



- 1. Two (2) sergeants working in the VMA-212 Operations Office, reported sighting an object approximately four (4) feet in diameter and orange in color, at 2245, 22 June 1952 just above the K-6 airstrip in Korea.
- 2. This object, measuring approximately four (4) feet in width, was first spotted at an altitude of eight thousand (8000) feet above the K-6 airstrip coming from the north. Immediately after sighting, the object went into a vertical dive and suddenly leveled off at a point approximately 1000 feet above the west end of the airstrip. During the dive, observers noted a trail of bright red flame extending from two (2) to five (5) feet in length. Without delay, it headed in a westerly direction for about one-fourth (1/4) mile, (two to three seconds elapsed during this maneuver), where it hovered briefly over the crest of some hills nearby. Grid coordinates of these hills are CR 232905.
- 5. The object them circled in a 180 degree turn to the right, spending about 45 to 60 seconds in the turn. At the completion of the turn, the object emitted a bright flash and headed in an easterly direction for a distance of about one-half (1/2) mile. No trail was noticed at this time. At this point a second bright flash was noticed, followed by complete darkness.
- 4. The two observers, because of the sudden darkness could not see the object disappear in any particular direction.
- 5. No moon was shining at this hour, and during the entire sequence of maneuvers, no sound was heard from the object.
- 6. Comment by original preparing officer (1st Lt. Walter H. Polak, Intelligence Officer, Marine Air Group 12):
- a. As a result of combined and individual interrogation of the two (2) enlisted men concerned, there is little doubt in the writers mind that they did see some sort of flaming object in the sky at the time and place mentioned. A check with the Marine Air Group Aerology Office revealed that average temperatures prevailed, there was no wind activity, no moon and no clouds at the sighting levels. The period of time that elapsed from time of sighting to its disappearance would give added credence to their story. Both men hold responsible jobs in the Operations Office of their squadron.







STATEMENT OF STAFF SERGRANT "A" "P" MOORE CONCERNING FLYING MISSILE.


At approximately 2245/I Sgt. KINNER and I was returning from the messhall going back to work at VMA-212 Operations. We were traveling in a jeep on the road going around the west end of the runway when we spotted a strange light about four (4) feet in diameter. We first spotted it at about 5,000 feet in the air coming downward at a terrific rate of speed. There was also sparks and a flame of fire attached to it while it was coming down. It got down to approximately a 1000 feet from the deck and went westward until almost out of sight at a terrific rate of speed, it then made a 150 degree turn and gave off two (2) big flashes of light, the flashes were about a mile apart and on the second flash it disappeared and that was the last we saw of it.

Sergeant KINNER and I stopped the jeep we were in when we first saw it and also turned off the engine to see if we could hear any sound, but we were unable to hear any sound or distinguish if it was an aircraft.

STATEMENT OF SERGEANT JAMES KINNER, JR., CONCERNING FLYING MISSILE.

On 22 June 1952, Staff Sergeant MOORE and myself were going around the west end of the runway when we noticed a bright object about a 1/4 of a mile coming from the north. It was about four (4) feet in diameter. When it got to the end of the runway it was approximately 1000 feet from the deck and made a 180 degree turn back toward the north. The last we seen of it was when we noticed two (2) bright flashes about one half (1/2) mile apart.



Mrs. of Ringtown R.D. #1, Pa., reported an observation of a group of strange red lights in the sky while at a drive-in theater at Brandenville, Pa.

The observation was made between 0230Z and 0300Z hours on 20 June 1952.

The observer described the lights as being strange in appearance and not resembling those of an aircraft.

This Office believes that the lights may have been a reflection of a series of red lights used by a circus located approximately fourteen miles east of the location of the observation. However, this report is being forwarded because of the many alleged sightings of flying objects in this area of late.

These so-called sightings may have been stimulated by the recent newspaper publicity on the subject.

(NOTE: This Office was advised by Captain Ruppelt, ATIC Project Monitor for "FLYOBRPI", that no signed statement would be necessary.)

Observers were flying B-29 No. 44-62204 on a routine training mission, cruising at 17,000 feet, 190 miles per hour on a track of 3040. Object was sighted at 33°02'N, 88°26 W. for a period of five seconds.

Both observers sighted object at two o'clock position level, approaching the aircraft at a high rate of speed. Airplane Commander attempted a left turn to avoid a collision, but sircraft was on C-I suto-pilot and before action could be taken, object executed sharp left turn and passed from line of sight.

