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NEWS BRIEFS

NEW TRUSTEES NAMED TO BOARD -- Bruce B. Bates, general partner (Administration) in the brokerage firm of George D.B. Bonbright & Co., and Robert W. Miller, vice president, Finance and Administration, Eastman Kodak Co., have been named to the Board of Trustees at Rochester Institute of Technology. The announcement was made by RIT Board Chairman, Arthur L. Stern, at a Sept. 21 Trustees meeting.

Bates, a native of Port Chester, N.Y., was educated at Phillips Academy in Andover, Mass. and later at Yale University (B.S. degree) and Massachusetts Institute of Technology (master's degree in Industrial Management). He was associated with the Procter & Gamble Co. until 1956.

Prominent in Rochester community affairs, Bates serves as a trustee of Rochester Savings Bank and as a board member of Rochester General Hospital, Convalescent Children's Hospital, and the American Red Cross (Rochester Chapter vice president).

Miller, who joined the ranks of Eastman Kodak in 1939, holds a B.S. degree from Ohio State University and an M.S. degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Beginning his career as a business and technical trainee in Kodak's Personnel Department, he rose to the post of Kodak vice president in 1959 and was appointed to his present position in 1968. He was elected an Eastman Kodak director in 1969. Miller is a trustee of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce; a board member of Rochester General Hospital, Marine Midland Trust Co., and Rochester Hospital Service; and a member of the Executive Committee of Region Two, Boy Scouts of America.

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AMERKS MANAGER TO ADDRESS RIT GROUP -- Dick Gamble, general manager and coach of the Rochester Amerks, will lecture on "Hockey and Business" on Wednesday, October 14, in the multi-purpose room of RIT's College-Alumni Union, at 7:30 to 9 p.m.

Gamble will discuss in detail the administrative and business aspects of managing a professional hockey team. Sponsored by the RIT Epsilon Lambda chapter of Delta Sigma Pi (professional business fraternity), the lecture is admission free and open to the general public.

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WAR CORRESPONDENT VISITS RIT ON OCT. 5 -- Noted author, lecturer, and war correspondent, Miss Ruth Sheldon Knowles, will visit RIT and address student groups on Monday, Oct. 5, and talk on "The Petroleum Industry and Ecology."

Among other topics she will discuss will be her recent six-week editorial research trip in the Middle East, North Africa, South Vietnam, and the North Slope of Alaska.

From 8 to 9 a.m. on Oct. 5 she will address the Social Consequences of Technology Class, College of General Studies, taught by Prof. Edward O. Hennick, (room 2232); from 12 noon to 1 p.m. -- Ecological Awareness in Literature, College of General Studies, taught by Dr. Carolyn Snyder, (room A230); and from 2 - 3 p.m. Introduction to Engineering, College of Engineering, taught by Dean Edward T. Kirkpatrick (room 1149).

Miss Knowles has made four trips around the world in the last five years, concentrating on the less developed countries. She has visited major world trouble spots, including Castro's Cuba, and has served three times as a war correspondent in South Vietnam where she was named honorary member of the "Green Berets," the U.S. Special Forces unit.

The granddaughter and daughter of independent oilmen, Mrs. Knowles also is a petroleum specialist who has held a number of posts as consultant to the United States, Mexican and Venezuelan governments.

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REHABILITATION WORKERS TO VISIT RIT -- More than 300 professional rehabilitation workers representing every state in the nation will visit the National Technical Institute for the Deaf at Rochester Institute of Technology on Oct. 14.

The "NTID Day" is a wrap-up to the 1970 Convention of the Professional Rehabilitation Workers of the Adult Deaf (PRWAD) scheduled Oct. 11-14 in Rochester.

A team of administrators will present an inside look into the goals and objectives of NTID. Guest speakers include Dr. Robert Frisina, RIT vice president and director of NTID; Dean William E. Castle; Dr. Ross Stuckless, director of Research and Development; Dr. Jack Clarq, director of Student Development.

In addition to lectures and a tour of the NTID facilities at RIT, rehabilitation workers will visit with deaf students, many of whom they recommended for the NTID program.

--LEGACY OF ANNE FRANK: Just four years before Hitler's rise to power, Anne Frank was born in Germany of a wealthy and cultured Jewish family. The political events of the time intruded not only on the quiet tenor of her days, but also on the lives of millions of others.

--THE DIARY OF ANNE FRANK: Young Anne Frank died in a Nazi concentration camp. Prior to her capture she lived in hiding in an attic above a spice factory in Amsterdam. There she recorded her observations of her family and friends undergoing the same ordeal--the tension of the time and conflicts arising from their cramped quarters, severely rationed food, and limitation of movement.

CLOSELY WATCHED TRAINS: about a 17 year-old trainee in a provincial railway station during the German occupation of Czechoslovakia. Admission for both films is \$1.00.

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NATIONAL THEATRE FOR THE DEAF PERFORMS OCT. 8 and 9 -- David Hays, noted Broadway stage designer, will direct the National Theatre of the Deaf (NTD) when it performs October 8 and 9 at 8:15 p.m. in RIT's Ingle Memorial Auditorium, of the College-Alumni Union.

