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The opportunities

- Many help materials on English Wikipedia were designed prior to [VisualEditor](#)
- Existing help videos for Wikipedia that are shown on the <https://en.wikipedia.org> domain are few and are often antiquated.
- Existing on-wiki help pages are often [walls of text](#).
- The Wikipedia Adventure was designed prior to VisualEditor, takes about 35-45 minutes to complete, and is generally completed in a set sequence.
- The Teahouse is a generally successful help project that can be leveraged.

The opportunities

- A number of affiliates as well as WMF are interested in increasing the number of contributors and contributions from [GLAMs](#), [educational institutions](#), [STEM](#) institutions, and other mission-aligned organizations, such as the U.S. Government organization [NIOSH](#).
- For [edit-a-thons](#) and workshops, it is not always possible to have an experienced Wikimedian available.
- Time spent learning Wikipedia and Wikimedia Commons is time *not* spent creating or uploading content, and time is precious in many contexts including classes, edit-a-thons, and workshops.
- The practicality of Internet-delivered video as an instructional modality is increasing as the availability of high-speed Internet connections becomes more widespread.

The opportunities

- The limited population of experienced Wikimedians who help others often spend our time repeating the same information. Mentors' time could be used more efficiently if well-designed instructional materials are available that cover common tasks and answer common questions, preferably in multiple languages.
- A video series in modular format will allow instructors, mentors, and new Wikimedians to select the video modules on an à la carte basis.

Project basics

- 40 to 60 minutes of view time for all modules
- Shortened 20-minute module set available for time-limited circumstances
- 9-month project timeline (originally 6 months)
- Project budget of \$8804.92, excluding WMF staff time
- Possible tracks of modules
 - General Wikipedia editing
 - GLAMs, STEM institutions, and mission-aligned organizations
 - Health content ([MEDRS](#)) editing
 - Translation courses in education programs

Measures of success

- Viewership targets:
 - 5,000 views of the video modules within one year post-publication
 - 20,000 views of the video modules within two years post-publication
 - 50,000 views of the video modules within three years post-publication
- Positive feedback received on feedback forms; a link to the feedback form will be displayed in the video.
- Positive community sentiment from experienced Wikimedians.
- Positive sentiment from educators, students in education programs, and GLAM representatives who watch the video in the first 3 months after publication and are individually asked for their feedback.
- At least two success stories, one each from a Wiki Ed Foundation supported class and one from a GLAM organization, about how the video helped them to achieve their goals or motivated them to contribute.

Project timeline (subject to change)

- Research
- Grant approval process (December 2015)
- Gather community input (January 2016)
- Script outline (January - February 2016)
- Script drafting (February 2016 - May 2016)
 - Midpoint report (29 March 2016)
- Production starts (June 2016)
- Public rollout (August 2016)
 - Near the start of the new academic year
 - Around the proposed time for WikiConference USA 2016
- Project complete (September 2016)
