SAVANNAH, Jau. 29. of the last session—we are told that the crop of the United States is short; that we cannot have at most above 1,150,000 bales, and that there has been an increased consumption in Great Britain of 5 per cent. as compared with 1833—these two iteins do not make a difference of more than 100,000 bales—wis: the difference between the crop of the United States of 1833, 1,205,000 bales, and that of 1834, (assuming it to be as stated above at 1,150,009,) would be only 55,000 byles, an increase of 5 per cent. in the consumption (Bolton, Ogden and Ce's-Circular,) of Great Britain in 1834, on 900,000 bales,




