### AEROPLANES USED IN **QUELLING DISORDERS** IN PUNJAUB DISTRICT

Martial Law Has Been Declared at Lahore and Amritsar; Governor Satisfied "State of Open Rebellion" Exists

Simla, April 17.—Aeroplanes were used in coping with the disorders that have broken out in the Punjaub. A mob attacked a pas senger train in this district and wrecked the railway station at Gujranwala. Aeroplanes were sent from Lahore and the mob was bombed and subjected to machine gun fire from the air.

Considerable unrest still exists in Delhi and Lahore. The Com-

missioner for the district has appointed some of the leading men to use their influence for the reopening of the shops. Otherwise the authorities would take action.

Martial law has been declared in the districts of Lahore and Amritsar, according to announcement made here. It is stated in the announcement that the Governor-General is "satisfied that a state of open rebellion against authority exists in those districts."

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### Atlantic Aviators Make Preliminary Spin to Big Flight

Spin to big riight

St. Johns, Nfid., April 17.—Weather conditions are favorable for flying here to-day, Captain Frederick P. Raynham, British aviator, and Harry Hawker, his Australian rival for trans-Atlantic flight honors, looked to incoming weather reports for word as to whether the "Aerigi brokers" over the ocean would permit them to "hop off soon." Raynham was preparing early in the day to make the most of the local atmospheric clearing by a trial flight which could be held without loss of advantage, while Hawker was awaiting trans-Atlantic reports.

Rain had softened the ground, but Raynham said he believed he could run his machine along the road without damaging the plane. Hawker conceded that the soggy ground at the Mount Pearl-plateau tended to interfere with a successful "take off."

Raynham put his biplane through its flying paces just before noon, making a thirty-minute spin over the hills of the east coast. After landing he said he awaited offly a change in the weather to start across the Atlantic. The engine and the plane itself, he said, "worked beautifully." Hawker, who witnessed the flight, received advices that weather conditions on the Atlantic continued unsatisfactory.

# PANDER TO MODERATES

Bolshevism in Russia Declared to Be Giving Way to a "New Bourgeoisie"

Copenhagen, April 17.—Bolshevism in Russia is giving way to a "new bourgeoisie," according to the director of the Moscow Red Cross Committee who hiss arrived here. Premier Lenine and War Minister Trotzky are trying to reach an understanding with the moderate element in Russia.

The situation in Paternal

The situation in Petrograd, the di-rector reports, has been growing worse and numerous anti-Bolshevik out-breaks have occurred here. In Febru-ary there were \$3,000 deaths in Petro-grad compared to 123,000 in January.

The mention by the Russian Soviet government of fighting in the region north of Oleonetz indicates that the Bolshevik have resumed the campaign against the Finns. Oleonetz is northeast of Petrograd and on the opposite side of Lake Ladoga.

The victims of the Bolshevik terror are taken to the island of Hazen, in the Dvina River, and are said to number 70,090, including women and children. No one is permitted to take food or money to the island.

### **EIGHTEEN HUNDRED** MURDERED AT UFA BY THE BOLSHEVIKS

London, April 17.-Eighteen hun dred persons, including 400 women were murdered by the Bolsheviks at Ufa, according to a telegram from

Ufa, one of the principal cities in the Orenburg district near the Siberian border, was taken by the Bolshevikz carly this spring, but late in March was recaptured by forces of the Omsk-All-Russian government which have continued to press back the Bolsheviks in this region. Dispatches from Omsk dated April 5 and feceived on Tuesday, announced the massacre by the Bolsheviks of more than 2,000 civilians in and near the town of Osa, to the north of Ufa, in this district.

### **WOULD REVIVE** OPIUM TREATY

Britain Submits Proposal to Conference for Control of Noxious Drugs

London, April 17.—Cecil B. Farmsworth, Under-Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, told a questioner in the House of Commons yesterday that the British Government had submitted a proposal to the peace conference that the countries represented there should take steps to bring the opium treaty of 1912 into force, and that a provision should be in the peace terms imposing on the enemy states the obligation of ratifying the convention.

The British Government had also suggested that the League of Nations should be entrusted with the duty of supervising and carrying out the terms of the convention, and also the traffic in opium and other noxious drugs.

Toronto, April 17.—Premier Heart's bill providing for a referendum on the continuance of the Ontario Temperance Act received second and third readings in the legislature last night after it had been debated for three hours by the House.

