing conditions and a slight protection of dry leaves with pine branches over them to prevent the leaves blowing away, they will come through without any trouble. Then in the Spring, after they commence to grow, they should be divided so just one shoot will remain to make the future plant. While the first frost will blast the flowers that are developed at the time, it will not injure the unopened buds, and the outdoor 'Mums can be enjoyed to their fullest extent all through the lovely "Indian Summer" weather.

PROTECTION

The best method of protection for the Hardy Chrysanthemum is as follows: After they are through flowering about the middle of November, cut the dead stalks down to within 2 or 3 inches of the ground. Cover the crowns over with dry leaves to a depth of 3 or 4 inches, and then place chicken wire or evergreen boughs over these leaves to prevent them blowing away. Be sure that all danger of frost is past before this covering is removed in the early Spring, and you will find your plants will come through with practically no losses.

Early Flowering Chrysanthemums

This type of Chrysanthemum deserves a place in every garden, coming as it does after the Summer flowers have begun to wane, and continuing to bloom profusely in most places until well into November. The cultivation of these 'Mums is simple: Plant them in a rich, well-drained piece of ground, setting out the plants a foot apart and pinching them once or twice during the months of May or June. They will branch out and make beautiful bushes and give the cultivator more return for the labor expended than any plant in the garden. There is a place for this type of 'Mums in every garden in America, whether one has greenhouses or frames, or not. Some growers who have grown these as pot plants have had great success with the same and we can recommend them highly for that purpose.







DAHLIAS

Culture.—The best time to plant tubers is from May 15th to June 15th, but green plants should not be set out earlier than mid-June. Plant 3 feet apart in the rows having 4 feet between each row. This will allow the plants to grow without crowding and the air to circulate through the plants.

The tubers should be planted 6 to 8 inches deep and laid in a horizontal position so that the growth will come straight up as it develops. Be sure that the tuber is placed with the eye upward and cover the same with about 2 inches of soil and fill in with more soil as the growth develops.





CULTURAL DIRECTIONS

The Gladiolus is a flower of easy culture and does well in any soil, but should be planted in full exposure to the sun. They will do well planted in the hardy borders or in front of shrubbery. Many of the best varieties produce small bulbs, and in buying a mixture you will find it much better when the size of the bulbs varies to a considerable degree. The largest bulbs do not always give the best results. It is essential that the bulb should be of blooming age rather than size. Soil should be well prepared in the early Spring, with a good coating of agricultural lime and bonemeal thoroughly worked into the soil, but fresh stable manure should be used only where the ground can be manured the previous Fall and well worked over in the Spring before planting.

Planting for cut flowers should be made in rows 18 inches apart, with bulbs 3 inches apart in the row, covering from 4 to 6 inches, according to the size of the bulbs; press the earth firmly around each bulb. Care should be taken to plant the bulbs right side up, and deep enough so that the new bulb, which forms on top, will not be pushed too near the surface. For succession of bloom, plant from the time the ground can be worked until

July 1st.

In cutting the flower spikes, it is ruinous to cut the stalk where the flowers end. There must be some foliage to lend grace. Cut the spikes so as to leave two or three leaves on your bulb root, thus giving you a flower spike sometimes nearly 4 feet long, leaving plenty of

strength for the bulb and beauty for the

decoration.

In shipping cut blooms of the Gladiolus, it is absolutely essential that they be shipped dry, after standing for a while in water.





ROSES FOR OUTDOOR PLANTING

Cultural Notes

The cultivation of Hybrid Tea Roses is as follows:

THE SOIL

The soil which best suits the Rose is a deep, unctuous loam, with free drainage, as Roses do not thrive where there is stagnant moisture. If these conditions are not to be had naturally, they must, as far as possible, be provided. In the first place, if drainage is bad, the soil must be thrown out to a depth of 18 inches, and, if it is not convenient to use tiles, about 5 or 6 inches of broken bricks or other rough material should be thrown in the bottom, and a layer of turf laid on top, grassy side down. On the top of the turf should be placed a layer of well-decayed farmyard manure, then a light layer of soil, and another layer of manure, on top of which should be placed the remainder of the soil, to which, if light and sandy, should be added a liberal supply of well-chopped-up turf, raising the whole of the bed to a height of about 12 inches above the original level of the soil. In case of heavy land, a layer of lime rubble should be added, as this will help to sweeten the soil.