Object was described as "Ball of Fire" type, clearcut, brilliant white, cone shaped at rear. & Length was approximately three times the diameter; diameter estimated as: (a) Eight to ten feet at a distance of 400 to 500 yards, (b) One hundred feet at a distance of 15 miles. 





sighted what he at first believed to be a meteor but almost immediately realised that this object, which was between a "point" and a "round" source of light with a "rosy" constant or steady glow, was not a meteor. This object appeared to be approximately two (2) or three (3) times greater in diameter than the larger stars and was moving back and forth in a pendulum motion. SOURCE stated that he would estimate the height at which object appeared would be from 8,000 to 10,000 feet, however, he asknowledged that this would be a rough estimate.

After two (2) to four (4) minutes SCURCE left his wife and mother-in-law to observe the object and went into his apartment to call the Operations Officer on duty at the 604th ACAN Squadron to determine if any unidentified object appeared on the radar screen. After calling the Radar Site Captain Management returned outdoors to join his companions and was told that the object had moved rather swiftly on a horisontal to the North and disappeared at approximately 2230 hours local time.

c. At approximately 2245 hours local time Captain Manual observed a faint reddish light which he believed to be the same object he had previously observed. This time object appeared to be at about a 45 degree angle above the Eastern horizon and much dimmer. Captain Manual then attempted to obtain a picture of object, using a Retina I camera with a 3.5 lens opening, giving it a two (2) second exposure. 

STATEMENT

At approximately 2220 hours on 21 June 1952, while walking up a hill between the Depot Theater and Williamsville urea, I was looking at the stars and pointing out the Big Dipper, Cassiopeia and the North Star to my wife and mother-in-law. On looking more directly overhead I momentarily thought I was seeing a meteor but then realized that the light I saw was not going amyplace and was not "burning out". It was a rese-colored (pale red) round light about 2 - 3 diameters larger than the largest stars, the not as bright, yet having a more steady glow like Venus (in the Southwest). It was about 300 below being directly overhead and to the East (according to the North Star). This light did not appear to be connected with any object. It woved back and forth through an are of only perhaps 2 - 5 degrees with the impression of a pendulum, the rather quickly. After 2 - 4 minutes it started getting smaller and more thint as though it were rising, for it stayed still in the same part of the sky. It seemed as though it were proceeding directly toward a certain bright star. At this point I left my companions and telephoned the officer on duty at the 604th ACAW Squadron, describing what I had seen and asking him to check with his operators to see if they could locate anything. This was at 2235 - 22ho. My wife and mother-in-law had continued to watch the light until about 2230, they said it moved in a horizontal memor rather swiftly before it disappeared.

At 22h5 I took my 35mm Retina outdoors and at once located a faint red light about 150 above the Eastern herison. It was only as large as the smaller stars and much dismer than before. However, it had a red tings and appeared to be moving slowly in relation to the stars in that area. It slowly moved in a signag fashion for a few seconds and disappeared. I took two (2) photographs pointing the camera in the general direction of the light. The first was at 1/3.5 at about 1-2 seconds when I first saw the light and again for 2-4 seconds, steadying the camera on a post.

At no time was any sound heard. It was an unusually clear night (for Bavaria) and no fog or clouds were evident at the time. The air was cool and still. There was no moon.



STATEMENT

On the evening of June 21, 1952, my son-in-law and my daughter (Captain and Mrs and I were walking home from the picture show. It was about 1020 P.M. The night was unusually clear and we were observing the stars. We located the big dipper, the north star, etc., when all at once there came to our attention an unusually bright object, redder in color than the stars; it was larger and appeared to be round. At first I thought it was a meteor, since it was moving in a downward direction, but the next instant it was back in its first position. It moved in this manner for a few minutes, probably 3 or 4 minutes. I could tell it was gaining distance, for at first it was to the right of one star and while we watched it moved far to the left of the same star and the light grew dimmer until it was out of sight.

Then we first noticed this bright object it was almost overhead, in the eastern sky, then moved toward the north as it appeared to be ascending. Altogether I watched it for about 10 minutes before it disappeared completely from sight.



STATEMENT

On Saturday night the 21st of June 1952 at about 1020 P.M., while walking home from the Depot Theater with my mother (Mrs.) and my husband (Captain), we saw a reddish light in the eastern sky. It was easily noticeable because of its strange movements and greater size than the surrounding stars. When first seen it appeared to be bouncing around in the sky, moving very quickly in one direction than in another.