"The Temperance Act was passed as a war measure," the Premier said. "That was the justification for action without a vote of the people. I was confident then that the Government was interpreting the will of the great majority of the people, and I am more confident to-day after the experience of three years.

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Peace Delegates Say Not Anxious to Try Former German Emperor

Paris. April 17.—The Belgian peace conference delegates to-day informed the correspondents that Belgiam had not been officially requested by the Council of Four to bring the former German Emperor to trial, and that the Belgian Government would feel obliged to decline to take the step even if there were any request for such action. The Belgian delegates bold that any action should be taken by a commission representing the associated powers. The official Belgian view, it was said, is that the former emperor cannot be arraigned for declaring war or violating the neutrality of Belgiam, or for any act preceding or coincident with the declaration of war.

After pointing out that there is no tribunal competent to hear such charges against the former emperor, and no provision of international law covering such cases, the delegates said that Belgium expects that persons guilty of acts punishable under the criminal codes of any of the belligerent powers will be placed on trial, as the fact that theft, murder and other crimes were committed during war does not relieve the criminal of responsibility. If the commission desires to arraign General Baron von Manteuffel for the sacking of Louvain, General von Schroeder for the murder of Captain Fryatt and General von Saubersweig for the execution of Miss Edith Cavell, all the necessary documents will be forthcoming," said the general secretary of the delegation.

Ottawa, April 17.—The Post Office Department last night issued a length; statement dealing with the long draws out discussion between the Domini Government and the pogtal workers. There was not any intimation from the postal employees of any intention to strike.

Two days later another list of fitteen démands was received, and the outcome was that a delegation was invited to come to Ottawa to discuss the situation with the Government. Increases for temporary employees who have been on minimum pay for some time were asked and the Government replied that with certain exceptions, as in the case of returned soldiers, it would not be possible to give annual increases to these temporary men.

### MUST HAVE SHOCKED THEM.

Mr. Lloyd George's announcement that all the pledges he had given in the general election had been incorporated in the demands agreed upon by the Allies, that full security for France against Ger-man aggression in the future had been guaranteed and that the Conference had not the slightest in-tention of recognizing the Bolshevik Government of Russia, must have been a shock to the "wild men screaming through the key-hole."

It certainly must have a discouraging effect upon even the chronic pessimism of Dr. Dillon who was sure the peace treaty would be an "ugly abortion," and possibly we shall hear that Lord North-eliffe has indulged in another of his neurotic changes of front and that his battery of publications is again extolling the Prime Minister to the

It may be, however, that the prophets of woe and ruin will take another tack and assure us now that the terms to be demanded of Germany are so drastic that the Berlin Government will not sign them, that, instead, Germany will go Bolshevik and that for this the Paris Conference will be to blame. People endowed with imaginations so elastic ought to find somewhere fresh fuel for their

Much of the wild criticism which Mr. Lloyd George scathingly denounced yesterday was prompted by the best intentions mixed with groundless apprehension. Some of it sprang from the hopeless tendency of certain people to look upon the dark side-of things. But some of it, un-happily, was deliberately intended to sow dissensions among the Allies so that the world might continue to be a barracks, with conscription, armament competition and general reaction. The authors of it, fearful that Prussianism will perish in Germany, would like to see it revived in Germany's To them a world made safe for democracy is a world not fit to live in. A peace which will eliminate the German peril and military im-perialism generally is the last thing they want. That, however, is the kind of peace the people of the world desire and mean to have.

### MAYOR GALE'S APPOINTMENT.

The post of Public Utilities Commissioner to which Mayor Gale has just been appointed is a new departure in British Columbia. It is an additional branch of governmental machinery in which there is plenty of scope for a Commissioner with keen in

telligence and courage in keeping with the times.

Mayor Gale is energy personified. Perhaps
the best tribute that could be paid to a public servant was paid to him by his own city when, as its
chief magistrate, it sanctioned his second term of office by acclamation in January of the present year. Last year perhaps was about the most diffi-cult twelve months in the history of Vancouver as far as the conduct of its civic affairs was concerned. On account of this fact, and the happy issue secured by Mayor Gale in connection with a number of extremely trying situations, his initiative and executive ability can not be seriously questioned.

During his public life Mr. Gale has not been small to stick to his convictions and executive and public life.

