It appears clear that Mr. Rotapert was the sole cause of all the jealousies which have heretofore existed against our country; the *Registro Oficial*, of the 21st May will explain the whole.

WAR AMONG THE INDIANS.  
It appears that a kind of exterminating war has broken out, between the Cherokees, Shawnees, Delawares, and other tribes of northern Indians, lately removed to Texas, and the Tawaccas, Wacos and Comanches. Col. Bran writes from Nacogdoches under date of the 29th of May, to a gentleman in this place, that the Cherokees, Shawnees, and Kikapoo have gone to war with the Tawaccas and Wacos that they have had one battle, in which the latter lost thirty killed, and the former five.

San Felipe de Austin, July 22.

Basin of National Unity.—We learn that the packet ship Francis 1st has brought out a pair of slippers for the President of the United States, and another pair for the honorable Secretary of State, presents from the Emperor of Morocco.—*N. Y. Journal of Commerce.*

We presume that the President and his chief counsellor will not venture to put on those slippers without sending another message to Congress. If the Emperor of Morocco intends, by this present to signify that he has obtained the length of the feet of the greatest and best, as well as that of the Great Magician, we hope the two distinguished who have been favored with such slipper emblems of esteem, will refrain from giving any written acknowledgments of the accuracy of his measurement. We feel something for the sagacity of our country, and we are excused by recent events for being peculiarly sensitive on the score of its character for grammatical knowledge, which has been put in imminent peril by the present Administration. If the report made at the last session relative to the death of the *Bolivian* had not settled the fate of the slippers, we may expect some grave and protracted deliberation, and out of Committee next session on the subject of their fate. It is to be regretted that the multiplying perplexities of the Cabinet should have received this unexpected addition of this critical moment. But an immediate friend, &c.

New York, July 21.  
Another gentleman, James Hosmer, passenger in the Kentucky from New Orleans, appeared before Justice Hopson yesterday morning, with a complaint against the young Spaniard, of having robbed him of two hundred dollars on the passage. Mr. Hosmer was permitted to visit the prisoner in Criddlewell, and upon his return produced to Mr. Hopson an order for two hundred dollars, signed by him, which was promptly paid out of the 500 dollars taken from him when arrested. The officers searched his trunks, where, besides the elegant gold hunting watch found upon his person, they found two gold patent lever watches, with gold chains, seals and keys, and two diamond breast pins and other articles of jewelry.

Biddle and his squadron were lying. Commodore Randolph.—By the following communication, it will be seen that our Extraordinary Minister to the Emperor of all the Russias, has commenced playing similar fantastic tricks to those he enacted on board of the ship Alexander, Capt. Baldwin, in which he embarked for England two or three years since, in the Delaware. Not content with his title of Minister Extraordinary, he has attempted to grace his name with a naval appellation, by usurping the command of the ship. There is no doubt of the fact; for the annexed article comes from a most honorable source—from a man, who, in the brighter age of the republic—when youth made the man—stood high in the confidence and council of his country. We marvel at the forbearance of Capt. Perry. The Minister should have taken a turn below.

