



THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

Trustees of the Peabody Institute.

The Trustees, in presenting their thirty-third Annual Report, do so with feelings of grief and sadness at the severe loss that our Board and this community have suffered in the death of our late President, adviser and friend, Hon. Alfred A. Abbott. But his memory and his example will long remain fresh to direct and advise us still.

More fitting words than those contained in the Resolves passed by this Board cannot be found to express our feelings at this loss, and they are embodied hereafter in this report.

The Trustees being "required to make a full report of their doings, and the doings of the Committee by them appointed, at the annual town meeting," such report is herein submitted.

On March 17th, 1884, the Board met and elected its own officers and committees, and also appointed the Lyceum and Library Committee consisting of twelve citizens of the town. The complete organizations of the Board of Trustees, and the Committee, will be found in the usual place at the end of this report. An appropriation of \$3200 was made for the use, and subject to draft, of the Lyceum and Library Committee.

On October 20th, at a meeting of the Board, it was "voted:—that the L. & L. Committee be empowered to secure the use of

the new town hall for their course of lectures in such manner as they see fit, at an expense, from the general fund, not exceeding that of last year pro rata."

It was also "voted:—that, if the L. & L. Committee shall secure the use of the town hall, without expense to the Institute, the sum saved shall be appropriated to the use of said Committee."

On October 28th, at a meeting of the Board, the death of our honored President was announced by Mr. Appleton, President pro tem. It was then "voted:—that a committee of three, consisting of the chairman, Mr. Thomas Carroll and Mr. Franklin Osborn, be appointed to draw up and present to the Trustees at a future meeting appropriate resolutions; and that they have full powers to make all necessary arrangements for the Board to attend the funeral."

On October 30th, at 1.30 P. M., the Board met, and the following resolutions were read and adopted:

The Board of Trustees of the Peabody Institute, having learned with deep sorrow and sincere grief, of the death of our honored President, wise Counselor and friend, Hon. Alfred A. Abbott, therefore

RESOLVED, That in his death our institution has suffered a grievous loss and that in his being taken away, a vacancy is made on our Board and in our community, that cannot be filled.

Mr. Abbott has been connected with this institution from its inception, intimately associated with its beneficent founder; his confidant and counselor in many of his noble schemes for the advancement and education of his fellowmen. He has been to our Board a Friend, a Philosopher, a Guide, and we realize that our last living connection between Mr. Peabody and the work of this Board has passed beyond our reach for valued services in this earthly sphere.

The character of Mr. Abbott, the splendid personality of the man, his manner so gracious, and free from pettiness, so simple and yet so commanding, aside from his great gifts of intellect, made him a

man of mark in any assembly. In his presence combining courtliness, urbanity and dignity, the simplest person was never overawed by his superiority.

In the many offices of trust and honor which he has filled, he performed his duties with zeal and fearlessness, ever guided by a manly independence, and a keen sense of right. As a presiding officer, his rulings were incisive and impartial, and his counsel and advice always tended to allay strife and contention. His naturally comprehensive and logical mind was strengthened and developed in the successful practice of his profession. His attainments in the path of general literature, and his cultivated and classical taste in the field of Poetry and elegant scholarship, were the delight of his associates.

RESOLVED, That his place in our memory is beside that of our revered founder, and that a suitable portrait be procured and hung in our room.

RESOLVED, That the deep and heartfelt sympathy of this Board be tendered to the bereaved family of our deceased associate, in their affliction, and that a copy of these resolutions be tendered to them in the name or the Trustees, and that copies be inserted in the local papers.

RESOLVED, That the Trustees attend the funeral in a body.

After the acceptance of the resolutions the Board withdrew to attend the funeral services at the family residence, and also at the grave. The Institute Building was closed to the public on the day of the funeral, crape was attached to the handle of the front door, and a handsome floral tribute was presented, as tokens of the high esteem in which Mr. Abbott was held throughout our whole community.

On February 2d, 1885, the Board met to receive the annual reports, and adjourned until February 7th, when this duty was completed.

The report of the Treasurer of the Board which, with all other reports, is herewith presented, gives a full account of the financial doings of the Board, and shows the present condition of the Funds committed to our care.

The Committee on Buildings have attended to their duty and have reported to the Board that the property in their care appears to be in good condition.

The reports of the Lyceum and Library Committee, and its sub-committees, and of the Librarian, give interesting accounts of their doings for the current year, and it is hoped that the citizens will give them the careful attention which they deserve.

Report of the Lyceum and Library Committee.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE PEABODY INSTITUTE:-

The reports of the Sub-Committees and Treasurer of Lyceum and Library Committee and the report of the Librarian of the Peabody Library, for the year ending Jan. 31, 1885, are, with their recommendations and suggestions, respectfully submitted as the report of the Lyceum and Library Committee.

REPORT OF PEABODY LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

TO THE LIBRARY AND LYCEUM COMMITTEE:

During the year past the Sub-Committee on the Library have been deprived of the valuable assistance of their late Chairman, Theodore M. Osborne, Esq., by his removal from town.

They report an increase in the circulation of the Library of about 3 per cent., the exact figures being given in the carefully compiled report of the Librarian.

Some changes, which it is hoped have been for the better, have been made in the rules regulating the delivery of books.

The accessions to the Library for the year have been much less than for any previous one for a long period, and a reasonable proportion of current literature cannot be secured for the patrons on any thing like the sum allowed this year, after deducting the expense of maintenance.

