#### INTRODUCTION.

One of the first qualifications for success in Print-Collecting is a clear idea of what one intends to gather together, joined to a will sufficiently firm to keep its possessor within the bounds he has set himself.

There are many divisions in this interesting pursuit. Some collect Portraits to illustrate an age of history, literature or science; another will have nothing to do with anything outside a certain narrow, well-defined period of the world's life; whilst a third finds pleasure in bringing together Prints—portrait and other—illustrative of the district of his residence or the county of his birth. Hence my own interest in Wiltshire Portraits and Views.

My regret is that I did not take up this hobby earlier in life. Had I but done so on first coming into the County, my collection would have been larger and more satisfactory, and doubtless would have been obtained at a considerably smaller cost. A casual reference to Chaloner Smith's "Catalogue of Mezzotint Portraits," is sufficient to show that a quarter of a century or so ago, the cost of good

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Prints was appreciably less than at present; and it was less difficult to obtain them then, than now.

In putting together this Catalogue my object has been to make it of use for reference not only by myself, but by others who take an interest in the History of the County.

I do not pretend to give biographical sketches of the personages represented by the Portraits, but merely furnish sufficient particulars to identify them with the County.

The Portraits are placed under three heads :----(1) The Pembroke Family; (2) the Bishops of Salisbury; and (3) Miscellaneous Personages.

It has seemed to me that, by reason of their close association with Salisbury for so many centuries, the Pembroke Family, and the Bishops of Salisbury, call for special attention, and for a prominent place in this Catalogue.

A great deal has been written from time to time on the subject of Prints, setting forth the several modes of reproduction, and enumerating and describing the Pictures produced by the various artists and methods since the introduction of engraving; even in the small Collection which I have got together, the rise and fall of the art is clearly to be traced. To illustrate this, take the Pembroke Family Prints. The Portrait of the 1st Earl (of the present creation) from the "Heroologia," 1620, shews the style of line engraving when it was coming into general use; the Portraits of the 3rd Earl, by Voerst, 1623 (see illustration), and L. Vosterman, the 4th Earl, by Hollar and by Van Voerst, and the 5th Earl, by Lombart, show it still advancing; whilst the height of the perfection attained by Mezzotinting, as an art, is evidenced in the Portraits of the 10th Earl, by J. Watson, and that of his wife, by Dixon, both Portraits being after Paintings by Sir J. Reynolds. Following these, the Portraits of the succeedings Earls and their relatives degenerate in quality; whilst now-a-days one finds but lithographs or photogravure prints, and has to be content with such.

I have not given the exact sizes of the Portraits, but described them as folio, quarto, octavo, &c., as the case may be. Mezzotint and Stipple engravings are so recorded: with few exceptions, all the others are line engravings.

The Topographical Prints are arranged alphabetically under the towns and other places of residence in the County.

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# THE PEMBROKE FAMILY PORTRAITS.

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WILLIAM HERBERT, THIRD EARL OF PEMBROKE. See p. 16.

HERBERT, SIR WILLIAM, first Earl of Pembroke of the second creation (1501 ?---1570), grandson of William Herbert, Earl of Pembroke of the first creation (d. 1469); Esquire of the Body to Henry VIII., 1526; married a sister of Catherine Parr; was granted the dissolved abbey of Wilton, where he built part of the present mansion; buried in St. Paul's.

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HERBERT, HENRY, second Earl of Pembroke (1534?—1601), elder son of Sir William Herbert, first Earl; educated at Peterhouse, Cambridge; styled Lord Herbert, 1551—70; married Catherine (sister of Lady Jane Grey), 1553, whom he subsequently repudiated. Succeeded as Earl, 1570; married secondly, Catherine, daughter of George, Earl of Shrewsbury; and thirdly, in 1577, Mary, daughter of Sir Henry Sidney, and sister of Sir Philip Sidney.

This Earl, when Mr. Henry Herbert, in 1550, was appointed to the Mastership of St. Nicholas' Hospital, Salisbury, which he continued to hold till he resigned in 1577; he was buried in Salisbury Cathedral.

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- HERBERT, MARY, Countess of Pembroke (1561– 1621), sister of Sir Philip Sidney; married Henry Herbert, second Earl of Pembroke, 1577; suggested composition of her brother's "Arcadia" (first printed 1590), which she revised and added to. She survived her husband upwards of 20 years, and died at an advanced age at her house in Aldersgate Street in 1621; her remains were removed to Salisbury and placed near those of her husband in the family vault in the Cathedral.

