(Correspondencia particular.)

Paris, 25 de mayo.

Las diferentes cartas que recibimos de los departamentos nos marcan que en todas partes los electores constitucionales estan resueltos en elegir a los diputados que votaron por el discurso en contestacion al del rey...

Un buque que llego a Livorno procedente de Oran, nos anuncia que 20,000 Bedouins (Arabes) habian llegado el 28 de abril a Argel, para socorrer a diez y siete tropas...

Todas las familias de los consules se han retirado en los campos, por que corria generalmente en Argel los rumores de que el 30 de mayo estaria la expedicion francesa en las costas de Africa.

Hoy se declara que el Principe Leopoldo habia dirigido formalmente al duque de Wellington su renuncia de la soberania de la Grecia, y que Mr. Eynard habia recibido una carta de S. A. R. en la que le participaba su renuncia definitiva.

Esta noticia es confirmada por la comunicacion que hizo el Lord Alberdeen, al parlamento, el 24 de mayo.

Las noticias de la escuadra del apostadero de Argel, son que se observan en la costa de cuando en cuando, tropas de gente moros que tocan el pais como para adivinar el sitio del desembarco.

Se han las noticias que se han recibido de Tolon nada tenemos que temer de aquel bay, el cual parece que quiere permanecer amigo de la Francia; de consiguiente solo tendremos que combatir con los argelinos y los tripolitinos.

El 5 llego a Tolon el barco de vapor la Esteele al mando de Mr. Sarlat, teniente de navio, procedente de las aguas de Argel, con pliegos del comandante del buque escritos el 4; de modo que en quince dias de 24 horas sabe el gobierno lo que pasa en Argel.

Las cartas que ha traido la Esteele, parece que se han desembarcado en una bahia que forma una playa abundante de arena blanca; situada a tres o 4 de Argel. Los argelinos siguen levantando sobre la costa nuevas baterias.

La expedicion de Tolon se compone de los buques de guerra siguientes: Primera escuadra: El navio almirante la Provence, el Trident y el Basilard; las fragatas la Pallas, la Iphigenie, la Surveillante, la Dilon, la Groeniere, la Hermine, la Melpomene, la Amphitrite, la Venus, la Belle Gabrielle, la Magicienne, la Medee, la Esperance, la Arctique; los buques de vapor Sphinx, Soudier, y la Ville de Havre.

Segunda escuadra. Los navios el Trident, el Suberbe, el Agaveas, la Ville de Marseille, el Duquesne, la Couronne, el Scipion, el Maréchal, el Neuf; las fragatas la Marie-Therese, la Jeanne-d'Arc, la Arctique, la Trinite, la Thémis, la Gloire, las corvetas la Caravelle y la Grithye; los buques de vapor Soudier, el Courrier, el Rapide, y el Hussard.

Columnas de la derecha compuestas del capitán de reserva, teniendo seis lanchas de guerra la Corneille y el bergantin el Dragon. Estas columnas se hallan a 4 millas de distancia del ejército del centro.

Primera columna. Las corvetas la Honite, el Marr, el Bayonais, el Ithone, el Lybio, el Chameau, el Adour, la Victorieuse, y la Vignonne; las bombas de la Venus, el Finistere y el Volcan.

Segunda columna. Las bombardas la Dore, el Anachron, el Cyclope, el Volcan, el Hécla; las corvetas Robusta, el Astrolabe, la Geronie y la Truite; los bergantines el Paque y el Zebre; las gabarras el Magonin y el Léopard; la polvorina No. 30 situada a 2 millas de distancia, y el No. 26 a la misma distancia de esta.

La flotilla de transporte es compuesta de 300 embarcaciones del comercio. Elon 19 de mayo.

Hoy los comandantes de los buques leyeron a sus respectivas tripulaciones la siguiente orden del dia dada por el almirante Dupre. Todos los marinos y soldados prorrumpieron con un vivo entusiasmo los gritos de: Partamos, vivos el Rey.

ORDEN DEL DIA.

A bordo del navio Provence el 18 de mayo. Oficiales superiores, subalternos y marinos: "Llamados con vuestros hermanos de armas del ejército espedicionario a tomar parte en la suerte de una empresa, que el honor y la humanidad ordena, debéis partir la gloria. De nuestros comunes esfuerzos y de vuestra perfecta union; es, de quienes el rey, y la Francia, aguardan la reparacion del insulto hecho al pavillon francés. Recobremos los recuerdos que en circunstancias iguales nos han legado nuestros padres! Imitemos los y el triunfo es seguro! Partamos. Viva el Rey!!!"

Se lee en el periódico el Avis de Tolon, lo siguiente: Un telegrafo inventado por un almirante francés para hacer uso de él de dia y noche, servira para seguir la correspondencia del cuartel general con la vanguardia y con la escuadra en la campaña de Argel. Otros dos de la misma especie se han colocado, el uno en el fuerte Lamalgue, y el otro en la torre del puerto; cuyos dos puntos se corresponden entre sí dia y noche para conocimiento e instruccion de los militares destinados a este servicio. Esta maquina se hizo experiancia de este genero de comunicaciones, a vista del general del ejército, quien colocado en el puerto del arsenal, ha hecho pasar muchas veces a los Lamalgue, que responden a todas cosas con exactitud; puede facilmente inferirse lo útil que será este servicio en una guerra donde puede haber interrupcion de comunicaciones en el ejército de tierra, y entre este y la armada. Los fanales que se emplean para las señales de noche, son de corriente de aire y reflejos que pueden percibirse a 3 y 6 leguas en la mar.

HABANA, 5 de julio. Por el correo maritimo número 1º, mandado de D. Miguel Anes, que entró en este puerto el jueves del sábado 3 del corriente, procedente de Cadix, con la estrordinaria navegacion de 31 dias, hemos recibido nuestra correspondencia general de la Península.

SS. MM. y AA. quedaban el 25 de mayo en el Real Sitio de Aranjuez sin novedad en su importante salud.

Entre algunas de las distinciones concedidas por S. M. a los habitantes de esta Isla, encontramos a los Sres. brigadieres D. José María Chacon, conde de Casa Bayona y D. José Ricardo O'Farrell, agenciados con la gran cruz de Isabel la Católica; y al aucaerista este digno y bien merecido premio debido a las virtudes cívicas, a la felicidad personal, a los méritos y servicios dilatados de tan esclarecidos patriotas, no podemos menos que honrarlos de un placer interno, hijo de los sentimientos mas puros y sinceros.