Went directly north in a straight line and appeared to be climbing, for it gradually disappeared. I watched it for about 3 minutes in all. I could not see that it had any definite shape as it was merely a round spot of light. I do not know how high it was beyond the fact that it was noticeably larger than the stars. The air was very still and the sky clear so that it was easy to observe the movements of this red light and to feel sure that the motion could not have been caused by wind.



UFOs and the Opposition of Mars

Venus is not the only heavenly body to simulate a flying saucer. Jupiter and even Mercury, the smallest of the planets, have inspired their share of UFOs. Mars, which can also be very bright, has frequently been reported as a spaceship.

On June 21, 1952, an F-47 aircraft was on routine patrol over the Atomic Energy Commission installation at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, when at 10:58 P.M. a spotter from the Ground Observer Corps informed the pilot that a slow-moving craft was moving in the area at very high altitude. At about the same time the pilot observed a blinking white light, of no definite shape and with no exhaust or trail, apparently making passes at him. For the next eighteen min-




utes the pilot tried vainly to intercept the unknown. The plane was at 15,000 feet, moving at about 250 knots. As the pilot turned to meet the pass, the UFO would pull up some 4000 to 5000 feet above the plane and then move in again. When the plane reached 22,000 feet, the UFO appeared to make a final dive from 28,000 feet, pulled back up to its previous altitude, and then disappeared. The pilot's reaction is indicated by his answer to one of the routine questions on the Air Force report form: "Did you stop at any time during the sighting?" His reply read: "Ha Ha!"

Investigating if e incident, officials from ATIC at first suspected that the object might have been a balloon, released as a hoax; only a few weeks earlier a crank had launched a flight of balloons near Oak Ridge and had been caught. But after interviewing the witnesses, the investigators concluded that the UFO was far more probably the planet Mars. As so often happens, however, they could not convert the "probable" into a "positive" identification because they lacked one essential fact: the bearing of the aircraft [1].

A further investigation of the incident referred to in your teletype of June 24, 1952, brought forth the following data which may be of use to you. A lighted 100 gram pilot balloon with an ascent rate of about 1000 ft./min. was released at 22:00 EST June 20, (210300Z) from the McGhee-Tyson Airport near Knoxville. This balloon was observed for 15 minutes at which time the lighting unit failed. The 0300Z radiosonde balloon from Nashville was followed presumably by an SCR 658, to an altitude of 25,000 ft. No winds above 25,000 ft. were reported by Nashville.

Unidentified Flying Objects Reporting (FLYOBERT)

DESCRIPTION

An intense blue-green light was seen traveling at a high rate of speed across the herison in a level line of flight at an altitude of about 20,000 feet. The light was traveling in a south-easterly direction on a line between Cheyenne Myoming, coordinates 41°3'N 104°46'N, and Wellington Colorado, towards Limon, Colorado, bearing 150°.

The source of the light could not be determined. No object of any shape or size characteristic of any conventional aircraft could be seen. The blue-green light seemed to be a high frequency timed flash about two fort in area. The observer stated that although the object appeared to have a definite line of flight, no sound could be heard to denote any type of propulsion system.






MARKER OF CESERVATION


EVIDENCE



I should like to report the sighting of an unusual illuminated aerial object which my wife, my daughter, and I saw the evening of June 22, 1952 between 9:00 and 9:30 P.H.


I was pointing out the stars of Ursa Ninor when the object moved across the sky in a path some distance below Polaris. It was almost as plainly seen as quarter moon. Its shape was roughly "tear drop" with the forward portion rather clearly defined and the rear portion feathered out. The color ranged from (warm yellow in the forward center area to turquoise blue at the borders and rear). It had a dark band running through the front center area. We each made independent sketches of our impressions of the object and they all agree favorably. I am enclosing a sketch of my impression.


The object was first seen by my wife who called it to my attention. It was first seen as it came from behind the second story of our house, traveled through about 30° and disappeared behind trees on the neighboring lawn. We immediately made estimations of the size and location. The altitude was approximately 35° and the path seemed to descend at about 10°. The size approximately two thirds the size of the index finger at arms length from the eye. The length of time in passing was probably two or three seconds. There was no noise heard.

I spend a considerable amount of time observing the heavens with a small telescope and withthe naked eye. I have observed a number of the larger nubulae, galaxies, and star clusters. I have also observed numbrous meteors. This object was many, many times more spectacolar than the most brilliant meteor I have observed. It was an object not soon to be formotter.


