**"THE HOPE OF CANADA"**  
 BY RALPH SMITH, M. P.

Before a large audience in the Wallace Street Methodist church, Nanaimo, on Tuesday evening, Ralph Smith, M. P. delivered the following stirring discourse on "The Hope of Canada":

Introducing the above subject to this audience I desire to say a few words especially to the members of the Epworth League, consisting as it does of young people, all of which will take some bearing on the subject of my address, which will follow. I desire first to impress them with the responsibility of citizenship, apart altogether from party politics and in spite of the various beliefs and theories on all great subjects. There is an obligation for every individual to become intelligently interested in the affairs of state. The removal of national wrongs can only be accomplished by the active interest of an intelligent public, and the important part of the great public who must work for the present and future amelioration of the race are the young people of the country.

Next to this I would strongly advise you to have  
 Strong Positive Opinions

On all public questions. Well thought-out convictions and the strength of character to state them is the all-important quality. This, remember, does not in any way conflict with advancing thought; conclusions based on every-day experience. The world moves because we do, but the men who push it along most safely and determine its wise destination in different decades are the men who have well thought-out opinions, men who used their head when fads and fancies come their way and subject every proposal to a close logical scrutiny and win a manly courage and charitable consideration for the views of their opponents fearlessly hold and state what they believe to be right.

Then again I would remind you that things are never what they might be. Conditions always did need improvements, and always will. This will be so after you have spent your best energies when you hear of philosophers who proclaim the immediate ushering in of the millennium by their single conception, be sure you are dealing with fanatics. There is just as much difference between them and the really useful and practical man as between the intelligent physician and the quack; the former knows and admits that his powers are limited; he can aid nature, he can help her to remove obstruction and clear away abnormal growths, but he knows he cannot recreate a broken constitution or make a perforated lung do the work of a sound one. But the quack with his pills and plasters and potions will undertake to cure all the ills that flesh is heir to. There is a great work for us all to do in this new and glorious country, and our duty, therefore, is to seek to promote those principles which  
 Will Make Canada a Great Nation.  
 The first thing which gives us great hope for Canada is the fact of our possession of great advantages in

that great country, that the British spirit and thousands of original British subjects have in many respects been considered one of the sources of her greatness to-day. One of the great pillars in the Canadian edifice has been the superiority of British institutions as against certain countries who sought to maintain control of the destinies of Canada, and these people of an alien race are not afraid to announce to the world that they are not British subjects by force, but delight in their connection with this part of the British Empire as British subjects, because of what they know to be the Superiority of British Institutions.

The same may be said of British law. In every country of the world the great fundamental laws of England are emulated, and in every legislative assembly, when once a British precedent can be shown you are more than half assured of getting the consent of the legislative body to agree to your proposal. In England the law is made to be honored and respected; it is made after every kind of deliberation, after its necessity has been proved, and every man who comes under its power is glad to obey and promote the end for which it was made. There is not a great law in this country to-day which has not its precedent in British law, and the most important and valuable laws of British Columbia to-day—laws for the administration of justice, laws for the protection of life and limb, and every industrial enterprise—all have their precedent in British law. Combined with the people, British ancestors of British birth and trained under the great influences of every kind of social institutions connected with that great country, these things combined, to my mind, constitute The First Great Hope of Canada.

Again, Canada's privilege is her constant opportunity to learn from the faults of older nations. I desire for a few minutes to point out one or two of the important lessons which we have learned in this connection. With all the great things that I have said about the British government there are many things which we have seen fit to avoid.

There is a black list before the eyes of Canada written as national history which becomes a warning and a teacher to Canada. The mother country has borne the brunt of our sins, and has by her own sacrifices taught us how to escape the bad and acquire the good. Two or three of these great questions I will refer to. After centuries of British reforms we find ourselves free at the very beginning of our national career from

The Power of Landlordism.