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SIDNEY, SIR PHILIP (1554—1586); born at Penshurst, Kent. A chivalrous English soldier, a poet, and a great favourite at Court. SIR PHILIP SIDNEY. The true Portraicture of that Learned & Valiant Sr. Philip Sidney, Governour of Flushing, & ye Castle of Ramekins, who was slaine at Zutphen the 17th of Octob., 1585, & Honourably Interred at St. Paul's, London. Undescribed. 4to. HERBERT, WILLIAM, third Earl of Pembroke of the second creation (1580—1630), eldest son of Henry, second Earl of the second creation ; educated by Samuel Daniel, of New College, Oxford ; succeeded as Earl 1601 ; patron of Ben Jonson, Philip Massinger, Inigo Jones and William Browne (1591— 1643) ; thrice entertained James I. at Wilton ; died 10th April, 1630, and was buried in Salisbury Cathedral.

HERBERT, PHILIP, Earl of Montgomery and fourth Earl of Pembroke (1584—1655); younger son of Henry Herbert, second Earl of Pembroke ; matriculated at New College, Oxford, 1593 ?; favourite of James I., and Gentleman of the Bedchamber, 1605—25; created Earl of Montgomery, 1605; succeeded his brother William Herbert (1580—1630) as Earl of Pembroke and Lord Warden of the Stannaries, 1630; patron of Massinger and Vandyck; addicted to sport, re-built front of Wilton House, and laid out gardens; died January 23rd, 1655, and was buried in Salisbury Cathedral.

- CLIFFORD, ANNE, Countess of Dorset, Pembroke and Montgomery (1590—1676); heiress of George Clifford, third Earl of Cumberland; married, firstly, 1609, Richard Sacville, Lord Buckhurst (Earl of Dorset, 1609), claimed the Barony of Clifford, 1628; married, secondly, 1630, Philip Herbert, fourth Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery (died 1655); lived unhappily with both husbands; inherited the Clifford Estates, 1643; wrote an autobiography.

On their left, their daughter, Anna Sophia, and her husband, Robert, Earl of Caernarvon; before them, Lady Mary, daughter of George, Duke of Buckingham; and above, in the clouds, are two sons and a daughter, who died young.

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HERBERT, PHILIP, fifth Earl of Pembroke (1619– 1669), second son of the fourth Earl of Pembroke, whom he succeeded in 1655; received the honour of a visit from Cosmo de Medici, A.D. 1669, and conducted him to Salisbury and other towns, and to Stonehenge; buried in Salisbury Cathedral.

PHILIP HERBERT, fifth Earl of Pembroke. Anton Van Dyck, p. P. Lombart, sc. Fol.

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# HERBERT, GEORGE AUGUSTUS, eleventh Earl of Pembroke, and eighth Earl of Montgomery (1759 –1827); General; son of Henry Herbert, tenth Earl of Pembroke; entered the Army, 1775; became a General, 1812; M.P. for Wilton, 1784–1794; succeeded to the Earldoms, 1794; married in 1787, Elizabeth, daughter of Joseph Beauclerc, fifth son of Charles I, Duke of St. Albans. The Earl married secondly, in 1808, Katherine, only daughter of Count Woronzow, by whom he had issue the Right Honble. Sidney Herbert (father of the present Earl), and four daughters; he died October 26th, 1827.

HERBERT, ROBERT HENRY, twelfth Earl of Pembroke and ninth Earl of Montgomery (1791– 1862), son of George Augustus Herbert, eleventh Earl of Pembroke; succeeded to the title in 1827; married in 1814 the Princess Octavia Spinelli, daughter of the Duke of Lorraine, and widow of Prince Rubari, who died in 1857. This Earl, who resided during the greater part of his life in Paris, died 25th April, 1862, and was buried in that City.

- HERBERT, SIDNEY, first Baron Herbert of Lea (1810—1861); Statesman; second son of George Augustus, eleventh Earl of Pembroke; educated at Harrow and Oriel College, Oxford; Conservative M.P. for South Wilts, 1832—60; War Secretary during Crimean War; married, 1846, Mary Elizabeth, daughter of General Charles Ashe a'Court, and niece of the first Lord Heytesbury. In 1863 the Statue of Lord Herbert of Lea in Salisbury Market Place was unveiled by Earl de Grey.