### A HARD NUT.

The difficulties with which the Peace Conference has been grappling received special emphasis from the British Premier yesterday in his remark that questions that never had been heard of before the war had nearly produced a conflict between two of the Allied states.

The reference probably was to the dispute be tween Italy and Jugo-Slavia of which Serbia is the dominant element, over the Adriatic seaboard. Possession of Fiume, formerly a famous Austrian seaport, and the Dalmatian strip, is demanded by Italy under the terms of two secret treaties en-tered into with her by Great Britain and France in 1915, and prominent Italians in Paris declare that unless this is insured there will be a revolution in Italy. On the other hand, the Jugo-Slavs claim ne on the ground that it is preponderatingly Slavic in population and is their natural outlet on

the Adriatic. How would those who have been so busy criticizing the Peace Conference on its "delay," and deluging the conferees with advice through the newspapers, crack that nut? A revolution in Italy would be a deplorable development; so would a revolution in Serbia. War between the two would be a calamity. Yet this question must be settled by the Peace Conference. The war was not a lim-ited-liability affair on the part of the Allies. The peace problems of the Balkans are as such a compeace problems of the Balkans are as such a com-mon issue as the military problem was during the conflict. They are as much integral parts of a whole existing situation as the Near Eastern fronts were of the military situation, and must be decided in Paris just as the military strategy for all was

### NO INTERVENTION.

In deciding against military intervention in Russia the Paris Conference is pursuing a wise course. Mr. Lloyd George says intervention of that kind would be "an act of the greatest stupidity" and his statement has the sanction of reason and history.

As far as Russia is concerned she must work out her own salvation and settle her domestic affairs according to her own idea of what is best for herself. That is what every other nation has

This involves untold hardship and suffering for the Russian people as it involved hardship and suffering for the people of Great Britain and France, but it is only through them that people, kept in a state of repression, can learn which path to take to enlightened political development and progress.

The decision of the Conference to refuse recognition to the Bolshevik Government is equally sound. That Government usurped power with the bayonet and has maintained its position by violence. It was defeated in elections to the Constituent Assembly authorized by it, and at once abolished the Assembly by force. In fact, it is not a Government at all, but it remains the business of the Russian people to get rid of it as soon as they are capable of organizing against it.

Something more than a century ago France had a Bolshevik Government which seized power in precisely the same way and kept it for a time by the terror of the guillotine. The other powers of Europe, however, made the mistake of intervening. They united with Austria in an attempt to restore the discredited Bourbons to the French throne with the inevitable result that they consolidated all France against them and produced Napoleonism and twenty years of war.

The analogy between the French and Russian revolutions is so close that the folly of military intervention now must be readily obvious. Russia will get rid of Bolshevism if she is left to herself, but outside pressure probably would substitute for

tervention now must be readily obvious. Russia will get rid of Bolshevism if she is left to herself, but outside pressure probably would substitute for it a new species of Napoleonism and the world would be confronted with a new war. Without external provocation the Bolsheviki never can lead a consolidated Russia in a war of aggression. Nor can they propagandize anarchy successfully in any ordinarily enlightened country.

### THE MINER IS ALL RIGHT.

If Great Britain is somewhat perturbed politically at the present moment—a condition, by the way, which makes its appearance with the regularity of the moon change—Britain industrially has cause to congratulate herself. Perhaps one of the most significant items of news to be flashed across the Atlantic yesterday was the announcement that the Miners' Federation in conference at Southport had accepted the Sankey report by a majority of more than 600,000.

It should be noted, however, that in addition to his conciliatory attitude, he has had to digest the startling revelations of the Coal Commission itself, mentally noting for future reference, no doubt, the amount of excess profits made during the war by the operators. He has swallowed all this and throughout the whole proceedings he has displayed a remarkable spirit of restraint and toleration

Apparently, the British workingman is living up to his reputation. He looks before he leaps. Russian and German "nationalizing" will not be the pattern for the miners of Britain. And with a majority for industrial peace of over 600,000 a working argument has been set up that should hold in subjection such extreme elements as are bound to creep into so large an organization.

### RULE OF THE ROAD.

At its recent session the Legislature of British Columbia went on record as favoring a change in the rule of the road in this Province. The only reason offered against the introduction of legisla-tion this year was based upon the argument that due notice should be given, not alone to the people but also to the transportation companies and automobile manufacturers.