Hays is presently making preparations for two new Broadway productions -- "Two By Two," a musical by Richard Rodgers, under the direction of Joe Layton; and "The Gingerbread Lady," a comedy by Neil Simon.

But in his connection with NTD, Hays will direct a deaf company comprised of 12 deaf and 3 hearing actors. The cast will be led by Bernard Bragg, who has built an international reputation on stage and television.

NTD will present "Woyzeck," adapted from the German classic by Georg Buchner, and "Journeys," a dramatic montage of selections from collections of children's literature, "Journeys and Miracles."

In addition to the performances, NTD will conduct workshops for area high school and college drama groups on October 6 and 7 beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Ingle Auditorium.

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RIT HOSTS KODAK FILM AWARD JUDGING -- Preliminary judging for the 8th annual Kodak Teenage Movie Awards was held Friday, October 2, in the Motion Picture and Illustration studios on the fourth floor of the Frank E. Gannett building. Over 1,000 films were shown.

Kodak employees and RIT faculty and students made up the 30-three-man juries for the one day showing of films by 12 to 19-year-old filmmakers.

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TWO TECHNICAL PAPERS SCHEDULED FROM GARC-- Two technical papers on printing technology from the Graphic Arts Research Center of the College of Graphic Arts and Photography have been scheduled for presentation at technical society meetings during October.

The first, written by GARC technology supervisor Zenon Elyjiw and Dr. John A.C. Yule, GARC research associate, will be delivered Oct. 7 in London, England, by Dr. Yule at the Pira/IARIGAI international conference on applied lithographic technology. It concerns the newly developed GARC Process Ink Gamut (PIG) Chart.

The second, written by RIT graduate Clarence Gutteridge, as his master's thesis under Dr. Yule's guidance, will be delivered Oct. 23 in Washington, D.C., at the Society of Photographic Scientists and Engineers Symposium on Color Photographic Systems. Gutteridge's paper concerns a computerized method for calculating the proper conditions to obtain best results in three-color photomechanical printing.

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CHEMISTRY DEPT. SPONSORS SEMINAR SERIES -- A series of nine lecture programs by prominent scientists will be presented in a "Fall Seminar Series," sponsored by the Department of Chemistry.

Noted faculty members and speakers representing the American Medical Association, California Institute of Technology, Clarkson College of Technology, Warner Lambert Research Institute, University of Illinois, and Bell Telephone Laboratories will be featured in the weekly seminars. Two RIT faculty members, Dr. Kenneth C.D. Hickman and Dr. William N. Bigler, will lecture on October 22 and November 12, respectively.

All lectures, with the exception of two evening programs, will begin at 4 p.m. in room 2178 of the College of Science. On October 8 and December 1 the seminar programs will be held at 8 p.m. in the College of Science Lecture Hall (1250).

The seminar series is a joint presentation with the Rochester Section, American Chemical Society. Further particulars concerning topics and speakers can be obtained by contacting the Department of Chemistry in the College of Science.

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RIT MAKES UNIQUE CREDIT OFFERING TO TELEVISION VIEWERS --

Television watching for credit, an educational development of fairly recent vintage, is being given a new dimension by RIT's College of Continuing Education.

Three credits in General Education will be given for the successful completion of a course (#3233), centered around the highly acclaimed television series, "Civilisation", which will begin locally on WXXI (Channel 21), 8:30 p.m., Wednesday, October 7, and run for 13 weeks. Re-runs will be shown on Sundays at 9 p.m.

The programs will also be broadcast on Channel 2 of RIT's closed circuit television system.

"Civilisation", based on the book of the same name by British art historian Sir Kenneth Clark, depicts the growth of Western civilization, beginning with the Dark Ages.

To fulfill requirements, the student will be asked to watch all 13 segments of the television series, read Clark's text, complete a project or paper, take a two-hour examination, and attend at least one group seminar during the 13 weeks.

Seminars, which may be held on a weekly basis, will offer the students an opportunity to work closely -- often on a one-to-one basis -- with a member of RIT's faculty, staff, or administration.

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CLUB FOOTBALL OPENS SEASON ON WINNING NOTE-- Tom Coughlin's debut as head football coach at RIT was a pleasant one, as his freshmen-laden club rolled over Utica College, 21-6. While the defense, led by senior captain Bob Peters, was limiting Utica to 33 net total yards, the Tiger running game piled up close to 300 yards--in the style of Coughlin's alma mater, Syracuse.

The pacesetters were two newcomers to RIT football, junior Pat Muscarella (129 yards on 24 carries, plus a touchdown) and sophomore Joe Widay (117 yards on 22 carries).

Muscarella's backup man, Tony Wolanski, scored a touchdown, as did Peters, who stole the ball from the Utica quarterback and rumbled 15 yards for the score. Peters' touchdown gave RIT a 14-6 lead early in the fourth quarter. A fumble recovery by Jim Dickson, just two plays later, set up Wolanski's clinching touchdown. Utica's only touchdown came after a blocked punt was fallen on in the end zone by a Utica player.