PLANTING

Should be deferred until the soil is in proper condition to receive the plants, as it is a great mistake to plant in wet soil. Teas and Hybrid Teas should be planted about 18 inches apart and the Hybrid Perpetuals 2 feet apart, keeping all manure away from direct contact with the roots when planting. Firm the soil well around the plants and give a thorough watering.

PRUNING

All the short, prematurely ripened wood and all small shoots should be cut clean away, leaving just the strongest shoots from 4 to 6 inches long. Pruning should be done immediately after the plants are set out, if it has not been previously done.

This close pruning does not apply to the Hardy Climbers or Ramblers; these should be shortened back if they have grown beyond their allotted space and thin out the very small shoots.

PROTECTION

Before the ground freezes solid the soil should be pulled up around the base of the plants, 7 or 8 inches, and the surface of the bed afterward well covered with dried leaves or cornstalks. When so protected, even the most tender varieties of Hybrid Tea Roses are entirely hardy as far north as Winnipeg.

INSECTS

Caterpillars and rose grubs are the worst pests that attack Roses, and these should be destroyed by hand picking when they first appear. Green flies are also troublesome in most sections, but if the plants are syringed carefully with a solution of soft soap in the proportion of one pound to six gallons of water with some tobacco dust added to the same, it will be found effective.

MILDEW

This will appear on Rose plants in the early Autumn or during the Summer if the weather is very, very wet. The best preventative is Sulphide of Potassium used in the proportion of ¼ ounce to a gallon of water and sprayed on the foliage once a week, when the mildew first makes its appearance.

Before planting Delphiniums loosen the soil to a depth of 8 to 10 inches. Place the plant in the ground just as deep as it has been growing before. Spread out the roots and firm the soil well after planting and water at once. Do not use any manure. A light sprinkling of lime in the Spring and Fall will prevent the black rot. For Winter protection, cover after the ground is frozen with straw or marsh hay. Do not cover with leaves or manure, as these rot the crowns. A handful of bonemeal may be worked in near the plant after it is well established. Be sure they do not suffer from drought the first year.

HYBRIDS. CULTURE AND PLANTING

Do not use manure. Lime the throughly prepared bed well and give an annual top-dressing of lime in the Fall, with a top-dressing of bonemeal in early Spring. Do not plant in deep shade. Open woodland paths, if well drained, make admirable locations for broad masses of Iris, a notable example being the Iris Path on Admiral Ward's beautiful place.

Plant 3 feet apart and wait for clumps to form; or 1 foot apart for more immediate effect. Barely cover the rhizomes. Planting may be done at any time the ground is open, but the ideal time is through the months of July, August and September. The new growth is then active and the root quickly establishes itself for blooming next season. Late plantings should be mulched with leaves or straw, not manure.


Phlox makes a beautiful background for the earlier flowers in the border and add a riot of color when their blooming season arrives in early July. A careful selection of varieties will give a continuous show until Fall if properly handled. Cut back the flowering heads as soon as they finish flowering to prevent them going to seed, since it is the seedling plants that show the magenta color so often seen in the Phlox family.

Phlox should be planted from eighteen inches to two feet apart, and will quickly repay any expenditures in the line of extra care and fertilizers. They flower continuously from July until Fall, and are always very showy in a garden.

Phlox is sometimes attacked with mildew, and this is best treated by the use of sulphide of potassium, applied in the proportion of one ounce to two gallons of water.

All of the varieties listed herein, unless noted, will attain a height of from two to two and one-half feet.

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
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