It has now been definitely decided, however, that a bill will be introduced at the next session of Parliament designed to bring the rule of the road in this Province in conformity with that of the ad-joining States and the rest of the provinces of Canada. At the moment British Columbia stands alone on this continent as the one adherent to the

In the event of the bill becoming law, "turn to the right" in British Columbia will go into effect on July 1, 1920. Autoists in this Province and in Many accidents will be avoided, tourist inter-change should get considerable impetus, and the financial benefit from this class of traffic should be considerably increased.



### MINISTER OF PUBLIC **WORKS DISPOSES OF** HIS EMERGENT VOTE

Detailed Programme Covers Trunk Road System of the Prevince

MALAHAT DRIVE TO **BE MUCH IMPROVED** 

Northern Agricultural Areas to Be Assisted in Large Measure

Reports from the various District Engineers attached to the Provincial Department of Public Works indicate that the greater part of the emergency vote of \$1,500,000, passed at the recent session of the Legislature, should be allocated to the improvement of the trunk road system of the Province, the construction of new roads for the opening up of agricultural and mineral areas, and for industrial development. From the general recommendations carefully compiled at the request of the Department, the Hon. J. H. King, Minister of Public Works, has been enabled to formulate his programme, which is intended primarily to relieve unemployment conditions as they may arise during the gradual process of demobilization.

It will be recalled that the Bill was

arise during the gradual process of demobilization.

It will be recalled that the Bill was given a good deal of mature consideration before it was introduced into the Legislature and in order that accurate data might be on hand, all the District Engineers were advised to take careful stock of the needs of each particular district some months ago and file a report by the time the Legislature assembled. This was duly carried out and the reports in question have been Dr. King's guide in compiling the general programme which follows hereunder.

Vanceuver Island.

On this Island an expenditure will be made in each electoral district on what is known as the Island Highway. It is proposed to improve it by resurfacing, bettering the location, while at or near Victoria there will be an amount of hard-surfacing, or permanent roadway. On the Malahat Drive the expenditure will be on improving curvatures, widening of the road and placing guard ralls at the most dangerous portions. The Government has also under advisement the expenditure of money on the building of a road from Port Hardy to Coal Harbor, Quatsino Sound, and a sum will be devoted to the location of a road from Campbell River. Steps will likewise be taken to ascertain the possibility of road construction in the Renfrew district.

thoroughfares. At the present time, these being macadamized roads, it is impossible to maintain them, according to expert advice, and it is fherefore proposed to devote an amount to hard-surface some of the more important ones, particularly the Pacific Highway. The Government regards this traffic as through traffic and takes the stand that assistance should be given.

Representations have been made from North Vancouver that assistance should be give to connecting up the Marine Drive with the present ferry service. In view of the fact that the late administration contributed to the expenditure on the Marine Drive, which has made this an attractive road for tourists and people living in the city of Vancouver, the Government considers it advisable to construct, in co-operation with the Municipality of North Vancouver, the road connecting the ferry service with Marine Drive for a distance of one and a half miles. If this work is proceeded with the Minister states that it will be on a fifty-fifty basis with the Municipality.

Inland Poists.

In the Dewdney and Chilliwack districts work will be confined to the trunk roads, and also to the construction of an industrial road into the oil plant at loco. At the present time residents are more or less dependent upon water transportation to the industry at that point.

It is proposed to complete what is known as the one-mile road between Merritt and Princeton in the Yale District. This construction has been determined by reason of the fact that it would open up a very large section of country, and would give a much shorter and better route between these two important centres.

In the Kamloops district the expenditure will be on the trunk roads known as Kamloops Savona and the Kamloops-Falkland roads, general improvement being necessary.

North Okanagan improvements will be carried out on the Enderby and olkanagan centre road, and also on the Falkland-Vernon road, the latter being a continuation of the road from Kamloops. In South Okanagan it is proposed to improve the present trunk will be carried out on the Similar construction will be carried out in the Similkameen.

In the Boundary Country, including Greenwood and Grand Forks, the trunk roads will be improved and a survey made to connect up the Kootenay district, giving the people access to the Boundary and Okanagan districts. A survey party will shortly be in the field between Paulson and Rossland, and if a feasible route can be obtained the Minister says that construction will take place on this link during the comping season.

As far as Trail and Nelson districts are concerned it is proposed to construct some four miles of road between Thrums and Brilliant for the purpose of giving a more direct route between Nelson and Trail, and so relieve the necessity of maintaining what is known as the Pass Creek road, which is not judged suitable for traffic and is badly located. Consideration is being given to the Nelson-Ymir road, a survey being made by the Government last year. This would largely be a development road leading out of the city of Nelson, serving lumbering and mining operators, as well as giving service to agricultural development.

