Mission Restoration

Newspapers and other journals throughout the State are devoting much space to the present restoration work at Mission Carmelo. A recent issue of the Palo Alto Times has this to say:

"Father Mestres of Carmel, who has had the welfare of this historical site under his very able supervision for many years past, is working with added zeal toward the reproduction of the structure in its entirety. The Catholic Church is bringing from its rich stores of historical accounts the needed background for thorough investigation. In conjunction with the work pursued in the archives of each diocese has been the research carried on in the libraries of the state, of which California may be justly proud.

"The California Historical Survey Commission is stepping forward with all the assistance at its command and many leading men are interesting themselves in the finances of the undertaking. Publicity, which had its beginning in the metropolis, has awakened Californians to the need not only of individual interest in Carmel, but state wide appreciation and activity.

"Many of the Missions have fallen into decay. Father Mestres, feeling that the Mission of Carmel should be saved from this common fate, has assumed the task of the perpetuation of her architectural beauty. The Mission will again assume its setting among low red-tiled dwellings. The home of the herder of the Mission sheep will be built upon the hill, and upon a centrally located spot will be placed a large cross commemorative of the first service held on the
