Extract from the act of incorporation. SEC. 4. Be it further enucted; That the owners of real estate situated in the State of Louisians, and who are citizens thereof, shall be the only persons entitled o subscribe, and shares so subscribed, shall be transferable only to such owners until after four year, when they shall be transferable to any owner of real estate in this state, whether citizen or not, provided, however that to secure the capital or interest of said bank mortgage shall be given to the amount of four millions of dollars on property situated in the city of New Orleans and its suburbs.

SEC. 8. Be it further enacted, ife. That to secure the payment of the capital and interest of said bonds, the subscribers shall be bound to give mortgage to the sutisfaction of the direction on property to be in all cases at least equal to the amount of their respective stock which mortgages may bear on cultivated lands and slaves, on lots with houses or other ediffice ielding s revenue. That the said mortgages may also be created on lands not cultivated but susceptible of cultivation. and on vacant lots; Provided, that no more than one fifth of the stock of each stockholder may, be secured by mortgage on unimproved lands not included in any plantation, and on vacant lots in the city and suburb of New Orleans. Ne mortgage on slaves alone shall be received. That, when a mortgage shall be offered on hands and slaves the value of the land shall be equal to least two thirds of the stock for which the morigage shall be given. That houses and other buildings mortgaged to the bank, shall always be insured against the risk of fire, and the policy of insurance transferred to the said institution, but it shall not be necessary to

insure buildings on plantations. That no mortgage shall be received on a brick house or other brick buildings for more than one balf. of its value; and on a frame house for more than one fourth its value. That no one shall be permitted to subscribe until he shall deliver to the commissioners a motogial act of sale, or patents or certificates of confirmation from the said commissioners of the United Sintes, or partition sales and adjudications by a decree of a coart of justice verified according to law, or such other evidence of title to the property proposed as a guarantee to the bank, as may be deemed satisfactory (o said commissioners or directors. That property al ready mortgaged may be received as guarantee; Provided, that the direction shall first deduct from the whole value of the property at least twice the amount of value of the property at least twice the amount of said mortgages, and then grant such only on the excess remaining after such abduction; Provided, however, the mortgage existing on said property shall not prevent the board of said bank from receiving them as accurate for stock when the sum to be losted is to be employed in the extinguishment of said mortgages.
