



"The difficulty the city is in is that it doesn't know where it stands as far as revenue is concerned. It has no idea what it can expect from the Government in the way of assistance. That is all very well, but we have absolutely no way of knowing how much we can expect from that source—it may be a large amount or it may be only a few dollars, depending upon the rate of profit the Legislature decides to make on liquor sales. If some of the members of the Legislature have their way there will be no profit made on liquor sales and then our prospects won't be bright. I very much fear that after the Act has been navigated through the stormy waters of the House there won't be much in it for the municipalities.

"We must have more revenue or else the Government must take oversome of our expenses so that we shall go to the Union convention with the intention of making vigorous representations on taxation matters.





The School Board can now eliminate all the extraordinary estimates or refer them to the people in the form of several bylaws. Before any action is taken, however, a committee of the Council will consult with the Trus-tees in an endeavor to reach a com-

The college, he argued, was saving Victoria parents money and was giving two years of University work to many students who otherwise would be unable to pursue their studies past the High School stage.

Technical School Question.
The Council passed over the college item and took up the School Board's annual estimates, some \$20,-000 of which, City Solicitor H. S. Pringle stated, was extraordinary. A sum of \$7,500 to pay for the construction of the first unit of a technical school was the largest single amount included in the extraordinary estimates. Alderman Aitken argued that, if the city failed to carry on technical education here, Aitken argued that, if the city failed to carry on technical education here, it would be failing in its duty to some eighty boys who had commenced technical work. If the course were abolished now all money spent upon it in the past would be wasted. City Comptroller, J. L. Raymur, reminded the Council that if the school estimates were to go before the people the submission of five separate by-laws would be necessary. 



EXTENSIVE GROWTH

The requirements of India are doubtful. A good monsoon would stimulate demand, especially after the poor imports of 1920; but the country is well stocked with precious metal, and coinage is out of the question. The prospect of Chinas demand is also uncertain. So much depends upon the power of China to export goods, and the ability of Europe to pay for them. It can be taken for granted, however, that the interior of China is unusually well stocked with silver, and that confidence is being restored in official issues of notes.

"The world as a whole would have good reason to welcome the return of the prices of silver to a pre-war level. The persistent advance in the price of this metal has much to do with the increase in the prices of commodities, the reason being that the Allies had to depend so largely upon the products of the East, chiefly from India, with whom the world balance of trade has always been—unless the monsoon proved a failure—heavily in her favor. Wheat, rice and beans, jute, cotton, hides and Skins figure largely in the useful goods which come from India and China, It was the rise of the cost of such items as these which stimulated that of other commodities in the markets of the world.

In Mr. Charlesworth's opinion there is afgeneral feeling among teachers that arbitration should be made compulsory in cases of acute disagreement rather than leave the schools to be closed as the only means of bringing about a settlement, and probably some action will be taken by the Teachers' Federation to suggest that a Board of Reference composed of a representative of the Trustees' Association and one from the Teachers' Federation, with a neutral chairman, shall be provided for and given power to act in cases where a crisis seems imminent.


