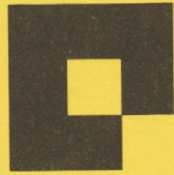

TOURNEYS SET FRIDAY, SATURDAY

Rochester Institute of Technology will be playing the role of the underdog as the Tigers host the 15th annual Invitational Basketball and Wrestling Tournaments Friday and Saturday, Dec. 1 and 2.

Joining the defending RIT squad in the 15th annual Tech Tourney will be basketball teams from Ithaca, Alfred University and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, making it an all-Independent College Athletic Conference (ICAC) competition. Ithaca and Alfred replace University of Scranton and Brooklyn Polytechnic.

In the seventh annual wrestling classic, RIT will host defending champions Brockport, Notre Dame, Colgate, Akron University, Syracuse, University of Rochester and St. John Fisher.

Colgate, Fisher and Syracuse are new additions, replacing Scranton and Case Western Reserve.

In the opening round of basketball competition, Ithaca and Alfred meet in a 6:30 p.m. tipoff. RIT and RPI will clash in the nightcap at 8:15 in a renewal of the final last year when the Tigers came from behind to edge the Engineers, 74-72.

The consolation game starts at 6:30 Saturday and championship play is slated for 8:15.

Preliminary rounds in the wrestling competition get underway at 12:30 Friday with quarter and semi-finals to follow. Consolation eliminations start at 12:30 on Saturday and the finals are slated for a 3 p.m. start.

The Bevier Gallery is located in the James E. Booth Memorial Art Building on RIT's Henrietta campus.



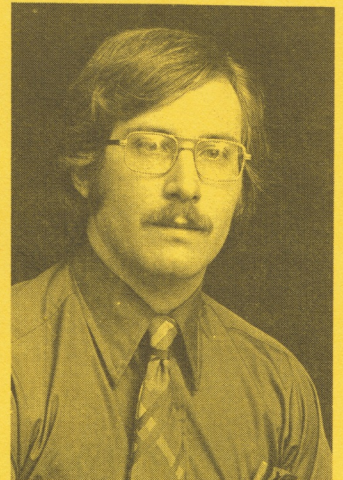

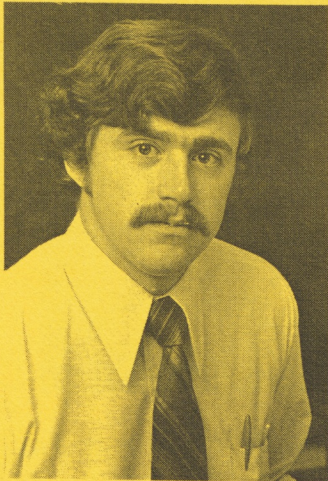

WOODWARD ELECTED TO BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Dr. Kenneth W. Woodward, executive director of the Neighborhood Health Centers of Monroe County, Inc., was elected to the RIT Board of Trustees at the board's meeting Nov. 20 in Ingle Auditorium.

Dr. Woodward, who has his undergraduate degree from Ohio Wesleyan University, received his medical degree from the University of Rochester Medical School in 1953. His specialty is pediatrics.

Dr. Woodward has held faculty appointments at the University of Nebraska and the University of Rochester. His hospital appointments have included service at Meyer Rehabilitation Hospital in Omaha, Neb., and St. Mary's, Genesee, Highland and Strong Memorial Hospitals in Rochester.

Dr. Woodward is a member of, or has been a consultant to, a number of local

and national medical and health boards, agencies and commissions. His most recent professional work has been in the fields of community medicine and ambulatory health care. He has served with the Monroe County Health Department, Baden Street Settlement in addition to his current work with the Neighborhood Health Centers.

In nominating Dr. Woodward, Alexander D. Hargrave, chairman of the Board's Nominating Committee, said:

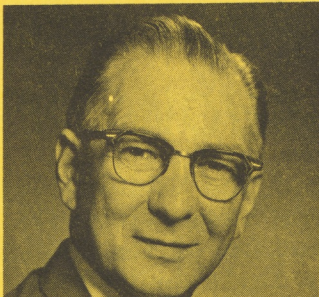
"As RIT expands its curriculum in social work and explores the possibilities of new programs related to the allied health professions, Dr. Woodward's background and experience can be of inestimable value."

