

As a border for the vegetable plot, or planted in a row beside the vegetables, they will thrive under the same cultivation and not only decorate the garden, but provide beautiful cut flowers for the home, or other purposes.

As the largest growers of gladioli in the world, we take pride in making this collection the outstanding value in the gladiolus field, in spite of the handicaps imposed by war conditions, which have seriously advanced costs and reduced production.

Each of the eight varieties is recognized by fanciers as among the finest in its color. With this collection, for a fraction of what a single SHIRLEY TEMPLE







bulb of any one of these varieties would have cost a short time ago, you will have a gladiolus garden which few can equal.

The bulbs in this collection are not first size, but they are of flowering size, such as we use for growing exhibition flowers. They take a little longer to bloom than larger

PICARDY

bulbs, but the size and quality of flowers are equal to the products of larger bulbs, and the crop of bulbs for next year's planting is likely to be greater.

Vaughan's gladiolus farms are centered at Ovid, Mich., on Michigan Route 21, 13 miles west of Owosso. The farms begin to show flowers about July 15 and from then until October are a sight worth seeing. Visitors are welcome during the flowering season.

EVERBLOOMING HYBRID TO SOLVE SALES S

A LL these Roses will bloom in your garden this summer, if planted according to simple directions furnished with the plants. Before winter comes they should have borne for you hundreds of lovely blossoms, beginning in June and continuing without interruption until killing frosts. Our plants are finest two year budded plants that are produced. The varieties are of the newest type, some of the very latest to make their debuts. Plant dormant Rose bushes as soon as the soil thaws and dries out enough to be prepared properly. As soon as dormant Roses are properly pruned and planted, hill them up with 3 or 4 inches of moist soil. This keeps the wind from drying the plants and helps them to leaf out more quickly. Remove the soil gradually as the plants begin to grow.

FLOWER SEED CULTURES—HOW TO SOW

NFIVE paragraphs below, designated A, B, C, D and E, we cover in considerable detail the methods of starting flower seeds which are available to the amateur without a greenhouse, and which cover well the needs of an outdoor garden. In the flower seed section in the case of each flower listed, information is given as to the cultural methods which can be used for that subject.

While our cultural instructions are definite, detailed and exceptionally thorough, they should be supplemented by reading in good gardening books and by obtaining, at first hand, advice from successful gardeners in your neighborhood. Success in gardening requires study, and the opportunity for enlarging one's information and trying out new things is one of the most fascinating features of gardening.

Sow in the bed, border or row where the plants are to grow. The soil should be loamy, with well pulverized surface. With heavy soil inclined to cake and crack, it is usually best to grow plants in a seed bed (B) and transplant to the permanent place. Loosen the soil where seeds are to be sown, with the trowel, or hoe, several inches deep. Rake smooth. Broadcast small seeds and cover them lightly four or five times their diameter. Very small seeds may be merely pressed in. Larger seeds may be planted singly, well covered, but more thickly than plants are wanted. Firm the soil well over the seed. Watering now becomes of great importance. At no time should the soil be allowed to become hard and dry, yet excessive watering may cause the seeds to rot, sour the soil, or cause "damping off." When the plants appear, thin them out, allowing each to grow singly, without crowding. The distance between them is governed by their ultimate size and spread. Excess plants may usually be moved to a new location.

Sow in outdoor seed bed, to be transplanted. The seed bed in the open should be of loose, mellow loam, raised slightly above the surrounding surface, and preferably surrounded by a wooden curb, to prevent rain washing across it. It should not be wider than four feet, so it can be worked easily. Shelter from high winds is valuable, but damp and shady corners are not desirable. Full sun is advisable when seedlings are up, while shade when needed, as in midsummer for percnnial seedlings, is best supplied by a lath or cloth canopy, which can be removed in damp and cloudy weather. Sow the seeds in rows which may be as close as five inches. Sowing and watering are the same as described in "A" above. Seedlings may be transplanted when they make true leaves, the second pair of leaves to appear; or they may be left until larger before being moved to their permanent location. Perennials should be moved from the seed bed to a nursery row, to grow until fall before being moved to the border.