This, in my opinion, is the secret of the commercial difficulties in England to-day. In Canada we have a free national heritage in the land; it is true we have already made mistakes by handing over to corporations the complete possession of large tracts of land, in others without taxation for periods long enough to make the purchasable land dear to the industrial settler, but the great domain is owned by the government and industrial settlers can possess for reasonable conditions and become absolute owner beyond the taxation of a landlord. But the land laws of England to-day have their foundation in the feudal system which is being buttressed by modern enactments up to date. Farmers are leaving the soil and have been for many years, as they are robbed by the landlords; crofters have been crushed out to make room for deer forests, thus the country is being sacrificed in the interests of the owners of the soil. In Canada we are free from these restrictions for thousands of acres of territory over the earth are taking up the free holdings of this country, where the farmer can reap the full fruits of his skill, industry and capital. The fundamental security of any country is unlimited ownership in the soil, for if you give a man possession of a bleak rock he will turn it into a garden, but give him, as they do in England, a ninety-year lease and he will turn it into a desert. But in Canada, with our small freeholds throughout the country the bulk of the population can have a

Hold on the Land.

By thereby creating the greatest possible safeguard for the independence of the country, for real patriotism will always follow possession, and this in my opinion is one of the greatest hopes of Canada. Then, we have learned a lesson in connection with manhood suffrage. In England to-day property retains the power, such qualifications being still necessary. The principle of democracy is still restricted on the question of Great fears have been expressed against a complete manhood suffrage. It was considered dangerous for the masses to have a vote, but in Canada we have complete manhood suffrage, and we do not think that the aristocratic fears of older countries have been realized. It is dangerous in any degree for the masses to have a vote, the experience of Russia demonstrates that it is more dangerous for them to be without it. Manhood suffrage is

The Political Safety Valve.

As there can be no revolution as long as there is a free vote, free speech and a free voice under all conditions. The 21 years of age should not be entitled to a vote as men. Then there is the further development, the democratic principle of increased state regulation of industrial enterprise which involves the great question of the better distribution of wealth and yet preserve the energy of the enterprise. I believe in maintaining individual capital, but that every industrial investment should be used and operated to a more reasonable benefit to the worker, and therefore lessening of the profits to the owner. In my opinion strict state regulations could be operated without impairing the energy of the investor to the greater benefit of the actual producer, for the state to own every power of production, in my opinion, would mean absolute

Destruction to the Individual.

Initiative, but as this is treading on controversial grounds, I am simply giving a personal opinion. Every person must work the matter out for himself, but everyone agrees that one of the greatest questions of the age is how to better distribute wealth, and in my opinion the following conclusion is the best answer to that important question.

The hope of Canada, more than anything else, depends upon the physical, mental and moral qualities of her citizens, and especially the young people.

Knowledge is power when associated with moral qualities. Moral character is the wise director of the man, and subjects every force to a right cause. We may be physically strong, and we may have great learning, but the proper utilization of these forces is dependent upon the moral wisdom of the individual, for knowledge dwells in heads replete with thoughts of other men. Wisdom in minds attentive to their own. Knowledge a rude unprofitable mass. The mere materials with which wisdom builds, till smoothed and squared and fitted to its place. Does not encumber whom it seems to enrich.  
 The real hope of Canada, therefore, depends first of all, upon her people. If the units are right the whole will be right. Individual effort first, organized effort next, state assistance afterwards.

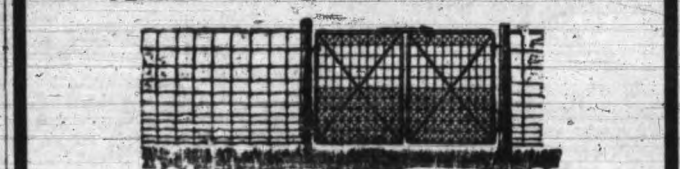

PURE WATER.

To the Editor:—A recent letter to the city council advocates the use of copper sulphate (an irritant poison) as a means of purifying the drinking water supplied to this city.

The writer of the letter in question assumes that the objectionable color and odor of the water, during the past summer, were due to algae. Although careful microscopic examinations showed that the water was overgrown with vegetation this is not surprising.

If the filter beds and other appliances at the water works were adequate and properly attended to there would be no cause for complaint. Truly things must have been grossly mismanaged during several years to produce results such as have been so apparent in the summer just past.

THE DEATH ROLL CONTINUES TO GROW

Later Details Regarding the Storm in South—Steamers Report Having Lost Number of Passengers.

(Associated Press.)

Havana, Oct. 20.—Reports of the damage done by the storm in the interior of the island continue to come in slowly. The estimate of the damage done to the tobacco crop in the province of Pinar Del Rio is not yet fully known, but it is believed to be great.

