The lowest yield during that time was 25 bushels, while the highest was 55 bushels per acre, the average yield for the time being 45 bushels per acre. The present crop, now within ten days of maturity, is fully up to the record. This wheat is wonderfully productive and very hardy, and it is thought by the station that the time has arrived when it should be distributed throughout the state in lots of from two to six bushels, and as it is the intention to introduce this variety and seed into every county in the state, the number of orders that can be filled will necessarily be limited."

At the Nebraska State Experiment Station in the fall of 1896 they sowed 37 varieties of winter wheat. It all winter killed except three; in 1898 over 100 varieties and only five varieties survived the winter in good condition. In 1899 they sowed 42 varieties.