Sow in flat, pot or pan outdoors or in a cold frame. This method is applicable to slow germinating subjects, some of which may take a year to germinate. Fill the receptacle with potting soil as described in "D," firm the soil and broadcast the seed, covering four or five times their diameter. Place the receptacle in a shaded location, where there is free air circulation. During the spring, summer and fall, water often enough to prevent soil from drying out.

A mulch of peat moss will help retain moisture. In winter, place in a protected place outdoors and cover with leaves. Have patience with slow germinating subjects; do not disturb too quickly. Any live seed will eventually grow if given time enough, provided soil, moisture supply, etc., are right. When seedlings appear and make true leaves, transplant to pots, nursery row or permanent location. If moss forms on soil surface, sprinkle fresh earth over top.

Sow indoors in a box, pot or pan. This method may be followed where there is a window facing south, enjoying sunlight most of the day. Use a standard florists' pot or pan (shallow pot) or a "flat", which is a shallow box, with holes bored in the bottom for drainage. Cover the drainage holes in pot or box with broken pottery; fill with potting soil. This is a mixture of half sand and half black loam. It may be obtained from florists. Firm the soil, and sow the seeds in rows, marking each row to identify the sowing. Water by setting the box or pot in water, so that it soaks up from below, or use a fine spray which does not wash the soil. Place in a dark place, covered with a wet newspaper blanket until the seeds sprout. As soon as sprouts appear bring into full light. Cover the box or pot with glass to check evaporation, but when moisture collects on glass wipe it off, and prop up one end of the glass to allow air to circulate during the sunny part of the day. A temperature not below 50 degrees at night, or 75 degrees by day, is best. Do not allow the soil to dry out. When the seedlings have made true leaves (the second set), they should be transplanted to other flats, giving at least two inches of space apart; or they may be moved to small pots or to an outdoor seed bed or border.

Sow in a hot bed or cold frame. A cold frame or a hot bed heated by manure or other means may be used. The best method with flower seeds is to sow seeds in flats, which are placed in the frame. With manure heated beds, seeds should not be sown until the temperature of the newly made bed has dropped to 90 degrees. Watering and ventilation are important. On sunny spring days, always prop up one end of the sash to prevent overheating, which may occur quickly and cause spindly growth. Do not allow the soil to dry out. When the seedlings have made true leaves, they should be transplanted to other flats, spaced two inches apart each way; or to the soil in the hot-bed, or to an outdoor location, if late enough.



Plan to Produce Without Waste

Grow the vegetables your family will eat and put up for winter, and no more. Below shows the space in a garden row which should produce one serving for a family of four. Serve three vegetables dishes a day (exclusive of potatoes) for maximum nutrition, two for dinner (one a raw salad) and one for lunch. Estimate the number of times each week you would like each vegetable to appear on your table, then lay-out your planting to produce all needs next summer and winter.

The figures which follow are based upon the assumption that your gar-den is well fed, with at least the equivalent of 4 pounds of Vaughan's Lawn and Garden Fertilizer, or Balanced Plant Ration, for each 100 square feet. In poor, or unfertilized soil, more room will be needed.

Plan for All Season Harvest

Many vegetables have a short harvest period. Your sowings of these must be divided into two, three or more plantings, to spread the harvest throughout the season.

Below we give the approximate time that one sowing will remain in top condition after harvest begins. Plan your second sowing so that when this period is ended, a succession crop will be ready for your table.

In spring your second sowing, made in warmer weather, will probably mature quicker than your first; so space your sowings a little longer apart than the harvest period.

But summer sowings will mature more slowly as a rule, so third and fourth plantings should be closer together to allow more time to mature.

First sowings of beans, carrots and beets will bear all summer (provided the beans are kept picked clean) but young plants of these usually give best results, so division into several plantings is recommended.