Sidney Herbert (afterwards Lord Herbert of Lea) in 1846. Soon after the death of her husband she embraced the Roman Catholic faith; wrote and published many books.

- HERBERT, GEORGE ROBERT CHARLES, thirteenth Earl of Pembroke and tenth Earl of Montgomery (1850—1895), son of Sidney Herbert, first Baron Herbert of Lea, whom he succeeded in 1861; succeeded his uncle in the Earldoms, 1862; Under-Secretary for War, 1874—75; married, 19th August, 1874, Lady Gertrude Frances Talbot, daughter of the eighteenth Earl of Shrewsbury, and died without issue 3rd May, 1895; he was buried at Fugglestone Church. A statue of this nobleman stands near the entrance to Wilton House. It is the work of Alfred Gilbert, R.A., who has produced a good portrait of the deceased Earl in the uniform of a Colonel of the 1st Wilts Rifle Volunteers.

- HERBERT, SIDNEY, fourteenth Earl of Pembroke and eleventh Earl of Montgomery; born 1853; succeeded his brother in 1895; a Lord of the Treasury 1885—6; M.P. for Wilton 1877—85; M.P. for Croydon 1886—95; Mayor of Wilton 1899—1900, in which latter year the 800th celebration of King Henry the first's Charter took place. His lordship married, in 1877, Lady Beatrix Lambton, daughter of the second Earl of Durham, by whom he has issue two sons and two daughters.

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WYVIL, ROBERT ( d. 1375), born at Stanton
Wyvil, Leicestershire; Bishop of Salisbury, 1329;
recovered the Castle of Sherborne and the Chace of
Bere for the See; died at Sherborne, September 4th,
1375, and was buried in the Choir of his Cathedral.

Dodsworth, in his "History of Salisbury Cathedral," says :-- "His ordinary mode of life "displays the energy, activity and purity of his "character. At four in the morning he rose, and "having attended prayers with his family at five, "and in the Cathedral at six, he devoted the rest of "the forenoon to his beloved studies. After dinner "he received suitors of every class; and acted as "arbitrator in the accommodation of disputes. At "nine in the evening, he called his servants to "account for their conduct during the day, and "having offered up his prayers in the Chapel, with-"drew to his studies 'till midnight." He died at Monckton Farley in September, 1571, in the fiftieth year of his age, and was buried in the Choir of his Cathedral.

ABBOT, ROBERT (1560—1617), Bishop of Salisbury, 1615—1617, elder brother of George Abbot, Archbishop of Canterbury; born at Guildford, in Surrey, and, after receiving his education at the Grammar School of that place, removed to Balliol College, Oxford; one of the Chaplains in Ordinary to James I., 1603; Master of Balliol, 1609—1615; Fellow of Chelsea College, founded by James, 1610; died March, 1617, and was buried in Salisbury Cathedral.

BURNET, GILBERT (1643 - 1715), Bishop of Salisbury; born at Edinburgh; educated at the University of Aberdeen; ordained priest in 1665 by the Bishop of Edinburgh; married 1671, Margaret Kennedy, daughter of the Earl of Cassilis (d. 1685); married secondly, Mary Scott (d. 1698), and thirdly, in 1699, Elizabeth, widow of Robert Berkeley; offered the See of Chichester 1678; attended the deathbed of the Earl of Rochester; attended Lord Russell on the scaffold; outlawed by James II., 1687; obtained from Mary, consort of the Prince of Orange, a promise to place power in William's hands; advised Sophia of Hanover of the intended invasion of England; drafted William's "declaration"; accompanied William to Torbay and London in 1688; Bishop of Salisbury, 1689; preached the Coronation Sermon; appointed to attend Peter the Great, 1698; attended William on his deathbed, 1702; spoke against Sacheverell, 1710; wrote a "History of his own Times" (published 1723-34). Dodsworth, in his "History of Salisbury Cathedral," says that during the intervals of Parliament he regularly preached the Thursday lecture at the Church of St. Thomas in Salisbury; and on Sundays continued his system of pastoral instruction in the churches of the City or its neighbourhood. He died March 17th, 1715, and was buried in the Parish Church of St. James, Clerkenwell.

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
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