I have been sickened for many years with John Randolph; and his last jumps at Norfolk make a dose for a man of stronger entrails than I possess. The truth is, he is, except by fits and starts, an enemy to man, woman and child—his vanity is extreme—wrapped up in himself, he believes that the waters of command, and that the eyes of all men are turned to him to obey. His speech, his toasts, his addition to the toasts of other guests, at the dinner given him by people of the Borough of Norfolk, are all fresh instances of his pride, vanity and impertinence—but his airs to Captain Perry, commander of the ship which is to carry him to Russia, were beyond all bearing. The ship, ready for sea, lay off Norfolk's Point, some 7 or 8 miles below Norfolk, waiting for his coming. He came on board in the afternoon of the Dinner-day, and desired Capt. Perry to go under way. Captain Perry informed him that his surgeon and purser were in Norfolk. Randolph said, he need not wait for them; that he now directed the movements of the ship! She however, did not sail till next morning. So, if Randolph did undertake the command, Perry did not obey him. Had Perry been like some officers of another nation that I have heard of, he would have ordered him below, and confined him to his State room. Undoubtedly his conduct on board conduct on board the Concord will, as it did in the ship he went to England in, eventuate in a quarrel with the Captain, and every body on board—and ten chances to one, the Captain's conduct will be so represented to his Government, as to cause a Court of Enquiry at least. What is to be hoped from his Embassy I know not—but this I am glad of, that his impertinence and folly will have to go through an interpreter; and though folly may be translated, impudence they will not dare to render into the Russian language. He is the most improper man in America for a mission to that Court. No Great Britain he might do, as there he could cover ungracious manners, and even rudeness, by sycophancy and roach-eating to the great, as was the case when he had there some few years since.

Unfortunately for him, Catherine is not on the throne—on looking at the Ambassador, she would say, with Lady Margaret Boscawen, of Carlisle, “turn him out.”

PROCLAMATIONS.

JOAQUIN MOSQUERA, President of the Republic of Colombia, to his countrymen.  
COLOMBIANS.—The part which we represent in the great drama of Nations is interesting not only to us but to all South America. We are now presented with a most suitable occasion of offering to the world a powerful example of morality and virtue, of regenerating Colombia, of exterminating anarchy, and of enforcing the laws, the only means by which popular feeling can be restrained, and liberty established. The constituent congress has given you the means of expressing the national will through the deputies elected by your own free will. The Liberator of Colombia has withdrawn in order to calm the apprehensions of the friends of liberty; he has laid aside his laurels, and has quitted every pretext for disorder.

At this important crisis, the representatives of the people have committed to my charge the provisional administration of the Republic. I have this day sworn to the Constitution; and our adhesion to that alone is the only means by which all can act in concert and by which Colombia may be saved from the dissolution that threatens her. The pure love of country is the sacred light by which I am guided, and what more can you ask from a man like me, suddenly drawn from the private walks of life to be the faithful minister of your will? If you desire more, your honor, our glory and the national interest demand that you should express it, and the credit of promoting the good of the country will be yours.

Citizens, of all opinions, unite for the interest of the country. What is past will be forgotten. They are not true friends of freedom who desire to excite a new revolution.  
COLOMBIANS, now is the time to increase our glory, and to perpetuate our political existence. Let us set an example to the new states of our continent, and let us show our detractors that we are not unworthy to be free.

The most atrocious murder ever heard of in New Orleans, was perpetrated last night on the person of an unfortunate woman who slept, Mrs. Widow Gaston, of an advanced age, and the mother of grown children, was found in her bed and weeping in her blood. It would appear that this murderer had either hidden himself in the house, or had got into it by one of the windows of the bedroom, which the lady was in the habit of leaving open. At all events the monster took so well his precaution, that he executed his horrid design without being heard by the two young ladies who slept in an adjoining room, nor by the tenants of the upper story. The victim received eleven strokes of a hatchet or knife, any one of which would have sufficed to kill her. Five or six were given on the neck and the others were on the breast and stomach. The assassin took hold of the keys of the door, which were placed under the pillow of the deceased, opened it without noise, and took away a bag containing a few hundred dollars in specie. With respect to the author of the crime, has not been arrested, but we think nothing will be neglected by our police to apprehend him, and give him up to the vengeance of our laws.  
Another murder was committed last evening on the person of one J. P. Lewis by one P. Roder. The murderer has been arrested. We have not been able to learn the particulars.  
A new born child, of the male sex, apparently white, was found this morning, in a coffin, in front of the old burying ground. It was wrapped up in a piece of cotton cloth. From the extravasation of blood around its eyes, its mouth and its forehead, and from the marks of fingers around its neck, no doubt could remain but that the poor little creature was murdered by those who had begotten it.