WITMEYER TO RETURN TO TEACHING

Director and Professor... which is my role?

For about twenty years Stanley H. Witmeyer has held both titles. But as the School of Art and Design at Rochester Institute of Technology has grown to be one of the largest and most respected among colleges of art, his post as Director had to be full-time. He did his job exceedingly well. Now Mr. Witmeyer has asked to return to his first love: the closer association with small groups of students as their professor.

It is interesting that this man, whose experience covers the range of artistic expression, has chosen to develop and teach in a foundation program: Creative Sources and Fundamentals of Design.



Professor Witmeyer feels that here, at the onset of a student's professional education, he can make his greatest contribution.

Witmeyer is at home among his peers in the national and local scene, as artist and art educator. His own works have been widely exhibited, although he will tell you that he derives more pleasure from helping young artists find their own individual role and achieve recognition. To accomplish this, he took the presidency of the Rochester Art Club in 1952, and was a director of the Rochester Arts Council from 1959 to 1969. He has had positions of responsibility in the Eastern Arts Association, the National Art Education Association and the New York Art Teachers Association. Perhaps more than any other person, Witmeyer prepared the way for RIT's accreditation with the prestigious National Association of Schools of Art.

Most of the 120 students accepted by the School of Art and Design each year -- and an even greater number who aren't -- were interviewed, and their portfolio screened, by Mr. Witmeyer. Many who were not yet ready were given the kind of encouragement and direction that led to re-application and acceptance later. While a firm believer in the highest standards for the School, he recognized that standards are not arbitrarily set, but are the cumulative result of achievement by its students and faculty.

This is the artist-teacher. What else of this man? As an undergraduate at RIT, Witmeyer captained the 1936 basketball

team, later playing professionally with the Buffalo Bisons and the Rochester Seagrams. In 1971 he was inducted into the highly selective RIT Sports Hall of Fame. The State University at Buffalo, where he completed his bachelor's degree in 1939, named him its Distinguished Alumnus in 1968. RIT Alumni voted him Outstanding Alumnus for 1971.

The director now steps aside; the teacher -- always present -- will again dominate. Those who strive to become professional will have in the ranks of their mentors another proven professional - artist in the craft, molder of artists to be. For Stan Witmeyer, and for art students of the 70's, it's a happy choice.

MINORITY SUPERVISORS ATTENDING WORKSHOPS

Twenty RIT supervisors of personnel from various departments within the Institute are attending Supervisors' Awareness Workshops sponsored by the Industrial Management Council and Rochester Jobs, Inc.

Groups of 4-5 will be attending workshops as they are offered over the next few months. The first workshop started November 20 at the Chamber of Commerce building.

Everett Merritt, director of personnel, and James Papero, administrator Affirmative Action believe this program will play a vital role in the Institute-wide affirmative action training efforts.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE TO BE FLEXIBLE

Personnel Director Ev Merritt reports that the Institute is providing a more flexible, individual schedule for taking days off during the upcoming holidays.

Merritt said RIT will close, of course, on the two Mondays, Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

During the period starting with Monday, December 18, 1972 through Tuesday, January 2, 1973 there will be two additional days off, (for those who work during that period) which may be taken between those dates on any days chosen by the employee and agreed upon by his/her supervisor.

Departments should gauge their own operations, services and responsibilities during this two and one-half week period to decide how individual days may best be scheduled, Merritt said. It's feasible that an entire department may close on a certain day, however, that should be reviewed and cleared in advance with the appropriate Dean or Vice President.

STUDENTS DONATE \$2,000

The RIT Student Association has donated \$2,000 to the Horton Child Care Center Scholarship Fund. The scholarship monies will be available beginning winter quarter to qualified full-time day students who enroll their children in the center.

According to the center's director, Gerda Dymysza, a committee will be set up at RIT to dispense the scholarship money.

The Horton Child Care Center is located in Riverknoll, and was formally dedicated on November 2. Twenty children between ages 3-5 are enrolled.