The principal havoc outside of Havana is reported to have been at Batabano, where seven men were drowned and the American steamships Campbell and Sara were wrecked and many houses were destroyed, and two hundred people were rendered homeless.

The brunt of the storm seems to have been sustained by the City of Havana and its suburbs. No more deaths have been reported.

It has now been ascertained that only twenty-four lighters were lost, four of which were loaded with sugar and the rest with various merchandise. The initial transports, Wright and Laupar, have arrived at Sagua La Grande.

Seventy Persons Drowned. Jacksonville, Fla., Oct. 20.—A special from Miami, Fla., says: The Mimal steamer St. Lucie was crushed by the high waves in Thursday's hurricane and out of 100 persons on board 35 were lost.

Peerless also lost about the same number, they being blown off the vessel. The launch Elmore was capsized, and it is thought to be a total loss.

Work-barge numbers 6 and 7 and dredge number 4, of the East Coast road, broke away and drifted to sea, but are now safe on the other side of Biscayne bay. The Peninsula and Occidental shed was badly damaged. No persons at Miami were hurt.

# ANNIVERSARY OF THE BATTLE OF TRAFALGAR

Just one hundred and one years ago to-morrow the battle of Trafalgar took place, giving the British such an overwhelming victory over the French and Spaniards as to place the nation in undisputed dominion of the seas. In that struggle the hero of the fight, Lord Nelson, received his death wound. But though his spirit departed, the memory of his indomitable courage, his splendid self-sacrifice in the country's interests, and his achievements will be always one of the most cherished among the many grand historic traditions of the British Empire.

"Nelson stands alone. There is no figure like unto him among all those who have ploughed the weary seas," is a tribute paid the British naval idol by Lord Rosebery. And it is safe to say that these words adequately express

command to come from their leader. While the British nation observes the anniversary of that great naval battle, the historic event which placed it upon a plane of superiority which it has ever since maintained, Lord Nelson should not be the only hero recalled. There were others who backed up their leader so nobly that their memory is worthy more than a passing thought. Let every true Briton think of Lord Nelson in conjunction with that coterie of officers, whose names are known to every student of history, who so nobly carried out those plans which enabled the commander to realize his ambition. And, also, let them not forget the British tar, humble in his position, but equally brave, equally devoted to his country, displaying that unquestioning faithfulness which has since been a

the sentiments held by all loyal citizens of the present age. The mere reading of the account of the engagement at Trafalgar, as given in British history, with no embellishments beyond the plain statement of fact, is sufficient to make the blood course more rapidly through the veins of the average Anglo-Saxon. But when in conjunction with this is taken the many incidents related illustrative of Lord Nelson's character there is imbedded in the student a love for the man himself, a feeling much the same, doubtless, as that which impelled the plucky British tars serving under him to walk unhesitatingly "into the jaws of death"

feature of naval discipline and to which is due Britain's supremacy upon the high seas. In short the battle of Trafalgar, although in it Lord Nelson shines above all others, was a triumph of a nation—so great a triumph that that nation will continue to celebrate its anniversary, as it recurs down through the ages to come.

Shortly after the battle of Trafalgar what was alleged to be the first bulletin from the grand naval army (the combined forces of France and Spain) date Headquarters Cadix, October 25th, was published in the *Moniteur*, a then prominent French newspaper. In the light of the facts as since disclosed it is exceedingly amusing and, to doubt, will prove of interest to readers of the Times. It follows:

"The operations of the grand naval army, second in the Atlantic, those of the grand imperial army in Germany. The English fleet is annihilated! Nelson is no more!" Indignant at being inactive in port, whilst our brave brethren in arms were gaining laurels in Germany, Admirals Villeneuve and Gravina resolved to put to sea and give the English a battle. They were superior in number, forty-five to thirty-three; but what is superiority of numbers to men determined to conquer? Admiral Nelson did everything to avoid a battle; he attempted to get into the Mediterranean, but we pursued, and came up with him off Trafalgar. The French and Spaniards, who had each other who should first get into action, Admirals Villeneuve and Gravina were both anxious to lay their ships alongside the Victory, the English admiral's ship. Fortune, so constant always to the Emperor, did not favor either of them—the *Santissima Trinidad* was the fortunate ship. In vain did the English admiral try to evade an action, the Spanish admiral, Oliva, prevented his escape, and lashed his vessel to the British admiral. The English ship was one of 136 guns; the *Santissima Trinidad* was but a 74.

