As will be recalled, a conference between committees of the board of trade, chamber of commerce and Voters' Lengue and city council was recently held to discuss the subject, and the upshot of the discussion was a motion requesting the council to urge the authorities at the capital to incorporate the board.

The board of trade council dealt with the question yesterday and decided that it should be more fully discussed. As a matter of fact, it was pretty thoroughly considered at the conference the other day, and it was only after the various phases had been fully dealt with that the resolution referred to, was passed. 

EXPERIENCES OF

STORY OF THE WRECK TOLD BY MEN HERE

Over Forty-eight Hours of Awful Misery Spent on Sinking Schooner In a Storm.

Captain Emil Ramlose, First Officer Victor Gullin, Second Officer William Hallgren, Frank Le Strange, cook, and seventeen Indians who formed the crew

of the wrecked soaler Geo. W. Prescott, arrived home from the Sound on the stamer Majestic yesterday evening. Nearly all bore marks of the terrible trials they had passed through. The captain's hands are scarred, the second mate carvies his hand in a sling, and others are marked in different ways, indicating that the struggle for I fe was not alone that of fighting with angry waves but with floating wreckage.

The wreck of the Prescott, according to the stories of master and second mate, is one of the most unique in the annals of shipping on this coast. When struck by the gale south of the Columbia river those of her crew on deck, consisting of her captain and three Indians, were thrown into the sea, the vessel almost turned a complete somersault, and the men in her cabins were hurled out of their bunks and rolled about like so many beans in a bottle. They were half drowned. Of this awful experience, happening as it did in the middle of the night, few have a vivid recollection.

"I was sleeping on the windward side of the vessel." said Second Mate Hallgren, "and remember distinctly the awful crish of the seas against the side of the vessel. I was pitched I know not where, and it seemed as if my head had struck something hard which dized me. After that I did not know what had happened. I did not even know that the schooner had turned over: When I regained cousciousness I found all on deck working like Trojans, They were balling out and I went to their assistance."

Captain Ramlose remembers the vessel having been thrown over and himself and three Indians swept into the sea, As to exactly what followed during the next few minutes he knows nothing. "I felt as if I wanted to go down," he said." I did so twice and on rising a second time my hand came in contact with a wire. I grasped it instinctively. It seemed to arouse me from a stupor and I clung to it until through my own efforts and the aid of an Indian I was hauled on deck. The three Indians who were cast adrift like myself managed with one exception to swim b

sank."

The drowned man's name was Joe Williams. Victor Gullin was struck on the head by the stove and stunned. He lay as if dead for a time, but on regaining consciousness "turned to" on deck.
