1. a. In most cases enrollment figures reported to Civil Education personnel were different from those reported in April to the board of education secretariate, and both of those mentioned were found to be in error according to actual count.

- b. There has been no provision for schools to report fluctuations in enrollments during the school year to the board of education.
- e. Pupil accounting is so incredibily loose and inaccurate that even some principals appear not to know enrollment figures of their schools. Certainly the prefectural board of education cannot know how many children are currently under its jurisdiction.
- d. Facilities Section officials stated that when allotting school lunch ingredients and other meterials on a per pupil basis, if figures submitted by schools appeared high they were checked with average enrollments of past years and allottments were arbitrarily reduced accordingly. No stigma seemed to be attached to submission of erroneous or padded figures, however.
- e. Discrepancies between enrollments accounted for during inspections and those reported to the secretariate ranged between twentyeight (28) under the reported number and forty-two (42) over. Most discrepancies were too small to benefit schools which might be attempting to gain extra apportionments to any significant extent.



f. Enrollment figures quoted to Civil Affairs personnel by principals and head teachers before head counts were made tended to be high, possibly with the hope of obtaining favorable material benefits in a distribution of goods influenced by the Occupation Forces.

3. Conclusions

- a. Discrepancies discovered are due principally to loose accounting rather than deliberate padding, with the probable exception of the one upper secondary school surveyed.
- b. Padding is most likely to be found in upper secondary schools according to survey results and opinions of Facilities Section and Civil Education personnel.
- 4. A secretariate official stated his intention to continue the investigation upon his own initiative, and that he would notify this headquarters of further results.

Reference: Letter, Headquarters I Corps, Military Government Section, dtd 7 August 1948, subject: "Transmittal of Memoranda." 2. Figures are forwarded on educational statistics as of July 1949. Civil Education officers should send corrections to these figures through channels. Continued guidance to schools and to research sections of the Secretariat should help improve pupil-accounting and teacher-accounting procedures, and provide a basis for improved budgetary methods with precise cost per pupil at each school level being the basis for cost estimates and cost accounting. 3. The vast disproportion of schools in their own buildings between upper-and lower-secondary schools indicates the need of continued cooperation among the Japanese and their cooperation with Civil Affairs to improve the lower-secondary school and to secure more adequate buildings wherever possible. The parallel at other levels would be fullest possible use of primary and upper-secondary buildings and transfer to lower-secondary schools of all available buildings or rooms at the earliest possible date. Waste in building or room use continues to be a major problem as was suggested in the I Corps special study on school reorganization. 4. Most prefectures have many private schools, especially at secondary-grade levels. Considerable attention should be paid to these private schools, to their organization, to their equipment, and to their teaching procedures and results. Guidance to the Governors on private-school and higher-education sections should be frequent so that they may develop a sense of responsibility for these schools. Particular attention should be given to horean private schools in those prefectures where they exist. Japanese law is clear in its requirement of 9 years of formal education for all children in approved schools. The Japanese are responsible for keeping children in approved schools and for bringing all schools, public or private, up to the standards established by law or by Cabinet Ordinance. The Civil Education officer can do much in developing a desire for accreditation and for living up to the laws by private schools and by the Governor's Education Section.

- 5. Most prefectures have moved rapidly in the direction recommended by Hatsugaku 63 and 534 and the new curricula of the lower-and upper-secondary schools. Comprehensive schools have increased in most places over a year ago, with apparent growing understanding of the place the comprehensive school has in the community. Continued guidance on the part of the Civil Education officer and the Secretariat is indicated, with constant surveys of the needs of the children and the communities as a basis for what each school should teach.
- 6. The development of worthwhile try-out or experimental schools and study groups appears excellent from these statistics and from monthly reports and inspections. Continued attention should be given to these as a valuable part of in-service training. The try-out school may well be the chief contribution of the occupation to democratic education.
- 7. Statistics on Adult Education Courses in Democracy run through July. They are most satisfying in many prefectures as indicated by the results both in number and in monthly activities reports which show values received by participants. Many prefectures, however, are still at the starting stage of a program that should be continuous over a two-or three-year period. The course was organized and designed to reach 70% of the adult population of prefectures within I Corps. Some prefectures have already discontinued the courses after a single set of lessons. Others are establishing it on a semi-permanent basis with new courses beginning as soon as the old courses stop, the new ones enrolling persons who were not able to enter the previous course or courses. Others are providing continuation lessons for those who have found much value in the first 20 lessons, as well as new courses for those who have not previously participated. The total to date of 2,714,707 is for all attendants and should be divided by 20 to achieve the number who have actually completed all 20 lessons. That figure is too low for a 6-month period in an area comprising more than onehalf of the population of Japan.
- 8. The continuous development of the Adult Education program will be emphasized by all team commanders.
- 9. Japanese officials and organizations should be urged to increase numbers of courses and frequency of meetings. It has been suggested that this course with slight modification may be used by unions for labor education. It can equally well be adapted to agriculture groups, fishing groups, white collar groups, nationality groups, Eta areas, and any other minority groups with special interests.