"Lord Nelson adopted a new system, afraid of combat in the old way, in which he knows we have a superiority of skill, as was proved by our victory over Sir Robert Calder, he attempted a new mode of fighting. For a short time they disconcerted us; but what can long disconcert his Imperial Majesty's arms? We fought yard-arm to yard-arm, gun to gun. Three hours did we fight by this manner; the English began to be alarmed—they found it impossible to resist us; but our brave sailors were tired of this slow means of gaining a victory; they wished to board; the cry was 'a la bordage!' Their impetuosity was irresistible. At that moment two ships, one French and one Spanish, boarded the *Temeraire*; the English fell back in astonishment and fright. We rushed to the flagstaff, struck the colors—and all were so anxious to be the bearer of the intelligence to their own ship, that they jumped overboard; and the English ship, by this unfortunate impetuosity of our brave sailors and their allies, was able, by the assistance of two more ships that came to their assistance, to make her escape in a sinking state.

"Meanwhile Nelson still resisted us. It was now the second first board, and have the honor of taking him, French or Spaniard—two admirals on each side disputed the honor—they boarded his ship at the same moment—Villeneuve flew to the quarter deck—with the usual generosity of the French, he car-

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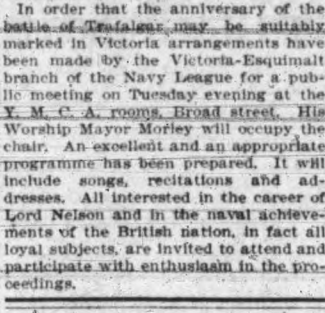

ried a brace of pistols in his hands; for he knew the admiral had lost his arm, and could not use his sword—he offered one to Nelson; they fought, and at the second fire Nelson fell; he was immediately carried below. Oliva, Gravina and Villeneuve, attended him with the accustomed French humanity. "Meanwhile fifteen of the English ships of the line had struck—four more were obliged to follow their example—another blew up. Our victory was now complete, and we prepared to take possession of our prizes; but the elements were this time unfavorable to us; a dreadful storm came on, Gravina made his escape to his own ship at the beginning of it—the commander-in-chief, Villeneuve, and a Spanish admiral, were unable, and remained on board the *Victory*. The storm was long and dreadful; our ships being so much more damaged, were driven ashore, and many of them wrecked.

"At length, when the gale abated, thirteen sail of the French and Spanish fleet got safe to Cadix, the other twenty have, no doubt gone to some other port, and will soon be heard of. We shall repair our damages as speedily as possible, so again in pursuit of the enemy, and afford them another proof of our determination to wrest from them the empire of the seas, and to comply with his Imperial Majesty's demand of ships, colonies and commerce.

"Our loss was trifling, that of the English was immense. We have, however, to lament the absence of Admiral Villeneuve, whose ardour carried him beyond the strict bounds of prudence, and by compelling him to board the English admiral's ship, prevented him from returning to his own. After having acquired so decisive a victory, we wait with impatience the Emperor's orders to sail to the enemy's shores, and complete the conquest of his navy, and thus complete the triumphant work we have so brilliantly begun."

In order that the anniversary of the battle of Trafalgar may be suitably marked in Victoria arrangements have been made by the Victoria-Esquamit branch of the Navy League for a public meeting on Tuesday evening at the St. M. C. A. rooms, Broad Street. His Worship Mayor Morley will occupy the chair. An excellent and appropriate programme has been prepared. It will include songs, recitations and addresses. All interested in the career of Lord Nelson and in the naval achievements of the British nation, in fact all loyal subjects, are invited to attend and participate with enthusiasm in the proceedings.