Hardy Lilies for Spring Planting

ARDY lily bulbs, of 1943 crop, carried over the winter in cold storage, may be planted in the spring, and will blossom in midsummer, when the garden needs their glory.

Lilies are truly among the most beautiful of all bulbous plants. They are especially suitable for planting in herbaceous borders, and enjoy a position where they are protected by the shade of surrounding plants. Light, well-drained soil is recommended. Bulbs should be planted 5 to 6 inches below the surface, and to prevent the accumulation of excessive moisture, surround the bulb with coarse sand and fill in with a mixture of fibrous loam and leaf-mold.

Many varieties are termed "stem-rooters"—that is, they develop roots on the stem up to two or three inches from the ground. These roots are voracious feeders, and on them depend greatly the number and size of flowers. When they appear, the plant should receive a top dressing of good rich soil on which they can feed freely.

For the smaller varieties, plant in clumps, the bulbs about 6 inches apart, leaving more space for the strong and larger species. The most striking mode of planting is in groups of 3 to 9 bulbs in a mass.

Lilium Canadense (Meadow Lily)

The whole plant has a downward, graceful movement and looks like a slender, tiered green belfry ringing golden bells. The flowers are nodding, bell-shaped, with petals flaring out and turning back slightly. They are heavily dotted on the inside with purplish brown dots. Blooms the end of June to July. Leonard Holden Vaughan

Born March 8, 1880. Died September 11, 1943.

Leonard Holden Vaughan, President of Vaughan's Seed Store, died on September 11, 1943. He had been President since 1924, when he succeeded his father, John Charles Vaughan, who founded the business in 1876.

Born in Chicago in 1880, Mr. Vaughan was educated in the Chicago public schools, and in Armour Institute Academy, from which he graduated in 1899. After six months in the University of Chicago, he was enrolled in the department of horticulture of Cornell University, during the period of Prof. Liberty H. Bailey's active teaching. He was graduated in 1903 and at once entered the business.

After a training period he was placed in charge of the vegetable seed and green-house departments, and soon instituted and managed extensive seed and bulb growing operations, in which he took great interest, and which were constantly expanded during his life.

When he became President, he was thus equipped with thorough scientific training and twenty-one years' active participation in the business.

Following the example of his father, he devoted much time to furthering the interests of horticulture. He was President of the American Seed Trade Association in 1911, of the Society of American Florists in 1929, and of the Illinois State Florists' Association in 1941 and 1942. He was constantly active on committees of many organizations and just before his death, had been appointed a member of a committee of the seed trade to work with the O.P.A. on price ceilings. He was also interested in outside community activities, having been a member of the Lyons Township High School Board for nineteen years and president of that School Board for four years.

His interest in bulb growing, first concentrated on Gladioli, led him to undertake extensive experiments in commercial production of Tulip and Lily bulbs, which had never been successful in this country. When war interrupted imports from Holland and Japan, he had built up the largest tulip production in this country which thereupon became available for American use. Our Lily bulb production was also well under way in Louisiana and Oregon.

In 1904 Mr. Vaughan married Anita Wilkens, who survives with six sons and one daughter. His sons are John Charles Vaughan; Leonard H. Vaughan, Jr.; Gager Throop Vaughan; Lieut. Alan W. Vaughan, U.S. Army; Ensign Warren L. Vaughan of the U.S. Coast Guard; and Ensign Edward H. Vaughan, U.S. N. His daughter is Mrs. G. Raymond Donnersberger.

Mr. Vaughan was succeeded as President of the company by his eldest son, John Charles Vaughan, who, for several years has been manager of the New York branch. The new President was graduated



from the horticultural department of Cornell University, and passed several years in acquiring experience in seed an bulb production in various countries of Europe, and sections of this country. He assumed charge of the New York branch in 1930, since when he has acquired familiarity with all departments of the business.

Carl Cropp, Vice-President, who has been head of the flower seed department of the company for nearly sixty years, continues to be active in that position. He is known internationally as a specialist in annual and perennial flower seeds, and for several years he has been assisted by his son, Carl V. Cropp.