Slocan District.

In the Slocan district the re-building of an old road, which has been in existence for many years, between New Denver and Slocan, will be undertaken. This would serve also as a connecting link between these points and give an outlet to numerous mines operating in that district. In the Kaslo-district it is proposed to complete the it is now found necessary to give connection between these two towns. Consideration is also being given to the advisability of constructing some five or six miles of road between Sirdar and Kuskanook, using the right-of-way of the Great Northern Railway Company. Once this link is completed it would give access to the people of the Prairie Provinces and East Kootenay into the country adjacent to Nelson.

In connection with the allocation to be made in the Revelstoke district the Department will carry on the construction of roads from Mara Lake through to Taft and Boulder Creek. A locating party of engineers will be placed on this job shortly and work is expected to be undertaken this year. This road, when completed, will not only give the people of Revelstoke access to the road system of the Okanagan countries, but it will also give the farmers in the Malakwa district an outlet to the markets adjoining them.

Lillocet and Cariboo.

Certain moneys will be spent in open-

Certain moneys will be spent in opening agricultural and mining areas by the construction of roads in the Lilicoet district. In the Cariboo an expenditure will be made largely on the improvement of main trunk roads. In the northern sections of the Province, Fort George, Peace River and Omineca, the Government proposes not only to improve the trunk roads, but to institute the construction of roads that will serve the agriculaural districts now being opened up. It is expected that expenditure in these districts will be of some magnitude as indications are that there will be a large immigration on these lands. In the Atlin district where there are indications of considerable mining activity, it is proposed to expend certain moneys in the construction of roads which will assist the development of this country.

Banfi-Windermere Land.

With the passage of the bill granting to the Dominion Government the Park Reserve in the Banfi-Windermere country, the Minister states that it will be nacessary to improve the roads into the Columbia district in order that they may be able to carry the automobile traffic which will develop once the Banfi-Windermere road is constructed, and certain expenditures will be made in that locality.

He was employed by the Canadian Pacific and the Canadian National Railways at different times before he accepted the position with the P. G. E.

# **WILL CLOSE STORES**

Retail Section of Board of Trade Considers Oriental Competition

The observance of a full holiday on Easter Monday, and ways and means to abolish Chinese retail competition, were decided on at the initial meeting of the Retail Section of the Board of Trade last night.

The Section is widely representative of various lines of retail trade and its declaration in favor of \$\frac{a}{2}\$ whole holiday on Monday will probably mean that all stores will be closed. Though in the end the resolution to close was made unanimous, there was considerable opposition to the proposal from several merchants.

J. D. O'connell and G. D. Christic contended that there was no valid reason for closing up the city Easter Monday and that the return of a large number of soldiers during the weeksnd made it important for the local stores to remain open in order that the soldiers could be outfitted.

Those who favored Monday closing fectared that Monday had been fixed as a bank holiday and was therefore a stautory holiday.

F. Elworthy, who supplied the following summary of the Oriental situation here:

"At one time the Chinese furnished domestic help and they engaged in work upon the land. But now there is a great scarcity of laborers in these fields and concurrently we find the Chinese engaged in almost every line of business formerly carried on exclusively by the white population. The Orientals succeed in these new spheres largely on account of their ability to live cheaply, and thus sometimes undersell the white traders, who are generally married men with families, having a standard of living entirely different from the Orientals. These conditions will not remain stationary. The menace must be abated forthwith or it will grow to intolerable dimensions. So long as Chinese are allowed to remain in British Columbia the Victoria retail merchants wish to see the old conditions restored; that is, the Chinese to be producers and not competitors in business, and that their present trading operations become a field for our returning soldiers. It is realized that the task is beset with difficulties."

Would Improve Trade

A committee on the question brought in the following report:

"We think that the public will be impressed with the necessity and advisability of trading with their own people instead of with allens, and by this means enhance the prosperity of this city and at the same time better their own conditions. We have also called the attention of the Real Estate Exchange to the detrimental effects Oriental occupation will have on the property occupied and adjacent property. We think that if action along these lines is taken up and given a persistent trial it will bear results which, if not up to our expectations, will better the conditions of the trade as they exist at present."