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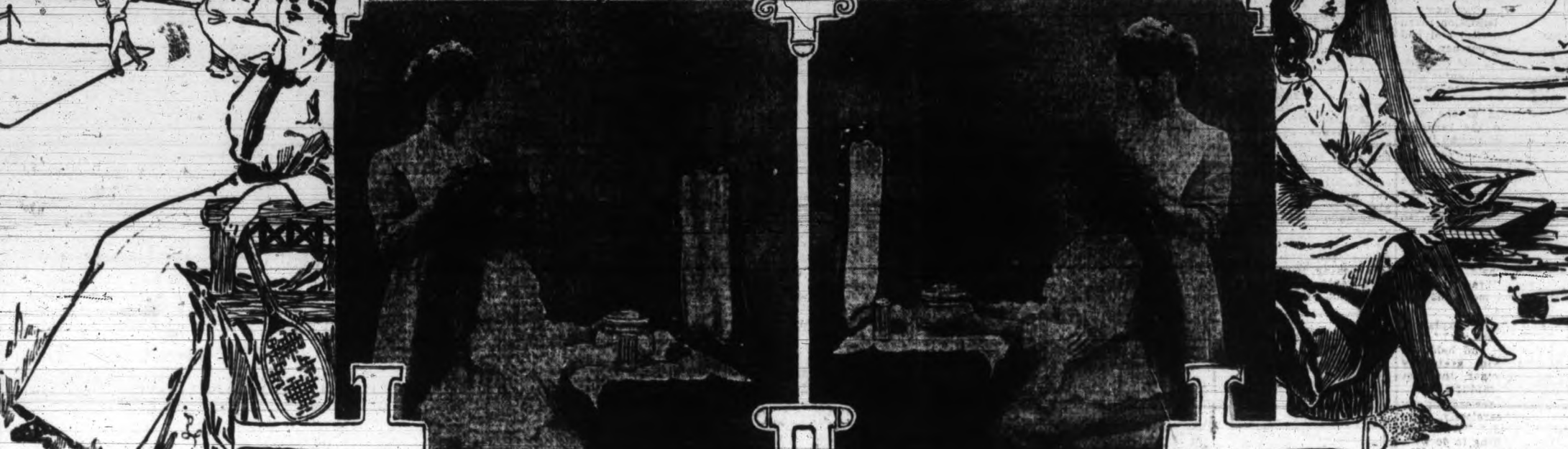
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# HAIR AND BEAUTY

## The After Effects of Summer upon the Hair



When Even the Scalp Is Sunburned

Massage with Rotary Movements

### Answers to Many Correspondents

JUST about this time of the year the hair often seems dull and lifeless and dry, and in color almost as though slightly bleached. Apparently, this condition has no connection with summer; in reality, it is caused by nothing in the world but the heat and dust of summer—a cause which doesn't show its worst effects until well into the fall.

Sometimes, if you have been where there's sea bathing, and haven't been particular about the drying, even worse troubles will result, the hair falling out in an alarming fashion, and seeming dead way into the roots.

At any rate, no matter how far the trouble has spread, don't lose any more time in getting at and removing it than it takes to get it out. For every day's delay only adds just that much more difficulty to the case.

When you reach your hair, if the scalp seems sunburned to the point of dryness, make a point of rubbing the least bit of vaseline well into it with the tips of the fingers, after hair and scalp are both perfectly dry.

Don't forget to rub the fingers with the vaseline, however; there must be no more applied than will sink into the scalp. If there is, it will only clog up the pores of the skin and prove a drawing-card for more dust.

One woman, whose hair was easily brought back to its best health, asserts she did it by rubbing vaseline (the cruder codoline is even better) into her scalp—applying it with the fingers, and letting it stay on for two or three hours before she washed her hair. By that time, she said, the hair was so softened up that it was easily washed and the scalp had absorbed enough of the oil.

Be careful when you apply vaseline or olive oil, to part the hair and rub it into the scalp down the line of each part, going over the whole head in the same way. This is a slow process and one which must be repeated every day. It keeps the oil from getting into the hair and matting it.

Rubbing is almost a necessity to stimulate the roots. Use rotary movements and sub-briskly until your scalp glows pink. This is very hard to accomplish

with some scalp, and while that in itself is no sign of an unhealthy condition of scalp or hair, when it does grow pink easily it is a sign of good condition.

It is best to shampoo rather frequently, while you are trying to get the hair into its best—and prettiest—condition again, especially if you follow the vaseline treatment after shampooing. Do it every two weeks for a couple of months, and, if possible, in the daytime, in clear weather, giving it a good sunning while it dries.

Don't comb it out until it is perfectly dry, and then take your time to it; and, in spite of advice you may receive from certain disbelievers in brushing, brush your hair regularly. The only danger point about brushing is when the brush is not kept spick and span. Use a hairbrush with a water (or borax and water) at least once a week, and give your hair a thorough stroking a day, if you can, as they used to do in the old days when coiffures were of as much moment as they are rapidly passing with us.