Whether this, or a more liberal policy shall prevail in the Library department in the future, depends of course upon the action of the governing Board of the Institute in the division of the funds at their disposal.

The Committee are of opinion that future additions to the Library should not be in any great degree of a special nature but for the most part such as will reach the masses.

They would not be understood to recommend any increase in the proportion of the lightest literature, but in more substantial matter in popular form, of the scope of the North American Review, the Popular Science Monthly, Harpers, etc., with the best of current travel, discovery and fiction, carefully avoiding for a Library of this kind, the extremes of too heavy and too light mental food.

REPORT OF LECTURE COMMITTEE.

Dec. 4, J. G. Wood. Subject:-Pond Life.

Dec. 11, J. G. Wood. Subject:-The Ants of the Tropics.

Dec. 14, J. G. Wood. Subject:—The Ants of the Temperate Regions.

Jan. 1, Col. Ch. Chaille Long. Subject:—Egypt's Three Prophets. Jan. 8, Rev. Joseph Cook. Subject:—Seven Modern Wonders of the World.

Jan. 15, Prof. J. W. Churchill. Subject:—Miscellaneous Readings. Jan. 22, Geo. Parsons Gilman. Subject:—Up and Down the Alps. Jan. 29, J. W. Riley. Subject:—The Eccentricities of Western Humor.

Feb. 3, Lieut. Fred'k. Schawtka. Subject:—Search for Sir John Franklin.

It was thought best to change the night of the lectures from Tuesday to Thursday, and the consent of the Trustees having been granted, the change was made, and seems to have given satisfaction.

The lectures have been given in the New Town Hall, and, with a few exceptions, have been well attended. The readings

have been the most popular with the public, and the three lectures by Prof. Wood, on Natural History, the least satisfactory.

Much annoyance was experienced by some of the lecturers and those who wished to hear them, by the late arrival of many of the attendants, and also by the early departure of some who were apparently not interested in the subject before them. This was aggravated by the slamming of doors. The latter may be easily avoided by hanging the doors so that they will swing either way. It is a question if, in the future, some measures should not be adopted looking to the removal of these disturbances. It has been found necessary in other places to adopt such methods and they seem to work satisfactorily. Some of the less popular lectures could, in future, be given in the Institute Hall with more comfort to the speakers and hearers.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

TO THE LYCEUM AND LIBRARY COMMITTEE:-

The report of the Librarian for the year ending February 1, 1885, is respectfully submitted.

The building committee, during the past year, caused the erection of a large book case on the north side of the Committee room. The Public Documents and other uncatalogued books formerly shelved in the alcove at the north west corner of the library room were transferred to this case thus giving room for a portion of the books in foreign languages which had crowded this alcove, which is now lighted by a gas jet.

The files of the Peabody Newspapers can now be found in a rack in the hall leading from the Library to the front entry. These changes are thought to be improvements and are duly appreciated.

New rules for the management of the Library were made by your Board in July last, and a copy thereof has been given to each family who have been borrowers since that time.

The yearly examination had been nearly completed when the rules came to hand and the books were again taken from the shelves and nearly ten thousand of the abbreviated regulations were pasted upon the covers of as many volumes and most of the other books had the same regulations stamped upon them on the fly leaves.

At the same time two-thirds of the seven-day books were made fourteen-day books.

In addition to the usual annual statistics, your committee will find as a part of this report statements as to the purchases of books for several years, their cost and cost of binding which are here inserted, as they may be of use in the future.

Gifts of bound books have been received during the past year from the following donors:

W. W. Kingsley, Cincinnati School Board, Smithsonian Institute, The Archaeological Institute of America, one volume each; B. Frank Southwick, Esq., and the Librarian, three volumes each; Miss Ann F. Osberne, The Secretary of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, two volumes each, and Hon. Eben F. Stone, 19 volumes.

As stated before, nearly two-thirds of the seven-day books were made fourteen-day books, in July, when the new rules were adopted. The books, it is believed, have been more promptly returned than formerly, but probably the fine money is not quite as much, but if the books are more promptly returned, a great gain is made.

Since September, the average number of books delivered on

Wednesdays after eight o'clock, P. M., has been five; and on Saturdays after the same hour twenty-three.

In regard to the wants of the Library, I feel warranted in making a few suggestions.

Should the appropriation for the ensuing year allow the expenditure, at least a third of the books worn out since 1872 should be replaced; some of the sets of periodicals completed as well as many incomplete sets of other books; grammars of the modern and ancient languages, and an atlas for the reading rooms provided.

The committee are well aware of the deficiencies in the several departments of the Library and doubtless will supply the need when circumstances will allow, but the longer the delay, the more difficult and expensive will it be to remedy the defects.

My thanks are due to the Trustees and Committee for their cordial cooperation in the promotion of the interests of the Library.

The courtesy and fidelity of the Library Assistants and the Janitor have been most commendable.

TO THE LIBRARY AND LYCEUM COMMITTEE:

The Committee in charge of the Eben Dale Sutton Reference Library submit this their sixteenth Annual Report.

There have been added to the Library during the year 80 volumes, of which number 59 were purchased and 21 presented, and also 98 parts of serials.

The total number of volumes now in the Library is 2196.

The number of visitors to the Library shows a decrease from last year, being 1390 as against 1669 in 1883-84.

A slight reduction is also to be noted in the number of consultations, there having been 455 this year, as against 540 in 1883-84.

Miss Daniels, as Librarian, has performed her duties acceptably to the Committee.