If your hair seems disposed to be brittle, keep it as long as possible, especially when you are shampooing it, and let the brush do as much of the work of the comb as possible. Sitting erect in a chair, bend the head from one side to the other and then roll the head to the right, left and forward. Another good position is to let the arms hang loosely at the side. Raise the shoulders as high as possible, then forward, down and backward until a circle is formed. Continue this for a time and then reverse the motion. Do this every day for five or ten minutes.

Again, stand perfectly erect with the arms at the sides, lift them up vertically, inflating the lungs as the arms ascend. At the same time rise up on the tips of your toes and throw your head back, at the same time touching the backs of the hands overhead. As the arms slowly descend exhale from the lungs.

It is good, also, to rub cocoa butter on the neck every day.

**Hair Seems Lifeless**  
I DESIRE to explain to you the condition of my scalp and hair. The scalp seems perfectly dry, and the hair has not grown at all since the summer. It is very close to the scalp, and seems to be dead. I have used many of your formulas for dandruff, and it helped very much. However, I have noticed another formula, which I used, but with no satisfaction. Is this the last formula you used for dandruff? If so, persist in using it.

**To Remove Dandruff**  
Tincture of cathartide, 1 ounce; liquid ammonia, 1/2 ounce; oil of clove, 1/2 ounce; thyme, 1/2 ounce; rosemary oil, 1/2 ounce. Mix and use as directed.

**Tea Hair Tonic**  
Black tea, 1 ounce; glycerine, 1/2 ounce; alcohol, 2 ounces; infusion of hops, 1/2 ounce. Mix and use as directed.

**Weaken the Formula**  
I have read with much interest your recipes for beauty seekers, but my own attempts at home manufacture of same have not been successful. I have tried your "Witch Hazel Cold Cream" and "Orange Flower Cream," which of the two is better for a massage cream, and can be used for any other purpose? I have a cream after trying almost every one on the market which I bought in this city several years ago, but my complexion is not improved. Also, do you know of anything that will make a face white by combing it through the hair? Your recipe for hair curler would be too stiff for what I want.

**To Fatten the Neck**  
I think the orange-flower cream is better for your purposes (if I understand the situation), since it is a skin food and good flesh builder. The other cream is especially good for a sore, scratched skin, as it is healing and astringent in nature. I do not know of any place where these are already prepared. By taking the formulas that are

rather leave well enough alone, as I have never used anything on my face.

**Blackheads and Acne**  
Can you give me a remedy for blackheads and acne? I have a large number of blackheads, some of which feater. At other times, small hard bumps appear on the face, and these are troublesome at all times. This condition has been present for several years. I have tried various remedies and have not succeeded. **Cure for Confluent Acne (Moinin)**  
Apply the following mixture to the affected parts: morning and night, 1/2 ounce; zinc, 1/2 ounce; salicylic acid, 1/2 ounce; potassium iodide, 1/2 ounce. Use only a little of the same.

**Marked From Smallpox**  
Will you please tell me of some good skin ointment to remove the marks of smallpox? I was vaccinated twice, but the marks are still there. I would like to know if you could advise me better than any other.

**Treatment for Blackheads**  
Get the correct cream's hair face scrub brush, a bland toilet soap, a little good cold cream or toilet cream, and a few ounces of common washing soda. If the black points are very distinct, press them out, if not, scrub the face morning and night with hot water into which you have put a bit of the soda about a half pint in size to each quart of hot water; soap the brush precisely as you would wear, you going to use it for your hands, and scrub the face thoroughly.

**Obstinate Freckles**  
Oxide of zinc, 1/2 ounce; sulphide of bluish, 1/2 ounce; desprin, 1/2 ounce; glycerine, 1/2 ounce. Spread the paste upon the freckles at night before going to bed. In the morning remove what remains with a little powdered borax and sweet oil.

**Massage With Cocoa Butter**  
Would you kindly let me know of something that will keep the hair in curl? Please advise me what I should do to get my neck and shoulders developed.

**Likes the Orange Flower Cream**  
Will you kindly give recipe for cucumber cream as soon as convenient. I have had the recipe, but gave it to a druggist, and am unable to get it again, and would like to have some made while cucumbers are in season. I think your orange-flower cream is the best skin food I have ever used.
